

Festival AMAN '76, Aman's Institute for January 30 to February 1, 1976. will be a radical departure from previous institutes. "Dance in Context" is a new approach to instruction and we hope that you will find it as exciting as we do.

In addition to the members of AMAN who have done research abroad, we are proud to present sessions led by Dick Crum, nationally known folklorist, and Ivan Perkovich, former member of LADO, the Croatian State Folk Ensemble.

We hope that you will join us for what promises to be an exciting added dimension in folklore and dance.



Jugoslavian Institute

The 1975 Folk Dance Institute in Yugoslavia opened with a bang on Saturday, August 16th, with a reception and private concert at the Ivo Lola Ribar Ensemble Studios in Belgrade. Ensemble Director VLADETA VLAHOVIĆ introduced SLAVKO KVASNEVSKI to the Institute members and apologized for himself and the Ensemble because they would be in Algiers during the Institute.

Slavko took over the artistic direction on short notice, but showed the professionalism that comes from a lifetime as a dancer and director. Working with CAROL WALKER, an English syllabus for the Institute was prepared in record time. Coincidentally, Slavko and Institute General Director STEVAN RADOJICIC had been members of the Army Ensemble together during the 1950's. For more than twenty years, Slavko was artistic director and choreographer for the professional ensemble SOTA, which specializes in dances of the Kosovo region, and currently he is director of the ENSEMBLE JEDINSTVO, and amateur ensemble based in Beograd.

For the first year's program, it was decided to present a wide sampling of Yugoslav dance material, as nearly as possible in its original form. More than forty dances were taught during the two-week institute; they covered Vlach, Vojvodina, Nis, Central Serbia, Vranje, Kosovo, Crna Gora, Bosnia, Macedonia, and Croatia. The range was from basic dances such as Lesnoto and Vranjanka, through the improvisational courtship dance Sota. which was practiced in both city and village versions. In the mini-concert members presented on the last evening of the Institute, Slavko had three different couples perform Sota: Sandy GUAGLIANONE and PHILLIP KLINGMAN as young lovers, CAPOL WALKER and MARIO CASETTA as not-quite-so-young lovers, and ANNE KROLL and Slavko himself as the more "mature" representatives. is in her 60's and had as much fun--maybe more, as 16 year old OWEN BRADLEY; they represent the age range attending the Institute.

Organizers of the Institute, Stevan Radojičic and Carol Walker, with a lot of help from PETER MULIN of Gary, Indiana, planned to present an American-style institute in Yugoslavia with the goal of providing the members with a program that would have enough interesting material for the dedicated dancer/teacher and plenty of fun for dancers of all ages and abilities. Situating the Institute in the heart of Serbia added a cultural dimension to the experience that could not possibly be achieved elsewhere.

There were several opportunities for cross-cultural friendships. Slavko had two young assistants and an accordionist from the ENSEMBLE JEDINSTVO and they were in Arandjelovac for the duration of the Institute. Members of Stevan's family came to visit us and PETER MULIN'S aunt, "Tetka Fina", was house-mother for about a week. The entire group attended a Serbian Wedding celebration and had a special, all day party at a farm, plus meeting several young Yugoslavs who came to watch the dancing and stayed to join in. Peter Mulin made contact with a Serbian master tailor who is still hand-making the traditional men's wear and women's vests and with the members of a zadruga or collective that specializes in opanki-making--you can imagine how the group took advantage of these opportunities! Conversations took place in a crazy mixture of English, Serbo-Croatian, German and pantomime; when the going got really tough, there was always someone bilingual who could help out.

Plans for 1976 include considerable expansion of the teaching program with two, possibly three, teachers, plus a musical director. Members will be encouraged to bring instruments and play them. The Institute will again be in Arandjelovac, a lovely, small resort town fifty miles south of Beograd. It has many fine facilities to offer and the many friends made in 1975 are looking forward to seeing the Institute held there again. The dates for the Institute are July 11-25, 1976, conveniently between the Ohrid Macedonian Festival and the International Festival in Zagreb. Following the Institute, there will be a group travel arrangement to Zagreb and possibly to Bulgaria. This waltz mixer from Alsace (pronounced COME TOO AY BELL) means "how beautiful you are". Because Alsace was for many years attached to Germany the music reflects a strong German influence. The dance also has obvious similarities to many other family-waltz type dances. It was introduced by Louise and Germain Hebert at the 1975 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp, Stockton, California.

SCHOLARSHIP Hope of the Future

With the coming of the new year our thoughts turn to plans of the future -- our own, and that of Folk Dancing and the peo-

ple associated with it we have come to know so well.

The future of Folk Dancing has always been bright. Bright because we know there will always be folk dancing and bright because there will always be new faces to come to our classes and enjoy that which we can give them. One way in which this tradition can endure us through the SCHOLARSHIP.

The main purpose of the Federation SCHOLARSHIP programs is to select young people to attend camps as a part of their training to become the future of FOLK DANCING and perhaps be the new teachers and leaders. Those of us who are now the teachers and leaders will not always be able to participate --

there must be new people trained to take our places.

In 1951, under the guidance of MILDRED BUHLER, Peninsula Folk Dance leader, a scholarship program was started in cooperation with the DOCEY DOE CLUB in memory of JACKIE HOWERTON TURNER, outstanding youth leader in Folk Dancing. This program was for

Peninsula youth only.

In 1955, MILLIE von KONSKY, East Bay Folk Dance Teacher and leader, became interested in the idea and presented it to the FEDERATION. The idea of scholarships open to any and all young dancers was unanimously accepted as a Federation function and the present program came into being.

AN EXPERIMENT IN COOPERATIVE ENDEAVOR A Get-acquainted Party sponsored by the

FOLKLORE FESTIVAL COMMITTEE of the City of Sparks Bicentennial Commission

Over 200 people of all ages filled the gymnasium of the Sparks High School for a Get-Acquainted Party on Saturday evening, November 15, 1975. The party inaugurated the Folklore events of the Sparks, Nevada Bicentennial Commission and was the first such event ever held in the Western Nevada area.

The program of music and dances held even the youngest members of the audience enthralled as they introduced a wide sampling of folk culture to each other and to those who joined

this first intercultural event of the area.

The evening also featured exhibits of crafts and costumes of seven national heritages among local residents. Ethnic foods were sold by three of the groups during the evening. Seven collections of costumed dolls were also featured covering a large assortment of native folk costumes from all corners of the world. Numerous folk costumes were worn by members of the audience as well as by most of the participants in the performances and in the exhibiting groups.

Dances performed by four groups of young people made up the first part of the evening's program. Three adult groups, three soloists, and a bagpipe band were presented on the last

half of the program.

Youth groups represented Temple Emmanuel, a family from the Georgian Republic and the newly formed Philippine-American Club. Another group of young people who live at Sierra Shadows Mobile Home Court, near Stedd, North of Reno, did dances representing Afro-American, Western U.S. and German cultures. The ages of performers in this part of the program ranged from a 4 year old boy to several young people in their late teens.

The second part of the evening's activities was opened by a selection of gospel songs presented by the 1975 Interfaith Gospel Choir, led and accompanied by Jesse Hall at the piano, with the

entire audience helping "keep the beat".

Korean Dance soloist Moon Whitaker danced a graceful fan dance, displaying her skill in handling two lovely fans and showing a beautifully embroidered two-piece costume. The eight to Eighty Folk Dancers selected a trio formation for their first number, and then followed with a no-partner dance from Romania and a women's stick-handling routine from Hawaii.

The Sierra Highlanders Bagpipe Band thrilled the audience with several exhibitions of their skill with stirring Scottish music. Greek music and dance were featured in a humorous sketch by Vasili Titus, including his artistry with clarinet and bouzoukee followed by dancing with a glass of wine (where did the

wine go?) and ending with his famous "table"dance, complete with chair on top. He apparently has iron jaws and nails for teeth.

An Afro-American Suite by Joyce Jackson Smith and her students from Hug High School demonstrated agility and skill in the dances of Jamaican, Brazilian, and other Caribbean influence on the American Dance. Moon Whitaker returned in a different and charming costume for her ribbon dance. Final event on the program was a lively grand march in which many of the young people of the performing groups were joined by others from the audience. General dancing followed with requests and repeat numbers from the program completed the evening's program.


For the newer dancers we offer here a brief explanation of "Folk Dancing" as we know it. Some people think only of American Square and Round Dancing when you mention "Folk Dancing". Some think only of Greek Dancing, since this form has become popular through movies and other sources.

Our dancing is really International in scope. We get fun out of trying to learn dances of many countries. Since there is great variety in the ethnic quality of the style and steps of each nationality, it adds to the fun of learning the dances.

Many of the dances we learn were done in "Free Style" in the country of origin. A self-appointed leader, who paid the musicians, was priviledged to improvise steps for the others to follow.

California Folk Dancers find it more feasible to learn certain routines and planned choreography for several reasons. It is easier to remember the dances when certain steps "go with" certain phrases in the music. It also solves floor traffic problems when many people are dancing.

After you have learned a few dances, you will be able to relax more as you get into the spirit of the dance you are doing. After all, the whole idea is recreation!

PASADENA FOLK DANCE CO-OPERATIVE




