The SCHEDULE OF EVENTS calls for dancing at the Miramar on Friday night, at the Auditorium Saturday night, Sunday Afternoon and evening and at Lincoln Park and Miles Playhouse Monday afternoon. The institute is scheduled for Saturday afternoon. Ned and Marian Gault will be teaching Polish, English and Finnish dances, Tony Shay and Billy Burke Balkan dances and Vilma Machette Greek Material. There will be LIVE MUSIC for the afterparties at the Miramar both Saturday and Sunday evenings. There will be exhibitions Saturday evening, Sunday afternoon and again on Sunday evening. Costume parades are scheduled for Sunday afternoon and evening. Sunday morning brunch will be for installation of officers, both North and South. 12th Annual Citywide Children's

FOLK DANCE FESTIVAL

On Sunday afternoon, March 20th, hundreds of young dancers, representing grades 5, 6, 7 and 8, ringed the floor of the Oakland Municipal Auditorium during the 12th Annual Citywide Childrens' Folk Dance Festival.

Approximately 700 boys and girls from Oakland public and parochial schools marched onto the arena floor and to their places on a predesignated circle. The scene became a dazzling array of color.

Some of the girls appeared in multi-colored skirts and blouses. Others wore bicentennial dresses and still others appeared in ethnic Italian, Indian and African dress.

The boys wore dark trousers, bright colored shirts and sashes around their waists.

Adding a special cameraderie to the occasion was the participation of children from the O.S. Hubbard School of San Jose under the direction of Jane Brown and Norman Ollerich.

Saint Paul's Catholic School of San Francisco, under the direction of Sondra Dwyer, was also well represented.

The dance program featured, along with other dances, the Russian Korobushka, the Israeli Hora, the American Three Quarter Quadrille, exercises from the Peoples Republic of China and, of course, such favorites as Patty Cake Polka, Bunny Hop, Snoopy and Oklahoma Mixer in Threes.

Midway through the program participants and spectators alike were entertained by Junior Dancers International under the direction of Millie von Konsky, the Cabadbaran Cultural Dance Troupe, directed by Rosita Arcol, Ballet Folklorico de Jalisco, directed by Abel Zamarripa, the McTeggart Irish Dancers, directed by Maureen and Pat Hall and the China Dancers, directed by Judy Job Callahan.

The City of Oakland, Office of Parks and Recreation, sponsors the Citywide Childrens' Folk Dance Festival each year. Millie von Konsky, a Past President of the Folk Dance Federation of California and a Dance Specialist with the Oakland Recreation Department, directed the event.

How did all of this come about? In a "nut shell", it culminated from the interest and effort of some 50 recreation and dance leaders who prepared the children for participation in the event after they, themselves, participated in a series of training sessions. The results...hundreds of children folk dancing joyously and with ease. New friendships were made and the occasion was a rewarding social experience for all.

Oakland is to be congratulated!

SQUARE DANCING FOR THE FOLK DANCER

Some clubs are privileged to have excellent Square Dance Callers and Square Dance Teachers. When possible we should all appreciate this talent and take advantage of the opportunities they give us. Some dancers who profess not to like American Squares should remember that this is one form of our own native folk dance.

In Folk Dancing as we practice it, much of our learning is done by rote or by the memorizing of sequences. This is not true of American Square Dancing. We have only to learn the meaning of the "calls" and then be willing to LISTEN. Perhaps most of our problems stem from the fact that too many of us are unwilling to LISTEN.

- 1. LISTEN TO THE CALLER.
- 2. KEEP A TIGHT SQUARE. Don't let the square flare out.
- 3. DON'T REACH OUT TOO FAR. Keep arms and hands close inside the square.
- 4. KEEP YOUR BODY WEIGHT OVER YOUR FEET. Move smoothly through and around the square.
- 5. EXECUTE ONE "CALL" WHILE HEARING THE NEXT. Don't be a "single-track", the caller is ahead of the music, so he will be calling the next figure while you are still working on the last one.
- IF YOUR SQUARE FALLS APART don't continue to flounder trying to complete the calls, simply "square up" and wait for a familiar call such as "swing your partner" or "Allemande left your corner".

A little practice in the above technique will bring great success, much pleasure, and good fun and exercise. You may even grow to like square dancing if you haven't enjoyed it before. People who sit out Squares and find them beneath their dignity are really missing a lot of good dancing fun. It might be more rewarding to learn to cherish this splendid form of our National Dance. To each his own, but it has been said, "Americans who don'e Square Dance are like Swedes who don't Hambo!". One last plea! If you are sitting out the Squares, by choice or otherwise, try to hold down the conversation as a courtesy to the Caller and to those who are trying to LISTEN. Conversation on the Sidelines is especially distracting at Square Dance time. Be a good neighbor, and EASY DOES IT!

... AND SOME INTERESTED DANCERS:

Dear Ms. Horn:

I am a regular reader of your magazine, and find that the articles and dance descriptions are generally pretty good. I am writing this letter, however, because I am afraid I am of a somewhat different opinion about something.

In your January 1977 issue, you have two Finnish dances in your descriptions, one of which is Atta Man Engel (it means 8man "engel" -- English). This dance is described as being introduced by Susanna Daley at the UOP Folk Dance Camp last summer. Perhaps it is merely a matter of semantics, but I feel I should point out to you that "introduced" is not exactly an appropriate term. I have been doing this dance with the Swedish Folk Dance group of Palo Alto for over two years -- in fact, if my memory does not fail me, we have done this very same dance for several Federation functions, including the annual San Jose thing in January. It is a dance which is regularly danced and taucht in this group.

I am fairly sure that this is probably one of the dances which Kenneth Seeman, the "director" of this group, taught when he went to Oregon to teach some dances, I believe it was in the summer of 75.

I'm glad that this dance is finally getting some more exposure, but it's been around, right under everyone's noses for quite some time.

To the Editor:

This is in response to your request for comment concerning the several variations of NEVER ON SUNDAY. It is written in behalf of the Dance Research Committee. NEVER ON SUNDAY is not an authentic Greek folk dance. It may have been written to be done in the movie of the same name, but it was definitely choreographed to be done to the music of the same name.

Real Greek dances are done free style. Dancers in each line follow the leader who is on the right end of the line. Since this is so, dancers need not worry about which version of the dance to do; they should follow the leader in their line in the typical Greek fashion. Uncertainty about whether they know the version being done may be resolved by dancing behind the line for a few moments before joining the line.

NEVER ON SUNDAY has not been researched by the Federation. The several versions observed may stem partially because the dance has not been standardized. The reasons for dance stand-, ardization are obvious.

Folk Dancers are often uncomfortable with free style dances, being used to set patterns. This may explain why few Greek dances have become popular but NEVER ON SUNDAY has become exceedingly popular.

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Costume Pattern Suggestions

Include in your spring and summer sewing some peasant style ensembles that you can wear folk dancing as well as for street wear if you wish. Many of the patterns can easily be used for costumes by adding a little lace, braid or embroidery. Take a look at some of these patterns and notice how they resemble some of the ethnic folk styles. Keep in mind though, that these patterns will only be available for a few months. But what you like now and sew when ever you want to, even if it's 1 or 2 years from now. When you want a peasant style pattern in September or December you will only find the winter styles in the pattern books, so buy the ones you like when you find them, which is now!

Check the Bi-centennial patterns for good vest and pants for men's patterns. The shirts are very good, but the neck measurements seem to be a little large and may be preferred to be made smaller, check first by measuring the pattern.

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
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Let's Do Squares!

QUADRILLES

As noted in this column in the October issue of LET'S DANCE, the New England Quadrille is one of the two dances from which the American Square Dance movement descended. The other is the Kentucky Running Set of Big Circle Dancing. Lloyd Shaw in his book, COWBOY DANCES states that, while France is given credit for the Quadrille, most Europeam countries had dances done in squares. The movements in Quadrilles were adopted from English Country Dancing. Quadrilles and Contras, as well as Kentucky Running Sets, thus have this in common.

The Quadrille, as originally done, had 5 separate parts. Couples were numbered with couple 1 in the same position as in American Squares, couple 2 facing couple 1, and couple 3 to the right of couple 1. Couples 1 and 2 were active together, and then 3 and 4 were active together. The dance pattern was established by the dance and the dance was not called. Popular music of the day (19th century) was used.

Just as today, the latest dance fad tended to be passed from country to country in Europe to be done in high society in the big cities. In the country the more traditional, indigenous dances continued to be done. In this manner, in the United States Quadrilles became the "rage" in the cities but Contras continued to be danced elsewhere. The French Quadrilles have recently enjoyed a modest popularity in Northern California. The most recent to be introduced was *Le Quadrille de la Vie Parisienne*.


Modern Quadrilles are danced with the same couples active as listed above but the terminology has been changed to "heads" and "sides". This practice is continued with Squares. At some time calling was added and Quadrilles are now prompted just the same as Contras. The 5 figure format was gradually abandoned.

The Quadrille survives today, though not nearly as commonly done as the Contra, which now seems to be enjoying a revival. Quadrilles done now include Grand Square, Wheels Quadrille, and Queens Quadrille. Quadrilles, in common with Contras, have a particular charm which is largely missing in modern Square Dancing. This comes from dancing to the musical phrase. Since the dance is prompted (called prior to the musical phrase upon which it is to be danced), the dancing is always exactly on phrase.

Square Dancing, on the other hand, has become increasingly position oriented. The movements, since they vary in length, often do not correspond to the music. Dancers have a tendency to merely rush from position to position. In other words, the dancing is being lost from Square Dancing.

Quadrilles, in common with Contras, are just the oppositethey blend perfectly with the music. Try Quadrilles, you'll like em!

The most popular Quadrille in California for many years, GRAND SQUARE, is included with the dance write-ups in this issue of LET'S DANCE.

GRAND SQUARE

(United States)

Grand Square is an American quadrille. It has been danced for may years, although the origin is unknown. Grand Square is also a Square Dance movement which consists of Fig I of the dance as written The dance may be called (more proprely, prompted) or may be danced without a call. Since it below. is prompted, the call in completed before the musical phrase on which it is to be danced.

Record: SIO F102; SIO 2088: Lloyd Shaw X53/54; Cap DAS-4041; Col 10019 (no intro). MUSIC:

4 cpls in a square*. Head cpls are in pos 1 and 3 (backs to the music and facing FORMATION: the music). Side cpls are in pos 2 and 4.

STEPS: Walk*.

Ladies Chain:* Two designated W take R hands and exchange places, assume Back **PATTERN:** Promenade Pos* with opp M and turn CCW to face opp cpl (Courtesy Turn).

> Right and Left Through:* Two designated cpls take R hands with opp person and exchange places, assume Back Promenade Pos* and turn CCW to face opp cpl (Courtesy Turn).

Half Promenade: Two designated cpls assume Promenade Pos* and exchange places with M passing L shldrs and turn CCW to face opp cpl.

STYLING: When dancers are side by side, join inside hands.

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ZAD KRAK (Bulgaria)

This dance (zahd krahk), a member of the Pravo family of dances, comes from the Radomir area in the Shope region of Western Bulgaria. It was learned by Ron Wixman from Dennis Boxell and was presented at the 1976 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp by by Mr. Wixman.

MUSIC: Vitosha LP 001. 6/8 meter. For teaching and counting purposes it would be easiest to say cts 1-2-3 = ct 1; cts 4-5-6 = ct 2. Only during meas 3 of the fast music do you need to know where the quick closing of R ft to L occurs, but the way it is written is perfectly correct.

STYLE: When stepping, lift free ft up in back to maintain the Shope style.

MUSIC 6/8

PATTERN

Measures

1	Facing ctr, step on R ft to R (cts 1, 2, 3); step on L ft behind R ft (cts 4, 5, 6).
2	Step on R ft to R (cts 1-6).
3	Step on L ft fwd, twd ctr (cts 1-6).
	Note: when tempo increases, meas 3 becomes: Step on L ft fwd (cts 1, 2); close R ft to L (ct 3); step on L ft fwd (cts 4, 5, 6).

FORMATION: Open circle, "V" pos.

(US - Sweden)

This Circle Schottisch is a simple progressive dance of unknown origin which has been danced in California for many years. In the early 1940s it was the only pattern dance that was always on the program of the Saturday night parties at the Swedish-American Hall in San Francisco. The hambo, schottisch, waltz and polka were all danced "free style" played by an orchestra of three or four musicians.

MUSIC: Record: Any good Swedish schottisch.

FORMATION: Cpls in a circle, all facing ctr, W to M R; all hands joined a little above waist level.

STEPS: Schottisch: Step sdwd R on R (ct 1), step L beside R (ct 2), step sdwd R on R (ct 3), hop on R (ct 4). Step also begins L to L.

<u>Step-Hop</u>: Step on indicated ft (ct l), hop on same ft (ct 2); repeat action with opp ftwk (cts 3-4). On the hop, free ft is under body, knee bent.

PATTERN

Measures

INTRODUCTION Varies according to record used.

I. <u>CIRCLE LOD AND RLOD</u> Remain facing ctr during this pattern.

1-2 Dance one schottisch step to R (LOD) and one schottisch step to L (RLOD).

3-4 Dance 4 step-hops in place: Step-hop on R (cts 1-2), step-hop on L (cts 3-4). Repeat action (cts 1-2, 3-4).

BEGINNERS' FESTIVAL -- Another Success Story


