Tramblanka

(Poland)

Tramblanka (trahm-BLAHNK-ah) is a couple dance from the region of Opoczno in the Mazowsze Region (Central Poland). Its most popular version was introduced for the first time by the State Ensemble "Mazowsze." Other versions have been taught by Jan Sejda at Madelynne Greene's '67 Mendocino Camp and by Sharon Leyton at the '73 U.C.Berkeley Festival. This description describes the routine as taught by Jacek and Bozena Marek at the 1991 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp in Stockton, Ca.

CASSETTE: Dance Poland Side B/7. 3/4 meter

FORMATION: Cpls in a circle facing LOD (CCW) in escort pos as follows: M places R hand at waist level close to ctr front of body. W to R of M linking her L arm into the space formed by the MR bent elbow. Outside arms at sides.

STEPS and STYLING:

Mazurka (1 per meas): Slide L ft (knee turned out) in designated direction and take wt (ct 1); bring R instep to L heel taking wt on R ft (ct 2); hop on R, bringing L heel over R instep (ct 3). Step repeat exactly.

Run: Steps are small, light, and bouncy, one to a ct. Do not kick ft up in back, but keep ft close to the floor and don't prance.

Arms: In Figs I, III, and IV (meas 9-12) the designated arms are bent at 90 degrees. Forearms are parallel to the floor, close to the body and hands are made into fists with the thumbs held up. Bent arms are moved twd the outside on one count and back across in front of the body on the next count. Movement comes from the shldr only.

The 2 stamping steps at the end of meas 12 in Figs I, III, and IV are emphasized a little more than the other 3 accented steps. M stamp R,L (no wt) (cts 1,2); hold (ct 3). W use opp ftwk.

The body is held erect and proud. Dance is done with energy. Occasionally the M may typically move his head back and forth sideways rhythmically.

MUSIC

3/4 meter

PATTERN

Measures

4 meas INTRODUCTION No action or promenade with ptr. At end, bend ML, WR arms.

I. RUN IN LOD AND RLOD

- 1-3 Beg ML, WR run fwd in LOD with 3 steps per meas (9 total). Beg moving bent arms out to sides (ct 1) and across in front of body (ct 2), etc.
- Turn in place as a cpl 1/2 CCW with 3 accented steps. Bend body slightly fwd to help with the accent. Bent arms continue to move.
- 5-7 Repeat meas 1-3 in RLOD (CW).
- 8 Repeat meas 4 but turn 1/4 CW to end facing ctr.
- 9-10 Run fwd twd ctr with 3 steps and then accent 3 steps by leaning fwd slightly.

Tramblanka - Pg. 2

11-12 Run bkwd 3 steps out of the ctr and then end with 2 stamping steps facing ptr, W back to LOD. Take closed ballroom pos and look twd ctr.

II. MAZURKA TOWARD CENTER AND BACK

- 1-3 Beg ML, WR dance 3 Mazurka steps twd ctr leaning slightly twd ctr to accent ct 1 of the Mazurka step.
- Accent 3 steps in place, turning twd ptr to face out (M CW, W CCW), but remaining in closed pos, joined ML, WR hands curved overhead.
- 5-7 Beg MR, WL repeat meas 1-3 with opp ftwk twd the outside of the circle.
- 8 Turn in place 1/4 CW as a cpl with 3 accented steps to end facing LOD.
- 9-11 Repeat meas 1-3 fwd in LOD.
- Step away from, and face ptr with 2 stamping steps (M LR, W RL). End with MR, WL hands on hips, and other arm bent with thumb up.

III. DO-SI-DO

- 1-3 With 9 running steps (beg ML, WR) do-si-do CW around ptr, passing R shldr first and backing up passing L shldr. Move ML, WR arms as in Fig I.
- 4 Dance 3 accented steps in place, bending body slightly fwd.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 dancing do-si-do CCW passing L shldr first. Move ML, WR arms as in Fig I.
- 9-12 Hook R elbow with ptr and turn once CW in place with 9 running steps, both moving L arms as in Fig I. On meas 12 dance 2 stamping steps to end in closed ballroom pos, M back to ctr.

IV. MAZURKA WITH HALF TURNS

- Beg ML, WR dance one Mazurka step twd LOD, accenting ct 1 by leaning slightly twd LOD.
- With 3 running steps turn twd ptr while turning 1/2 CW as a cpl to end W back to ctr, joined ML, WR hands curved overhead.
- 3-4 Beg MR, WL repeat meas 1-2 with opp ftwk, moving in LOD and still turning CW.
- 5-6 Repeat meas 1-2.
- 7 Repeat meas 1 with opp ftwk moving in LOD.
- 8 With 3 running steps M dance in place and W turn 1/2 CW to end both facing ctr in Escort pos with outside arms bent.
- 9-12 Repeat Fig I, meas 9-12 turning to face LOD on the last 2 stamping steps.
- DANCE SEQUENCE: Dance pattern as written three times total. At end of dance, remain facing ctr.

Krecavi Ketuš

(Vojvodina)

Krecavi Ketuš (KREH-tsah-vee KEH-toosh) was presented at a seminar on Yugoslav dance on Badija, a small island in the Adriatic Sea. The name of the dance, a mixture of Serbo-Croatian and Hungarian meaning "double sawtooth," refers to the steps of the first figure. Vojvodina has been an autonomous region in northeastern Yugoslavia. The dance was presented by Barry Glass at the 1991 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp.

RECORD: FR-4105A; Aman 101 Side A/5.

2/4 meter

FORMATION: Open circle of dancers, facing ctr. Hands down in "V" pos.

STEPS and

Bounce*, lift*, hop*.

STYLING:

Steps are small and light. Hips always face ctr.

MUSIC

2/4 meter

PATTERN

Measures

INTRODUCTION None.

I. SIDE STEPS

- A l Moving to R side (LOD), step lightly onto R fit near L, bringing L ft up in back (ct l); step onto L beside R, bringing R ft up in back (ct &); repeat (cts 2,&). The feet are raised up in back by an amount that matches the energy and enthusiam of each dancer.
 - 2-4 Repeat meas 1 three times.
 - Still moving R, step with accent on R fwd twd ctr of circle (ct 1); small step sdwd on L in LOD (ct &); step on R slightly twd outside of the circle (ct 2); small step sdwd on L in LOD (ct &).
 - 6-7 Repeat meas 5 twice.
 - With ft together, bounce three times (cts 1, &, 2); hold (ct &).
 - 9-16 Repeat meas 1-8 with opp ftwk and direction.

II. LIFT STEP

- B l Lift on L and come down gradually onto R (cts ah,1)(This is the same kind of step found in Veliko Kolo.); repeat with opp ftwk (from R to L) (cts ah,2); lift again on the L (ct ah).
 - Bounce three times on both ft (cts 1, &, 2); hold (ct &).

- 3-4 Repeat meas 1-2.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4.

II. HOP TOUCH

- B l Hop on L and touch ball of R ft beside L (cts ah,1); hop again on L and touch R heel beside L (cts ah,2).
 - 2 Hop twice on L, bringing R around L (cts 1,&); step on R behind L (ct 2); hold (ct &). In order to remain in place during the Figure, move slightly fwd on L during the hops.
 - 3-4 Repeat meas 1-2 with opp ftwk.
 - 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4.

DANCE SEQUENCE: Dance pattern as written six times total.

Czechoslovakia and Its Colorful Costumes

The Republic of Czechoslovakia is composed of Moravia, Bohemia, Silesia and Slovakia, and each province has several types of costumes.

Two features of Czech dress are its brilliance of coloring and predominance of embroidery in its decoration. Both sexes use this type of ornamentation.

The hand-woven shirt of the

The hand-woven shirt of the men displays fine embroidery at the wrist and neck. The trousers which are fashioned of wool, leather or linen may be lace trim med, embroidered or fringed. These trousers which may be white, blue or black are loose in fit from the waist to the knee and fit tightly to the legs below the knee. When of linen, they are shirred or smocked at the top. Around the waist is wound a sash of red and black its ends falling to the ankle. The wide leather belt over it is pierced or embroidered. High boots of polished leather encase feet and legs, or embroidered socks may be worn with pointed moccasins which are tied to the feet with leather thongs.

The short sleeveless jacket is so heavily encrusted with brilliant embroidery or applique that but little of the foundation material of velvet, silk, cloth or sheepskin is visible. Moravian swains add several jaunty, huge red wool pompoms to the front edges of this jacket. A regular felt hat is usually worn with a high crown and turned down brim with an embroidered band or feather or bunch of flowers for its trim. In some provinces of Moravia, a red and black wool bell-boy shaped hat is worn.

The Czechs' overcoat is of sheepskin with the fur worn toward the body in dry weather. This skin is elaborately ornamented with stitching or with an applique of finer skins which have been colored in vegetable dyes made by the peasants from native plants. The tulip, pink and star are the favorite motifs used in designs.

The feminine silhouette is decidedly bouffant due to the full short gathered or pleated sleeves and slightly below the knee length full gathered or pleated skirts which are worn over three lace trimmed petticoats. The underskirts, skirt and apron are like a series of aprons since each is attached to the straight belts with rows of shirring, and each is divided in front, and the

apron itself hides the divided skirts.

The blouse of linen is either gathered or finely plaited at the neck and is finished with an embroidered band or a similarly decorated ruffle three inches in width. The striking part of the blouse is the sleeve which is very full and quite conspicuous with an oblong of gay embroidery covering a large portion of its surface. These sleeves are

The high boot is generally black with scallops or some form of decoration at the top which is often repeated just above the heel. Long, hand knitted stockings of red or white accompany this sturdy footwear.

Little of the woman's hair

Little of the woman's hair shows as the entire head is covered by a cap or kerchief which is tied in an intricate knot at the back or simply knotted under the chin. This kerchief is





often pleated or stuffed with tissue paper. They are gathered at the elbow, terminating in an embroidered ruffle or may be caught into a band at the wrist. Little of the blouse except the neck and sleeves show since over it is placed a short, sleeveless close fitting jacket of silk embroidered in rich colors. In Moravia, this jacket has enormous bunches of red wool pompoms down the front.

The Czech woman delights in an elaborate apron painstakingly embroidered, lace trimmed and of bright hued cotton or silk. Down the front hang the long ends of the colorful brocaded ribbon which fastens it.

folded in a variety of ways each of which indicates the village from which the wearer comes. Both cap and kerchief are embroidered and edged with lace although some of the head shawls are of intense red or yellow cotton similar to the bandana. The small shoulder scarfs are white embroidered in striking designs in colors or black with lace or fringe edging.

The men of the Slovaks residing in the Carpathian Mountains clothe themselves in tunics and voluminous breeches of

native white homespun girdled about the waist with broad belts over a foot in width that hold all sorts of implements necessary for hunting, eating or smoking. Broad brimmed hats decked with flowers and gaudy beads form a fantastic head covering.

Snugly fitted hoods of red cloth and striped, ankle length skirts which do not have the bouffant silhouette are the most colorful of the Slovak woman's garments though the bodice sparkles with embroidery of several hues.

HUNGARIAN COSTUMES

In Hungary, as in most countries, we find a basic costume, which has its variations in each town and county. However, the national colors of Hungary—red, white, green- always are carried out in some part of the peasant dress. Here is a description of one of the many forms of national dress.

MAN: Tight black pants, some-



times trimmed in red or silver, black high boots (Wellington). White shirt with very wide sleeves, trimmed with lace or embroidery. open-work black ribbon is used as a tie. The vest is black, silver buttons almost up to the neck and is rather tight-fitting. The profusely embroidered apron is optional for this costume. A high-crowned hat with colored band and a cockade of flowers completes this costume.

WOMAN: Many stiffly starched petticoats are a must for all feminine forms of Hungarian national dress. The costume has a white very full skirt. either pleated or tightly gathered. Near the hemline the skirt is trimmed with one red and green band. The white blouse has a round ruffled collar trimmed with eyelet

lace. very full short sleeves, with full lace ruffle, which should come to the elbow. A red or green apron (white is authentic too, but not so col-orful) edged in lace and a flowered, fringed scarf are also a must. The red or green velvet bodice closes in front with frogs and is very tight-fitting. It sometimes has a little flared peplum. A scarf, small cap or some flowers are worn on the head. The very elaborate headdresses often seen on illustrations are worn by brides only. Red boots complete this costume. However. white stockings and black shoes, or black boots may be worn with this costume, too.

I should like to point out here that white boots are incorrect for most European costumes.

APPETIZERS

ROQUEFORT CHEESE BALLS (France)

1/4 pound Roquefort cheese

3 tablespoons unsalted butter (softened)

l tablespoon minced green onion tops Freshly ground pepper to taste

2 teaspoons brandy 1/4 cup bread crumbs

2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley

Mash cheese in small bowl. Beat in butter to form a smooth paste. Blend in onion, pepper, and brandy. Shape into small balls, about half-inch in diameter. Mix crumbs and parsley. Roll balls in crumb mixture. Chill, if made ahead.

Serve cheese balls at room temperature, with crusty French bread. (24 balls)

SHRIMP PIES (Greece)

4 ounces cream cheese

l egg yolk

1 tablespoon chopped parsley

1 tablespoon chopped green onions

1/2 teaspoon lemon juice

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 6-ounce package frozen shrimp,
 thawed and chopped

2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

6 sheets phyllo

l stick butter, melted

Whip the cream cheese with an electric mixer. Beat in the egg yolk. With a spatula mix in the parsley, green onions, lemon juice, salt, shrimp, and cheese.

Chill for one hour.

Brush a 13x9x2" baking dish with some of the melted butter. Brush 3 sheets of phyllo with butter, fold in half, and stack in the pan. Pour in the filling. Stack the remaining phyllo sheets, buttered and folded in half, on top of the filling. Brush the top of the pie with butter. Preheat the oven to 375° F. Bake for

Preheat the oven to 375° F. Bake for one hour or until golden brown and puffed. Cool the pie for 5 minutes and cut into

squares. (30 appetizers)

DEVILED EGGS (Hungary)

6 hard-boiled eggs

2 tablespoons mayonnaise

3 tablespoons tomato catsup

1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
 A few drops of Tabasco

1/2 teaspoon salt

White pepper to taste Paprika to taste

Finely chopped green onion

Peel eggs, cut in half lengthwise. Place yolks in a small bowl. Add remaining ingredients, except paprika and onion; mix well. Spoon mixture into egg whites. Sprinkle with paprika and onion. Refrigerate until serving time.

FRIED CHEESE STICKS (Italy)

1 pound Mozzarella cheese

2 tablespoons flour

2 eggs

2 tablespoons water

1 cup Italian-style breadcrumbs
 (Sauce)

l tablespoon olice oil

2 tablespoons finely minced onion

1 8-ounce can tomato sauce

l clove garlic, pressed

1/2 teaspoon oregano, crumbled Salt and pepper

Oil for deep frying

Cut cheese into half-inch slices, then into fingers or wedges. Coat lightly with flour. Beat eggs and water together in shallow bowl. Dip the cheese in egg mixture, then in crumbs; coat well. Refrigerate for 1 hour, uncovered.

Meanwhile, prepare the suace. Heat oil in small saucepan. Add onion and saute until tender. Add remaining sauce ingredients; stir well. Cover; simmer for 30 minutes.

Heat 2" oil to 380° F. Fry breaded cheese fritters, a few at a time, until pale golden. Drain well on paper towels. Serve immediately accompanied by tomato sauce. (Makes 6 servings)

MUSHROOM & CHICKEN-LIVER DIP (Poland)

1/2 pound chicken livers

1/4 cup butter

1 3-oz. can mushroom stems & pieces

2 tablespoons minced onion

2 tablespoons chopped parsley

1/2 cup mayonnaise

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon white pepper

Sauté livers in butter until brown. Drain; chop fine. Drain and chop mushrooms. Add to chicken livers. Add remaining ingredients and blend well.

(Makes 1-1/2 cups)

CHICK-PEA FRITTERS (Spain)

2 cups cooked chick peas 1/4 cup finely chopped onion 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder 1/2 teaspoon baking powder

l teaspoon salt Dash of pepper

1/2 cup diced smoked ham
Olive oil for frying

Mash chick peas. Add remaining ingredients; mix well. Shape mixture into small balls. Press ham cube in center of each ball, covering ham with the chickpea mixture.

Heat oil to 375° F. Deep-fat-fry balls until golden brown. Serve hot. Or heat oil in a fondue pot. Arrange fritters around the pot and allow guests to cook their own fritters. (16 appetizers)

SCALLOPS CHINESE-STYLE (China)

1 cup soy sauce

1 tablespoon lemon juice

2 teaspoons fresh gingerroot, finely chopped, or powdered ginger

2 tablespoons sugar

1 pound scallops, cut into bite-size
 pieces

In a large saucepan combine soy sauce, lemon juice, ginger, and sugar. Bring to a boil. Add scallops and cook over medium-high heat until all the liquid has evaporated. (Makes 25 appetizers)

SIMPLE TUNA APPETIZER (Japan)

1 6-ounce can of Tuna

1 teaspoon soy sauce (more, if desired)

2 tablespoons chopped onion

Drain tuna. Mix with soy sauce and chopped onion. Spread on rice crackers, or other crackers of your choice, as an appetizer. (5 to 6 servings)

CHEDDAR CHEESE PUFFS (Mexico)

2 cups grated Cheddar cheese
1/2 cup butter, softened
1 cup flour, sifted
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
48 small green olives, stuffed with pimientos

Blend cheese with butter. Add sifted flour, salt, and paprika; mix well. Mold I teaspoon dough around each olive to cover. At this point you may refrigerate or freeze cheese puffs for up to 10 days.

Bake puffs at 400° F. for 15 minutes. Serve hot. (Makes 48 appetizers)

SMOKED SALMON ROLLS (Russia)

1 8-oz. package cream cheese, room temperature

3 tablespoons sour cream

1 2-oz. jar red caviar

1/2 pound thinly sliced smoked salmon.

Blend cream cheese with sour cream.

Gently fold in caviar and spread salmon slices with mixture. Roll up and cut into 1-1/2" lengths. Serve chilled.

(6 servings)

HERRING-STUFFED BEETS (Denmark)

24 small whole cooked beets 1 ô-oz. jar pickled herring tidbits 1/4 cup sour cream Dillweed sprigs for garnish

With small melon scoop, hollow out top of each beet. Drain and coarsely shred herring and fill each beet with 1/2 teaspoon. Dot with sour cream and garnish with dillweed sprigs. Serve cold.

MUSHROOM-YOGHURT DIP (Middle East)

2 tablespoons butter

4 ounces finely chopped mushrooms

4 scallions, chopped

3 ounces cream cheese

1/2 cup unflavored yoghurt

1 small clove garlic, crushed

1 teaspoon salt

Parsley for garnish

Sauté the mushrooms and scallions in butter until golden-brown. Allow to cool to room temperature.

Cream the remaining ingredients in a bowl, blending until smooth. Add the mushroom and scallion mixture. Sprinkle with salt and mix well. Adjust seasonings, if necessary. Mound onto a serving dish and refrigerate until well-chilled. Garnish with parsley. (Makes 2-1/2 cups)

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


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
