

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Camellia Festival

Saturday and Sunday March 13th & 14th, 1976

Memorial Auditorium, 16th & J Streets Sacramento

Every year, early in March, Sacramento honors the Camellia flower, which grows so profusely in this area, with a Camellia Festival. Each festival has a theme and honors a specific country. This year the theme is "Bicentennial U.S.A." and honors the United States of America.

The Camellia Festival actually begins March 5th with the Queen's Presentation Breakfast. The Queen is chosen from among Royal Princesses representing the four local colleges, and with them reigns over the week's festivities. This is followed by the Fifty Second Annual Camellia Flower Show on March 6th and 7th in the new convention center located at 13th and K Streets, where thousands of varities are on display.

Each year Sacramento Council of Folk Dance Clubs sells Camellia Buttons to help support the Camellia Festival. This year it is imperative that 1200 buttons are sold to finance the Pageant and Festival. If they are not sold there will be no Pageant next year. So won't each of you buy at least one Button?

There are many interesting activities all week including the Camellia Ball and the Pink Perfection Luncheon when the Queen and her Princesses are honored. There are also International and Photographic exhibits, China Painters' show, the Camellia Cup Regatta held on Folsom Lake, and the Camellia Capital Century 100 mile foot race. Don't miss the Festival Parade on Saturday, March 13th at 10:00 AM, in downtown Sacramento featuring children with their floats of Camellia flowers.

The highlight of the whole week is the Camellia Folk Dance Pageant and Festival on the 13th and 14th. This begins with a Folk Dance Institute at 1:00 P.M. in the Memorial Auditorium, 16th and J Streets, under the chairmanship of Bea Schildt. The teachers this year are Jeff O'Connor from the Westwind Folk Dance Ensemble who will teach Clog and Big Circle dances, and Bruce Mitchell, director of the Camtia Dance Ensemble, who will teach Line Dances and some Recreational Dances.

Saturday evening there will be general dancing from 8:00 -11:30 PM including four exhibition groups with narration by Ron Palmer. This is followed by two after-parties, one Balkan and one for general dancing. Dances on the Saturday and Sunday program are those selected from the lists of favorite dances submitted by each Federation club. (Continued on page 4)


(an You MOUE in Your (ostume?

Clothing is designed and constructed to meet the needs of the occasion, but often dancers pick a style of clothing designed for a sedate occasion and then try to use it for active folk dancing. Work clothes are built loose and roomy, sport clothes are sleeveless or have built in ease, but when we pick a court costume, or use a garment pattern designed for show, not, active wear, we find movement restricted. A folkdancer needs costumes usable for all types of movements, not for just waltzing or walking.


Here are some hints on how to make your Statewide costume danceable, but these ideas can easily be applied to most any costume or garment.

The biggest problem in the Bi-centennial costumes seems to be in the arm and shoulder movements of both the men and the women's costumes. As the costumes were copied from the 1776 court attire, they were designed for stately Minuets, nota German Schuhplattler, Polish Oberek, or Russian Peasant Dance. The answer to this problem seems very simple, but it 'takes some trial and error experimentation, which does take time and patience.


You may have noticed that on a men's regular shirt sleeve the shoulder cap is wide and flat; this is to give arm movement to the working man (A). Compare it to a woman's sleeve or a man's jacket sleeve (B), which has a high shoulder cap for a smooth fit, but not allowing much freedom of movement. To make a sleeve that will allow movement, the shoulder cap is not flattened, but the underarm area is raised.



On a large piece of paper, trace your sleeve pattern and the body patterm, including the seam lines as it is the seam lines that you work with. Add the seam allowances after your alterations are completed. On the body pattern piece, raise the underarm area two or three inches or more (E). Measure your shoulder and arm circumference (C). Use this measurement to compare with the measurement around the pattern armhole (D) to give you an idea of what the minimum measurement should be on the pattern. This will vary and must be determined by trial and error. Raise the underarm area on the sleeve pattern the same amount as you have raised the body underarm area (F). The armhole measurement and the shoulder seam on the sleeve to be eased in.



Using this altered pattern, make a sample out of sheeting or muslin. Put it on and move around. Can you move, is it cutting you under the arm, is it too baggy somewhere? Trim the sleeve and body down a little at a time, if necessary, until it fits and you can still move comfortably. Sometimes an added amount in the back armhole is needed also, and can be tried by

using a $\frac{1}{2}$ " or $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance rather than cutting a new sample piece. (Remember to change your paper pattern if this adjustment is used) Remember, you can look like a fashion plate, smooth and sleek, or you can be active and dance comfortably, but not necessarily both at the same time, so be reasonable about the fit. No need to look sloppy, but unless you make your clothes out of a stretchy knit, you need to put in the ease by adding fabric where ease is needed.

Some seamstresses feel that lowering the underarm seam, rather than raising it, will give more ease, but this only makes the armhole larger and less fabric to move about in.

Gussets cam also solve the shoulder movement problem, but often the gussets show, which is okay on a peasant blouse or shirt, but not as nice on a men's jacket or coat. If you already have a garment that has the movement problem, try a gusset. Gussets can be square, diamond-shaped, or elliptical (G). The diamond can be used vertically or horizontally, depending on whether it is up and down or forward and backward movement needed. Gussets are always cut on the bias so they can give maximum stretch. A woman's gusset is usually about 3 ot 4 inches square, the size, of course, is determined by the woman and the garment itself. A man's peasant shirt gusset is usually 5 or 6 inches.

Sometimes it is a good idea to allow ample room in the back of men's pants to prevent splitting during a bend or sit. Don't make them skin tight unless you are using a knit.

The Scottish Highland Bagpipe

ROBERT BEGG has piped many dances in the Bay Area for the Federation and for Millie von Konsky.

The thrilling sound of the Highland Bagpipe of Scotland has, over the ages, inspired the soldier in battle, struck fear into the enemy, and, in turn, welcomed the visitor and (strangely, as it might appear to those not used to the great sound that it makes) soothes the breast of the troubled.

Bagpipes, thought to have originated in India and Persia, are used through all the middle and near Eastern countries of Europe under different names. These include the Musette of France, the Dudlebach of Germany, and the Gaita of Spain.

It is only in Scotland and Ireland, however, that the Pipes became a serious instrument of warriors, and were developed to sound at maximum intensity with two to three drones (sustained tones) and a chanter (melody-playing pipe).

It was also in Scotland that pipers invented for their instrument the only classical form in the western world which does not fall into the conventional musical tradition This form is called *Piobaireachd* (pronounced PEEBROCH), and is most carefully constructed. The Scottish warpipe is tuned with the drones on A, E, and A; the scale of the chanter (low to high) is G natural, A, B, C, D, E, F, and A.

This classical music for the pipes has come down through the years as unwritten melody, free flowing, and subject to the personal interpretation of each performer. It was handed from piper to piper even through the dark ages, after the 1745 Rebellion, when piping, like wearing the tartan, was subject to the death penalty.

The Piobaireachd is in the form of theme and variations, each successive variation requiring more intricate fingering.

It is the amazingly rapid succession of grace notes (so-called "shakes") on almost every melody note that gives pipe music its distinctive and curious flavor.

With the revival of piping in the early 19th century and the formation of pipe bands in the Scottish Regiments, there was added to the piping repertoire a variety of popular Marches, military retreat airs, and Gaelic Folk Songs.

It is only in modern times that the bagpipes, originally a solo instrument, have been incorporated into bands with drum accompaniment. In the 17th and early 18th centuries, Scottish pipers led the clans into battle, and skirled songs of victory and the dirges of defeat. It was the piper who celebrated births and marriages and composed laments on the deaths of the Clan chiefs.

African blackwood normally is used for the wooden components and reeds are made from Spanish cane, which must be the very best quality to obtain best results.

The great Highland Bagpipe takes its place as the major instrument in the bagpipe family, which encompasses bagpipes from Spain, Italy, Yugoslavia, Brittany, India, Russia, and Hungary.



FIRST SQUARE DANCE WORKSWOP

"ABSOLUTELY FANTASTIC" was the way the 76 people who attended the first square dance workshop with "Great" - "Wonderful"-"Terrific" and "Just what we needed" comments summed up the excellent presentation of our two co-chairmen, Jack McKay and Vera Holleuffer on Saturday, January 10 at the Lake Merced Boat House in San Francisco.

The morning started with brief comments and an outline of the day's schedule followed by actual dancing with intermittent stops for additional comments, instructions and answers to questions from the floor.

Following the coffee break provided by the Federation some of the group called contras while others danced. The usual question and answer opportunities were included.

After lunch the groups divided into two rooms, one for callers to practice with helpful criticism, the other to dance and receive instructions on the BASIC 50 steps covered in the instruction manual provided each attendee. The 46 basics listed on page 24 of your December 1974 LET'S DANCE are the ones considered most useful for Folk Dancers.

The latter part of the day included general square dancing, instructions and lots of questions and answers.

The dancers were truly sorry to see the day end but all indicated they were looking forward to the next two-day session being planned for early May.

An outstanding personality...

Formerly in the dry cleaning business down the peninsula somewhere. Did some floor laying and other carpentry work, not much to show off but lived life to its fullest.

Somewhere along the line he became something of a selftaught sound man, complete with a sound truck and a heart of gold. He furnished the sound for many benefit shows, ball games, Folk Dances, Dancer and Teacher institutes, and almost anywhere you could think would need his talents. You may remember the Les Vogel Chevrolet Sound Truck. You maybe don't remember who was behind the wheel.

Ed Kremer remembers him coming to an elementary Folk Dance class in Berkeley. He had a little Irish in himor was it Scotch? - anyhow, he liked the old square dance "Wearin 'O The Green".

The older members of the Fun Club and the Scandinavian Folk Dancers will remember him. He was their president, not one time but several times. He was also exhibition chairman of the Scandinavian Folk Dancers. In those days a Folk Dance Party wasn't complete without an exhibition of some kind. Some people even recall that he was one of the original "Saturday Night - Party Night" inventors.

In any case he was a top-notch "One Night Stand" man with the success to prove it. He could get 200 people out to St. Dominic's just about any time he wanted to. And he would end the party with sashay right -- and - sashay right - and - sashay right, until you were all over there and then what else but sashay left - and sashay left - and, well, we had fun, and lots of it when Danny McDonald did a one night stand. His specialty was "Fun" and "Gimmick" pattern calls, in square dance rhythm, polka rhythm, and to a lively waltz. It was just short of sacrilege.

He could be a perfect Santa Claus one minute and call a square dance the next. He could work with records or with an orchestra, in a big hall or in a small one or out on the lawn, but best of all he could work with people. He could get the children going or the oldsters to tapping their feet, but best of all he got the crippled and the people who really needed him going. Maybe you remember the "Indoor Sports", all in wheel chairs, or the "Square Crutch" or "Square Wheel" clubs that met at the May T. Morrison Rehabilitation Center. Above all, just remember Danny.

He was President of the Federation and held several other offices from time to time. Your old issues of LET'S DANCE have several years of "Tell It To Danny" and he was a real guiding light in many ways, not only to the Federation but to Folk and Square Dancing as a whole.

For several years Danny was official chauffeur for Madelynne Green's "Festival Workshop", even driving them to the East Coast on one or two occasions.

Several groups got their start with the help of Danny. The "Forest Hillbillies" of the Forest Hill area of San Francisco was one of those that was still in operation as late as 1973.

Many Folk Dancers today owe their early interest in Folk Dancing to Danny. Many of us have records in our files that were cut by Danny, just so we could get the record when it was not readily available through the regular channels or in the form in which we could use it.


Danny, his wife Marian (deceased) and daughter Betty, were all "born" ham actors. They enlivened many Folk Dance events with their "Gay Nineties" exhibitions, and their comic version of the Dreisteyrer, always in appropriate costume.

Danny was 80. He got tickets to the concert and through friends got a ride and good seats, right in the front row. Ernie introduced him, past president and good friend of Folk Dancers. He remembered many of us and talked good times. That was Saturday night, September 27, 1975. He waved. It wasn't that old battered hat or the little bavarian one with the feather in it, but he waved, and we remembered, and he remembered, and we will always remember.

Then on December 30, 1975, Danny McDonald passed away. He wanted it quiet and that is the way he choreographed it. It was more than just a one night stand, it was a lifetime of service.

So, it's "In to the Center with a great big shout, now you be quiet, and I'll be quiet too".

O UBAVA MALA MOMA

(Serbia)

This is a traditional dance from the Nisava Valley of Serbia. The dance was introduced by Bora Gajicki at the 1975 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp. Pronunciation of the title is oh OO-ba-vah MAH-lah MOH-mah.

MUSIC: Record: Borino Kolo Folk Ensemble #475, S-2, B-2, 2/4 meter.

FORMATION: Line. Hands are in W pos, hands joined with adjacent dancers, elbows bent and close to own sides, hands at shoulder level during Fig I; hands are in V pos, hands joined with adjacent dancers, arms straight down at sides during Fig II.

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STYLING: With each step free ft is raised slightly in back, knee bent in preparation for following step, unless otherwise noted in the description.

LILKA

(Serbia)

Lilka (LEEL-kah) is a traditional Serbian dance from the Nisava Valley. It was presented at the 1975 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp by Bora Gajicki.

- MUSIC: Borino Kolo Folk Ensemble. BK-475; S-B, B-4. 5/8 meter. The rhythm is Quick, Quick, Quick, Slow. Counted here as 1, 2, 3, 4.
- FORMATION: Short lines of 8 10 dancers. Belt hold, or front basket hold; L arm over neighbor's R arm. Face LOD. Wt on L ft.
- STEPS and STYLING: The dance is lively and bouncy. Raising the free ft in back, knee bent, as the supporting ft takes wt is a style characteristic. However, in Fig I and Fig III the hop on ct 1 of each meas involves raising the free ft in <u>front</u>, knee bent.

WHAT IS A SCHOLARSHIP - WHO CAN APPLY?

Scholarships are for dancers. This means, people who can dance a little but want to learn more, people who may become our future Folk Dance teachers or who may continue to become exhibition dancers or perhaps to become professionals on the stage.

Too often we have seen the young student win a scholarship and then never be seen on the floor again after camp is over. We can only hope that they will some day return to Folk Dancing with a new spirit of willingness to serve as so many are now doing.

The Scholarship Committee of the Federation is made up of five people appointed by the President, who meet at least two times a year to determine the most eligible of the applicants. The applicants themselves must be qualified by their own council before being presented to the Federation.


Here are some basic rules that apply:

- 1. The applicant must be between 18 25.
- 2. The applicant must be sponsored by a Council.
- 3. The applicant must live on campus whenever possible.
- Where possible and it is offered the student must take college credit.
- The applicant must demonstrate a real desire to continue his or her dancing career (or avocation) after camp. This could take the form of a commitment to help teach or to remain an active student.

When an application from a council is received by the scholarship committee it is reviewed with all the other applications and the selection(s) for scholarships are made after interviews with the applicants, usually at the Oakland Festival and the Sacramento Festival, both held in the spring. The committee will want to look at the sponsoring letter from the council and any other information available from school authorities, employers and Folk Dance teachers that may be apropos.

Along with the application there is a requirement for a deposit to make the reservation for camp firm.
