

The details of this elegant ensemble are beautiful. Many hours of hand sewing are needed to stitch down the many yards of narrow gold wrapped cord needed in each design. Often the beginning and end will start in the same place, but from there on it proceeds like a grand march. The cord will double back so it looks like two cords, or maybe four, and then suddenly there is only one single cord along one edge or in the middle of a design. (Fig 1 on pg 6) The heavier flat braid has the gold only on the top, so no expensive gold is wasted where it can't be seen; cotton thread is on the bottom half.


The blouse is of a fine silk, plain weave and with woven stripes, in a light yellow gold color. The pattern pieces are

cut in block style (Fig. 2), with a slit type front opening, and only the front and back panels being in plain weave. The neck edge has a half inch wide band, alittle like a stand-up collar, heavily embroidered with small cross stitches using a two thread count in black, very


EMBROIDERY EXAMPLE


BLOUSE



dark green, and very dark blue and gold flat wire in a slant stitch (Fig. 3). The center front is decorated with matching embroidery and is closed at the neck with a hook and eye.

The short jacket is of a midnight or very dark blue wool and is elaborately decorated with gold covered thread (Fig. 4). It appears as if each pattern piece is decorated and then sewn together by hand, leaving the sleeve seam and the side seam to be sewn last. There is no gold decoration on the lower edge in the back. The jacket is lined with a heavy muslin.







SLEEVE

The sleeveless coat is of the same fabric as the jacket but is more elaborately decorated (Fig. 5, next page). The coat is worn over the jacket. In addition to the gold covered thread, a gold half inch braid, a 1/8 inch red braid, and a 1 3/8 inch gold metallic ribbon is used. Along one edge a gold cord and a red cord were twisted together to make a red and gold cord. Eighteen gold wire covered oval balls decorate each side of the up-

per center front edge. The coat is lined with a red plaid cotton fabric, and the upper front is lined with a dark brown wool. The three tassels on each side are of silver and make a lovely contrast for the blue and gold that is so predominant.



The skirt is of the dark blue wool, reaches the ankles, and is not very full. There is no decoration on the skirt.

Presumably the jacket and coat were not meant to be cleaned, as cardboard was used as the stiffening behind the gold designs and around the edges.

A Look at

International Ballroom Dancing

Is International Ballroom Dancing all that different from International Folk Dancing? Quite different, in fact it is not the same as American social dancing, either.

What is now known as "International" in the United States or "Imperial" in some other countries actually started in England. Early this century the people there were enjoying their socalled folk dances, such as St. Bernard's Waltz, Eva Three Step, Cumberland Square, and Canadian Barn Dance. Gradually the English dancing public in the cities, especially London, made the change from sequence and set dances to couple dances during the years of the First World War. This was followed by the jazz craze of the twenties and the swinging years of the thirties.

For a number of years fad dances came and went until some English dance teachers decided to standardize a few basic steps and to clarify good technique. Great progress has been made during the last 50 years until today the English style, or International Ballroom Dancing, is regarded as classic throughout the world. For competition purposes it is divided into two categories: Latin, including cha-cha-cha, rhumba, samba, and paso doble; and Modern, including Waltz, quickstep, foxtrot, and tango. (Swing and Viennese Waltz are sometimes included in compettition.)

Those wanting to learn this kind of dancing soon find that it is more difficult than ordinary social ballroom or most folk dancing, and that it would take years of study and practice to perfect their form. However, novices can learn the basic steps of most of the different dances in either class or privatelessons and soon can enjoy the challenge of participation. Couples practice in large ballrooms of dance studios or private clubs.

World-wide interest has resulted from the recognition of International Ballroom Dancing as a truly great indoor sport and recreation. A movement has started to get it approved for competition in the Olympic Games. As a competitive sport it has already aroused great interest in many countries. Those in the British Commonwealth were originally the most enthusiastic in building dance champions, i.e., Scotland (England), Ireland, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, and Canada.

In Europe most of the Western countries are now involved, such as Germany, Austria, Holland, Denmark, Norway, and Sweden. Interest in ballroom dancing is also increasing in the eastern countries of USSR, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, and Yugoslavia. Participation is high in countries as far away from England as Japan, Ceylon, Indonesia, and Iceland.

Truly International in scope are the world championships which are scheduled every other year in London while competition is held on alternate years in such leading cities as Berlin, Zurich, Sydney, Tokyo, and New York. The 1975 U.S. Ballroom hampionships are scheduled for the Labor Day weekend at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York. At the peak of the pyramid of world dance competition is the Blackpool Dance Festival, which includes the World Congress, held every year in May in Blackpool, England, and attended by thousands of participants and observers. This year the festival will celebrate a half century of competition on the highest level of ballroom dancing perfection.


Americans are the most enthusiastic ballroom dancers of all outside of England itself. More than 25 competitions are held each year in the United States in Arizona, California, Florida, Illinois, Michigan, New York, Texas, Utah, Virginia, and Washington, D.C. California heads the list with the most active dancers and the most ballroom studios and private dancingclubs. In northern California the two leading ballroom studios are the Hinton-Pick and Renaissance Ballrooms, and members of the Peninsula International Dance Club have been practicing weekly in Redwood City for ten years. In southern California there are several ballroom schools, including Cully's, Lexton, Margaret Michaels, Morgan, Sloan, and Webber-Sire, and Westmor.

A large California dance club is called the National Smooth Dancers with 600 members divided into 11 chapters in the following areas: San Diego, Coronado, Fallbrook, Long Beach, Los Angeles, San Fernando, Bakersfield, Fresno, San Jose, Oakland, and San Francisco. This popular club originated in Los Angeles about 35 years ago and practiced the "slicker" or smooth style. About 12 years ago they gradually began to learn the International style until most new members have converted.

Californians like to dance and fortunately they don't have to choose between International Folk Dancing and International Ballroom Dancing. Those with the time and energy can enjoy

With more than 250 dancers in attendance the April 6th BEG-INNERS FESTIVAL can be termed as a BIG success.

Dancers from as far as Sebastopol and Santa Rosa on the North, and Modesto and Turlock to the south were at the Bancroft Jr. High in San Leandro to test their skills with the Beginning and Intermediate level dances presented by the East Bay Council. Among the new dancers were a number of more experienced dancers, including 19 teachers, 5 Federation Past Presidents, and 5 current Federation officers. When Stan Valentine called, there were 20 squares packed on the floor with enough spectators for another 10 squares had there been enough room on the floor.

TEACHER-DANCER SEMINAR

Our Spring '75 TEACHER-DANCER SEMINAR held at the Commodore Sloat School in San Francisco on March 16 and April 27 was very enthusiastically attended.

The opening session included a get-together round table discussion of various class situations, problems, and possible solutions.

After the coffee break, groups of 8 or 10 met in seperate rooms and those who wished were extended the opportunity to teach a part or complete dance, using their own procedures and methods.

At the end of each teaching period the participating students joined in making comments and offering helpful suggestions to the teachers.

Each group was under the guidance and supervision of atleast two experienced teachers.

Following the catered luncheon and rap sessions, everyone gathered in the auditorium for a presentation of Folk Lore and historical background with a master lesson on Hungarian dances by Anthony Ivancich at the first meeting and Russian, Yugoslav, and Greek dances by Anatole Jakowsky during the second meeting.

At the close of the second meeting all attenders were afforded the opportunity of listing in writing their reactions and comments together with suggestions and recommendations of changes, additions or improvements to be considered for inclusion in our next seminar.

The committee has tabulated these suggestions and is most appreciative of the cooperative response from the students as these will be the format guide for our next seminar to be held in Spring '76, for which we already have several people registered.

Ample publicity is being planned so that all those interested will have plenty of advance notice.

ŚWINIOK

(Poland)

Świniok (SHVEEN-yawk) comes from the mountainous region of Beskidy in the southern part of Upper Silesia in Poland. The name of the dance derives from a song. The word "świniok" (Silesian dialect for "świniarz") means a swineherd. The same dance appears in other parts of the Beskidy region under different names. The dance was introduced to California dancers at the 1974 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp in Stockton, California, by Ada Dziewanowska, who learned it in Cieszyn, Poland, from a noted Silesian folklorist, Janina Marcinkowa.

MUSIC: Record: Tance Slaskie 7167, Side B, Band 2.

FORMATION: Cpls in open pos facing LOD with outside hands free at sides, or M may place hand on his lower back, palm facing away from body.

STEPS: Polka: In this dance the same as the Two-step* with no hop, Hop*, Pivot*.

1-8 INTRODUCTION No action.

I. POLKA WITH DOUBLE HOP

Starting with outside ft (ML, WR), move fwd LOD with 1 polka step, bending fwd from the waist (cts 1,&) and straightening (ct 2).

- 2 Hop twice on outside ft (cts 1,2), swinging inside ft fwd LOD on the first hop and holding it there for the second hop.
- 3-4 Release ptr and make a half turn twd ptr (M CW, W CCW) to face RLOD. Take open pos with W on ML and repeat action of meas 1-2 moving RLOD with opp ftwrk. On last hop finish facing ptr. M raise L hand to W shldr blade and put R arm around W waist, while W lower R hand to M shldr blade and put L hand on M upper arm.
 - II. PIVOT

Starting ML, WR, cpl dance a smooth, fast pivot CW making 4 complete turns with 8 steps while progressing in LOD.

Repeat dance from beginning.

Shecharchoret (sheh-har-HO-ret) is a couple dance choreographed by Ya'acov Levi to traditional Ladino music. The name means "The Dark One". The dance was introduced at the 1974 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp by Schlomo Bachar.

MUSIC: Record: Hadarim IV "I Remember...", Side B, Band 6. Meter 4/4

FORMATION: Cpls in a circle facing LOD, W to R of M, standing close together with inside hands joined and outside hands free to move with the flow of the dance.

STEPS & <u>Yemenite Step</u> - Yemenite L: Step sdwd L on L bending knees (ct 1), rock onto R in STYLING: place with knees straight (ct 2), step L across in front of R bending knees (ct 3), hold (ct 4). To dance a Yemenite R use opp ftwk. <u>Three-Step Turn*</u> There should be much communication between the cpl (eye contact) as Shecharchoret is

a very romantic dance. The "hold" cts are most important. They make the dance more dramatic. Ftwk is described for the M. W do opp except in Fig III where the ftwk is the same


for both M and W. For ease of understanding the dance is written in cts instead of meas.

1-4	Dance 1 Yemenite Step as follows: Step sdwd L on L bending knees and moving free hand out to the side - look twd hand - (ct 1); rock onto R ft in place looking at ptr again (ct 2); step L across in front of R bending knees (ct 3); swing R ft fwd, toe pointed in LOD as you rise onto the ball of L ft with both knees straight (ct 4).
5-6	Still looking at ptr and with hand still out to the side, slowly squat with R ft slightly in front of L.
7-8	Slowly rise taking wt on the L ft.
9-12	Beg R ft, dance 3 long steps in LOD (cts 9-11); hold (ct 12).

Repeat dance from the beginning 2 more times (3 times in all). At the end of third time continue turning with R arm around ptrs waist and L arm diag upward. Continue stepping R with bent knee, L with straight knee as the music fades away.


CAMP SCHOLARSHIPS




