History of the Folk Dance Movement in California now available

At long last after more than four years of research together with input from a select group of more than a dozen folk dance leaders, a History of the Folk Dance Movement in California is now at the printers and will be available for sale by the time you receive this copy of "Let's Dance".

To best describe this some 135 page history we refer you to the reduced in size Table of Contents shown below. Our third and final writing is now a fairly complete tabulation of events dating from the year 1938, with special emphasis on the early years. A careful examination of the Table of Contents will indicate the depth of our research. In addition to personal photos and copies of original documents there are copies of Volume 1, No 1 and 2, both two page mimeograph sheets dated January and February, 1943, forerunners of our "Let's Dance" magazine.

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If you were a teacher, square dance caller, leader or contributor to the movement during the Forties, Fifties or even later, you are likely to find your name listed along with that of all Presidents and their staffs.

We believe every club as well as many folk dancers will want a copy of this history. It is being offered at a price of just \$8.00 that includes the sales tax, plus a mailing charge of \$1.25. A11 costs other than that of the actual printing have been assumed by the author. It is his contribution to a movement that has given him much pleasure over the years.

ROBERT CHEVALIER

We have chosen as the next folk dancer for our "Lost and Found" column, a fellow who's career in folk dancing started in the early 1940s. He is Robert Chevalier who's dedication to the movement over several decades certainly deserves mention. Prior to his introduction to the art he was busy six days a week operating a bicycle and ski rental shop. As many as three of his customers convinced Bob he should look into this new activitity, folk dancing. He gave it a try and was immediately hooked. As a member of Changs International Folk Dancers, in 1946 he met the lovely Kathleen and shortly thereafter they exchanged marriage vows.

Not satisfied to just accept without offering something in return, Bob took over as Editor of "Let's Dance" in 1953. In his first issue he featured Your Column and Mine", reserved for news from all Federation clubs.

Some eight years later, Robert Chevalier was elected President of the Folk Dance Federation of California, North, for the 1961-1962 term. Something he felt opened up a good discussion among Council members was his policy to ask just prior to adjournment of Council Meetings, Can you think of anything that would benefit the organization?"

In 1964 at the Dimension in Dance Statewide, Bob Chevalier gave each Past President, both North and South, a postcard calling for a meeting immediately following the Installation Brunch, for the purpose of forming a new Past President's committee. This meeting was held and one may consider it the forerunner of the present day Past President's party along with the recognition of all Past Presidents on Statewide programs.

Bob's and Kathleen's active participation in folk dancing gradually ended as the years went by. As to how these years were spent, we refer you now to their reply to our inquiry and we quote:

"Retirement has been a busy time for me. After 30 years of a six day work week in the bicycle business I changed occupations and maintained two buildings for the State of California. A five day week; paid vacations and all.

Like Vi Dexheimer, for the next sixteen years Kathleen and I have traveled all over the West. We wore out two Volkwagons, an International TravelAll and a Chevrolet van. we rode Amtrak to Washington D.C. and we rented a car and drove to Niagra Falls, saw the Fall Foliage colors, then to Chicago and flew home. We also went across Canada by train to Quebec. Rented a car and drove around the scenic Gaspe Peninsula and then flew home. Later another trip by Alaska Ferry to Juneau via the Inland Passage. Another year we took a sightseeing

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bus from Seattle up the Alaska Highway to Anchorage and from there flew to Kotzebue and Nome above the Artic Circle. The same year we also went to France for about a month, headquartering in Paris.

We bought a 1993 Ford Escort and Things have guited down. have yet to drive it to San Francisco. To stay busy, Kathleen works on her weaving. I have gotten into Video and I put almost all my slides and 8 mm movies onto Video. It is a slow job. I belong to a Video group where I have to make a video every two months - short one. Thanks for considering me."

Bob and Kathleen still have a soft spot in their hearts for folk They seldom find time to attend any affairs but did dancing. spend three days in Dublin at the 1992 Statewide as did some 20 or more Past Presidents from the North and 6 from the South. I as may happen, the 1996 Statewide is held in the San Francisco Bay area, we suggest they heat up that 1993 Ford and join in the fun.

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Cigánytánc Szatmar County, Hungary

Cigánytánc (TSEE-gahn-tahnts), or Gypsy Dance, is danced solo or with couples scattered randomly around the dance area. Traditionally the dance is never danced in a formation. Men's solos are intended to show virtuosity. Women often play games by attempting to circle partner. The dance described here was choreographed by Steve Kotansky for recreational dancing and presented by him at Stockton Camp, '94. His detailed description of motifs and other variations are given in that syllabus.

Formation: For recreational dancing Steve taught this with individuals facing center in a circle, but it may be danced in couples with partners facing, and dancers may change partners. Arms are forward about chest level, moving freely. Fingers snap.

Steps: <u>Bounce</u>: Lifting on ball of supporting ft, raise heel ahead of the beat and lower on the beat.

Styling: The feeling is lively and bouncy, yet controlled.

Measures 4/4 meter

PATTERN

INTRODUCTION. At the discretion of dancers. Steve waited four measures.

- I. <u>PIHENÖ</u> (Rest)
- 1 Facing ctr, touch R toe (or heel) fwd (ct 1); step on R beside L (ct 2); touch L toe (or heel) fwd (ct 3); step on L beside R (ct 4).
- 2-4 Repeat meas 1 three more times (total of eight touch-steps).
 - II. <u>SÉTALO</u> (Walk)
- 1 Facing ctr, touch R toe (or heel) fwd (ct 1); turning to face slightly R of ctr, step on R in LOD (ct 2); step on L across in front of R (ct 3); turning to face ctr, step on R to R (ct 4).
- 2 Repeat meas 1 with opp ftwk and direction.
- 3-4 Repeat meas 1-2.
 - III. <u>HEEL TWISTS</u>
- 1 With wt on L ft, and ball of R ft touching slightly fwd, bounce on L (bending R knee slightly) and twist both heels to L (ct 1); bounce on L and twist both heels to R, lifting R ft slightly (heel out and knee close to L knee) (ct &); step on R beside L (ct 2); repeat cts 1, &, 2 with opp ftwk and direction (cts 3, &, 4).
- 2-4 Repeat meas 1 three times (total of eight heel twists).

IV. FORWARD AND BACK WITH CLICK AND TWISTS

- 1 Facing ctr, move fwd with accented steps R, L, R (cts 1, &,2); click L ft to R ft (ct 3); shifting wt to L ft, twist heels to L (ct 4).
- 2 Step bkwd on R, twisting L heel to R (ct 1); step bkwd on L, twisting R heel to L (ct 2); repeat cts 1, 2 (cts 3, 4).
- 3-8 Repeat meas 1-2 three times (total of four times).

V. <u>STEP-TAP</u>

Step on R in place (ct 1); tap L heel next to R, no wt (ct &); step on L in place (ct 2); tap R heel next to L, no wt (ct &); step on R heel to R (ct 3); step on L behind R (ct &); step on R to R (ct 4); tap L heel next to R, no wt (ct &).

- 2 Repeat meas 1 with opp ftwk and direction.
- 3-4 Repeat meas 1-2.
 - VI. <u>CIRCLING</u> (for women and men)
- 1 Step on R heel to R (ct 1); step on L behind R (ct &); step on R to R (ct 2); tap L heel beside R ft, no wt (ct &); step on L heel to L (ct 3); step on R behind L (ct &); step on L to L (ct 4); tap R heel beside L ft, no wt (ct &). Note: Steps are small, as dancer turns smoothly 1/4 turn CW.
- 2-4 Repeat meas 1 three more times, completing one full CW turn.
 - VII. <u>OPTIONAL SLAPPING PATTERN FOR MEN</u> (May replace <u>CIRCLING</u> after one complete sequence.)
- 1 Fall onto R (ct 1); click L ft to R, no wt (ct &); fall onto L (ct 2); click R ft to L (ct &); jump onto both ft, slightly apart (ct 3); click heels together in air (ct &); separate ft in air and land on both ft together with knees bent (ct 4).
- 2 Jump onto both ft, R crossed in front of L, with knees bent (ct 1); on balls of both ft, turn once CCW (cts 2-4).
- 3 Step on L in place (ct 1); moving twd ctr, bend fwd to slap R calf with R hand (ct &); step on ball of R ft in place (ct ah); step on L next to R (ct 2); slap R calf with R hand (ct &); repeat cts 1-2 with opp ftwk and slaps (cts 3-4).
- 4 Step on L in place (ct 1); slap R calf with R hand (ct &); step on R fwd (ct 2); slap L calf with L hand (ct &); step on L fwd (ct 3); straightening up, slap L thigh with L hand (ct &); slap R calf with R hand (ct 4).

Kak pri balkye

Russia

Kak pri balkye (KAHK pree BAHL-kyeh) is a traditional dance from the Orenburg region of southeast Russia whose title translates as "how by the gully." The dance shows the influence of the Ural Cossacks who live in the region. Research for the dance was done by Hennie Konings who introduced it in Germany in 1993. Hennie presented it at the University of the Pacific Stockton Folk Dance Camp in 1995.

Cassette: Russian Dances Stockton 1994 Side B/7 2/4 meter

Formation: Single circle of dancers, hands joined in V-pos.

Steps: <u>Walk</u> (2 to a meas): Each walking step takes 1 ct.

<u>Scuff Step</u> (2 to a meas): Low leap fwd onto R (ct 1); scuff L heel fwd (ct &); repeat with opp ftwk (cts 2,&).

Meas 2/4 meter

PATTERN

4 meas <u>INTRODUCTION</u> No action. Start with vocal.

I. <u>CIRCLE IN LOD</u>

1 - 4

Beg R, dance 8 Scuff Steps in LOD (CCW).
<u>Note</u>: Fig I may be danced with other stamping patterns:
<u>Stamp Variation</u> (1 to a meas): Low leap fwd onto R (ct ah);
stamp fwd (with wt) L,R,L (cts 1,&,2); scuff R heel fwd (may be omitted) (ct &).
Hennie suggests the dancers be encouraged to dance a variety of patterns. In class, W danced 8 Scuff Steps and M danced the Stamp Variation 4 times. On the next repeat the steps were switched with the M dancing the 8 Scuff Steps.
Another suggested pattern: Dance 2 Scuff Steps and 1 Stamp Variation (2 meas). Repeat (2 meas).
Because all these patterns are compatible, any pattern may be danced by any dancer at any time.

II. INDIVIDUAL CW CIRCLES

1-4 Releasing hands, walk 8 quiet steps (beg R) in an individual CW circle to the outside of the big circle. Follow your R shldr with arms down and out from the body.

III. TOWARD CENTER AND BACK

- 1-2 Rejoin hands and beg R, walk 3 steps twd ctr; fall fwd onto L, bending knees and lifting R ft up in back. Gradually raise the joined hands fwd about to about waist level.
- 3 Walk bkwd R,L, lowering hands and then releasing them.
- 4 Walking R,L, turn alone once CW, moving back to the original circle. At the end, join hands to reform the large circle.
- SEQUENCE: Repeat dance as written until music ends. At the end, bow from the hips twd ctr.





CALENDAR of EVENTS

<u>-OJAI ODYSSEY - THE STATEWIDE FESTIVAL -</u> <u>A BLEND OF NOSTALGIA AND CONTEMPORARY FOLKDANCING</u>

The Statewide Festival planned for Memorial Weekend, May 26 thru 29, 1995 in Ojai will bring folkdancers a bit of nostalgia as well as contemporary folkdance music and dance. The first Statewide, held in Ojai in 1946, featured dancing in the streets. Musicians played on top of the fountain while dancers twirled and stamped in a roped off section of Ojai Avenue in front of the Arcade.

Troika, Hopak, Korobushka, Scandinavian Polka, Hambo, Polka Mazurka, Italian Quadrille and Sherr are a few of the dances still seen in Folkdancer's repertoire and were some of the dances enjoyed by the first dancers at the original Statewide Festival. Over the years, the scope of dances and countries represented by folkdaning has grown, thus enriching us all. Gustav Skoal, Chiapanecas, Durham Reel, Neopolitan Tarantella and Eide Ratas are some of the dances seldom seen today. Perhaps they will reemerge when folkdancers make their odyssey to Ojai.

The quiet town nestled in the mountains welcomed the more then 500 folkdancers who converged on the city in 1946 with open arms and hearts. <u>Let's Dance</u> said "this historic event for our California folk dancers will be frequently resurrected and re-enacted." True to this prediction, the two Folkdance Federations, North and South, have continued the tradition of the Statewide Festival for the last fifty years. This year we return to the place of its origin and inception to celebrate the anniversary of a great idea.

ALBERTO TOLEDANO & LOREEN ARBUS

BIOGRAPHY


Alberto Toledano and Loreen Arbus are foremost Argentine Tango dancers, choreographers and teachers, trained in Argentina. They teach group and private lessons in both the Salon (social) and Exhibition styles in Los Angeles and nationwide. Amongst the many types of dancers they work with, they particularly enjoy teaching and performing at folk dance camps and festivals, and have appeared as Guest Artists with AVAZ.

In 1994 they produced, directed, choreographed and starred in the critically acclaimed show, RITMO TANGOTM, which had two sold-out runs in March and September at the Fountain Theatre, in Hollywood. The show was hailed in the Los Angeles Times' 'Best of '94' edition as "...an atmospheric survey of Argentine traditions featuring the drop-dead authority of Alberto Toledano and Loreen Arbus..."

In December, 1994 they were invited to participate in a European Tango Symposium in Belgium. Also in December, "Reto", an Argentine Tango commissioned by Hispanic 'hyperdance' star, Frank Guevara, for his sensation-causing modern dance company, Dance Theatre of East L.A., premiered. The Los Angeles Times' dance critic Lewis Segal called it "The year's most daring tango."

In January, 1995 they choreographed several tangos for the off-Broadway hit play, "The Stand-In". Shortly thereafter, **Alberto** and **Loreen** launched a three-week run of RITMO TANGO[™] at the hot, cabaret nightclub, Luna Park, in West Hollywood.

Some of their film and television credits include "Naked Gun 2 1/2", "Mr. Saturday Night", "The Dance", a short movie for the Playboy Channel, and an episode of "The Red Shoe Diaries" on Showtime.





DANCING FOR THE HEALTH OF IT

It was ironic that the educational seminar that LEGACY, the International Assembly of "Trustees" of the Square Dance Activity, presented in conjunction with the National Executive Committee at the National Square Dance Convention in Portland, Oregon, entitled "Dancing for the Health of It" had a serious health problem. Moderator Dr. Lee Walker and several of his panelist "patients" became seriously ill and were unable to participate.

This session began with a discussion on emergency preparedness and questions to answer. Various types of emergency situations were discussed as well as suggested procedures to follow. Questions included: Does your club maintain (and always have available) a current listing of members trained in CPR or who are nurses, doctors, members of ambulance squads or trained in EMT? Do you know who to call for emergencies? Where is the phone located? Do you need money to place a call? Who is in charge in cast of emergency? What is ECMA--the Emergency Call for Medical Aid? How does ECMA work? Does your club have insurance? Who do you contact about insurance? What follow-up to emergency situations does your club follow?

Several clubs who have members with handicaps told of how their club has made adjustments to fit their needs. One caller mentioned how the hearing impairment sound enhancement device he carries as standard equipment is often utilized. Also discussed were "Sunshine" chairmen responsible for keeping in touch with missing dancers. Another told of the "emergency repair kit" (including an eyeglass screw kit!), their club always placed in both the men's and women's bathrooms at their dances.

The session then concentrated on the healthful benefits of the square dancing activity with Jim Connelly, RN, NA, concentrating on weight loss and fitness tips. While no one there had a surefire method to deveop the will power necessary to avoid those delicious refreshments so many clubs serve at their dances, it was heartening to hear that veggie platters and healthier foods are becoming more popular items.
