At this writing the Statewide Committee is working very hard to bring to all California Folk Dancers a fine festival in a brand new area. Flyers and schedules on all events and registration forms may be obtained from the Council Presidents.

One of the teachers for the Institute to be held on Saturday May 14. at 1:30. will be DICK CRUM. afternoon. Dick is the well-known Balkan dance authority with a wealth of material from Bulgaria, Croatia, Serbia, Macedonia, and Slovenia. He has taught at many Institutes and camps throughout the United States and Canada and was one of the first to introduce Balkan dancing in the United States, having made early trips to Yugoslavia. Dick is also a linguist, speaking Spanish, Serbo-Croatian, and English, and possessing a working knowledge in many more, including Bulgarian, Polish, Indonesian, and Romanian. Formerly living in Pittsburgh and associated with the Duquesne Tamburitzans, he is now residing in Los Angeles. The Statewide Committee is delighted to have Dick for an Institute in which North and South are combined.

There will also be a teacher who is new to everyone. MANUEL ALBERTO MARTINS hails from the Azores Islands, and presently makes his home in Santa Maria with his wife and three children. He is the State President of the Portuguese 20-30 Luso-American Club, and travels throughout California attending and presiding at club functions.

Manuel will be teaching and calling the Portuguese Chamarita in the style of his particular island, Fayal. There are many calls and styles, and they all depend on which island the caller hails from. The word itself, CHAMA-RITA, means "Call Rita", (Rita being the name of a girl) and the Chamarita is a style of dance rather than a name of a dance. It is a delightful couple dance mixer, with a Caller, who <u>always</u> dances with the people rather than using a microphone, such as a square dance caller. Callers who perfect the calls seldom call the commands in the same order in every dance; therefore, the first rule of the dance is KEEP YOUR EYES ON THE CALLER.

We are most proud to have these two fine teachers for the Institute, and you should all plan ahead, and make Santa Maria a MUST for May 23-26.

SIMPLICITY:


- 5866 Woman's long sleeve jacket has good seam lines for a bodice.

- 6815 Woman's cossack shirt with a stand-up collar (see illustration).



SUNDAY, APRIL 6, 1975 Sebastopol



There will be an art and flower show held at the Veteran's Memorial Building, and don't forget the Apple Blossom Tours. Maps will be provided for the short or long tours.



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Toward A Dance Library

Dance archives centers are growing in number where old and new books, records, dance magazines, and historical data can be found. Space is provided for such collections in more than fifty cities across North America. Many are private libraries in the hands of interested dancers and teachers; others are in college libraries or separate sections in a public library. These dance collections are unique in the fact that they contain much specialized dance memorabilia not found in the average public library.

The Lawton Harris Library (see LET'S DANCE magazine, July-August 1974), includes a vast collection of recorded material, tapes, music and films, especially useful to the folk dance teacher. Another fine historical library is maintained by the Lloyd Shaw Foundation at Colorado Springs. The library at SETS IN ORDER AMERICAN SQUARE DANCE SOCIETY (SIOASDS), in Los Angeles, is particularly involved in building a complete collection of periodicals and as much square dance material with historical significance as possible. The dance collection here at San Mateo is somewhat broader in scope, and in addition to an immense collection of square dance material, there are extensive collections of folk dance, ballroom dance, American Indian dance, costume books and dance music.

An important source of dance information is found in the various periodicals which occupy considerable shelf space in some of these archives centers. Magazines such as LET'S DANCE, ROUND DANCER, SETS IN ORDER, VILTIS, AMERICAN SQUARE DANCE, BALLROOM DANCE, NORTHERN JUNKET and others, are frequently used by students, teachers and callers. Last year a remarkable contribution to these archives centers was made by Bob Osgood, editor of SQUARE DANCING (Sets in Order magazine) when he distributed a hundred or more complete sets of back issues. These volumes, dating from 1948, are now available for reference and study at those centers which are listed in the magazine's annual directory (see SQUARE DANCING, August 1974).

Gene's Dance Library in San Mateo is one of several locations in California that include material of benefit to both folk dancers and square dancers. Students and teachers doing research work or program planning have made good use of the library. For example, a young recreation leader, assigned to do a summer folk dance program for children, was happy to make use of the many books available from the Folk Dance Federation and SIOASDS. A girl scout leader needed a selection of dances for all girls of different age groups. A church group wanted suggestions for simple square dances and fun dances that the whole family could enjoy at a family night party. We have always enjoyed helping a student with a thesis or school paper.

Let me give you one or two examples of some of the interesting projects we get into: One young man selected the unusual subject of "ANTI - DANCE", and of the scores of books in this category, we had twenty titles which gave him enough material to fill a book. I was glad to know that he did not plan to have it published, although his final chapter was lavish in the praise of the benefits of dance. Most of the books that condemmed dancing were published during the nineteenth century following the time when the fast turning waltz in closed dance position became the rage. The pulpit preached with all its fervor against the temptations of such wicked amusements, and the clergy published scores of books and tracts on the evils of dancing. Here are the curious titles of some of the books we used: From The Ball Room To Hell, The Devil In Modern Society, Essays On The Evils of Dancing, Immorality of Modern Dances, From The Dance Hall To White Slavery, The Dance Of Death.

This last title, published in San Francisco in 1877, was one of the most profane protests ever written against the sins of the ballroom. And during the same year, a Mrs. Dr. J. Milton Bowers published *The Dance Of Life*, an answer to *The Dance Of Death*. It was written, she said, "because of a strong impulse to vindicate my sex from the book's infamous slanders." Her strong rebuttal was a guiding light for the hundreds of books that started to appear at the turn of the century that extolled dancing as a wholesome and healthful recreation. Some quotes from a book written by a Rev. George Hall aroused anger in many dance lovers:

"This amusement, the modern dance, is a deadly foe to purity, and I am glad that the pious and pure of all faiths condemn it."

"Arch-Bishop Spaulding, of New York, states that the confessional of his church has revealed the fact that nineteen-twentieths of the women who fall take their first downward step in dancing parties."

"The tendency of dancing is toward frivolity, worldliness, lust, lewdness, and hell."

"Christians who lament the alarming magnitude of this social evil should unite in opposing the dance, for in so doing they will remove one of the most potent causes of adultery, fornication, and sexual looseness." It's little wonder that inthe days when the church ruled the social life of the people the very name of dancing was anathema. This is why many of our old time folk dances survived as "singing games" or "play-party games." Not all the rigid doctrines of strict religion could stamp out the dance and music of centuries of tradition. This is born out in the following quote from Eloise Linscott's interesting book Folk Songs of Old New England: "An excellent example of the fine distinction between playing a game and dancing is the old singing game of "The Wild Irishman," the figures of which were done to a special tune, while verses were sung by the players. The Wild Irishman, minus the special tune and verses, is known today as the Ninepin Quadrille.

The chapter on The Country Dance in this same (Linscott) book suggested the subject of a paper by a college student who came to us for some ideas. Her title was The History Of The Quadrille, and we searched through many old and new books such as: An Analysis Of Country Dancing, Good Morning, by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford, Dick's Quadrille Call Book, Square Dancing, A History, Squares Galore, Playford's Dancing Master, The Quadrille and Cotillion Panorama, and early issues of Square Dancing magazines.

Another student is presently working on a paper about American Indian Dance, and at the same time is helping us prepare a bibliography of this section of the library. Our biggest project now in progress is a category index and bibliography of the entire dance collection. Folk dancers will find useful book reference in the FOLK DANCES FROM NEAR AND FAR volumes, published by the Folk Dance Federation of California, Inc.



Remember !

THE BEGINNER'S FESTIVAL will be held Sunday, April 6, 1975 at Bancroft Jr. High School in San Leandro. The program is designed especially for beginners, and STAN VALENTINE will call some basic squares, so all of you who are frustrated by regular festival programs, here's your chance to get out and do every single dance! The program will last from 1:30 to 5:30 PM. The school is located at Bancroft and Foothill in San Leandro.

Remember the 4th OF JULY FESTIVAL in Oakland. Watch future issues of LET'S DANCE for the exact time and place. It is quite possible that it will not be held at the Municipal Auditorium.

INDIVIDUALS AND CLUBS using the services of the Federation Office for distribution of flyers regarding parties and other non-Federation events should note that the executive board has voted to raise the charges for this service, starting April 1, 1975, to \$10.00 for each flyer included in a mailing of the minutes. The check for \$10.00 should be included when delivering the 500 $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ flyers to the office. Those availing themselves of this service should allow a month to 6 weeks before the event is to take place to have the flyers into the office.

Increased mailing costs is indicated as the reason for this change in service charges. It was noted that our mailing costs for the current fiscal year are going to exceed the budget, so some corrections in charges are to be expected.

LET'S DANCE April 1975

MAZULINKA

(Slovenia)

This is one of many Slovenian variants of the mazurka, and is a distant "cousin" of the Varsouvienne. The Slovenes, like practically everyone else in Europe and America in the late 19th century, adopted this dance from Warsaw via Paris, and with the turn of the century immigration to the United States, it reached this country years after "Put Your Little Foot" came into vogue here. The version described here was notated by Dick Crum from the dancing of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Kurnick in San Francisco, 1958. Mr. Kurnick was, throughout his long, active life, famous as a fine Slovenian dancer, and was also prominent in San Francisco and national Slovene-American activities. Dick Crum presented Mazulinka (mah-zoo-LEEN-kah) at the 1974 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp, and again, with Mrs. Kurnick as his partner, at the 1974 Kolo Festival, San Francisco.

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MUSIC: Record: 33-EP-SD 601-2, "Slovenian Old Time Dances", S-2, B-1, "Mazulinka." (This is a "nostalgia" reissue of a recording made by the Hojer Trio of Cleveland, Ohio in the 1920s). 3/4 meter.

FORMATION: Cpls in closed ballroom pos at random about the room.

STYLING: The entire dance is done with small steps, wt on ball of ft, with a rather stiff little bounce on every beat.

Direction are for M; W use opp ftwk.

MUSIC 3/4	PATTERN
Measures	
Upbeat	Preliminary slight bounce on R ft.
1	Step on L ft sdwd L (ct 1); close R ft to L, taking wt (ct 2); wt on R ft, one slight bounce (ct 3).
2	Repeat action of meas 1.
3	Beginning a $1/4$ turn CCW as a cpl, step on L ft (ct 1); continuing to turn, step on R (ct 2); finish the $1/4$ turn with a step on L ft (ct 3).
4	Point R ft out to R (ct 1); with wt on L, bounce in this pos twice (cts 2,3).
5-8	Repeat action of meas 1-4 with opp ftwk, making a 1/4 turn CW in meas 7.
9-10	Repeat action of meas 3-4 (1/4 turn CCW).
11-12	Repeat action of meas 7-8 (1/4 turn CW).
13-20	With small steps (3 per meas) turn as a cpl either CW or CCW, maintaining the stiff little bounce on each step.

Repeat dance from beginning.

LET'S DANCE April 1975

RUČENICA FOR THREE

(Bulgaria)

Rućenica (ruh-chen-NEE-tsah) is from the Strandža district in southeast Bulgaria. The dance was learned by Mr. Dick Crum from the late Ilkja Rizov, lead dancer with the Kutev Bulgarian State Ensemble. In a very elaborate form, the dance served as a basis for a portion of that group's showpiece "Ručenica." After much research into Ručenica For Three, Mr. Crum selected four figures and put them into a fixed sequence for use and enjoyment by American and Canadian folk dancers. Figs I, II, and III are original "village" figures; Fig IV is a stylized pattern, meant to give an idea of the improvised, non-structured solo dancing typical of the dance in its village setting. The following description is as the dance was presented by him at the 1974 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp, Stockton, California.

MUSIC: Record: XOPO-324 - A "Strandžanska Rúčenica" - B "Trakijska Rúčenica" 7/16 meter.

Any moderate to fast Rucenica may be used.

- RHYTHM: This music is in 7/16 meter, counted 1-2 (2/16); 1-2 (2/16); 1-2-3 (3/16). Since 3 beats to a meas are felt, the ct will be given thusly: ct 1 (2/16), ct 2 (2/16), ct 3 (3/16), with the ct 3 being of slightly longer duration. Cue Q,Q,S.
- FORMATION: Trios, 1 M with 2 W, all facing ctr of large circle of many trios. M arms are outstretched in front of W, his R hand joined with R hand of Wl to his R, L hand joined with L hand of W2 to his L. W join inside hands in front and above M arms.
- STEPS and
STYLING:Basic Ručenica Step: Step R (ct 1), step L (ct 2), step R with slight bend of R knee
(ct 3). Reverse ftwk for repeat of step. Steps are small with a light leaping
quality. Dance moves quickly with precise, controlled ftwk. Begin R, the basic step
is danced in place, bkwd, fwd, sdwd or turning with an occasional stamp to accent the
beginning or ending of a musical phrase. The basic step is used in Figs I, II
and III.

Bounce: With wt on one or both ft raise heel(s) with ball(s) of ft still on the floor (up beat) lower heel(s) (down beat). The bounce has a heavy down feeling.

All Figs beg R.

I. FORWARD AND BACK

- 1-4 With 4 basic steps trio move fwd twd ctr of circle.
- 5-8 With 4 basic steps trio move bkwd.
- 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8 (Fig I) fwd and back. At end of meas 16 W raise joined arms high to form an arch.

II. SQUAT, ARCH AND TURN SET INSIDE OUT

- M: Squat to a deep knee-bend moving fwd under W raised joined hands (cts 1-2); rise with wt on R, L extended across in front of R with L knee slightly bent (ct 3).
- M dance 1 basic step LRL, turn L (CCW) and raise his R and R hand of W1 high to form an arch. M is now facing W2.

W: Dance 2 basic steps in place.

- 3-4 With 2 basic steps; M turn more to the L, at the same time pulling W2 fwd under arch of M and W1. With 2 basic steps W1 move a little fwd, beginning to follow W2.
- 5-6 With 2 basic steps W2 turn R (CW) raising her L and M L joined hands high to form an arch, and lead the trio in a CW direction. W1 move fwd, passing under this arch, turn R and follow W2. M follow W1 under the arch, turn L (CCW) and bring his L hand

back over his head. Set is roughly back in orig starting pos facing ctr of room. W keep joined hands high in an arch.

- 7-8 With 2 basic steps M move bkwd ducking under W arch. W dance 2 basic steps in place.
- 9-15 Repeat action of meas 1-7 (Fig II).
- 16 Release hands and re-join them to form a circle of three.

III. CIRCLE RIGHT AND LEFT

1-8 With 8 basic steps circle R (CCW) turning, dancing sdwd, etc., in free style.

- 9-16 With 8 basic steps circle L (CW) turning, dancing sdwd, etc., in free style. Finish the circling with M facing ctr of room. On last meas (meas 16) release hands and place them on hips, fingers fwd, thumbs back. M dance 1 basic step in place. With 1 basic step W move a little fwd of M, W1 turn 1/4 L (CCW), W2 turn 1/4 R (CW), to face each other about 6 ft apart. W1 R and W2 L shldrs twd ctr of room.
 - IV. SOLO
- M: In place, hop L, kicking R across in front of L (ct 1); step R in place beside L (ct 2); hop R, kicking L across R (ct 3).
- 2 Step L in place, extend R fwd low (ct 1); step R in place, extend L fwd low (ct 2); step L in place, extend R fwd low (ct 3). (Scissor Kicks)
- 3-8 Repeat action of meas 1-2 (Fig IV) 3 times.
- 9 With 1 basic step move fwd twd ctr of room.
- 10 With 1 basic step move bkwd.
- 11 Repeat action of meas 9 (Fig IV), passing between the 2 W.
- 12 With 1 basic step turn 1/2 R (CW) ending on the other side of set with back to ctr of room. M is now facing his orig pos in the circle of three.
- 13-16 Repeat action of meas 9-12 (Fig IV) returning to orig pos.
- 1 <u>W</u>: With 1 basic step move fwd twd each other, turning 1/4 R (CW) to end with L elbow pointing twd each other.
- 2 Looking over L shldrs at each other, touch L toe to L side, leave R ft in place, with wt over both ft bounce twice (cts 1-2); bounce again releasing R ft with a slight flick (ct 3).
- 3 Begin R, with 1 basic step move bkwd, turning 1/2 L (CCW) to end with R elbow twd each other, looking over R shldrs.
- 4 Repeat action of meas 2 (Fig IV) with L toe pointing away from each other.
- 5-8 Repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig IV).
- 9 With 1 basic step W move fwd twd each other as if to pass L shldrs.
- 10 With 1 basic step turn 1/2 L (CCW) to exchange places.
- 11-12 With 2 basic steps move bkwd into each other's pos.
- . .

Note: W stay face to face throughout this movement (meas 9-12, Fig IV).

13-16 Repeat action of meas 9-12 (Fig IV) returning to orig. pos.

W: Meas 9-16 (Fig IV) are accompanied by special hand movements. Hands are held in front a little above face level, palms fwd (fingers not spread, although thumbs are opened out). Bring hands downward with an abrupt, flat movement as if smoothing a flat wall or surface (cts 1-2); quickly flick hands under and out by turning palms twd you as fingers bend twd palms, then with outside edge of hand "leading down" and away from you, flick hands out into pos of cts 1-2 (ct 3). Hands do not touch; if they did, middle knuckles would be in contact during the down-and-away flick. 8 hand movements are done (1 per basic step).

At the end of Fig IV, quickly re-form the set to repeat the dance from the beginning.






