





Statewide - Just Around the Corner

All Statewide activities are near the 210 Freeway. To get to the Santa Anita Inn, exit at Santa Anita Avenue; go south about 1/2 mile. A landmark on the left is a Denny's with a windmill. Turn RIGHT there onto Huntington. Pass the park on the left. Slip into the left-turn pocket, which is in front of the motel, and there you are! A Baker's Square coffee shop is across the street, and several restaurants are east on Huntington.

Those arriving in a self-contained RV will have received a pass for Arcadia High School's VIP parking area. They should continue south on Santa Anita past Huntington (then past the park and golf course), turning right at the next street, which is Campus Drive. A gate on the left will be open; it is the entrance for the VIP lot. See the campus the VIP lot. See the campus map on the back of the registration receipt.

All events at the high school are in the North Gym, except: Saturday's Beginner Institute is in the South Gym (simultaneous with the Afternoon Dance which is in the North Gym); Sunday's Afterparty is in the South Gym; Monday's Barbecue and Dance are in the patio area adjacent to the North Gym. The barbecue menu includes tasty beans, cole slaw, garlic bread, punch and coffee, not to mention chicken or beef right off the giant charcoal grill brought from Ventura County by chef Walt Metcalf.

The musicians are Miamon Miller's Tisa River Band. Miamon led the Aman Orchestra for many years before returning to UCLA for an MA in Ethnomusicology with a concentration in Romanian violin. Don Sparks, Vic Koler, and Jim Knight are backbones of Aman. Don

has played at several camps including Stockton. At the Saturday Evening Dance, sets of taped and live music will alternate. The Afterparty on Sunday will let loose with all live music.

The concert has grown into a multicultural extravaganza! The Dance Director of the young Philippine group was formerly with Bayanihan. Francis Awe is a Yoruba prince from Nigeria who believes the talking drum has a message for all people. Terpsichoreans, whose average age is 22, are the Sweepstakes winners of this year's dance competition for the western which was held Sacramento. And there's more -at press time, the total is eleven dance companies!

A costume display and vendors' ethnic wares will add to the fanciful atmosphere created by the springtime decorations. The word about footwear from Chairman Marshall Cates is that clean soles of dedicated dance shoes or boots are acceptable (no high heels, taps, or protruding nails) Wipe the dirt and your worries away at the door as you enter the world of Maytime Statewide treasured combination of traditions and stimulating new experiences. It has something for everyone! Don't miss it! The advance registration deadline is May 14.

Raca

(Serbia)

Raca (RAH-tsah), which means "duck", is a Vlaska dance from East Serbia. It was first presented by Dobrivoje Putnik, artistic director of "KOLO", Beograde, at the Borino Kolo Folk Ensemble Institute in San Pedro in 1973. Bora Gajicki presented it at the Kolo Festival in 1973. There is a dance by the same name but from Croatia, introduced by Nena Shokčič at the 1987 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp and published in the March 1988 "Let's Dance" magazine.

RECORD:

Dances of Yugoslavia, BK 732, Side B/3.

4/8 meter

FORMATION: Line or open circle, belt hold pos, L arm over R, mixed line, facing ctr. Leader

at R end.

STYLING:

Body is tilted a little back and turns and waddles twd side that is stepping.

MUSIC

4/8 meter

PATTERN

Measures

8 meas <u>INTRODUCTION</u>. No action.

I. BASIC

- Step on R ft to R (ct 1); step sdwd on L ft next to R (ct 2); step on R ft to R (ct 3); bend L knee and swing L ft diag in front of R and bounce on R ft (ct 4).
- 2 Repeat meas 1 with opp ftwk and direction.
- 3 Step on R ft to R (ct 1); bend L knee and swing L ft in front of R and bounce on R ft (ct 2); step on L ft to L (ct 3); bend R knee and swing R ft diag in front of L and bounce on L ft (ct 4).
- 4 Repeat meas 1.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 with opp ftwk and direction.

II. VARIATION

- Step on R ft to R (ct 1); step sdwd on L ft next to R (ct 2); step on R ft to R (ct 3); stamp L ft beside R and lift L ft immediately (ct 4).
- 2 Repeat meas 1 with opp ftwk and direction.
- Step on R ft to R (ct 1); stamp L ft beside R and lift L ft immediately (ct 2); step on L ft to L (ct 3); stamp R ft beside L and lift R ft immediately (ct 4).
- 4 Repeat meas 1.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 with opp ftwk and direction.

DANCE SEQUENCE: Dance basic dance until music speeds up. The leader signals the change to Variation II, which is then danced to the end of the music.

Assoulis

(Armenia)

Assoulis (ah-soo-LEESS) is a traditional dance from the Sasoun region of former West Armenia. Its name is a contraction of the verbs "asel", meaning "to say", and "lesel", meaning "to listen". "As ou lis" can be freely translated to "say and listen". It was presented by Tineke van Geel at the 1992 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp.

RECORD: Ararat Armenian Dances, Hakketoon 1989.34 Side A/3. 4/4 meter

CASSETTE: Ararat Armenian Dances, Hakketoon 1989.34 Side A/3.

FORMATION: Line or open circle, little fingers interlocked, W-pos, facing a little R of ctr. Leader is at R end.

STYLING: Light and energetic.

MUSIC 4/4 meter

PATTERN

Measures

INTRODUCTION. No action. 4 meas

I. BASIC

- 1 Step on R ft in LOD, forearms move to R (ct 1); step on L ft in front of R in LOD, forearms move to L (ct 2); facing ctr step bkwd on R ft, arms move to 'W" pos (ct 3); step on L ft beside R (ct &); step on R ft beside L (ct 4).
- 2 Step twd ctr on L ft, turning body R (CW) to put L shId twd ctr, swaying arms down to V-pos (ct 1); step on R ft beside L (ct &); step on L ft beside R (ct 2); step bwkd on R ft, turning body back to face ctr, swaying arms up to W-pos (ct 3); step on L ft beside R (ct &); step on R ft beside L (ct 4).
- 3 Moving sdwd to L, both knees bent, accent step on L ft, R toe remaining on floor, and drop hands at the wrists while arms remain in W-pos, little fingers interlocked (ct 1); step on R ft behind L, raising hands at wrists (ct 2); repeat cts 1, 2 (cts 3, 4).
- Repeat meas 3, cts 1, 2 (cts 1, 2); step on L ft to L, bringing arms down and to the L beginning a CW circle (ct 3); hop on L ft, bringing R ft next to L calf, and bringing arms up and to the R to complete the full CW circle (ct 4).

II. VARIATION

- 1-2 Repeat Fig I, meas 1-2.
- Repeat Fig I, meas 3, ct 1 (ct 1); rest in pos (cts 2-3); repeat Fig I, meas 3, ct 2 (ct 4). 3
- Repeat Fig I, meas 4.
- DANCE SEQUENCE: The basic figure may be danced throughout. However, the leader may wish to introduce the variation but only during melody A when there are pauses or stops of the dehol (drum)*. Musical sequence: Intro 4 meas; Melody A-8 meas; Melody B-4 meas; A*-8 meas; B-4 meas; A*-8 meas; B-4 meas; A*-8 meas.

POLAND

POLISH BEET SOUP

1 beef soup bone, cracked

1 pork knuckle

l onion, cut in half

4 quarts cold water

1 sprig parsley

1 stalk celery with leaves

2 carrots, diced

4 medium-sized beets, sliced thin

1 tablespoon vinegar Water

1 cup fresh lima beans

1 small cauliflower

2 tomatoes

1 tablespoon butter

1 small cabbage

1 potato, diced

1 onion, finely chopped

l tablespoon sugar

Jail

2 to 3 tablespoons vinegar

1 tablespoon flour

1/4 cup water Sour Cream

Brown meat and onion halves, cover with cold water, and bring to a boil. Add parsley, celery, and carrots. Simmer for 2 to 3 hours to make a rich stock.

In the meantime, sprinkle inch-long strips of beets with vinegar, cover with water, and cook until tender.

Also, cook in separate pans the fresh lima beans, slivered string beans, and cauliflower broken into small pieces.

Fry tomatoes in butter until soft and press through a sieve. Shred cabbage very fine, let stand in salt water for a few minutes, then drain thoroughly. When stock is ready, remove bones, celery, onion, and parsley, and salt to taste. Add diced potato and cook 10 minutes.

Mix in cabbage and cook 10 minutes longer. Then add beets, including water in which they were cooked, lima beans, string beans, cauliflower, and sieved tomato. Stir in chopped onion and sugar. Add salt and vinegar to taste and cook 5 minutes. Mix flour and water and stir into borsch.

Before serving, top each bowl of soup with a spoonful of sour cream. Serves 12

HUNTER'S STEW

2 pounds beef stew meat

2 pounds lean pork, cubed

2 tablespoons bacon drippings

1 large onion, chopped

2 cooking apples, chopped

1 #2 can tomatoes

1 medium-sized cabbage, chopped

1 #2 can sauerkraut

1 teaspoon sugar

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1 bay leaf

1/4 cup sherry

Brown meat in bacon drippings. Add onion, apples, tomatoes, cabbage, sauer-kraut, seasonings and sherry. Simmer for 2-1/2 hours or until pork is well-cooked, stirring occasionally. Add more sherry if you wish to reheat.

COLD CHERRY SOUP

2 pounds fresh cherries

4 cups cold water

3 sticks cinnamon Peel of lemon

1 cup hot water

3/4 cup sugar

2 tablespoons port wine

Wash, stem, and pit cherries. To half the cherries add cold water, cinnamon, and lemon peel. Bring to a boil and cook 20 to 30 minutes.

In the meantime, make a syrup of the hot water and sugar. When boiling vigorously, drop in the rest of the cherries and cook 5 minutes. Remove lemon peel and cinnamon from first batch; run fruit through a sieve; then add cherries cooked in syrup, and the wine. When cool, place in the refrigerator and chill thoroughly. Makes 8 servings of 1/2 cup, each, and serve as a breakfast fruit course.

BOW-KNOT CRULLERS

2 whole eggs

2 egg yolks

2 teaspoons melted butter

l teaspoon vanilla

1-1/2 cups sifted flour Powdered sugar

Beat eggs and egg yolks until light and fluffy; add butter and vanilla and beat again. Add sifted flour gradually, beating after each addition. Turn onto floured board and knead to light elasticity. Allow dough to rest for 10 minutes. Roll dough as thin as it is possible to handle. Cut into strips 2" x 1"; twist strip in center to give a bow-knot effect.

Fry in deep fat, turning frequently until evenly browned on all sides. Place on paper towel to drain and sprinkle liberally with powdered sugar. (Makes 54)

PIEROGI WITH MUSHROOM SAUCE

DOUGH: 1-1/2 cups flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 egg

l tablespoon cold water

Sift flour and salt into mixing bowl. Make a well in center and break egg into it. Add cold water. Mix thoroughly with fork, then turn out onto lightly floured board and knead for 20 minutes. Wrap in wax paper and place in refrigerator to chill for 30 minutes.

FILLING:

1 cup cooked beef

1 cup cooked pork 2 small onions

l tablespoon butter

1 egg

1/4 cup dry bread crumbs

Salt and pepper

Run the meat and 1 onion through the grinder, using the fine blade. Chop other onion fine and saute in butter. Add to meat. Add the egg and bread crumbs, salt and pepper to taste, and mix thoroughly to paste consistency.

SAUCE: 1 large package dry mushrooms

4 cups water 1 bouillon cube

l tablespoon butter

l tablespoon flour

Wash mushrooms and simmer in water for 1-1/2 hours. Drain and save liquid. Chop mushrooms very fine. Heat liquid and stir in bouillon cube. Melt butter and blend in flour. Add to the liquid, stirring constantly until smooth. Add mushrooms and simmer, stirring frequently until sauce is smooth and thick.

Remove dough from the refrigerator and roll out on very lightly floured board until paper thin. Cut in rounds 2-1/2" in diameter. Place 1/2 teaspoon of filling on one half of round, fold over the other half of round to form a semi-circle, and seal edges by presing with fork.

Drop about 20 of these pierogi at a time into a 4-quart kettle of rapidly boiling salted water and coil for 12 minutes. Remove to well-greased shallow baking dish and brush with melted butter to keep them from sticking together.

Pour sauce over pierogi and bake in a moderate oven (375°) for 15 minutes. Serve immediately. Yiels 40 pierogi.
