Statewide Fiesta '75

May 23-26 SANTA MARIA

Here are the last minute instructions to make it easier for your trip to Statewide in Santa Maria:

There are five exits from the 101 Freeway into Santa Maria, and the Stowell Road turnoff will take you directly to the Vandenberg Inn. This will be where you will register on Friday only from 5:00 PM - 7:00 PM, and also where the Installation Brunch will be held on Sunday at 10:30 AM.

The Stowell Road turnoff will also take you directly to the Convention Center; cross Broadway (corner where Inn is located) continuing west to S. Thornburg St. - which is the first right turn off Stowell Rd. The Convention Center is within walking distance from the Vandenberg Inn, considered four city blocks.

If you arrive after 8:00 PM on Friday, you will want to register at the Veteran's Memorial Hall where the Pre-Party will also be in session. The Main St - Guadalupe exit off the freeway will be easier, continuing due west, through the center of the city to Pine Street (there are signal lights) turn right, six blocks north, the Hall will be all lit up. This will also be the location for afterparties Saturday and Sunday 12:00 MID-3:00 AM. You will be able to get a snack there, as food will be catered by The Cooperage.

COSTUMES FROM:

ITALY

Central Area, Vicinity of Rome





Among the many costumes of Central Italy, two features are distinctive; they are "Le Ciocie" (chee-oh-chee-eh) which are the shoes used in this area, and "La Tovaglia" (tow-vahl-leeah) which is the headdress the women wear. These items identify the region from which the woman's costume originates.

The Tovaglia is the type of headdress made from a rectangular piece of cloth, traditionally linen, starched and folded to make a little box effect. This sits on the head while the ends fall on the shoulders and back, giving good protection from the heat of the sun. It is kept in place by long pins, silver for the young girls and gold "tremolanti" - dangling ornaments -for the brides and matrons.

The blouse is made of heavy, white linen or cotton, with no collar, and often adorned with lace at the neck or wrists. The wide sleeves are gathered at the top and below the elbow, and may have inserts of lace or colored embroidery two or more inches wide, just above and below the elbow. A broad cuff of red velvet may be added below the sleeve. For ease in laundering, it is suggested that the lower edge of the sleeve be gathered with a drawstring or ribbon, pinned or tied, that can be removed easily.

Green velvet is generally used for the bodice, although another soft fabric may be used, and is stiffened with a firm interfacing. The bodice may be edged in a bright color or with gold trimming. See back view and the way the lacings are tied. The color of the lacings may vary, but black is used for **bot**h the bodice and cuffs when in mourning.



A large scarf is draped over the shoulders and knotted so the knot meets the top of the bodice at the center front. The fabric is of a soft material with a floral print, and has a fringe of a soft red yarn.

The skirt is 3:1/2 to 4 yards around, cut straight, never flared, and gathered or pleated. The fabric is of a heavy texture; like wool, damask, etc. In the North, colors are dark: blue, dark green, brown, purple, and black, while in the South

the bright reds, maroons, and greens are typical. The skirt length is to the ankle or a few inches above it. Over the skirt a very decorative apron is worn, and the lighter colors appear here. It can be of delicate white or black home made lace, or of a linen, silk, velvet, homespun wool, or even leather. Sometimes it matches the headpiece.

"The apron is like a painting, it requires much thought and work and trimming. Some of the designs used may have symbolic meanings; a bird carrying a branch may mean love and fertility; two hearts, faithfulness, etc."* This is the place for imagination. It is large, covering the whole front of the skirt except for a few inches at the bottom. A bright print or embroi-

dery would produce the effect desired.

The woman's stockings are heavy white knitted cotton with lacy designs. The shoes, "Ciocie", are of black leather. They are made of a plain piece of leather cut a little wider than the foot all around. The edges are perforated with small holes through which ribbons or strings are drawn and then laced up around the ankle and leg. These shoes have a very ancient history; in fact they go back to the footwear used by the primitive people of the Italian peninsula and of other countries. "The women of this area for centuries have been called 'Ciociare" about whom many poems have been written..."*

Coral necklaces and earrings complete her costume.


The men wear a very stylish tall stiff hat made of a dark felt, and a small colored cotton kerchief tied loosely around his neck. His shirt is homespun, or a white linen, with a soft collar and narrow cuffs. Around his waist he has a solid color or lengthwise striped sash with a small fringe on the narrow ends. The sash is tied to the side.

The trousers are of a heavy wool material, or heavy cotton, of dark colors. Knee length is traditional, though the long length is now used as well. Brass buttons or ties are used at the knee opening. The front is either plain or may have a sai-

lor-type flap, also buttoned.

The stockings are white, or black, and are hand knitted. The shoes are the "Ciocie" or other black leather shoes, low cut, and may have buckles.


Keep up the good work, East Bay Council, and perhaps some of the other teachers, clubs, and councils should try a little of the same!

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
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


The Santa Rosa Folk Dancers and Redwood Folk Dancers extend a warm invitation to dance with them on Sunday, May 18th, 1975!


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KOZIORAJKA

(Poland)

Koziorajka (koh-zhoh-RAHY-kah) is a dance for three from the mountainous region of Beskid in the southern part of Upper Silesia in Poland. The name is derived from the word "koza", the goat. This dance has three melodies with three different tempos, characteristic of Silesian music. Ada and Jas Dziewanowski learned the dance in Cieszyn, Poland, from Janina Marcinkowa, a noted Silesian Folklorist. It was introduced by Ada Dziewanowski at the 1974 University of Pacific Folk Dance Camp.

MUSIC:

Record: DR 7167 Side B, Band 1 (no introduction) 2/4 meter.

FORMATION:

Circles of trios, M between 2 W, all hands joined with arms extended to form a circle

STEPS:

Step-hop*, run*, "szkrobok" (SHKROH - bohk): from the verb "skrobac" - to scrape,

or to scratch.

STYLING:

Place free hands on waist, fingers fwd, thumbs back.

PATTERN

Measures

23

I. CIRCLE L, R

- A 1-3 Beg L, dance CW with 6 step-hops.

 - 5-8 Repeat action of meas 1-4 with opp ftwk, moving CCW.
 - 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8.

II. "SZKROBOK"

- B 1 With a slight leap onto L in place, thrust pointed R ft fwd with toes touching the floor (ct 1); hold (ct 2).
 - 2 Small leap onto R and thrust L fwd (ct 1); hold (ct 2).
 - 3-4 Alternately thrust fwd RLR (cts 1, 2, 1); hold (ct 2).

III. ELBOW HOOKS

- C . 1-2 M and RW hook R arms. Both beg R and with 4 smooth running steps turn once CW, rounded outside (L) arms raised overhead. At same time LW, hands on hips, turn CCW in place one or two full turns with 4 steps.
 - 3-4 M and LW hook L arms. Both beg R and turn once CCW with 4 running steps, R arms high. RW turn CW.
 - 5-16 Repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig III) 3 times (4 in all).

Repeat dance from the beginning.

II. PAS DE BASQUES AND BROKEN ANKLE STEPS

- B 17-20 Face ptr. Beg L, dance 2 heel-pas-de-basque steps fwd and 6 broken ankle steps bkwd away from ptr.
 - 21-32 Repeat action of meas 17-20 (Fig II) three more times.

III. CHORUS

A 1-16 Repeat action of Fig. I.

IV. JUMP-TOE-TOE

B 17-32 Face ptr. Beg with hop on L, dance 16 Jump-toe-toe steps.

V. CHORUS

A 1-16 Repeat action of Fig I.

VI. TOE-HEEL-CROSS

B 17-32 Face ptr. Beg with leap onto L, dance 16 toe-heel-cross steps.

VII. CHORUS

A 1-16 Repeat action of Fig. I, taking wt on L on last ct.

VIII. BORRACHITO AND BROKEN ANKLE STEPS

- B 17-20 Face ptr. Beg R, dance 2 borrachito steps fwd and 6 broken ankle steps bkwd away from ptnr.
 - Repeat action of meas 17-20 (Fig VIII) three more times, but dancing only 5 broken ankle steps the last time, holding last ct.

IX. CHORUS

A 1-16 Repeat action of Fig I.

X. TOE-HEEL-CROSS WITH ROCK

- B 17-30 Face ptr. Beg with leap onto L, dance 7 toe-heel-cross with rock steps. During meas 9-30 ptrs approach each other.
 - Ptrs turn (M 1/4 CCW; W 1/4 CW) with 1 toe-heel-cross step to finish side by side facing LOD.
 - 32 Stamp LR (cts 1,2). Hold pose (ct 3).

LET'S DANCE MAY/JUNE 1975

EL NARANJO

(Mexico)

El Naranjo (nah-RAHN-hoh), meaning "the orange tree", is a lively dance from **nor**thern Mexico. It was introduced at the 1974 Folk Dance Camp in Stockton, California by Nelda Drury.

MUSIC:

20

Record: L.P. Eco #207 "Polka Alegres", Express 410 B

FORMATION:

Pts side by side facing LOD with inside hands crossed behind ptr back and joined with ptr outside hand. This is the position for the chorus. Dance all other figures facing ptr, M back to ctr of the circle with M thumbs at belt in front, W holding skirt at sides and using it freely.

STEPS AND STYLING:

Step-brush-hop: Step L (ct 1); brush R ft diag fwd across in front of L (ct 2); hop on L (ct 3). Repeat with opp ftwk next meas.

Running Steps*

<u>Heel-pas-de-basque step</u>: Leap onto L to L (ct 1); step on R heel in front of L (ct 2); step L close to R (ct 3). Repeat with opp ftwk next meas.

<u>Broken ankle step</u>: Step on one ft turning ankle of free ft out, no wt. (Be sure to transfer wt onto supporting ft <u>before</u> turning ankle of free ft.) Ft alternate on these steps, which are danced in even rhythm, 3 per meas.

 $\underline{\text{Jump-toe-toe}}$: Small jump or bounce on both ft (ct 1); hop twice on L ft and tap R toe behind L ft twice, turning head and body slightly CCW with body also leaning slightly fwd (cts 2,3). Repeat with opp ftwk and direction next meas.

Toe-heel-cross: Leap onto L ft and tap R toe at R side (toe in, heel out and up) wisking body slightly CCW (ct 1); hop L and tap R heel at side (heel in; toe out and up) twisting body slightly CW (ct 2); hop L and tap R toe across in front of L ft (ct 3). Repeat with opp ftwk and direction next meas.

Borrachito step: Leap onto flat R with accent, leading with R shldr fwd (ct 1); step on ball of L behind R (ct 2); step on R (ct 3). Repeat with opp ftwk next meas.

Toe-heel-cross with rock (2 meas): Dance the toe-heel-cross (cf above) (meas 1). Dance the rock with leap fwd onto R raising L behind close to R, keeping toe down (meas 2, ct 1); leap bkwd onto L raising R in front close to L with toe down (meas 2, ct 2); repeat action of meas 2, ct 1 again (meas 2, ct 3). Continuing into next 2 meas, repeat entire pattern with opp ftwk. During the rock there is no body bend fwd and back, but the feeling is up and down.

Ftwk is the same for both M and W throughout the dance.

INTRODUCTION - 3 pick-up notes

- I. CHORUS
- A 1-3 Beg L, dance 3 step-brush-hop steps fwd LOD.
 - 4 Leaning slightly fwd from the waist, dance 3 running steps fwd LOD, kicking ft slightly up in back.
 - 5-16 Repeat action of meas 1-4 three more times.

Saturday is the second session for the dances introduced on Thursday and Friday. The week comes to a climax with the Camp Talent Show, and then the fantastic international banquet. Our UOP chefs prepare a meal fit for Kings. The banquet is followed by an evening of dancing. The party themes for this year will be Polish for the first week and Balkan for the second week.

The "Coffee House" hasbeen one of the most pleasant additions to Camp. A relaxed atmosphere allows each dancer to finish the day (night) with the final touch. Your hosts, John and Paula Pappas, have taken great care to have a variety of international foods available. When the mood moves you, a request program is available right in the next room. Each dance party is hosted by a different staff member. Live music is often part of the evening.

The real "feeling" of Stockton is hard to describe. For one whole week the cares of the outside world seem to disappear. You become so immersed in the total activity of dance that a oneness arises above racial, cultural and religious differences.

We hope you will be able to join us for our 28th year. A \$25. deposit, forwarded to Mr. Jack McKay, Director, Stockton Folk Dance Camp, University of the Pacific, Stockton, California, 95211, will hold your place. 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


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
