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GUELAGUETIA



The Zapotec group of OAXACA (wah-hah-kah), a mountainous state in southeastern Mexico, has had since the preconquest times a festival called Guelaguetza (gehlah-geh-tzah). This is a gay fiesta of song, dance and gift giving. It is similar to Las Canacuas of the Tarascans of Michoacan in central Mexico.

Although the Zapotecas are the predominant group of Oaxaca, other decidedly different peoples live in pockets of the various mountain ranges. Each group has its traditional clothing, food and customs; therefore the time when all of the people of the valleys and the heights gather for their celebration in honor of a special guest is an excellent time to be in Oaxaca's capital city, Oaxaca de Juarez.

During the presidential campaign in January 1952 we Walters were fortunate enough to be in Oaxaca when the Guelaguetza was offered for the president-elect, Ruiz Cortines. Our good fortune included becoming acquainted with Cuauhtemoc Calderon, a local school Mr. Calderon accompanied us to the Plaza de la Danza on rehearsal day and stopped every group on its way to the dance area so that we might have a posed picture. When the groups danced, there was an opportunity to tape their music as well as to photograph them in action.

Several very primitive groups did simple preconquest dances which included one or more tigres and two or more folkloric clowns. Any cat-like animal is called a tigre by rural Mexicans. The dancer may have a gray or a yellow costume with spots resembling those of a jaguar or of the ocelot. The folkloric clowns are often Death and the Devil.



but *El Leon* (the lion), an old, old man, a cowboy character, or others are also seen. The clowns usually have ropes or whips, and students of the folklore of the rural Mexican dance state that the clown's duty is to keep the audience from encroaching on the space for the performers, and to kick any dancer who doesn't step it off fast enough, as well as the usual duty of amusing the audience. Other extras consist of *Los*



Toros, men who carry frames to represent bulls, which they hold aloft and use in a playful bullfight as part of the day's entertainment. The important non-dancer in any group is the M.C. He drills the dancers, makes all necessary arrangements, and is a boss who has complete authority.

Two groups we saw in '52 were doing quadrilles in imitation of the French, who were present in Oaxaca in

great numbers during Maximilian's short reign in the Each group had sixteen dancers, all male, 1860's. though by looking at the size of the feet, it was easy to see that none were women. One of these groups had simple masks and more or less everyday clothing. other group, probably from a wealthier community, was resplendent in brilliant costumes with hats which The costumes and cloth masks sported gall plumes. were particolored in the way of Pierrot and Pierrette. The dances were well-learned European squares. Los Pachecos, the Herdsmen, had only one square of dancers plus two clowns and two bullfighters. The four dancers who represented women had expensive white masks and they burlesqued the whites, or city people. The cowboys or herdsmen had very dark brown masks; burlesque was of themselves, showing themselves to much darker than in real life, and even One frame was badly damaged in the lively crashing fight of Los Toros.

Yalaltecas from mountainous Yalalag, and Chinantecas from neighboring settlements, wore a strange headdress composed of many strands of heavy black yarn twisted and coiled into a traditional wig. The head-

dress looks very heavy, and very warm, and it is! In olden times the yarn was intertwined with the hair and undisturbed for five or six months. Modern ideas of hygiene have changed all of that and now the ladies use the headdress only for the fiesta and put it on or take it off as they would a hat. Both of these groups use a hand-spun, handwoven huipil (wee peel). This huipil is a long straight blouse with head and arm openings. It is so wide that the shoulders hang over the arm to make a sort of sleeve.

The huipil of the Yalalteca has only a slit for the head opening. It is all white with beautiful ribbing woven in at the shoulders. A twisted rope of rayon threads decorates the bottom of the neck opening front and back, ending in long fringed tassels. Some fiesta huipiles have hand embroidered flowers of rayon threads in four vertical strips in front, in back and at the sides. The skirt is also handwoven in narrow brown and white horizontal stripes. It is without waistband, and is pleated and held up by a belt or sash. These women wear home made sandals made of muleskin.



The handspun, handwoven huipiles of the Chinantecas are quite unlike those of their neighbors, although the style differs only in the neckline, which is round in this case. The thread is of different quality, and designs in color are woven into the cloth instead of being added as embroidery.

Although both groups do their weaving on the strap loom, the Yalaltecas make a wide cloth, whereas the Chinanteca makes three narrow ones which is then put to gether by tiny hand stitch. Another variant is that the Chinantecas use commercial cloth for their wraparound

skirts, turkey red rather heavy cotton cloth with narrow, widely-spaced yellow, black or white stripes.

Mazatecas, also a mountain group, have the strangest huipil of any Oaxaca people. It consists of beautifully hand embroidered squares of cloth set together with a stripe composed of satin ribbons in cherry red and deep, bright blue. Below each of two rows of embroidered squares are horizontal stripes composed of eight rows of the cherry and blue ribbons. The round neck is finished with commercial lace, something over four inches wide, laid flat over the huipil, and over this lace four pieces of narrow ribbon are sewed. spaced so that the last one allows the edges of the lace to show. The final ornamentation seems "way out". It is a ruffle of rayon-like material attached to the arm opening, whose color seems to have nothing to do with the colors of the embroidery nor of the ribbons.

The Mazateca skirt is made of heavy white drill (a durable cotton fabric in twill weave) with a strip of dark red yarn embroidery at the hem, and a narrow blue ribbon for the very bottom. An occasional geometric design of black yarn may appear in the embroidered strip. The most interesting of the skirts have charming lively animals embroidered above the hem-stripe in the same deep red yarn.

The best known of Oaxaca's costumes comes from the Isthmus of Tehuantepec. Tehuanas of several towns still wear heavily embroidered satin or velvet dresses with a lace pleating, called the olan, for fiestas and dances. For very special occasions they still don the famous baby-dress, olan grande, with the heavily starched pleating of the hemline as a

frame for the wearer's face. At a dance in the town of Tehuantepec we saw dozens of girls in the traditional costume without the headdress. They wore their hair in braids hanging down, and their braids were made very heavy and fat by the use of wide satin ribbons, two strands of ribbon to one of hair. More often the braids

are seen atop the head, still entwined with ribbons. Men's costumes have not been described, since they are usually the white pajama-type suit so well known However, some Oaxaquenos wear colored shirts. and south of the State Capitol, there are groups in which the men wear only shorts. Especially is this true in the Isthmus, where some farmers are to be seen in shorts colored Mexican pink. However, the hat is the great variant in male wear. A tall black felt and a shorter one with a peaked top were ordered in our collection. They are worn by villagers of Oaxaca, and the reason we had to have them made to order is that we Anglos use larger head sizes than the Latins. exceedingly tall straw hat is worn by

the Mixtecas of northern Oaxaca, and this hat is often used for a comedy dance. On the roads of that part of the State men and women may be seen walking along the roadside path weaving hats as they go.

To me the most exciting costume at the Guelaguetza in '52 was that of Los Negritos. Authorities have written a great deal about the dance of Los Negritos, since it is done

in all parts of the Republic, and since it is a dance that antedates Cortez. The Little Negro was the Aztec god of music, dance and flowers. He must have worn a black mask, perhaps no finer, but possibly more grotesque than those we saw. Our Negritos had rich velvet suits with pants of peddle-pusher length, long pink stockings and black shoes. Their hats were black, and all of the black of the outfit was adorned with gold braid and some sequinned designs. The costumes were gorgeous and represented an outlay of the money income of the entire year. The dance was primitive and its pattern was of interest only to folklorists or for its basic rhythm.

A Guelaguetza of the importance of the one we saw, which brings so many traditionally costumed groups to the capitol, is not often to be found. The average

tourist is lucky if he sees the costumes and dances of Lunes del Cerro (Monday on the hill), which takes place on the Monday after July 16. The State Government Tourist Bureau arranges it, and it is well worth seeing. However, it takes place in the rainy season,

so it is often cut short by showers or fails to take place at all. However, if you are taking a trip to Mexico in the summer, don't fail to go to Oaxaca, and do try to include Lunes del Cerro.



ELIZABETH SANDERS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP



Fun In Marin

Twenty years ago there were two Federation Festivals in Marin. The Tamalpais International F. D. held one in San Rafael, on August 26, and the Sausalito F.D. in Sausalito, on November 11, 1945.

In June 1946 the Federation said they needed a Marin location for a July Festival, and the Marin Junior College graciously gave the use of their football field and the "MARIN JULY FESTI-VAL" was born on July 14, 1946.

The evening session shifted from Sausalito to Fairfax and back to Sausalito, and in 1949 the College of Marin Gym became the established location and was the scene of many wonderful exhibitions, except for the year 1956, when the San Rafael High School kindly loaned the use of their facilities for both afternoon and evening due to damage to the College field, as the result of heavy winter storms.

No more will the College of Marin Gymnasium echo to our folk dance music, for last year it burned to the ground, destroying the scene of so many happy times. It is gone, but we hope not forgotten by those who danced there.

July 1950 was the festival of "firsts" with Marin as the proud host to the Federation, when the first Federation Presidents' pins were presented to the first eight presidents by George Murton, the first of several Federation presidents and officers to come from Marin County.

The number of groups in Marin County has waxed and waned through the years, and in this year of 1964 Marin has welcomed two new groups: one of young dancers in the early high school ages, and the other a Balkan dance group.

Last year the College of Marin quadrangle was used for the first time, and so great was Continued on Page 16







EL SHOTIS VIEJO

(Mexico)

El Shotis Viejo (Old Style Schottische) is the type of dance which was popular in Mexico throughout the period 1815 to 1910. The schottische was introduced into Mexico about 1830, along with the polka and mazurka, and in the cities the people immediately adopted it. As the dance increased in popularity in the rural areas, its style became more rustic. This shotis is in the classical style, and is typical of the last half of the 19th Century, when people followed more of the European culture rather than the native culture. The music used for the dance was written by a young mariachi player, Miguel Martinez, one of the most popular composers of music of this type. He has produced many polkas and schottisches written in the style of the olden days.

El Shotis Viejo was learned from an elderly gentleman of Oaxaca, who taught the dance to native school teachers and young people during Mr. Pill's trip into the rural areas in Mexico. The teacher remembers dancing many figures in his youth, only a few of the most representative being included in this version.

MUSIC:

Record: Express 233

FORMATION:

Ptrs in a circle, facing each other, M back to ctr, R hands joined. W hold skirt with free hand; M place L arm across small of back and hold L hand almost over R hip. Throughout the dance MR hand hangs naturally at side whenever it is free.

STEPS AND STYLING:

-

Viejo Two Step: Step fwd L (ct 1), step R to rear of L (ct 2), step fwd L (cts 3-4). Do not pass R ft by L on closing step (ct 2), but allow it to close behind L heel. Step has smooth "lifting" motion. Repeat Step, beginning R.

5----

<u>Viejo Shotis Step</u>: Beginning L, walk 3 steps (cts 1-3), lift slightly on R toe while raising L ft with knee turned out to L (ct 4). Step may also begin with opp ft. This is a light, dignified step without an exaggerated hop.

Balance in Place: Step fwd on L, lifting R ft off the floor (cts 1-2), shift wt to R in place (cts 3-4), lifting L just off the floor.

Promenade pos*, Heel-Toe*, Walk*

Description is written for M, W does counterpart unless otherwise instructed.

PATTERN

Measures

- 3 Pick up Notes INTRODUCTION No action
 - I. HEEL TOE AND CROSS OVER

A 1-2 Bend bodies fwd from waist, extend L heel to L side (cts 1-2), touch 1/2

toe to floor with L heel across instep of R ft (cts 3-4). Beginning L, walk 3 steps fwd in LOD (CCW), gradually straightening bodies (cts 1-3), lift slightly on L (ct 4).

- 3-4 Repeat action of meas 1-2. Begin R and move RLOD (CW).
- Face ptr. With bodies bent slightly fwd from waist, extend L heel fwd (cts 1-2), touch L toe to floor with L heel parallel to R ft (cts 3-4).
- Hands remain joined. With 3 walking steps (gradually straightening bodies as in meas 2) exchange places with ptr (cts 1-3), hold (ct 4). Ptrs make 1/2 turn CW on last crossing step. Release hands.

- B 1-2 Ptrs take promenade pos, facing LOD. With 2 Viejo Two Steps, move fwd LOD.
 - Balance in place (cts 1-4).
 - Release L hands. M repeat action of meas 3 (Fig II). W take short step fwd on R, bend knees, lean fwd from waist and pivot one complete turn CW under joined R hands (cts 1-2), step L in place (cts 3-4).

 NOTE: M must hold joined hands high and his hand flexible to assist W in turn.
 - 9-16 Repeat action of Fig II, meas 1-4, three times.

III. HEEL TOE AND CROSS OVER

- A 1-15 Repeat action of Fig I, meas 1-15.
 - With 2 steps (RL) M move twd RLOD; on 2 steps (RL) turn CCW in front of ptr to face ctr (cts 1-2, 3-4) and stand at WL side as W move fwd to ctr with 1 Viejo Shotis step. M put L hand just above elbow of W L forearm, W hold skirt out to the side with L hand. Ptrs join R hands high above W head. As they face ctr. M is slightly behind W.

IV. SHOTIS, BALANCE, WOMAN PIVOT

- B 1 With 1 Viejo Shotis step, both beginning R, ptrs move to the R but turn slightly twd L.
 - Repeat action of meas 1 (Fig IV), but move slightly to L and turn to R to finish facing ctr.
 - 3-4 Repeat action of Fig II, meas 3-4 (Balance, Woman Pivot)
 - 5-12 Repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig IV) two times (Shotis in LOD, RLOD and Balance and Pivot).
 - 13-14 Repeat action of meas 1-2 (Fig IV) (Shotis LOD and RLOD).
 - Repeat action of Fig II, meas 3 (Balance fwd and bwd).
 - W repeat pivot, but turn to own R twd outside of circle. With 2 walking steps (RL) M turn 1/2 CW to face ptr, back to ctr. Release joined hands.

V. SOLO SHOTIS, WOMAN PIVOT

- B 1 With 1 Viejo Shotis step, move to own R (M-RLOD, W-LOD).
 - With 1 Viejo Shotis step, move to own L (M-LOD, W-RLOD).
 - Join R hands. M balance fwd and bwd in place. W pivot turn under joined hands (cts 1-2). Step L in place (cts 3-4.
 - M keep ft in place, bow from waist. W place R ft behind L and curtsy (cts 1-4), holding skirt to side with L hand.
 - 5-16 Repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig V), three times.

VI. HEEL TOE AND CROSS OVER

- A 1-5 Repeat action of Fig I, meas 1-15.
 - With three walking steps (M-RLR, W-LRL) ptrs move RLOD. Ptrs look at each other as dance ends.





WHAT DID HE SAY?

. By Jack Sankey

He said, "Heads Right and Left Thru, Star Thru, Pass Thru, Eight Chain Thru, then Allemande Left". "I got the Allemande Left, but I didn't get through the 'Thrus'".

Well. let's imagine that you are number one couple in a square and we'll go "thru" the figures. he said. "Heads Right and Left Thru". That puts first and third couples in opposite places. Then, he said, "Star Thru". Let's define "Star Thru". Two facing dancers, or in this case, two facing couples, go forward, and each man joins his right hand with the facing lady's left, and walking toward each other with joined hands raised lady does a quarter left-face turn under the man's right, and man does a quarter rightface turn to end up side by side with the same lady on his right. This gives you a new partner at this point, and your original partner is facing you. Now, after a pass thru, you are facing an outside couple. At this point he said, "Eight Chain Thru". Before we define that one, remember that after completing the "Eight Chain Thru" you should end up where you started On "Eight Chain Thru", the couple on the inside will do a Right and Left Thru movement with outside couples, complete courtesy turn to face in. The couples moving to the center from the outside continue across the set with alternate hands (no courtesy turn), until they reach the outside, and then courtesy turn their partner. This is all repeated to return to starting place. All couples will travel across the set and back. It takes eight hand movements to complete the "Eight Chain Thru". This puts you facing your original corner for an Allemande Left.


