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COSTUMES OF YUGOSLAVIA (SERBIA)

. By Audrey Fifield

Of the six republics and two autonomous provinces comprising the Republic of Yugoslavia, that of the Serbs, or Serbia, is by far the most populous. It occupies the entire east-central third of the country and has the nation's capitol city of Belgrade, or Beograd, in its northern section, a rich farming land. The Serbians of that area have developed especially beautiful and distinctive national costumes.

The man's (Fig. #1) clothing is brown woolen trousers and jacket (not shown) over an embroidered vest, which is usually left hanging open to show the embroidered linen shirt beneath. A sash of woven red wool, or sometimes woolen string "fishnet" knotting is wrapped around the waist and secured with a large and very fancy silver buckle. His hat is of black astrakan with a flat, red plush top. The cuff is generous in size. Shoes are flat sandals called "opanke" with a one-piece sole and woven or strapped vamp. Hard leather is used, or the intestines of animals, as they are more waterproof. They are worn over a heavy knitted sock of intricate design. Patterns of flowers and geometrics are both knitted and embroidered in duplicate stitch. The general appearance is usually dark, though not always. For instance, bright green socks trimmed with rows of orange-yellow balls is not unheard of. The sock and sandal together are called "opanken".

Sketch #2 is a diagram of the cut of the trousers (refer to page 1) See also the May 1967 issue of LET'S DANCE for the cut and seaming of the pants and shirt worn by the South Serbs. It is identical to those worn by the Macedonians of that region, (area near Skoplje)and was included in the article "Costumes of Macedonia" of that date.

Figure #3 is a South Serb, and his costume is of white linen worn over a <u>second shirt</u> or <u>jersey</u>, depending on the weather. The wide red woolen <u>cummerbund</u>, worn wound snugly from the hips to the armpits is a distinctive part of this costume and serves as the wearer's pockets for everything from knives and watches to books and lunch. His astrakan hat has a pointed top and is sometimes worn extended to its highest without the cuff. Socks are plain and dark, and while "opanki" are worn, most men favor oxfords, especially if they are whiteback.

Drawing #4 is of a padded and quilted cotton vest and may be quite colorful. The one shown was of blue printed with red roses, big ones. It was lines in plain blue and bound with yellow biasfold.

Drawing No. 5 is of a different type vest and shows the con-



struction. The seaming shifted to the back from the side, allowing for a better fitting garment. This vest is most often seen in black wool and is quite thick and soft in texture. While it is somewhat double-breasted it is allowed to flap open more often than not. Both vests cover the sash, and Fig. #5 comes well down over the hips.

Figures #6 are from the Belgrade area and show the front and back views of this dress. The blouse is of lighter weight linen than the skirt. Both are embroidered, sometimes lavishly. The skirt is flared and gathered at the waist but is not too full. Some blouses have a plain ungathered neckline, cut rather wide but not low. Naturalistic flowers are then embroidered across the front rather than up and down. Sleeves are cut straight with a ribbon tied high, low, or elbow length, to control the fullness. Notice the sleeves of the left-hand figure are much wider than those of the right. The narrower sleeves have a narrow red ribbon run through beading to form a wrist ruffle.

The overskirts are of a firm but fine woolen cloth, and are usually of a stripe-and-cross-stripe design. When accordianpleated on these stripes, the effect is quite striking, even in the somber but rich colors usually used.

The bodices are of black velvet embroidered in gold thread, and one apron is also of black velvet. It's heavily embroidered in silk and gold and edged with black woolen lace. The other apron is of woolen stripes, quite stiff and heavy and of an intricate pattern. The bottom is finished in self-fringe. Both girls are wearing "opanken".

Fig. #7 is a South Serbian. These people are of a tall, blond race with blue eyes. (Men of six feet, two inches are not uncommon.) She is wearing a white linen shift of the cut shown in Drawing #8. Her collar and sleeves are edged with raveled wool, and her embroidery is more likely to be geometric in design. Three small red tassels hang on loops below the chest decorations. Her sleeves are solidly embroidered in black with naturalistic flowers or other designs in color. The whole sleeve is very stiff and heavy, as it is almost of tapestry texture.

A covered cord in the hem of the skirt holds it out in a cone shape. The vertical black applique striping varies from town to town and woman to woman. Some have the three center stripes extending to the waistline. Others have the side stripes long and covering the side seam with the center stripes very short and delicately embroidered. The peaked border trim above the hem is of black wool embroidery centered with rose colored stylized flowers. The red woolen cummerbund is secured COSTUMES OF YUGOSLAVIA

with narrow belts of woven cotton.

She wears a black woolen apron with threads of gold and bright colors woven into the warp. The cross bands are of gold braid. Some of her dowry is sewn to the apron and some hangs on cords from her apron string. Notice her apron strings. The apron is whipped to a cord and is then suspended from the apron string.

Coin necklaces and bracelets are worn and even finger rings with several small gold coins jingling from it are worn by the daughters of rich farmers or other trades.

The headdress is a long scarf which need not be white. Gold and silk embroidery is sometimes used on the crown areas. It is draped over the head and secured with a woven headband which passes under the chin and is fastened(or buckled)at one temple. Here again coins may be sewn, framing the wearer's face. The long ends of the scarf are wrapped once about the neck and then fall down the wearer's back to the waist, or lower.

Usually "opanken" are seen with this costume, but for dress occasions, an older type of beaded and rosette-trimmed mule is worn, obviously not a work shoe. Modern girls, like their brothers, prefer a dress pump with a medium heel.





Highland Dress

Today, proper Highland dress retains most of the features of the dress as worn in the 17th century, and consists of kilt and plaid, hose, doublet, low cut shoes, silver-mounted sporran, broad bonnet (Balmoral) and a brooch to fasten the plaid.

One should wear the tartan of his own clan or sept. If one is entitled to wear both a "clan" and a "district" tartan, it is permissible to wear kilt and hose of the latter and doublet or plaid of the former. If a "dress" tartan is worn, kilt, plaid and hose must be uniform.

The long shoulder plaid or the belted (more acceptable for indoors) plaid may be worn. The jacket or doublet may be of cloth, The patvelvet, or tartan cut on the cross. tern is similar to the "swallow-tail", but with the tails cut short. The buttons should be diamond shaped. The bonnet should bear the crest or motto of the wearer or of his chief. Garters should be of worsted fabric about one inch wide. The evening tie may be black or white, or a lace jabot.

For day wear, ladies should wear a kilted skirt with tween or other jacket. The sporran is not worn by ladies. For evening wear, a skirt of tartan silk is worn with a blouse which is usually decorated with Centic embroidery. A white or light colored evening dress may be worn. A tartan sash is worn across the shoulder, fastened with a brooch.

MUSIC: Record: "Back Hame tae Auchtermuchty", Parlophone PMC 1263, Side 2, Band 4, "Lord McLay's Reel", or any other suitably phrased reel (40 meas).

FORMATION: 4 cpls in longways formation.

STEPS, Skip Change of Step*, Move up or down*, Fig. of 8*, Wheel or Hands Across*.
TERMS AND Use Skip Change of Step throughout unless otherwise stated, always starting R
STYLING: (with preliminary hop L).

Chord Introduction. M bow, W curtsey to ptr.

- I. FIGURE OF 8
- 1-8 Cpl 1 dance a Figure of 8 around cpl 2, who move up on meas 1 and 2. Cpl 4 dance a Figure of 8 around cpl 3, who move down on meas 1 and 2. Finish in lines across the dance with cpl 1 between cpl 2 facing down and cpl 4 between cpl 3, facing up. (See diagram.)
 - II. FWD AND BACK, R HAND TURN WITH OPP
- 9-12 All join hands in lines of 4 and dance fwd twd opp line (2 meas) and bkwd to place (2 meas).
- 13-16 Release hands and turn opp, with R hands joined, once CW (M with M, W with W). Finish back in own line.

III. R HANDS ACROSS AND BACK

- 17-24 Ctrs (cpls 1 and 4) dance R hands across and L hands back, finishing on own sides with cpl 1 in 2nd place and cpl 4 in 3rd place.
 - IV. FWD AND BACK, R HAND TURN WITH PTR
- 25-28 All join hands in own lines and dance fwd twd opp line (2 meas) and bkwd to place (2 meas).
- 29-32 Release hands and turn ptr, with R hands joined, once CW. Top cpl (cpl 2) finish in 1st place, while bottom cpls (cpls 1, 4 and 3) join both hands with ptrs to make arches.

- V. ARCHES
- 33-36 Cpl 2 turn, with R hands joined, once CW.
- 37-38 Retaining R hands, W 2 lead ptr down the set under the arches to the bottom.
- 39-40 All move back into own lines to finish in order from the top -- cpls 1, 4, 3, 2.

Repeat the dance from new places, but this time top cpls (cpls 4, 1 and 2) make the arches while bottom cpl (cpl 3) turn with L hands once CCW, and W lead ptr up the set under the arches to the top. Repeat dance 2 more times with top cpl (cpl 4) turning

MAIRI'S WEDDING

(Scotland)

The tune for Mairi's Wedding (MAH-ree) is an old traditional one, and the dance is approximately 20 years old. It was presented at the 1970 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp by C. Stewart Smith.


MUSIC: Records: "Step We Gaily", Mercury Me 1203 or PMC 1122 or 3007, Side 1, Band 1. "Scottish Dance Time", Vol. III, Clansmen Records, QC-10, Side 2, Band 1. "The Gates of Edinburgh", Cal 114, Side 1, Band 4. "Scottish Country Dances No. 2, Fontana TFE 17048, Side 1, Band 1.

FORMATION: 4 cpls in longways formation.

STEPS: Skip Change of Step*, Slip Step*, Cast*, Corners*, Reel of 4*

TERMS STYLING: Reel of 3 (8 meas): A dance figure for 3 people in a line, ctr dancer facing out and outside dancers facing in. All 3 people are active and describe on the floor the pattern of a Fig of 8 consisting of 2 loops, one loop made CW and the other CCW. All 3 dancers go around the Fig of 8 in the same direction as in "follow the leader". In a L shoulder reel of 3 the ctr dancer (#1) always begins curving CCW to pass L shoulders with the dancer he is facing (#2) who also curves CCW, while the remaining dancer (#3) curves CW. (See diagram.) Dancer 2 cuts through the ctr before dancer 3. Each half loop takes approximately 2 meas. At the end of meas 4

dancers 2 and 3 will have changed places, and dancer 1 will have returned to the middle. At the end of meas 8 dancers will be back in original places.



Use Skip Change of Step throughout this dance unless otherwise stated, always starting R (with preliminary hop L).

- Chord Introduction. M bow, W curtsey to ptr.
 - I. R HAND TURN, CAST AND L HAND TURN
 - 1-4 Cpl 1 turn, with R hands joined, once CW and cast down one place on own side. Cpl 2 move up during meas 3-4.
 - 5-8 Cpl l turn, with L hands joined, once CCW and a little more to finish back to back in the ctr facing 1st corners.
 - II. HALF REELS OF 4

9-12 Cpl 1 dance Half Reel of 4 with 1st corners (the corners changing places).

- 13-16 Passing L shoulders in the ctr, cpl l dance a Half Reel of 4 with 2nd corners (corners changing places).
- 17-20 Passing L shoulders again, cpl l dance Half Reel of 4 with 1st corners (who are now on opp side and return to original place with this Half Reel).
- 21-24 Pass L shoulders, cpl 1 dance Half Reel of 4 with 2nd corners (on opp side and return to original place).

III. REEL OF 3 ACROSS

25-32 W 1 dance Reel of 3 with cpl 2 beginning by passing L shoulders with M 2, while M 1 dance Reel of 3 with cpl 3 beginning L shoulders to W 3. Cpl 1 finish in 2nd place.

MAIRI'S WEDDING

IV. CIRCLE L AND R

33-36 Cpls 2, 1, and 3 join hands and circle L (CW) with 8 Slip Steps.

37-40 Reverse and circle R (CCW) with 8 Slip Steps.

Cpl 1 repeat the dance in 2nd place. During last Fig. take 8 small Slip Steps when circling L so as not to go too far, and circle R with 6 larger Slip Steps to return to place. On last 2 Slip Steps, cpl 1 release hands and slide to the bottom on the outside, as cpls 3 and 4 slide up one place on the inside. Cpls 2, 3, and 4 then repeat the dance twice each in turn.

Chord M bow, W curtsey to ptr.



SCANDINAVIA

DENMARK

Lunch for the Danes is a Smørrebrød, which consists of open sandwiches, and is a tradition in Denmark.

The Danes specialize in unusual type breads -- whole grain, rye and pumpernickel -- thinly sliced. Sweet butter or whipped butter is preferred to our salted butter. Mustard is very often added to the butter when meat is used on the sandwiches.

Toppings for the thinly sliced bread vary extensively: Hard boiled eggs, sliced thin, with a sardine placed on top; small shrimps mixed with mayonnaise and parsley; smoked salmon on a lettuce leaf; cold meats and a variety of cheeses.

Snaps, a very potent drink, is served with Smørrebrød.

Cherry Heering (cherry brandy) is served after dinner.

FINLAND

The lunch table in Finland is called *Voileipapöytä*, and consists mostly of smoked fish, cold meats and cheeses.

Because of the cold climate, soup is frequently served. A favorite among the Finns is described below:

KURKKUKEITTO (Cucumber Soup)

- 1/4 pound butter
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 4 cucumbers, peeled & sliced
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 6 cups chicken stock or 2 cans chicken consomme and 2-1/2 cans water
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 egg yolks
- 1 tablespoon sherry
- 1 cup light cream
- 3 tablespoons chopped parsley

Melt the butter in a saucepan. Add the onion and cucumbers. Cook over low heat for 10 minutes, stirring frequently. Do not allow the onion or cucumbers to brown. Sprinkle the flour over them and mix well. Gradually add the stock, stirring constantly until the boiling point is reached. Add the pepper and cook over low heat for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Put the mixture through a sieve.

Beat the egg yolks, sherry, and cream in a bowl. Gradually add the soup, stirring constantly to prevent curdling. The soup may be served hot or cold. Sprinkle with parsley.

NORWAY

The well-laden table of "appetizers" is not as traditional in Norway as it is in Denmark and Sweden. However, the Norwegians enjoy fresh fish. Herring is the principal fish (cod and mackeral are runners-up) and is eaten fresh, smoked, pickled, spiced or dried. Their meats include elk, bear and reindeer. Their local cheeses are outstanding.

INLAGD SILL (Pickled Herring)

2 salt herrings	1/2 teaspoon white pepper
1/2 cup vinegar	1 small onion, sliced
1-1/w tablespoons sugar	

Cover the herrings with cold water and allow to soak for 12 hours. Drain thoroughly and dry with a towel. Remove the heads and skin and rinse in cold water. Split the herrings and remove the back bones.

Cut into narrow strips or pieces and arrange in a dish. Combine the vinegar, sugar and pepper and pour over the herring. Garnish with sliced onion.

SWEDEN

This is the home of the Smorgåsbord, which can be described as a table loaded with a variety of hors d'oeuvres. The Smörgåsbord etiquette involves three visits to the table so as not to mix the foods. The Swedes start with fish, then choose meat and hot dishes, and finally cheese.

The usual drink with Smörgåsbord is Snaps (brandy), as with the Danes.

Their favorite bread is a flat rye bread called Knackebrod.

BLOMKAL MED REKESOS (Cauliflower with Shrimp Sauce)

3 tablespoons butter	1 cup coarsely chopped
1 cup bread crumbs	cooked shrimp
1-1/2 cups milk	1 tablespoon brandy
1 teaspoon salt	1 whole cauliflower
1 teaspoon sugar	

Melt the butter in a saucepan. Add the bread crumbs, mixing well. Add the milk, stirring constantly until the boiling point is reached. Add the salt, sugar and shrimp and cook over low heat for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and add the brandy. Place a whole head of firm cauliflower in a large saucepan of boiling salted water. Cook for 20-25 minutes but do not overcook. Place the sauce over low heat to thicken for 2 minutes. Drain cauliflower, place on serving platter, pour sauce over it and serve.

Scottish Fishwife



BY MARJORIE POSNER (From March 1952 Issue)

A Scottish fishwife's costume is one that is not too difficult or expensive to make, and it is differentlooking.

The skirt and fish-apron are made of very stiff cotton material, white striped with a color, in stripes about one-half inch wide. Ticking that is very tightly woven is a good choice for these two pieces.

The skirt is a plain gathered one. about three vards around, over which goes the fish-apron. This apron is about the same length as the skirt but not so full, and is made to tuck up in back so it forms a pouch in which to carry fish in front. At the waistline in front is the money bag, made in an oval shape with a slit down the middle. This is quite large and is worn slightly to the left side. It can be tied on or hooked over the waistband. This money bag and the blouse are made of flowered material. also heavy and with a white background.

The blouse is rather simple, made with short sleeves that are straight and finished off with cuffs of a plain material. The neckline is a "V" with a bow of plain material for trim.

Over the head is worn a paisleydesign wool scarf, a long scarf rather than a square or triangular one. White cotton stockings and plain black or brown shoes complete the costume.

For table decorations, spray madrone or manzanita tree branches with gold paint, place the base in styrofoam or mount it on a small wooden platform, and hang miniature Chinese lanterns on the branches. (These can be purchased in Chinatown.)

Serving Chinese fortune cookies, along with your other refreshments, will add much to the merriment of your Chinese New Year. Ingredients for Chow Mein are available at your markets.

(Open House on New Year's Day was introduced to the United States by the Holland-Dutch)


- Invitations: Print or write your invitations on a facsimile of a windmill.
- Menu: Feature shrimp or veal curry, steamed rice, dried fruits, Edam and/or Gouda cheese, a variety of crackers. Serve hot chocolate or cocoa and marzipan cakes.

(Incidentally, it's an Old World superstition that those who eat <u>herring</u> on New Year's Day will always have money in the year ahead. I've been told the same is true if one eats sauerkraut, but it doesn't always hold true. Ed.)

Decorations: Dutch shoes as a centerpiece and blue delft ware on the tables. Also, tulips (artificial) in vases or pots will add to the decor.

Program: Interspace as many dances from the Netherlands as is possible on the program.



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
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
