Andor Ezompo

ANDOR CZOMPO was born in Budapest, and raised in Turkeve, Hungary. He toured Europe with the Hungarian Folk Dance Ensembles and later became a State-licensed Folk Dance Teacher. After coming to the United States in 1957, he worked with several exhibition groups, performed on TV, and was a dancer-choreographer for the Kovach-Rabovsky Hungarian Ballet's "Bihari". In recent years, he has choreographed several dance suites for the Duquesne University Tamburitzans and the BYU Int'l Folk Dancers. Mr. Czompo was recently recognized by Hungarian folklore experts as the leading authority on Hungarian folk art in the Western Hemisphere. Currently, he is Assistant Professor of Dance at New York State University at Courtland, NY.

WHAT IS THE BEST WAY FOR AMERICAN DANCERS TO ACQUIRE THE HUNGAR-IAN STYLE?

I feel American folk dancers generally over-emphasize the importance of style. Not just over-emphasize it, but somehow try to separate it, like an addition to the dance. Style is something which produces itself when the dance is done well technically. American folk dancers are in an extremely difficult situation. Let's compare an American dancer to a native dancer. A native dancer usually dances relatively few dances or very few types of dances. These he dances practically his whole life; he's not influenced with anything else. But an American folk-dancer tries to do 68 different nationality dances. Mixing of the different types of execution is quite obvious.

I would like to make a parallel between "dance language" and "spoken language". When someone learns a foreign language, regardless of how well he learns it, he always has some kind of accent. And it's the same thing when someone learns Hungarian dance. Regardless how well technically he does it, he always retains some foreign accent dancing. So to over-emphasize style, I think we destroy a great deal of the enjoyment of the dance.

IS IT MORE IMPORTANT TO ENJOY A DANCE OR TO DO IT CORRECTLY?

If a dance is not enjoyable when it's done correctly, that dance shouldn't be danced. You cannot separate the two. If you do a dance correctly, and it is not enjoyable for you, there's nothing wrong with the dance; there's nothing wrong with you. It just happens that the two things don't get together. Folk dancers should be a little bit more selective in their dances. They don't have to do every dance.

WHAT ARE THE OPPORTUNITIES FOR AMERICANS TO DANCE IN HUNGARY?

Very little, to tell you the truth. Very few (Hungarians) know anything about international folk dancing. People still dance the csardas occasionally in close family gatherings. To participate, you more or less have to be a member of that family, or have very, very close connections. And the dance style is improvisative, within a certain framework. They mix the figures, how many times they repeat, and so forth. It is extremely difficult to get into this kind of dance.

ARE DANCES DONE IN THE SAME WAY IN HUNGARY & THE UNITED STATES?

Definitely not. We have to more or less 'translate' the Hungarian dances for American use. We have to condense them, arrange them or fit them to the available music, and that gives very little possibility to improvise. Generally speaking, American folk dancers don't know how to improvise, because that takes much longer work and being exposed to certain types of dancing. American folk dancers just don't have that kind of time. I tried it once to teach two or three simple figures for csardas music. After everyone learned it pretty well, I told them I put on the music now, and each couple decides how many times they will do

each step. It was the worst mess I've seen in my life! And eventually nobody liked it. I understand why. That takes time, until they can freely improvise with a couple basic steps, like you usually do with a tango or foxtrot.

WHAT ARE THE POSSIBILITIES FOR TRAVEL IN HUNGARY?

It is quite easy. If you have a valid passport and visa, you can travel in Hungary freely. If you change places for more than 24 hours, you have to report that to the police, but this is not because you are a foreigner; the Hungarians have to do the same thing. If you stay in hotels, the clerk takes care of this. You can travel by car, and public transportation is quite good, so it's no problem in that respect. But I wouldn't advise, if you don't speak Hungarian, to spend too much time, except if you are very adventurous, away from the cities. Even in the cities, although people try to be very helpful, you hardly can get around.

Your best bet is to stay with organized group travel. The whole system is based on that. They cater to larger groups. And if you are interested in folklore, they have special folklore tours, especially in the summertime. They take you out to the villages where you can see village musicians and organized folk dance groups. No change to join in. I have to be honest about this; there is very little possibility to go and do a csardas.

DOES HUNGARY ENCOURAGE NATIONALISM THROUGH DANCING?

Does Hungary try to encourage nationalism when they speak Hungarian? It's their own. I don't think it's nationalistic for them or anyone to do their own dancing.

However, at one point I have the feeling this was done, not necessarily consciously, and not by the authorities, but from the young people. After the Second World War, when in 1948 the government accepted Communism, and later became Socialist, they introduced a great deal of Soviet culture and dancing. Authorities encouraged organized folk dancing groups in schools to learn Russian dances. This encouraged people to dance, but in the meantime, the young people discovered Hungarian folk dancing, even if it wasn't done in their own village any more. It was kind of a national backlash of the whole movement, and Hungary became aware of the richness of her own tradition. At that time dancing expressed a certain nationalism, but I think this is passed. When they dance, Hungarians don't try to sell nationalistic ideas about it.

DOES HUNGARY HAVE A DANCE INSTITUTE?

Yes, one way or the other. After World War II, they organized the Hungarian State Folk Institute, which had several departments: dance, music, folklore, embroidery, and so forth. This was rearranged, and now the Hungarian Academy of Science, a folk music and dance research group, very advanced and one of the best in Europe, concentrates on research and preservation of the fantastic amount of material which is found. The Insti-

tute of Popular Culture publishes the findings to make them available for choreographers, dance teachers, and the educational system.

ARE HUNGARIAN NATIONAL COSTUMES MADE COMMERCIALLY IN HUNGARY?

Hungarians do not have a "National" costume. Rather, Hungarians have folk costumes which represent geographical areas, sometimes only villages. In Transylvania, part of the Hungarian language territory which now belongs politically to Roumania, traditional clothing is still in everyday use. It's not a costume for them; that's their clothing.

There is a workshop in Budapest which makes simplified variations of original costumes and supplies folk dance groups who don't have originals. The old traditional clothing is very, very hard to find, and when you find it, the owners wouldn't even consider selling it, because they still wear it. If they don't wear them, usually they don't have them, because numerous Hungarian researchers and folk dance groups are combing the country, finding them before you do. If it is really valuable, it goes to the folklore museums; they have a very strict rule that this type of valuable museum piece cannot be taken out of Hungary.


WHAT IS THE MOST POPULAR KIND OF MUSICAL ACCOMPANIMENT FOR FOLK DANCING IN HUNGARY?

The Hungarian folk dance orchestra, whose repertoire is strictly the traditional melodies which accompany dancing. Not the gypsy orchestra, which plays everything from Argentine tangos to Vienneese waltzes, although the instrumentation is similar. Early in this century, single instruments provided music for folk dancing, the bagpipe and zither type instruments. But even today, Hungarians, even performing folk dance groups, always dance for live music.

IS THERE A RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE HUNGARIAN VERBUNK AND THE RUSSIAN PRYSIADKA?

I don't think there is any close relationship. The Verbunk developed in the 17th or 18th Century, evolving from the shepherd's and men's dances which became more regulated with the military recruiting influence. I really don't know the background of the Russian Prysiadka, so I can't compare it. If some technical similarities occur, it's probably accidental. The closest relation to the Verbunk is the Bavarian Schuhplatting. There are historical proofs that this type of dance was known all over middle Europe.





COSTUMES OF

TRANSYLVANJA

The name Transylvania conjures up mysterious and fantastic thoughts of dark castles, vampires, and handsome noblemen. Though there are many beautiful castles in this northwestern corner of Rumania, and its rich history has produced many truly noble men, the area today is rich and productive and very much a part of the Twentieth Century.

To the east and south it is backed by the curve of the Carpathian Mountains, and it faces the rich Tisza River plain. Historically, a five-hundred year period of autonomy was ended by the Hapsburg conquest at the end of the Seventeenth Century, and Transylvania was tossed around by the Austro-Hungarian Empire for decades. It was incorporated into Rumania after World War I and was awarded to Hungary in 1940. However, it was restored politically to Rumania following the Second World War.

The Hungarian population of Rumanian Transylvania comprises about 25% of the total population, though in some places it is as high as 75%. There have been difficulties between Hungarian and Rumanian residents of this area in the last half century, but these are being resolved as a result of newer political and economic policies. Hungarian ties with Transylvania are very

strong.

The Hungarian clothing and textiles of the Cluj (Kolozsvar) region, in central Transylvania, are very different from the Rumanian ones of the same area. Clothing here is older in origin than that of the Great Plain region in Hungary; elements deriving from 17th and 18th Century fashions may still be seen.

In the Cluj area, most garments for men are, even today, made of home-grown materials, the color being a natural grey-white, or brown. (The blue cloth suit, popular elsewhere among Hungar-

ians, never became a general fashion in Transylvania.)

The men from Cluj used to spend harvest time on the Hungarian Great Plain and acquired some elements of clothing from that retion. For example, the linen pantaloons, or "gatya" (Plate 1), worn by the men in the Cluj area are wide like the gatya from Hungary; elsewhere in Rumania the gatya may be quite narrow. In length they are approximately mid-calf, often having a narrow pulled fringe at the bottom edge.

The <u>shirt</u> worn with the *gatya* is short, just longer than waist length. In the last century a long shirt was worn in some parts which had no collar, wide sleeves, and no cuffs. At that time it was made of hemp linen. Later it was made of manufactured cambric, and the narrow standing collar and cuffs were introduced. The sleeves seem to be never longer than the top of the wristbone, whether the older or the new style sleeve.



The <u>jacket</u> worn most commonly in the Cluj area is called the "daroc" or "condra" and is usually white or brown (Plate 1). The bridegroom's jacket, however, is grey, and when a man died, he was dressed in his bridegroom's daroc. At the end of the last century the "szur" began to be used also (see Costume Calendar, May '72 and picture on Page 4 of this issue). The szur was made by szur-tailors of the town of Oradea.

An <u>apron</u> of patterned cotton fabric, often pressed into narrow pleats, is worn over the *gatya*, and high-heeled boots are worn which have tops cut in a characteristic pattern.

The women of this area wear their hair parted in the middle, with one plait hanging down the back. Girls wear the "parta", a young girl's crown, for the greatest holidays (Plate 3). It is a hoop about 4" high, decorated with pearls and pearl flowers of various colors. The hoop is lined in red or blue, and four or five wide silk flowered ribbons hang down the back, reaching to the waist. On those great holidays when girls wear their parta a very large fringed kerchief is spread, carefully folded, over the arms. It is white, green, or yellow, with many-colored floral designs. High-heeled boots, usually black, although sometimes red, are worn with this outfit.

For workdays, a patterned kerchief is worn, tied at the nape of the neck, and on Sundays and lesser holidays, tied below the chin. In summer a very wide-brimmed straw hat might be worn. Young married women used to wear a large white tulle veil for a few years after marriage. It was called a "duldandle" (from tulle d'Anglais) and was still worn in this area before the 1st World War. Colored crewel work decorated the corner (Plate 3).

The shift and <u>petticoats</u> of the women's clothing are made of a special kind of <u>linen</u>, <u>frilled linen</u>, which has a wrinkled effect on the surface. The linen petticoat, called "pendely" was gathered into tiny pleats. On great holidays, up to three petticoats would be worn, and two or three underskirts, especially by thin women who wanted to look stouter.

Two kinds of <u>blouses</u> are used with this outfit. One has the older Renaissance style of construction (Pl. 3 & 5). At the end of the last century the sleeves were not very wide and ended below the elbow with a wide cuff. The collar and cuffs were embroidered in red for young girls and blue for married women. The designs of stylized plants are compactly sewn, so the form and ground cannot be easily seen. The older style blouse also might have had similar embroidery below the shoulder or at the shoulder and along the sleeve. The sleeves tie closed at the cuff.

The newer style of blouse (Plate 2) has the sleeves sewn to the shoulder. It is quite full-sleeved, and the sleeves end above the elbow, also with a wide, densely embroidered cuff. The high collar is similarly decorated and is closed with two small buttons. The neck of the blouse is tied closed with a cord ending in two ball-like tassels.

The <u>skirts</u> are long in the Cluj area. One kind of skirt is called "muszuj" or "bagazia" and is not sewn together in front. Made of black or dark blue cotton or satin, it is very wide and finely pleated. The pleats are smocked at the top. At the bottom of the skirt is a wide cloth lining, colored red or orange, or for older women, dark blue, claret or black. In one area these bands are heavily embroidered in floral designs. The two bottom corners are tucked up into the waist in back to show the colorful band, and a bit of white petticoat becomes visible at each side.

With the muszuj, an apron is always worn. The apron is also finely pleated, and the band of smocking at the top is decorated in a characteristic way called "wasping". The aprons may be of cloth, silk or satin, in red, blue-green or black, and are heavily decorated with flowered silk ribbons.

Another skirt of white factory-made linen, finely pleated, is called "fersing" and is worn by the girls and younger women, particularly in the summer. More modern skirts are gathered into larger, flat folds and are decorated at the bottom with several rows of ribbon.


The <u>bodice</u> is of plain or figured brocade or cloth. It is often <u>cut high</u> in front and is laced with a long black cord. Flowered silk ribbons may be sewn to each shoulder (Plate 2).

The clothing of the Cluj region shows clear Hungarian influence, even today, in the folk costumes that are preserved. The men's gatya, the many pleated petticoats and skirts of the women, and the young girl's parta are all indicative of the strong cultural ties that bind the various Hungarian groups together.



Irish Rover, a reel, is a relatively new dance done to an old tune. It was introduced by C. Stewart Smith at Stanford University in the Spring of 1972 and again presented by him at Folk Dance Camp, University of the Pacific, Stockton, California, 1972.

FORMATION:

4 cpls in longways formation.

STEPS:

Skip Change of Step: Hop L lifting R fwd with toe pointing down, knee turned out (ct ah); step fwd R (ct 1); closing step L behind R, L instep close to R heel (ct 8); step fwd R (ct 2). Bring L leg fwd passing through with a straight knee for the next step, which begins with a preliminary hop R.

Move Up (2 meas): Described for M; W dance counterpart. Step L diag fwd L (ct 1); step R across in front of L (ct 2); step L diag bkwd L (ct 1); close R to L (ct 2).

PATTERN

Measures

5-8

INTRODUCTION M bow, W curtsey to ptr. Upbeat & Chord

I. LEAD DOWN, CAST UP AND HANDS ACROSS

1-4

Cpl 1 with nearer hands joined lead down the middle below cpl 3. Release hands and cast up to 2nd place. Cpl 2 move up (meas 3-4).

W I dance 3 hands across in a R hand wheel with cpl 2, while M I dances 3 hands across in a R hand wheel with cpl 3. Cpl I finish back to back in the ctr facing 1st corners.

II. HALF REELS OF FOUR

Cpl I dance a half reel of 4 with 1st corners. 9-12

Passing L shoulders in the middle, cpl I dance a half reel of 4 with 2nd corners and 13-16 finish by joining L hands with ptr in the middle and turning 1/2 CCW.

III. REELS OF THREE

17-24 M 1 dance down to cpl 2 (now in 3rd pos) and W 1 dance up to cpl 3 (now in top pos) to make reels of 3 across the dance. Start by passing L shoulders with the person in list corner pos. Cpl I finish on own side in 2nd place.

IV. HALF DIAGONAL RIGHTS AND LEFTS

25-26

Giving R hands in passing, active cpl change places with person diag fwd to your R 🕂 M I with M 2 and W I with W 3. M I moves diag down as W I moves diag up.

27-28 Turning sharply CCW and giving L hands in passing, M I change places on the side of the dance with W 3, as W 1 dances likewise with M 2. W 3 and M 2 make "polite" turns at the end of meas 28.

29-32 Cpl I repeat action of meas 25-28 reversing direction to start diag fwd to the L --M I with W 2 and W I with M 3. Notice, however, that M I still moves diag down and W I diag up. A sharp turn CW must be made this time to change places on the sides of the dance with M I and W I making "polite" turns at the end of meas 32. Cpl I repeat dance in 2nd place and then dance to the bottom on the outside. Cpls 2, 3, and 4 then repeat the dance twice each in turn.

will be gladly accepted.




will be entertaining us during the Festival.






