



The Castle Schottische

Unlike most ragtime-era dances, which were usually improvised combinations of characteristic steps, this dance was taught as a specific sequence. It appeared simply as the "Schottische - as taught at the Castle School of Dancing," in the 1915 booklet "Victor Records for Dancing." Later that year it was described as "The Castle Schottische" in the Philadelphia dance manual "Dancing Without a Master." It was presented by Richard and Melanie Powers at the 1989 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp at Stockton, Ca.

It is most likely that this dance evolved into the "Salty Dog Rag" that is done by dancers today.

CASSETTE: R. Powers Vintage Dance Tape S Side A/5 "Yama Yama Man" R. Powers Stockton 1990 Side A/4 "Yama Yama Man"

4/4 meter

- FORMATION: Cpls face LOD (CCW), W to R of M with M R arm around W waist. Joined L hands are extended diag fwd L, joined R hands held at W R waist. This pos is called Skater's pos by some and Courtesy turn pos by others.
- STEPS and Two-step*, walk*
 STYLING: Glide: Step fwd on the designated ft with a smooth long-reaching step,
 keeping ft close to the floor, while bending knee of supporting ft.

The style and manner should be relaxed, with just a touch of elegance. Each walking step has a light and upward feeling on the beat.

- 9-12 Repeat meas 1-4, beg L ft diag fwd L in LOD. At end, turn 1/4 twd ptr (M CCW, W CW).
- 13-14 Repeat meas 5-6, beg L ft sdwd L, changing from R hands to L on the second sdwd two-step.
- 15-16 Repeat meas 7-8, beg L ft, turning CCW with L hands joined.

DANCE SEQUENCE: Dance pattern as written until music ends.

Skater's Tango

(U.S.A.)

Skater's Tango is a pattern tango from 1914 danced in skater's position. Richard and Melanie Powers presented this dance at the 1989 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp and Richard reviewed it at the 1990 Camp.

- CASSETTE: R. Powers Stockton 1990 Side A/8 "Rapcodea Tango;" 4/4 meter R. Powers - Vintage Dance Tape S Side A/6 "Rapcodea Tango."
- FORMATION: Cpls face in LOD (CCW), W to R of M with M R arm around W waist. Joined L hands are extended diag fwd L; joined R hands are held at W R waist. This is called Skater's position by some and Courtsey Turn position by others.
- STYLING: Walking steps are dance walks, placing the ball of the ft down before the heel contacts the floor. Posture is erect. Flexions are in knee and ankle.

Ftwk same for M and W throughout the dance.

MUSIC 4/4 meter

PATTERN

Measures

- 4 meas INTRODUCTION No action.
 - I. MISTLETOE HESITATION
 - 1-2 Beg L, walk fwd 4 slow steps in LOD (2 cts per step). SSSS
 - 3 Step fwd on L, bending L knee to stop fwd momentum (cts 1-2); step bkwd on R (ct 3); step on L beside R (ct 4).
 S Q Q
 - Step fwd on R and pivot CW ½ turn to face RLOD (CW) (cts 1-2); step bkwd on L (twd LOD), taking full wt and leaving R ft where it was (cts 3-4). W is now on M L. As turn is made keep hands joined; extend joined R hands diag fwd R and place joined L hands on W L waist.
 - 5-8 Beg R, repeat meas 1-4 with opp ftwk and direction. The pivot turn is CCW. End facing LOD with wt on R in orig skater's pos.
 - II. EL OCHO AND MAURICE BEND STEP
 - Step fwd on L (may be a stamp), bending L knee and sweeping R ft in a CCW arc across in front of L (cts 1-2); step on R ft ahead and slightly to L of L ft (ct 3); step on L to L side (ct 4)
 - 2 Step straight bkwd onto R (cts 1-2); step on L across in front of R (ct 3); step on R to R side (ct 4).
 S Q Q
 - 3-4 Repeat meas 1 and 2 twice but start each repetition by stepping on L (no stamp) across in front of R (ct 1 of meas 3 and 5).

Repeat meas 1 but on ct 1, step on L (may be a stamp) $\frac{across in front of R}{SQQ}$

8 Turning about $\frac{1}{4}$ CW, step on R to R side (cts 1-2); draw L heel to R instep (no wt) and pose, looking at ptr (cts 3-4).

DANCE SEQUENCE: Dance pattern as written until music ends.

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Beale Street Blues

(U.S.A.)

Beale Street Blues is a combination of two dances: the Castle Schottische and the Skater's Tango, both of which are danced in skater's position. The music is an unusual composition by W.C. Handy that combines a bluesy fox-trot with a twelve measure tango. The original recording, performed on the clarinet by Boyd Senter and backed up by guitar and piano, was discovered by Beverly Wilder in the archives of the University of the Pacific Library. Richard Powers did the choreography and presented it at the 1990 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp.

- CASSETTE: R. Powers Stockton 1990 Side A/5. 4/4 meter
- FORMATION: Cpls face LOD (CCW), W to R of M with M R arm around W waist. Joined L hands extended diag fwd L, joined R hands held at W R waist. R ft is free.

STEPS and The complete descriptions of Castle Schottische and Skater's Tango are pub-STYLING: lished in this same issue (February 1991) of Let's Dance. Please refer to the descriptions for details and background.

MUSIC 4/4 meter

PATTERN

Measures

- 2 meas INTRODUCTION No action.
 - I. CASTLE SCHOTTISCHE
 - 1-16 Dance the Castle Schottische once with this exception: Meas 15-16: With L hands joined, walk <u>4</u> steps (cts 1,3,1,3) instead of 3 steps. This leaves the L ft free to start the Skater's Tango.
 - II. <u>SKATER'S TANGO</u> Music is only 12 meas in length so pattern is shortened thusly:

Fig I (Mistletoe Hesitation)

1-8 Dance pattern with no changes.

Fig II (El Ocho and Maurice Bend Step)

- 9-11 Dance meas 1-3 as written but omit the stamp on the first meas.
- 12 Step bkwd on R (cts 1-2); close L to R, taking wt (cts 3-4). R ft is free to start the Castle Schottische.
- DANCE SEQUENCE: Dance pattern as written, alternating the Castle Schottische and the Skater's Tango until music ends.

Scott and his wife, Claire, danced together for over 40 years. Scott passed away last fall. They "found" folk dancing in 1948 when they went to a festival at the College of Marin. They soon began to dance 5 nights a week with such well-known teachers as Chang, Mickey McGowan and Bill D'Alvy.

Scott was Council President for 2 years and with local dancers reconstructed an outdoor platform at the Marin Art & Garden Center.

Scott designed several parks in San Rafael. He was "into art" and many of his paintings grace the walls of his friends.

Both Scott and Claire were great supporters of folk dancing and taught a Balkan class for many years.

His wife, two daughters and current dog, Tess, miss him like crazy.

INTERNATIONAL CUISINE

NORWAY

Vi Dexheimer

Breakfast is the most important meal of the day in Norway. Many breakfasts consist of herring and salted and pickled fish, along with several kinds of bread. This may be followed by roast beef and smoked ham, cheeses, cereals, eggs, bacon and potatoes, fruit and beverages.

Soups of a sturdy character are often prepared as a complete meal.

Fruits and vegetables are scarce and expensive.

Fish is an important part of a Norwegian diet.

GRILLED MARINATED MACKEREL

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 2 teaspoons finely chopped onion
- 2 mackerel, 1 pound each
- 3 tablespoons combined melted butter and vegetable oil

Remove the backbones of the mackerel without cutting them in half. Preheat the broiler.

In a shallow baking dish, large enough to allow the fish to be laid out flat in one layer, combine the oil, lemon juice, salt, black pepper, and the chopped onion. Place the mackerel, flesh side down, in this marinade, for 15 minutes, and turn them over for another 15 minutes.

Brush the broiler grill with 1 tablespoon of butter and oil and place the fish on it, skin side down. Grill them on only one side, 3" from heat, basting them with the remaining butter and oil. In 10 to 12 minutes they should have turned a light golden color.

Serve at once, accompanied by buttersteamed new potatoes and horse-radish butter. Serves 2

HORSE-RADISH BUTTER

8 tablespoons unsalted butter

2 tablespoons prepared horseradish 1/4 teaspoon salt

Cream the butter with a wooden spoon until it is light and fluffy. Drain the horseradish and squeeze it dry. Beat the horseradish and the salt into the creamed butter. Transfer the butter to a small serving dish and chill until ready to serve. Serve cold, with grilled or fried fish. Makes 1/2 cup.

CHICKEN WITH SOUR CREAM

1 3-1b frying chicken, cut in serving pieces

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon white pepper

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup Cognac
- 2 cups milk
- 1/4 cup Sherry
- 1/4 cup parsley, chopped
- 1/2 cup sour cream Mushroom caps sautéed in butter Broiled tomato halves Parsley sprigs

Remove skin from chicken and rub with salt and pepper. Brown chicken on all sides in butter, in a large heavy skillet. Flame by pouring Cognac over chicken and lighting the heated spirit. When the flame has died down, cover with milk. Simmer, covered, over low heat, for 45 minutes, or until chicken is tender. Baste occasionally with the milk.

Add Sherry and parsley, and cook 3 minutes longer. Transfer chicken pieces to hot platter and keep hot.

Stir sour cream into pan juices and pour sauce over chicken. Garnish with mushroom caps, broiled tomato halves, and sprigs of parsley.

PRUNE PUDDING

1/3 cup sugar

3 tablespoons cornstarch

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 cup prune juice

- 1-1/2 cups pitted and chopped cooked prunes
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Blend sugar, cornstarch, and cinnamon in top of double boiler. Stir in prune juice and chopped prunes.

Cook over boiling water until mixture thickens, stirring constantly. Cover and cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Remove from heat and stir in lemon juice. Chill.

Serve with a vanilla sauce or with whipped cream.

STEKT KYLLING med SUR FLØTE (Chicken with Sour Cream)

Skin chicken and rub with salt and pepper. Heat butter in large skillet. Brown chicken in it on all sides. Flame by pouring Cognac over chicken and lighting the heated spirit. When the flame has died down, cover with milk. Simmer, covered, over low heat about 45 minutes or until chicken is tender. Baste occasionally with the milk. Add sherry and parsley and cook 3 minutes longer.

Transfer chicken pieces to hot platter and keep hot. Stir sour cream into pan juices and pour sauce over chicken.

Garnish with mushroom caps, broiled tomato halves, and sprigs of parsley.

SVINEKAM PIQUANT (Pork Roast Piquant)

1/4 C. Dijon mustard
1 Tbls prepared horseradish
1 tsp anchovy paste
1 Tbls sugar
1 pork loin (3 to 4 pounds)
2/3 C. fine dry bread crumbs
2 cups boiling dry white wine

Combine mustard, horseradish, anchovy paste, and sugar, and blend to a smooth paste. With a brush, spread meat on all sides with mixture. Place on a rack in baking pan. Cover top and sides with bread crumbs. Set oven at 325°. Roast 35 to 40 minutes to the pound. After 1 hour of roasting time, pour 1 cup boiling wine into pan. Do not allow wine to touch the meat. When the liquid has evaporated completely, pour remaining wine into pan.

Serve on a platter surrounded by alternating mounds of buttered peas, carrots and small browned potatoes. BLOMKÅL med REKESOS (Cauliflower with Shrimp Sauce)

1 large cauliflower
Boiling salt water

SAUCE:

2 cups milk2 C. cold cooked1 tsp onion powdershelled shrimp2 sprigs parsley1/4 C. heavy cream,1/4 cup butterwhipped1/4 cup flourMinced dill or1 tsp. saltparsley1/4 tsp. pepperparsley

Trim cauliflower and cook whole in boiling salt water. Meanwhile, make the sauce.

Combine milk, onion powder, and parsley sprigs and bring to a boil. Remove parsley. Melt butter, stir in flour, and cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Do not let brown. Stir hot milk into mixture, stirring all the time. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture is thickened and smooth. Cook 2 minutes longer. Season with salt and pepper.

Add shrimp and cook over very low heat until shrimp are heated through. Fold whipped cream into sauce. Place the hot cauliflower on a serving dish and pour sauce over it. Sprinkle with minced dill or parsley. 3 to 4 servings.

ALMOND PUDDING

1/4 C. cornstarch
1 cup milk
2 eggs, separated
1 C. heavy cream
1/2 C. sugar
1/4 C. finely ground almonds
1 Tbls rum or 1 tsp. rum flavoring

Mix cornstarch with 1/4 cup milk to a smooth paste. Beat in egg yolks.

Combine remaining milk, heavy cream, sugar, and almonds in a saucepan. Bring to a boil. Lower heat and stir in cornstarch mixture. Cook 5 minutes over low heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in rum.

Fold in egg whites, stiffly beaten. Pour into serving dish and chill.

Serve with a warm fruit sauce.

Participants enjoy all the pleasures and activities of the cruise as well as the two daily folk dance events. Dancing on this cruise will be led by Al Gladstone, a highly experienced folk dance teacher from Toronto, Canada. No other cruiseline offers such unusual and varied shipboard activities as this one. There are four University professors who give daily lectures on the history of the area, its geology, oceanography and the Alaskan Indians.
