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

The Story of ____

There seems to be a mystery concerning the origin of Bulgarian folk dances. Perhaps it is because, as is true in most of our folk dances of other countries, descriptions of dance and references to them have been handed down from generation to generation during many centuries to the present villagers. Folk dances of these early years do not differ greatly from those that are being done at the present time; however, some have been modified, while others have completely disappeared.

One of the most popular dances performed by all the village folk is the Horo. Another very popular dance is the Rachenitsa, which can be danced by one, two or more persons. Although there are many variations in the dance, it is considered a typical Bulgarian dance. As a solo dance it is performed by experts who take a great deal of pride in showing outstanding technique and ingenuity. When danced by two or more people it becomes a contest, where each person attempts to outdance the other.

Men and Women of all ages participate in the folk dances which are danced throughout the year on holidays and community festivals. The folk dances are danced with abandon, and include many movements, especially in the feet.

As is also true of folk dances of other countries, the Bulgarian dance reflects the real life and occupations of the Bulgarian people, and the terrain in which they live.

Dancing, as well as singing, has a large part in Bulgarian customs. Bulgarian Ritual Dancing has existed since pagon times. Their true origin can be traced back to some essential human needs, thoughts and feelings. It is through their dances that the Bulgarian people, in earlier times, have expressed their desire for fertility, prosperity and a happy life. Modern facilities have enabled man to achieve his goal without, what seemed to be, the magic power of rituals. Wherever customs are preserved, however, these dances are still popular at festivals and carnivals.

The women who dance in the festivals on Saints' days keep special clothes for these particular occasions and wear richly decorated headdresses.

A Bulgarian peasant wedding is a great occasion for the folk dances. The relatives and guests of the Bride dress in character costumes and perform dances in drama form. Only on rare occasions does the Bride participate. Horos are particularly popular at weddings.

The folklore of the Bulgarian people is exceptionally rich in poetry and music, and to this day the people have preserved their occasion for singing. The song expresses their experiences in sorrow, in work, and in their love. Through amature groups of singers the folk song is sung in Clubs and houses of culture. In recent years singing contests have been performed, which have had a tremendous effect on the Bulgarian people, with the reresult that songs are now being recorded and will be published so others may enjoy them.

HOLIDAYS AND FESTIVALS OF BULGARIA

JANUARY 1 - NEW YEAR'S DAY

A great holiday, especially for children, who bring little offerings to their elders, kiss their hands, and receive gifts of money in return. In rural disctricts they wish the old people a"Happy New Year", while switching them on the back with red-berried cornel twigs.

The most characteristic New Year delicacies consist of special holiday cakes and geese, placed on a bed of sauerkraut.

FEBRUARY 2 - VODITSI (Little Waters)

A procession goes to the river where the priest casts the cross into the water into a hole broken in the ice. Volunteers jump into the river to recover the precious object, receiving afterward the priest's benediction.

MARCH 3 - TREATY OF SAN STEFANO

Celebrating the liberation of Bulgaria from the Turkish yoke in 1877. This main political holiday of Bulgaria is observed by patriotic dances, parades, contests of the Sokols (athletic societies for young men), folk dances on the village green, marching and singing in the schools, and out-of-door picnics, at which roast lamb is eaten.

EASTER -

Just after Midnight, Easter morning, thousands bearing torches wait without the Cathedral of St. Sofia, darkened except for a light in one window. Everyone breaks his gaily decorated red or purple egg against that of his neighbor, an act sympolic of Christ's breaking the bonds of death and rising from the grave. Roast Lamb and cakes decorated with eggs are served at the Easter feast.

APRIL 23 - ST. GEORGE'S DAY

Festival of cavalry and horsemen. Singing by unaccompanied choirs is a feature of the special chruch services.

MAY 11 - ST. CYRIL and ST. METHODIUS

A great spring festival is held on this "Holyday of Letters" in honor of the two brothers believed to have devised the characters new used in the written language of all Slavs of the Eastern confession. The day is celebrated by the dramatic performances, historical pageants, mass singing, and exercises by the children.

SEPTEMBER 19 - UNION OF EASTERN ROUMELIA WITH BULGARIA, 1885

A political holiday celebrated in much the same way as on March 3rd.


NOVEMBER 2 - ALL SOULS' DAY

A day of mourning. In Rural Districts, candles and food offerings, consisting of wheat and honey, are placed on the graces and then given to passers-by with the greeting 'May God forgive your sins'.

DECEMBER 24 - CHRISTMAS

The children receive gifts from Grandpa Koleda, the ancient Winter God. Before breakfast, corn is put into a stocking and a portion sprinkled on the doorstep by the head of the house who says "Christ is Born". The others reply, "Indeed, he is born". Then the custom of wishing begins. Sparks are struck from the Christmas log with a wish to each blow. Health to the farm and a heavy crop are washed for; the ashes of the log are then gathered, a coin is hidden in them, and a wish for the good harvest is again made. The same custom is observed in some parts of Serbia.

COSTUMES FOR A BULGARIAN COUPLE

COAT:

White Sateen, waist length, trimmed with deep blue braid. Red and gold motifs may be added.

BLOUSE:

White cotton, decorated in red and gold, with a border of blue braid around the neck.

SASH:

Red woolen material.

TROUSERS:

White Sateen, trimmed in blue braid. CAP:

Red wool, shaped like an inverted bowl.

SHOES:

House slippers of red felt, with red pompoms at center point at instep.

STOCKINGS:

Red.

HEAD-DRESS:

A white cotton scarf with blue and gold decorations, edged with tassels of blue.

BLOUSE:

Should be of blue cotton material with yellow polkadots.

APRON:

Blue should predominate or be the background color for a blue and red plaid material.

SKIRT:

White cotton, full skirted, trimmed with blue and yellow braid, spaced vertically on skirt and around bottom edge.

BLOOMERS:

(Which show below skirt) are of blue material:

SHOES:

Felt house slippers of red.

STOCKI NGS:

White with stripes of red.

INTRODUCING . . . MILLIE COBURN

In the Sacramento area many conversations begin with "This is Millie" - what better introduction can there be to her folk dance biography?

Millie was born in El Dorado County, on a ranch which her German grandfather developed a year before the Gold Rush, and which remained in the family for almost a hundred years. Her paternal grandmother came from Hanover, Germany and the marriage of the grandparents was arranged by their families. On her mother's side, her great grandmother was direct from Ireland, and in the early days operated the Post Office and General Store at Lotus, El Dorado County, so Millie grew up on California history.

She was educated in the Sacramento schools and is a secretary by profession. She started folk dancing in Merced in 1949, with Circle M Folk Dancers. She



later became the instructor of the group and assisted in establishing the Merced Workshop which brought dancers from throughout the County together. This Workshop is still active in Newman and retains many of its original members. She was a member of the Fresno Council Workshop for five years, and Fresno is still "home"!

Millie was active in the Merced County Folk Dance Council during its existence, served as its secretary, and Club and Council representative to Federation affairs for many years.

She came to Sacramento in 1957 for a "short sojourn" which has continued to the present. She immediately became active with *Tahoe Swingers*, served as secretary, was Sacramento Institute Chairman in 1959, and is Sacramento Council secretary this year. She was appointed to the Federation Research Committee in 1958, and to the Teachers Institute Committee in 1960, on which she still serves.

Millie Coburn

Millie is employed by Aerojet-General Corporation in the Reliability & Quality Control Division of the POLARIS program, and is as enthusiastic about the Space Age as she is about folk dancing. She is a charter member of the Cordova Chapter, National Secretaries Association (International) a professional organization, has served on the Bylaws Committee of her Chapter and is now Bylaws Committee Chairman.

She considers herself blessed with co-workers of foreign birth, who take a sincere personal interest in her research projects, furnishing interesting, authentic information about their native dances. They assist in translating from original source material, when available, and vie with each other to establish accuracy. They are presently assisting in the translation of a volume of old Swedish folk dances for use by Camellia City Folk Dancers, and are proud and pleased to find a group of Americans interested in perpetuating the culture of their native country through their folk dances.

Many persons have contributed to Millie's development in the folk dance field, but she speaks fondly of two persons directly responsible for her enthusiasm for research, who pointed out that folk dancing can provide much more than recreational enjoyment.

One of the persons is Ruth Allen Roah, her first teacher, who urged her to try teaching, and who introduced her to the infinite variety and advantages of Folk Dance Camp at University of the Pacific, which Millie has attended for ten years. The other person is Miriam Lidster, who, through a presentation at Camp a number of years ago, influenced her decision to concentrate on research into the broad cultural and historical aspects of folk dance.

Millie sincerely believes that association with many nationalities through their folk dances will promote a better understanding between peoples — that through folk dance perhaps all people may come together, one step at a time, to eventually close the circle, the center of which will be international understanding and good will. She follows Miriam's philosophy that there can be no animosity toward your neighbor in your heart when you join with him in a dance.



SPEAKING OF THINGS

The other day I received a note stating that if I liked to be considered an 'old timer' in CHANGS International Folk Dancers, did I know WHO taught Mr. Song Chang the dances that made him so famous. I don't consider myself an 'old timer' in Changs. I joined eight years after Changs was formed. The person sending the query seems to miss just WHAT Song Chang did that made him famous.

I don't believe Song Chang lays claim to any special dances invented. On the contrary, Song Chang, way back before International Folk Dancing became an adult recreation activity, had an IDEA. Quoting from October 1944 Let's Dance, an article written by Song Chang states, "So it was with this international good neighbor idea that Changs was founded over five years ago (1938). It has since been known as the mother Club of all organized Clubs of California. I am certain that in other states similar Clubs have been formed by some of Changs members'.

He went on to state that International Folk Dancing was nothing new, even before Changs came into being, it had been taught at recreation centers, dance studios, schools and colleges (my wife Kathleen learned her first folk dancing at the S.F. Recreation Center on Sacramento Street in San Francisco, back in 1936 and 1937, I remember struggling through some squares at the American Youth Hostel Centers around the same time). Song Chang and others probably danced at Mama Gravander's Swedish Center of Pacific Avenue around this time.

The new IDEA for which Song Chang is famous, was an organized international folk dance group, financed by a group of enthusiasts and open to the public, not just a part of any other activity. He went on to state . . . "These first pioneers, Changs, went into it not only for their own pleasure, but to spread the movement far and wide. I knew that any large scale growth could only come about through a multiple of Clubs organized on a true democratic basis".

Today, are our Clubs organized on the same democratic basis? Do we have the same zest for forming new groups that these pioneers had?— or do we tend to hold never ending classes with never ending lists of new dances. Have we taken the fun and pleasure out of Folk Dancing?— do individual rule over their groups with the stern iron hand of a dictator?

How many of our Clubs are self-sustaining as were the early Clubs? I know the strongest of our Federation Clubs today are those which stand

on their own two feet. They rent their halls, own their sound and records, does your Club? Is your Club a democratic group, holding regular business meetings (much as we hate them), conduct its meeting under Robert's Rules of order, self financing, and still maintaining its fun and dancing?

If the majority of our Clubs are not true democratic groups, I think its about time we STOP, LOOK, and LISTEN — STOP being just a Class with Mr. X providing the records, dances and lessons — LOOK about you, are you bringing new people into the movement, are you keeping your members? — LISTEN to what Song Chang had to say about the multiple of strongly organized Clubs.

It matters little WHO taught Song Chang his dances, what really matters

is what he DID with them.



RACHENITSA NA SRYATA

(BULGARIA)

Rachenitsa Na Sryata (rah-cheh-nee'-tsa nah sree-ah-tah) was introduced by Michel Cartier at the 1961 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp. Mr. Cartier learned this version of the dance in Bulgaria in 1957 and again in 1959. The dance is performed during the wedding festivities when the families of the bride and groom meet. "Na sryata" means "to meet" and this determines the character of the dance — the families meet, part, and meet again. Many different steps are possible. The ones in this description are as Mr. Cartier presented the dance.

MUSIC:

Xopo LP-I-A, band 6, "Pred Tsenkini-Rachenitza".

Folk Dance LP - MH 109, band 4, "Rachenitsa from Briagovo".

FORMATION:

Two lines of dancers, 8ft apart, facing each other. Preferable to alternate M and W, but not mandatory. Dancers grasp belt of adjacent dancer, R hand over, L hand under. End dancers carry handkerchief and twirl it as the spirit moves them.

STEPS AND STYLING:

5-8

9-16

The ftwork is precise and controlled, posture erect. The dance is swift moving, always flowing in feeling. The 7/16 rhythm is broken into 3 cts per meas: quick (cts 1,2); quick (cts 3,4); slow (cts 5,6,7). For purposes of this description the meas cts will be given as 1,2,3 (quick, quick, slow).

Basic Step: Leap fwd onto ball of R ft (ct 1); close L to R, on ball of ft (ct 2); leap fwd onto ball of R ft, bending L knee sharply and bringing L ft up in back (ct 3). The vertical motion of the step is emphasized more than the horizontal motion, although the step is used to move fwd and bwd during the dance.

Chukche: Raise and lower the heel of a supporting ft sharply.

Pas de Basque: Step bwd on R (ct 1); cross L in front of R, taking wt (ct 2); step R in place (ct 3). Repeat beginning L, continuing to move bwd.

- R pointed to R, hop on L (ct 1); R pointed fwd, hop on L (ct 2); step R across in front of L (ct 3). During this step, the R ft is moved from R to L with a sweeping motion.
- Repeat action of meas 1, (Fig III), reversing ft work.
- 3-4 Repeat action of meas 1-2, (Fig III), Lines move fwd during these 4 meas.
- 5-8 Beginning R, move bwd with 4 Basic Steps.
- 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8, (Fig III).

IV. MOTHER-IN-LAW

- Turn 1/8 L so R shoulder leads, hop on L, lifting R with bent knee (ct 1); step twd ctr on R with a stamp (ct 2); close L to R, taking wt (ct 3).
- 2-4 Repeat action of meas 1, (Fig IV), 3 more times, advancing twd opp line.
- 5-8 Face ctr, do 4 Pas de Basques, moving bwd, beginning R.
- 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8, (Fig IV).

V. JUMP AND HOOK

- Jump lightly on both ft, R crossed in front of L (ct 1); in same pos bounce lightly twice (cts 2,3).
- 2 Repeat action of meas 1, (Fig V), reversing ft work.
- 3-4 Repeat action of meas 1-2, (Fig V).
- Hop L, lifting R fwd, knee extended (ct 1); step on R, adjacent to and on the L side of L ft (ct 2); lift L ft bwd, bending knee, just to free it (ct 3).
- Lift L ft in front, knee bent (cts 1,2); replace L ft exactly where it was (behind and to R side of R ft) (ct 3). NOTE: The action in meas 5 and 6 is smooth and rapid.
- With R ft crossed behind L, jump lightly hwd 3 times (cts 1,2,3).
- 8 With L ft crossed behind R, jump lightly bwd 3 times (cts 1,2,3).
- 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8, (Fig V).

VI. BASIC AND CROSS STEP

- 1-8 Beginning R, move bwd with 8 very small Basic Steps, so lines are again about 8 It apart.
- Jump into pos with R ft crossed in front of L, wt equally distributed (ct 1); hold (ct 2); jump with ft apart (ct 3).
- 10 Repeat action of meas 1, (Fig VI), reversing ft work.
- 11 Repeat action of meas 1, (Fig VI), exactly.
- With hoth ft together chug fwd (ct 1); jump with ft apart (ct 2); bring ft together sharply (ct 3).

Repeat dance from beginning. On Xopo recording dance is done twice through and ends after the first 16 meas of the dance the third time.
