



IN MEMORIAM Helen Allen (July 8, 1910 - November 19, 1992)

(Scotland)

A Highland Welcome is a 32 bar jig for 3 couples devised by John Bowie Dickson. It was presented by Marianne Taylor at the 1992 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp.

CASSETTE: <u>Muckle Carfuffle</u> FAC CS134 Side B/4; or any suitable 8x32 bar jig. 6/8 meter

FORMATION: Set of 4 cpls in Longways Formation*.

PATTERNS, Skip Change of Step*, Bow and Curtsey*, Cast Off*, Move Up*, Figure STEPS and of 8*, Reel of Three*, Cast Up*, Set*, Wrong Side*. STYLING:

> Promenade Position: Dancers side by side facing in the same direction. Hands are joined, R with R, L with L. R arms are above L arms. W may be on R or L side of M.

> Half Reel of Three: Dance meas 1-4 of Reel of Three*. Active dancer makes one loop and end dancers change places.

Skip Change of Step (beg R) is used throughout unless otherwise noted.

- 13-16 Taking hands on the sides, all three cpls Set and, giving R hands to ptr, cross over to own side.
- 32 meas Cpl 1 repeat dance from 2nd place dancing with cpls 3 and 4. On the repeat of Fig II, meas 15-16, cpls 1 and 4 join R hands and dance to own side by turning the resulting wheel one-half CW to end with cpl 1 in 4th pos. Cpl 3 cross giving R hands as before.
- 192 meas Dance the pattern as written from the beginning with cpls 2, 3, and 4 active each in turn.

Scottish Country Dance Parties

Have you attended a Scottish Country Dance Party? Here's a description of an eighteenth century party in Ediburgh. This description is in Henry G. Graham's book *The Social Life of Scotland in the Eighteenth Century*. London: Adam and Charles, 1899-1909, pages 97-100:

In the dearth of Public pleasures, the worldly energies of society found expression in concerts and dancing assemblies. The private houses were far too small to allow of dancing parties. There was not space enough for a country dance or minuet, no place wherein to pile up the superabundant furniture, no room for guests to sit, or refreshments to be eaten, or be-hooped ladies to move...

...so from 1710, when the first assembly was opened, it was at public balls that society met. The pulpits rang with denunciations of this seductive temptation to sin, lust, and worldliness; "promiscuous dancing" was condemned as an incentive to sensuality, and these rooms were pictured as nurseries of vice. But, in spite of all, society danced, and dancing masters drove as flourishing a business as the barbers. These dancing teachers gave their own balls, in bigger rooms of a wynd. Tickets cost 2s. 6p; dancing began at five o'clock and went on till ten or eleven... There was also the assembly in the West Bow...and in the narrow lane, from four o'clock, there was a crowd of sedan-chairs with their gaily attired occupants, the noisy mob pressing to witness the fine sight, the objurgations in safe Gaelic of competing chairmen, the clanking of swords of gentlemen in bright silken coats. Up the winding turnpike stair to a flat ladies ascended, holding up their hoops to gain difficult entrance by the narrow passage...

Under the patronage of ladies of high degree, such as my Lady Panmure, or beautiful Susanna, Countess of Eglinton, the minuet and country dance went on with stiffness and with state in the low-roofed, hot, ill-ventilated room to the meagre music of a few fiddlers. By eleven o'clock the company dispersed, the stream of fashion poured down the dark stair, and then, as the Countess of Eglinton, lovely herself, and her seven lovely daughters were borne, off in their sedan chairs, the gentlemen with drawn swords escorted them to their lodgings in Jack's Land.

Years passed on; new leaders of fashion came as the old departed. In the middle of the century, as the companies arrived up the stairs to the ballroom, at the entrance stood the old glover, Lord Kirkcudbright, selling white gloves to the dancers as they entered. At the end of the room sat the majestic figure of Miss Nicky Murray (sister of Lord Mansfield), decorated with a gold medal as insignia of her office as Lady Directrice, in which capacity she exercised undisputed sway.

Each partner had been chosen by a gentleman before the ball, the selection being made at some private party, when all the fans were placed in a cocked hat, and the owner of fan picked out became the partner for the night—each having a shrewd guess who was the fair owner of the fan he took. The tickets were then bought by the gentleman, who sometimes had one or two oranges stowed away in his coat pocket for the refreshment of his lady, who sucked them during pauses of conversation and intervals in the dance—a succulent process which she varied by presenting to her nose delicate pinches of snuff, which she extracted from the dainty snuff-box hanging by her side. The customary price for the ticket was two shillings and sixpence, not defraying the modest expenses of tea and coffee which were consumed in the card-room, and the proceeds of the ball were devoted to charity - especially to the new Royal Infirmary, which was enlisting popular interest...

In 1753, "when a stranger enters the dancing room, he sees one end of the room taken up by ladies, who sit dismally in a group by themselves, and at the other end stand their pensive partners that are to be. The ladies may ogle and the gentlemen may sigh, but an embargo is laid upon any close converse. At length the lady directress pitches upon a gentleman and a lady to a minuet, which they perform with a formality approaching despondency. After five or six couples have thus walked the gauntlet, all stand for the country dance, each gentleman furnished with a partner from the aforesaid directriss. So they dance much and say nothing, and this concludes an assembly."—Oliver Goldsmith.

...Neither in that room, nor in the larger apartment to which dancers adjourned in 1756 in Bell's Wynd, was dignity dissociated from discomfort at these balls; from the draughty stair-case came cold air, the smoke of flambeaux of footmen stationed at the entry, and the rooms were crowded on occasions when a supper was laid in one of the dancing apartments. As the St. Giles' bells sounded eleven, the despotic Miss Nicky with firm dignity waved her fan, the music ceased, the concourse dispersed, the gentlemen saw their partners home to their flats, and thereafter adjourned to some tavern to drink and each to toast the lady of his choice. Each man proposed his own as the loveliest of her sex, drank to her glory, vowing to die in her defence, the one who drank most and fell prone last being the victor. Thus one after another followed in tipsy folly the barbarous custom called "saving the ladies" till the chivalrous party became helplessly drunk.

With all their inconveniences and social crudities, in spite of all their shabbiness and discomfort, these entertainments, at which modern nerves shudder, were the charm of Edinburgh fashion, and lived long in the memories of old people, who remembered the bright days when they were young.



Four can share a room for about \$60. Parking is free. The hotel is just a few minutes from the Santa Anita Avenue exit of the Foothill Freeway (Route 210), north of Los Angeles.

For those planning to fly in, the nearest airport is Burbank-Glendale-Pasadena, about twenty miles west of Arcadia. If ground transportation assistance is needed, contact the Hospitality Coordinator in advance: Christine Owenson, 1020 Inverness Drive, La Canada, CA 91011, 818-790-7682.

A source of pride to Arcadians is the float representing the city each New Year's Day in the Rose Parade. Among Arcadia's attractions are many parks, a championship golf course, the Los Angeles County Arboretum, and the famous Santa Anita race track. But forget the horses and head for Statewide, where there will be unbridled folk dancing! And don't wear blinders, because some new sights are in store! For example, there will be a free event for novices and beginners in one of the gyms following the dance concert. And the Statewide Committee hopes to have some musicians playing during prime time for everyone's enjoyment.

Decorations will have a Maytime Magic theme. This will be a memorable Statewide. Don't miss out on the magic. Help make history. Be there. It's a lot closer than Greece.





YUGOSLAVIA

Yugoslavian cuisine is rich, oily and highly flavored. Each region shows traces of foreign influence in some of its dishes, although Yugoslavian cooks have created their own independent cuisine with specific specialties.

RED BEET SALAD

8 to 10 red beets Salted water to cover 1/4 cup wine vinegar 1/2 cup vegetable oil 2 teaspoons sugar 2 tablespoons minced scallions 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg 1/8 teaspoon ginger 2 teaspoons horseradish Salt and pepper to taste

Cook beets in salted water until tender. Peel beets and slice into thin strips. In a bowl beat together all in gredients and pour over the beets.

Marinate the beets overnight in the dressing in the refrigerator.

EGGPLANT CROQUETTES

- 2 large eggplants, peeled
- 4 to 6 cups water Salt to taste
- 1 cup minced parsley
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons scallions, minced Salt and cayenne pepper to taste
- 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1/2 cup grated Gruyere cheese
- 1 cup bread crumbs
- 2 to 4 cups oil for frying

Halve the eggplants lengthwise. Place them in a pot of cold salted water. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and cook for 5-7 minutes. Drain eggplants and squeeze the water out of them. Purée them in a blender. Mix the purée thoroughly with minced parsley, garlic, scallions, salt, cayenne pepper, and nutmeg. Add and mix beaten eggs, Gruyere cheese, and bread crumbs. Heat oil in a deep pan or deep-fat fryer. Drop a teaspoon of eggplant mixture into hot oil and fry on both sides until well browned.

<u>RIĆET</u>

(Beans with Smoked Pork)

1/2 pound navy beans
1/2 pound smoked spareribs

1/2 pound shloked spare

1/4 pound barley

1 small onion, diced

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

1/2 teaspoon paprika

Salt and pepper to taste

1/4 cup chopped parsley


Soak beans in water over night and drain. Place beans in a pot, cover with water, and cook for 2 hours, or until tender. Cut spareribs into serving pieces, place in a pot with water to cover and boil for 35 minutes. In a saucepan cook barley until tender. Drain the beans, reserving the cooking liquid. Mix beans with barley, adding 1 cup of cooking liquid. Add to the spareribs. Sauté onion in oil and add to the bean mixture. Add paprika, salt, and pepper. Cover the pot and simmer for 15 minutes. Garnish with parsley.


