VYTS BELIAJUS HONORED

At a National Convention of the American Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation (AAIPER) in Houston, Texas, Sunday, March 26, Vyts Beliajus wasthe Dance Division Heritage honoree. This Heritage Award is given each year toa deserving person in dance. In 1968, Lucile Czarnowski was so honored, and now Vyts has received the award.

Vyts has described the honor bestowed on him during that memorable occasion in his May issue of VILTIS, but I would like to publish excerpts ofthe speech delivered by Mary Bee Jensen, of Brigham Young University, at the Heritage Luncheon.

"This is Vyts' year. How excited I was to receive the Dance Division AAHPER letter indicating that the Heritage Committee ofthe Dance Division was pleased to announce that Vyts Beliajus was the nominee for the 1972 Heritage Award to be presented to him at the Heritage Luncheon in his honor at the National Convention of AAHPER in Houston, Texas.

"We can find no more deserving person than our Vyts. With in a matter of months Vyts has been honored at three very special occasions. Over the Thanksgiving weekend was the 20th anniversary of the San Francisco Kolo Festival, and Vyts was the honoree. He was the first person to start Kolo dancing forthe general public. The San Francisco Kolo Festival was startedby John Filcich and friends to help Vyts, who was hospitalized at the Denver American !ledical Center. The Festival has continued for 20 years to be a popular event in the Bay Area.

"One of the greatest tribto Vyts was the VILTIS utes 30th Anniversary Celebration on March 18 in held Denver. Colorado. Thirty years as the foremost folklore magazine. with Vvts as the originator and editor of this great magazine! In person and also thru the medium of VILTIS, Vyts has made an outstanding contribution to the folk dance field and contributed to the cultural enrichment of America."

Mary Bee Jensen's speech continued with a description of Vyts' arrival, at the age of 14, in America, on September 3, 1923. You will find the story of Vyts' life and his many activities in the last four issues of VILTIS.

"Vyts Beliajus published for the Chicago Park District first folklore magazine devoted to folk dance, called "Lore", 1936 to 1939. He was instrumental in publishing the first collection of stories in English, written by Lithuanian folk dancers, in He supervised for FOLK-RAFT the first album of Lithuanian folk dance records. collected and translated into English thefirst book of Lithuanian folk legends. He founded the now popular folklore magazine, VILTIS, in Fairhope, Alabama. It first appeared in mimeographed form as a service letter to the men in uniform. From this letter evolved the VILTIS magazine in its current form regularly printed since September 1944. It is a highly educational magazine, and as a folklore magazine it has

stayed at the very top.

"Vyts' generosity, kindness, modesty and dedication isamazing to me. He has an intense interest in what is going on in the field of dance. He has wanted to share his talents with the world and he has done it so graciously.

"Mr. Vyts Beliajus, Mr. Folk Dance of United States, you have made a contribution to the world of dance that will live forever, and the books that you have written bring to us your love of your homeland, Lithuania.

"May I speak for all of us here today, and for the hundreds of people who wish they could be here today, Vyts, in saying that we feel that the choice of honoree for this luncheon, and this great honor today, was given to the only person this year who should have it. We back you in all your endeavors and want you to know how much we appreciate you, Mr. Vyts Beliajus."

In the evening Vyts presented a two-hour workshop to over 150 delegates of AAHPER conference, and according to Miriam Lidster, who was one of the special guests at the luncheon, "he was magnificent and did all of us, who have known him in folk dance, proud."

We are happy and pleased that Vyts Beliajus has received so many honors during the past few months. (Ed.)

HUNGARIAN SZUR

(Refer to the calendar for June 1972 in the Folk Dance Costume Calendar for more details.)

The SZUR is a unique Hungarian garment, and has for two centuries been the most treasured possession of the Hungarian man. He was not a man and could not court a girl until he had one - - it was a mark of manhood.

is worn as protection from the weather, both the bitter cold and the searing heat of the Great Plain. swaggers in it and wraps himself in it at night, if he is It is costly, a herdsman. and elahorately decorated. made to last a lifetime. man is sometimes even buried in his szur, but it is often passed on as a treasured familv heirloom.

The szur was made by professional szur-makers, who operated within the protection and control of guilds. The strong rivalry which grew among the various artisans led to an ever increasing complexity of design, and each local area developed its own style of adornment. At various times legal action was taken against the making and wearing of such elaborately embroidered szurs, and many priceless works of the art were confiscated and destroyed.

The garment is made of bleached frieze cloth, a heavy coarse material woven from sheep's wool. The cut is ancient; front and back are of the same piece, cut crosswise in the center. The sleeves

lie across the top and panels are inserted at the sides between the front and back and beneath the sleeves. The indispensable square collar is attached at the back of the neck.

Ornamentation of the szur was originally, as in most garments, in the form of strengthening leather inserts in the seam and of appliques of leather and wool. The appearance of the embroidered szur, the so-called *Cifraszur* (adorned szur) first occurred in the 1830s and 1840s, and, by the middle of the century, nearly replaced applique everywhere in Hungary.


Embroidery was placed mostly on the side panels, where it was covered by the sleeves, and on the large square collar. Lesser amounts appeared on the outside of the sleeve, the hem, center of the back, and the lanels. Motifs were usually of the classic bouquets of flowers, symmetrically arranged, of roses, carnations, tulips, buds and leaves. Worsted yarn was used in a variety of stitches, mostly satin and feather stitch. As the patterns evolved, they became more and tending to more elaborate. fill the area embroidered until a crowded appearance became the style, late in the 19 century.

The szur is worn thrown over either or both shoulders and held in place by a broad strap buckled across the chest. The arms rarely went through the sleeves; rather the sleeve was closed at the bottom and used to carry personal articles.

The szur is a splendid example of the folklore of costume. Begun in antiquity, it grew with the culture to a climax and began to decline with the advent of the 20th century and mass production.

Few examples exist today, and rarer still is the man who can make one, but it served long and well as the mark of a man.

Teachers presenting materials at camp this year will be Shlomo and Dina Bachar, with dances from Israel: Barry Glass of AMAN with dances from Yugoslavia and Africa; Csaba Palfi coming from Hungary, via Australia, to present dances from his native land; Stewart Smith, a camp favorite for many years with old and new dances of Scotland; "Mr. Scandinavia", Gordon Tracie, bringing dances from all the Scandinavian countries; Bill Burke, also of AMAN (and who hasn't missed a summer at Mendocino), with dances from the Yugoslav folkdance camp he attended last summer; and Dean and Nancy Linscott, well known teachers and directors of the Kopachka Dancers to fill in with dances from several countries.

Each day at Mendocino we honor a particular country. One of the added features this summer will be our "sneak previews" of the next day's country at the late night snacks. ANOTHER TRIP TO FINLAND

When June Schaal returns from her trip to Finland, she should have some interesting material to present to folk dancers.

She left Vineburg on April 10, after bringing her Napa Valley Women's Group to the Apple Blossom Festival, in Sebastopol to demonstrate folk dancing is a fun activity for everyone. Enroute to Finland June stopped for three days in Glasgow, Scotland, spending most of that time shopping and resting. Apparently she was happy to leave Glasgow, since the weather was cold and damp and the hotels lacked heat.

Immediately on her arrival in Helsinki, Finland, folkdance classes were scheduled. and during her first two weeks there she taught every night. The Finnish leaders are very eager to learn dances from other countries. especially, according to June, from an American teacher. June has learned a few Finnish words. enough to enable her to call out patterns to 200 highschool teachers.

One Saturday night in April two large bus loads of dancers and some private cars motored to a very large and beautiful home some 20 miles west of Helsinki for a dinner and dance. June, and her friend, Orli Ahlstedt, were special

guests. In describing this mansion in one of her letters June explained that it had belonged to a wealthy Finnish man, and, after passing away, and after a lot of legal procedures, the State now has it as a foundation. For entertainment during the evening one dance group performed a contra of an early period. The performance was very effective since all the girls (beautiful blondes) were dressed in early 18th century ballroom gowns and the men in black tails and white ties. The balance of the program included mazurkas. polkas and waltzes of only two or three patterns.

The leader of this young group of dancers has recently discovered some oldtime dances being done in one of the rural areas. The material is being carefully researched to be incorporated in a second book of Finnish dances. (I am assuming a first book is already available).

The Finns use live music; mostly a fiddle or an accordian.

June describes the Finnish people as being shy and reserved, but extremely polite. When asking a girl for a dance the young man approaches her with a slight bow and takes her by the hand to the center of the floor to dance. When the dance is ended, the young man escorts the girl back to

where she was sitting.

And about the customs away from the dance - - -

Girls are wearing pants suits with wide bottoms, and jackets and coats knee-length. The young boys are wearing their hair long, but neatly combed. There are many new products in the markets. Food is high but shoes and clothing are less expensive than in the States.


During the last week in April it was still frosty. Although it snowed, the snow did not last for long. The Finnish people are trying to plant gardens hoping it won't freeze again, and are looking forward


to the 1st of May celebration, when the festival will last most of the night in anticipation of Spring.

According to Juanita Kramer who is secretary-treasurer of the Napa Valley Folk Dancers, June's itinerary will take her to Denmark, Germany, Belgium, Holland, Spain, Portugal and the Madeira Islands. June has teaching schedules in Denmark, Belgium and Holland, but in the other countries she hopes to relax and enjoy herself.

June will return to Vineburg the middle of July.

OBEREK OPOCZYNSKI

(Poland)

This lively couple dance (o-BEHR-ek o-po-CHIN-ski) is a simplified version of an oberek from Opoczno as done by Mazowsze, The Polish Song and Dance Company, and was introduced by Dr. Morley Leyton at the 1971 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp. It is in the National style; that is, a sophisticated dance, as opposed to a Folk or "people's dance" as might be found in villages and rural areas. The people of Opoczno may do an oberek , but it would not be as stylized as this choreography.

MUSIC:

20

Record: Muza XL 0141. Monitor Vol. I - MFS (C) 360, Mazowsze. 3/4 meter.

Note: Bruno BR 50017 and Vanguard VRS 6001 and 9016 are from an earlier recording by Mazowsze and will not do for this dance, as they are arranged differently.

FORMATION: Cpls in a circle, M on inside with back to ctr, inside hands joined and held low. Free hands fisted on hip. Dance is best done with five or more cpls in the circle.

STEPS AND STYLING:

Basic Oberek Step: Step on R ft with knee bent (ct 1). Step L next to R with knee bent (ct 2). Rise onto ball of L ft (ct &). Step on R ft in place (ct 3). Next step would begin by stepping on L ft. Direction of step is largely determined by placement of ft on ct 1.

Pas de basque*. Ftwork described for M. W opp unless otherwise noted.

Most movements in the dance are strong and vigorous with a lively, swift character.

MUSIC 3/4

PATTERN

Measures

4 meas

INTRODUCTION - No action.

I. FORWARD

Step fwd in LOD and away from ptr on L, knee bent (ct 1). Scuff R heel away from ptr, 1 ft close to floor (ct 2). Jump fwd onto both ft, knees bent, with a strong downward motion (ct 3).

> Joined hands swing in LOD with a strong motion, elbows straight, forcing ptrs to turn away from each other. There is a definite downward thrust throughout this meas with no lift during ct 2.

- Continuing to move in LOD, step on R (ct 1). Step L across in front of R (ct 2). Step 2 R next to L (ct 3). Joined hands swing back thru a low arc in RLOD with a strong motion, forcing ptrs to turn twd each other. Ptrs keep tension in arms.
- 3-8 Repeat action of meas 1-2, three more times, 4 in all.
- Change to Open Mazur Pos (MR arm around ptr waist, WL hand on MR shoulder, free hands 9 joined twd LOD, cpl face LOD). Bend fwd from waist, keep knees close together. Moving swiftly and lightly, run fwd in LOD using Basic Oberek Step with the following variation: Step fwd on L (ct 1). Step a little fwd on R (ct 2). Rise on ball of R ft (ct &). Step fwd on L, brushing R ft up in back, toes pointed down (ct 3).
- 10 Repeat action of meas 9 with opp ftwork.
- 11-12 Repeat action of meas 9-10.
- Repeat action of meas 9-11, but move bkwd in RLOD. 13-15
- 16 Stamp R, L (cts 1,2). Hold (ct 3).

II. TURNING IN PLACE

Turn to face ptr and assume shoulder-waist pos.

OBEREK OPOCZYNSKI (continued)

- 1-8 With very small, unobtrusive, flat-footed steps (3 per meas) turn CW, no more than once around.
- 9-16 Change to ballroom pos but M hold W R wrist in his L hand and W puts her head on her L hand at M R shoulder. Turn CCW back to place using same tiny steps.

BREAK I

- 1-2 M take ptr L hand in his R and lead her twd ctr as he takes two steps in place (one per meas) R, L and ends facing ctr. W step R, L as she moves twd ctr and turns CCW to face ptr.
- W join hands in a high arch and do one small Pas de basque in place, begin R. M, with fists on hips, do one Pas de basque with larger step than W and turn body slightly to R, begin R.
- Repeat action of meas 3 (Break I) with opp ftwork.

III. DUCK IN AND OUT - ELBOW HOOK

- M: In place, step on R, turn body slightly to R (ct 1). Stamp L ft in front of R, take wt (ct 2). Step on R in place (ct 3).
- 2 Repeat action of meas 1 (Fig III) with opp ftwork.
- 3 With one Basic Oberek Step move fwd and duck under W arch, passing ptr by L shoulder.
- Turn CW to face out stamping L. R (cts 1.2). Hold (ct 3).
- 5-8 Repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig III) to return to outside of circle. Pass thru same arch, turn to face ptr.
- 1-2 W: In place do two small Pas de basque, begin R.
- 3 Move fwd with one small Basic Oberek Step as M duck thru arches.
- Bring joined hands down sharply, bending fwd at waist, stamp L, R (cts 1,2). Hold (ct 3).
- Raise joined hands to arch pos, repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig III), but move bkwd during meas 7.
- 9-11 Hook R elbow with ptr, turn CW with Basic Oberek Step, begin R. L hand fisted on hip. Move out from ctr to enlarge circle.
- 12 Stamp L (ct 1). Clap own hands, stamp R (ct 2). Prepare to change direction.
- 13-16 Hook L elbow, repeat action of meas 9-12 (Fig III) turning CCW. Separate two or three ft from ptr on meas 16 and end with W back to ctr of circle, facing ptr.

IV. LIFT

1-2 Both ptrs repeat action of Fig III, meas 1-2 (M part). M step twd ptr on ct 3 of meas 2.

- 3 <u>M</u>: Prepare with plié (ct 1). Hands at ptr waist, lift her overhead (ct 2). Begin 1/2 turn CCW (ct 3).
- 4 Complete 1/2 CCW turn (cts 1,2). Set ptr down (ct 3). W now on outside of circle facing in.
- 3 <u>W</u>: Jump onto both ft, knees well bent (ct 1). Place hands on ptr shoulders, press down, and jump up until torso is horizontal over M head. Bend knees and bring ft up behind (ct 2). Hold (ct 3).
- 4 Sustain pos until ct 3 when M puts ptr down.
- 5-6 Both ptrs repeat action of meas 1-2 (Fig IV).
- 7 Change places with ptr, passing L shoulders, with one Basic Oberek Step, turning 1/2 CW

to face ptr again. Lean torso to L while passing.

- B Facing ptr, stamp L,R (cts 1,2). Hold (ct 3).
- 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8 (Fig IV). Remain close to ptr on meas 15. M must free R ft for Fig V.

V. TURNING OBEREK

1-16 Assume shoulder-shoulder blade pos, arms nicely rounded. Begin MR-WL, do 16 Basic Oberek Steps, turning CW and travelling in LOD. Make a one-half turn on each meas and lean upper body twd LOD on ct 1 of each meas.

BREAK II

- 1-2 Assume Open Mazur Pos except that W either places L hand under M upper R arm, thumb back, or hooks her L forearm under M R upper arm, hand fisted. Free hand fisted on hip.

 Begin MR-WL, walk two steps (one per meas) turning CW.
- 3-4 Continuing to turn CW slowly, do two small Basic Oberek Steps. Finish facing LOD.

VI. LEAP

- M: Step R across in front of ptr (ct 1). Leap into air, keep head down, arch back, throw ft high in air (cts 2,3).
- 2 Land on L ft bending knee well to absorb shock (ct 1). May slap floor with L hand and go down to floor with R knee, toes of R ft extended back so that top of ft is on floor. Recover to erect pos (cts 2,3).
- 1-2 W: Guide M in turn, helping to lift on meas 1 and steadying partnership on meas 2. Ftwork not definitive, only important that W act as support for ptr.
- 3-4 Two Basic Oberek Steps, completing one CW turn to end facing LOD. Begin ML-WR.
- 5-8 Repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig VI).
- 9-15 In Open Mazur Pos, but with W L arm around ptr neck, joined hands make a rounded circle of arms, knees bent in semi-plié, back straight, bend fwd from hips, ft close together, do 7 Basic Oberek Steps (begin MR-WL) turning CW 1/2 turn with each Oberek Step. Steps are small with no perceptible up-down motion; heads remain level. In order to develop speed in turn ptr's ft must remain close together, W leans wt against ptr's R forearm.
- Drop to full plie (ct 1). Hold pose (cts 2,3).

 NOTE: In Fig., meas 3-4 (Lift) cpl may execute 1/2 turn CCW in shoulder-waist poswith Basic Oberek Steps if Lift is not possible.



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
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
