

Camellia Festival

Memorial Auditorium 16th & J Streets SACRAMENTO

Sacramento is the Camellia Capital of the world and each spring we honor this bloom with a festival. This year's theme is Italian Renaissance and the country honored is Italy.

The Camellia Festival begins on March 4th with the Queen's Presentation Breakfast. On Saturday, March 5th, the Sierra Camera Club presents a photographic print exhibition. That evening we will attend the Camellia Ball at the Red Lion Motor Inn. March 6th, the Association presents the 53 Annual Camellia Show at the Community Center. The following week is full of activities; on Saturday, March 12th, there will be an International Friendship Luncheon and the Camellia Festival Parade. The highlight of the week will be the Camellia Folk Dance Pageant and Festival on the 12th and 13th. This begins with the Folk Dance Institute at 1:00 PM in the Memorial Auditorium under the Chairmanship of Hank Shonerd. The teachers are Grace Nicholes, who will teach Sicilian Tarantella and La Furlana, and John Pappas, teaching Miteritsa, Zoneradikos, and Antikrystes (Karsilanas).

Saturday evening there will be general dancing from 8 to 12 midnight, including exhibitions narrated by Hank Shonerd. There will be no after party for the general dancers, but there will be Balkan dancing in the small auditorium until early Sunday morning.

Sunday afternoon at 1:30 PM, the free Folk Dance Pageant begins, presided over by the Camellia Queen and her Princesses. The script will be written and narrated by Bruce Mitchell. The closing number by the Cameron Pipe Band is always appreciated and is a proper showcase for the Queen and her court. Folk dancing resumes from 3:30 to 5:30 P! when we will welcome a dinner break. Balkan dancing at 7 PM will be followed by general dancing from 8 to 10:30 PM.

We'll see you in Sacramento!!



AVIANO, ITALY

The costumes of the people of Aviano, in Northern Italy, are colorful, comfortable, and easy to make for the Italian Renaissance -- Camellia Festival. The colors preferred by those in Northern Italy are the blues, greens and purples, and it is always nice to keep to authentic details when assembling a costume.

The woman's costume is simple in detail but rich in color. Her blouse is of a fine, but not sheer, homespun linen, with a round, slightly low neckline, and long sleeves; over which she wears a dark tight-fitting bodice, made smooth and firm with many stays. The fabric may be wool to match the skirt or of a dark small print velvet. The black wool skirt may be pleated or gathered at the waist, is ankle length, and about four yards around at the hem. Horizontal tucks were common for adjusting the length of the skirt as it was often handed down to the smaller or younger ones in the family.

The apron was large, covering the whole front of the skirt and reaching almost to the skirt hem. The fabric was a light weight wool printed with a floral design in lively colors on a dark background. The Aviano girls would attach six or seven ribbons of various colors to the left side of the waist band, the ribbons being souvenirs of boyfriends.

The scarf or shawl, worn over the shoulders, was a large square in size, of a floral print, edged with a fringe. The ends were tucked into the front of the bodice.

The men of Aviano also wore a scarf tucked into their vest of velvet, velveteen or wool. The fabric may be plain, of a small print or plaid. Gold or antique buttons of various colors are the most popular.

The trousers are of a dark color, have little pockets, and a sailor-type front opening. Small red or green decorations, similar to small bows, are at the lower leg area of the pants. A wide sash, varicolored or striped, is wrapped snugly around the waist, leaving no ends hanging.

He tops his outfit with an alpine-style felt hat of a dark green felt trimmed with woolen balls or fresh flowers when they are available.

Both the men and the women wear white knitted stockings, the women's being knit with a lacey design. The shoes illustrated are dancing slippers of a black velvet with rope or stitched soles. Street shoes are black, the women's with low rather than high heels.



For more information on Italian costumes, the Aviano costume in particular, the book "Folk Dances, Costumes and Customs of Italy" by Elba Farabegoli Gurzau is very good. It can help you with your costumes and if you want to have an Italian party there are some helpful suggestions. The dances have piano mu-

sic included.

International Concert

To celebrate the thirtieth anniversary of the original International Folk Dance Festival, oldest and largest in the western United States, some five hundred colorfully costumed dancers, musicians, acrobats, puppeteers and choraleers --- among them fire and knife jugglers, a hot jazz combo, bagpipe, balalaika and bouzouki players, a gamelan orchestra and an "all star" Hollywood marionette revue --- will perform Saturday evening, March 19, from 8 to 11 PM in the Pavilion of the Los Angeles Music Center. Actress Susan Strasberg will narrate the awardwinning brotherhood event.

Javanese leading dancers Nanik and Nyoman Wenten recreate the duel between the Hindu hero Arjuna and the fanged demon Cakil, with K. R. T. Wasitodipuro, musical director for Radio Indonesia, conducting thirty gamelan players. Carol and Ron Montez reprise the rumba routine which won their 1975 world ballroom championships in Milan, aided by USC's unique Latin Formation Dancers, All-American prize winners. Other title holders will include James Lomath, gold medalist in both the US and Canada for Highland dancing; Argentine gaucho dancer Carlos Avilas, first place winner at the Moscow Folk Fair; and Tokuyae Hanayagi, recipient of the Tokyo Cherry Blossom Medal.

To represent the USA, founder-producer Irwin Parnes has invited Afro-American dance virtuoso Bill Couser with his jazz ensemble; the American Horse Indian Dancers in a war dance competition; Dr Tillman Hall's lively Hoedown Dancers; and the Liberty Assembly Dancers, singers and folk musicians reviving Georgia Sea Island ring plays and shouts to music of Scott Joplin.

The monumental roster also features San Francisco's popular Chinese Folk Dancers, the Rinaja Egyptian Belly Dancers and Orchestra; Athan Karras' Greek Taverna Dancers, the Krakusy Polish Company; Modzawe Dancers, Drummers and Chanters of Ghana; Ukrainian Spirit Dancers featuring songs and music of the Odessa Balalaikas; the Bachar Hadarim Israeli Dancers in traditional Hassidic dances to cantorials by Uri Frenkel; the Silyan Philippine Dancers in the pole-dodging "tinikiling;" and the Okalani Polynesian Dancers, Drummers and Fire Jugglers. Fred Astaire, Ginger Rogers, Judy Garland and other stars of Hollywood's golden era will perform courtesy of the Sky Highchief Master Puppeteers; and the College of Idaho Chamber Singers, directed by Dr James Gabbard, will offer folk songs from around the world.

Mail orders are now being filled at the Music Center box office, (213) 972-7211. Ticket prices range from \$7 to \$3; group discounts available.



EASY DOES IT!

THE POLKA II

Three of the most commonly used forms of the polka are: The Ballroom Polka, The Free-Style Polka and the Polish Polka. The Free-Style Polka employs all the various positions and floor patterns used generally in couple dances. Try it some time if the man has a strong lead and woman can follow easily.

Here is a description of these three forms of the POLKA:

- <u>BALLROOM POLKA</u> with a rhythm of A/QUICK-QUICK-SLOW done as HOP/STEP-CLOSE-STEP. The movements are smooth and each basic step covers quite a bit of floor space. The couple turn requires two basic steps.
- FREE-STYLE POLKA as done by the Scandinavian peoples both here and abroad has the same basic step as the Ballroom Polka but the steps are very small and done with a springy, bouncy movement. Each basic step covers very little floor space.
- 3. POLISH POLKA has a unique and distinctive style of its own which is difficult to describe without demonstrating. A slight, very quick hop on the preliminary "up-beat" (M right and W left feet); on count "1-and" place free foot (M left and W right feet) in front of hopping foot and lift both heels off the floor as you do a double bounce; on count "2-(and)" come down on both heels but without full weight in order to be ready for the next preliminary hop on the quick upbeat. The cue could be "HOP/BOUNCE-BOUNCE-DOWN".

Editor's note: Morley Leyton, who spent a number of years studying the dance in Poland, gave the above explanation of the Polish Polka at a Teacher Training class in our area.

Further information on the Polka can be found in the book "Folk Dance Progressions" by Lidster and Tamburini.

Let's Do Squares!

CONTRAS

American Contras have descended from English Country Dancing. Dances in line (or longways) were very popular in England in colonial days. Dances in lines were also done in Scotland and Ireland but the relationship to English Country Dancing can be seen in the movements in Contras. Movements which have come from English Country Dancing that are also done in squares today include Swing, Right and Left Through, Ladies Chain, Pass Through, and also include stars and circles. Calling is the unique American addition.

Early Americans usually adopted the latest "rage" in Europe including Quadrilles, Cotillions and Lancers. Contras, however, continued to be done, especially in the smaller towns and rural areas of New England, and have continued to be done to the present day.

Ralph Page from Keene, New Hampshire has been the one most responsible for the recent surge in popularity of Contras. For many years he has been publicizing Contras and has made several visits to Folk Dance Camp at the University of the Pacific at Stockton, CA. The Square Dancers have now "discovered" Contras and Contras have been generating a good deal of interest.

The word "contra" means "against". A Contra is thus a dance with lines facing one another. It has been said that Contras were popular in New England because they fit well in the long, narrow halls in the early days. In any event, they are danced in lines with from six couples to "as many as will." The men place their left shoulders toward the music and face their partners. Contras are danced with two or three couples working together. The couple in the set of two or three couples closest to the music is the active couple, others are inactive. Sometimes the active couple starts with partners crossed over in each other's place. With each pattern active couples work toward the bottom of the line (away from the music) one place, inactive couples move up. When they reach the end of the line, actives wait once through the pattern and become inactive and inactives do the opposite. In some Contras with each repeat of the pattern the active couple progresses two places.

The usual Contra pattern has eight movements, each done in eight beats of the music (most often four measures). Thus the entire pattern has 64 beats or 32 measures. The pattern can be repeated as long as the Caller desires, usually until everyone has had a chance to be active, at least for awhile. The calling (more properly prompting) for each movement is timed to end just prior to the eight beat phrase upon which the movement is to be danced.

The special charm of Contras seems to be in dancing exactly to the musical phrase. This is largely because of the Prompting.

It is the practice to walk-through the pattern of a Contra so that all dancers know the pattern.

In this space in the next issue of LET'S DANCE will appear a complete write-up of a Contra named Gardy Loo.





ITALIAN FOLK DANCES

Every region of Italy has its folklore, which finds expression in the dance. Not all of the Italian folk dances are now danced as they were originally. Some have become only a memory. Others, as a result of modern adaptation, have lost their snontaneity. In their essential character all these dances remain the basis of folk traditions, and are an expression of the creative artistry of the Italian people.

Dancing is as much a part of Italy's musical life as the street band. Although regional and national costumes are not worn too often at the present time, any excuse for a fiesta brings out many people in their brightest folk costumes to perform the dances of their native region. Modern dancing is, of course, popular. However, folk dances are still remembered, since ancient local traditions and attendant folklore are handed down from generation to generation throughout the centuries.

To Liguria, and especially the Lunigiana region, belongs the *Ballon*. In this dance the woman's skirt swells out during the "pirola", as in the waltz. The woman pirouettes, arms above her head, thus making the skirt appear as a balloon. This simple folk dance won fame on the stage.

The *Prigordin* was introduced originally to the Lunigiana region from France. It is usually danced at weddings or at ceremonies of baptism.

The Farandola, also, belongs to Liguria. It's feature is a rotation on first one foot and then the other. It was danced around a hay effigy of a bull, especially during the month of July. It is also danced to the music of the bagpipes around bonfires at carnival time. It is also known as the "round" dance, because hundreds of people have been known to dance arm in arm through the villages on festival days.

The Corrente, is a well known folk dance of Piedmont, originating in the 16th century, when Italian actors introduced it to France. Originally it was a very lively dance with dancers stepping on their toes, often in double time, but in some areas it has become slower and more solemn. It is said the Minuet is a derivative of the dance. The Gigueo is another Piedmontese folk dance. It is similar to the English jig, or a sailor's dance. The Claquette, a dance in which the feet are stamped, was derived from a Scottish Gigue. This was danced at weddings. The Monferrina, one of the most famous of the old dances, originated in Piedmont. In this dance, couples promenade and at intervals make a turn and pass under arm at which time a second man intervenes, taking the woman's hand to repeat the actions, while the first man returns to his place.

From Lombardy comes the Bergamasea. This dance was taken from Italy to Paris by Italian actors. Its original form entailed difficult somersaulting. It has undergone a complete change. The man now approaches the woman, takes four steps and bows; removes his hat, and extends his hand to her. Then, to return to his place he takes two steps and makes a turn followed by four further steps. There are many variations of this dance. In Romagna, among other places, it is known as Bal del Capel, or Hat Dance.

In the Venetia region, the most famous dance is the Furlana. It is one of the ancient mimed dances, taking the form of a lovers' quarrel. It is danced by Venetian gondoliers, with a clarinet, violin and bass accompaniment. Variations of the Furlana, which greatly resemble the Tarantella, are danced in Calabria, Romagna and in Emilia. This country dance won popularity in the cities where it became the Cotillon and the Quadrille. Other dances of the Venetian provinces include the Lavandera, or washer woman's dance, and the Girometta, which opens with a circle from which two people emerge and dance to music in twofour time, ending in a pirouette.

The *Torotele*, or Flower Dance, is famous in the Friuli region. A dance with many couples, it also takes the form of a lovers' quarrel, in which the woman, holding a flower, threatens the man who strikes the floor with a sharp blow of the foot.

The renowned *Volta*, of Medieval origin, is still danced and is believed to be the dance from which the waltz originated. The *Volta* was danced by a couple who in turning had to remain close together. The woman's right hand was on her partner's neck, while, with her left, she gathered her skirt, as in the waltz. The man's left hand was on the woman's hip, while with his right he assisted her to leap,left thigh against her right, giving firm support. The dancers, as in the waltz, circle the room.

Much has been said about these circling dances, and some writers and experts in choreography have been deceived into attributing the origin to Danubian countries because of the fame of the waltz. This is not true. The dance has always originated in countries of warm climate, among peoples of ardent and vivacious temperament, and thence has passed to colder climates and people of more sober character. It is not surprising that the *Volta* spread to the Danube area; nor that it then returned as the romantic waltz, arriving in France from Strasbourg and in Italy from Vienna-Venice.

The *Rescana* is danced in Gorizia, usually during Epiphany. It is called a fire dance because it is danced around bonfires in open country or on hilltops, with the youths leaping through the flames. La Danza Del Ventaglio, or Fan Dance, spread from Venice to other Italian cities. During this dance the woman chooses her partner, giving her fan in token.

In the regions of Marche, Umbria, Ciociaria, and Latium, the *Saltarello* has become the national dance. It requires as an accompaniment only the beat of a tambourine. The Rome variant of the *Saltarello* is the *Manfrida*, in which there is a mixture of mime, jokes and witticisms.


In Abruzzi, there is still danced a Renaissance dance named *Laccio d'Amore*. Usually 24 dancers, while dancing around a central pole from which hangs 24 ribbons, or streamers, must skilfully braid the ribbons while circling the pole from right to left. They unbraid the ribbons and end with a *Saltarello*.

In southern Italy, Sicily and Sardinia the *Tarantella* is the most popular of the folk dances. It has variations from region to region. Originally the dance was an imitation of the contortions of a person bitten by the tarantula. The *Tarantella* is of erotic inspiration and is picturesque and imaginative and full of folklore. It is danced by Neapolitans, Calabrins and the Ciociari in typical regional costumes. Clarinets and tambourines were used to accompany the *Tarantella* in these regions, while in the province of Naples the *Tarantella* is danced to the music of bagpipes and cymbals.

In Calabria, the Vala, of Albanian origin, is the popular dance. In Sicily the *Ruggero*, a round dance, is still in fashion. Variations of the *Saltarello* are often danced in native costume.

In Sardinia, the *Duroduro*, a circle dance, was performed in a rigid manner, with arms held close to the body. The dance has two parts: a slow preparatory one, and then an energetic and fast pace.

Chinese New Year

... the Legend of the Chinese Zodiac Cycle...

The Chinese community all over the world observed and celebrated Chinese New Year which began on Friday, February 18, 1977. It is a seven-day (week-long) event. According to the Chinese lunar calendar, it is the Year 4675 -- the Year of the Serpent!

The public celebration commenced on Saturday, February 26, and will culminate with the annual fabulous, world-renowned Chinese New Year Parade on Saturday, March 5, 1977, at 7 P.M.

Chinese New Year's Day does not fall on the same date from year to year (it varies between late January to mid-February), but rather, is based on the Chinese lunar (moon) calendar. Chinese New Year Day represents the first day of the first new moon. The Chinese lunar calendar has been in use for over 4600 years; it is used to designate hours, days, months, and years.

Legend has it that centuries ago, on a Chinese New Year Day, Buddha summoned all the animals in the world and he promised to name a year after each beast (as a reward) in return for their obeisance. Only twelve animals heeded his bidding - hence, those 12 animals are used as symbols to comprise the Chinese Zodiac Cycle. The 12 animals, in chronological order, are as follows: The Rat, Ox, Tiger, Hare, Dragon, Serpent, Horse, Ram, Monkey, Rooster, Dog and Boar.

Each animal/symbol will reign for a year. After all 12 animals have had their turns, the rotation cycle will be repeated. Thus, the Year 4674 -- the Year of the Dragon -- ended on February 17, 1977; the current Year of the Serpent will be followed by the Year of the Horse in 1978. The next Serpent year, based on the Chinese Zodiac 12-year rotation cycle, will surface 12 years hence; namely, in 1989. Clear as mud?

Anyhow, during this period, you may hear the expression "Gung Hay Fat Choy" uttered as the Chinese citizens greet one another. It will also be apropos for you to greet your Chinese friends with the aforementioned phrase. (Note: the spelling of the words is inconsequential; rather, it is based on phonetics.) So -- GUNG HAY FAT CHOY! to you, and you, and you! (which, translated, means: I wish you prosperity in the coming year! - or -May you be prosperous during the year!)



WHICH WAY IS CORRECT?

One of the main reasons for the Federation when first organized was to unify the steps and styling of all folk dancers so dancers from one club or area could dance with people from other clubs or areas with no collisions on the floor.

Sometimes we forget this purpose and various clubs will do a dance in different ways. A case in point is NEVER ON SUNDAY. We know of 5 different ways to do this one dance. You get in a line and then you find you are not familiar with the form this line if doing. Perhaps there should be a method to determine which style the leader of the line will use.

We would like to hear from YOU, the readers and dancers: -How can a leader signal the form of dance to be used? -What form of NEVER ON SUNDAY does your gorup do? BALLO SARDO or BALLO TANTO

(Sardinia)

Sardegna (Sardinia) is the only section of Italy which still retains an old time dance similar to those of the Balkan countries and the Near East. It is called "Ballo Sardo" (BAHL-loh SAHR-doh), Sardinian Dance, or Ballo Tanto (BAHL-loh TAHN-toh), Round Dance. When singers furnish the music, they stand in the middle of the open circle, but if accompanient is by "Launeddas" (a typical Sardinian wind instrument), musicians stand a little apart from the dancers. Musicians play an important part in this dance for they often and unexpectedly change the tempo of the music, adding greatly to the enjoyment of the participants. Introduced by Vyts Beliajus at the 1961 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp.

MUSIC: Record: Folkcraft 1407 B x 45 "Ballo Sardo".

- FORMATION: Open circle of cpls stand side by side, facing ctr, shldrs touching, arms held straight down, inside hands joined. Occasionally all dancers join hands, but more often just ptrs hold hands. Cpls may by 2 W or 2 M. Throughout the dance the circle moves gradually CW.
- STEPS and Walking step. Dancers stand erect. Except in the introduction there is no bouncing or springing. Steps are close to the ground, almost giving the effect of skating. When the music becomes lively, the M may kick higher and add fancy ftwk; W continue to dance smoothly, in a dignified manner.

MUSIC 2/4

PATTERN

INTRODUCTION

1-6 Dancers move from R ft to L ft with a springing motion in the legs. On ct 2 of meas 5 the lead col (first cpl on L of open circle or a designated cpl in closed circle) raise joined hands straight fwd. On ct l of meas 6 the arms move rapidly downward to indicate beginning of dance. Hold ct 2.

I. STEP-POINT

- A 1-2 Step on R ft in place (ct 1), point L in front of R, ft touches floor (ct 2), step on L in place (ct 1), point R in front of L (ct 2).
 - 3-12 Repeat action of meas 1-2 five more times. There is a slight morement CW in circle.
 - II. POINT AND STEP CLOSE STEP
- B 1-2 Step on R in place (ct 1), point L in front of R (ct 2), step L to L (ct 1), close R to L (ct &), step L to L (ct 2), as in a quick step-close-step swd with ft close to the floor.
 - 3-12 Repeat action of meas 1-2 five more times.
 - III. INTO THE CENTER AND BACK
- C 1-3 With 3 steps, RLR, walk twd ctr of circle (cts 1-2-1), point L in front of R (ct 2), step to L on L (ct 1), point R across in front of L (ct 2).
 - 4-6 With 3 steps, RLR, walk bkwd from ctr (cts 1-2-1), point L in front of R (ct 2), step L to L (ct 1), point R in front of L (ct 2) and make CCW semi circular motion in air with R (ct &), to repeat pattern.
 - 7-24 Repeat action of meas 1-6 three more times. M may raise legs on repetition. Knee may be hip high.

IV. POINT AND STEP CLOSE STEP

B 1-12 Repeat action of Fig II, meas 1-12.

Dance repeats three times (Figure I, II, III, IV). On last repetition Figure IV is done only five times.


