
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

Survey of Norwegian Dance (Part 2)

Alix Cordray is an American currently living and teaching dance in Oslo. She has attended folk dance teacher education courses provided by Noregs Ungdomslag, the main folk dance organization. In 1989-90, she studied Norwegian folk dance at the University of Trondheim in a brand new (and first in Norway) program at the university level. She originally wrote this material for the University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp syllabus. Part 1 appeared last month.

Songleik (Song Games)

The only accompaniment to songleik is singing, usually of rhymes. The dance is often a simple and stylized dramatization of the text. Songleik has very old roots; some of the texts can be traced back to the Middle Ages. However, it probably did not come to Norway until the end of the 1800s, arriving via Sweden and Denmark. Songleik has been much used in places where dance was/is forbidden for religious reasons; it was not considered to be dance as long as it starts in a circle and has no musical accompaniment. This form is not used together with other dance forms.

There are often many songleik games in places having a strong tradition; 20-30 is not unusual. Country and city traditions were quite different; one of the differences is that people of all ages did songleik in the country while in the city it was done primarily by young girls. Today, the city tradition is still strong, but the country tradition is quite weak. Songleik is also used in organized folk dance, primarily in connection with children's groups.

Songdans (Song Dance)

Songdans is performed to vocal accompaniment only. The songs are sung in unison, without harmony. The usual formation is a circle of couples; if it is crowded, there may be several concentric circles.

Songdans is not found in Norwegian folk traditions. It is mainly the work of Hulda Garborg in the period 1900-1910. She wanted to bring into use songs that had probably been danced to at one time. The Faroe Islands have a living tradition of singing long ballads while dancing a simple, six-count basic step (of the pravo or hora type). Hulda Garborg based her songdans on this tradition, and the two basic steps (attersteg, kvilesteg) are stylizations of the Faroe Islands step. Songdans became popular in organized folk dance in 1910-1920, and today it is often considered to be one of the trademarks of Norwegian dance. Even today, new dances are choreographed using appropriate songs: ballads, well known country songs, and sometimes more recently written popular songs.

Most of the dances use one of the basic steps, plus a part that is different, called the brigde. The brigde often relates to the text. Generally, the dance repeats for each verse and songs having only one verse are done twice.

The 20th century

There are two important organizations in Norway today dealing with folk dance: Landslaget for Spelemenn (The National Fiddlers' Organization) and Noregs Ungdomslag (Norwegian Youth Organization). Landslaget for Spelemenn regularly sponsors festivals and competitions for both fiddlers and dancers. In dance, their main area of interest has been bygdedans.

Noregs Ungdomslag is a large organization with a variety of interests, and folk dance has been viewed as a means of encouraging members rather than as an end in itself. Today, the organization sponsors many parties and festivals, as well as the bulk of teacher training in Norwegian dance. The main areas of dance interest are turdans, songdans, and, more recently, gammeldans. Klara Semb, involved early in the history of the organization, wrote a series of four books called *Norske Folkedansar*. They contain numerous songdans, most of the turdans of Norway, and a few songleik games. They are widely used as instruction manuals today.

Survey of Norwegian Dance-continued

The 1970s revival of interest in gammeldans produced numerous community organizations, often going under the name Gammeldansens Venner (Friends of Gammeldans). Their repertoires often include such dances as swing and foxtrot, as well as what we have defined to be gammeldans.

In the 1980s, there has been a surge of interest in swing. There are many local Norwegian forms of the dance. Swing is also taught widely in courses.

Today, Egil Bakka is one of the foremost authorities on Norwegian dance and he has written extensively. Danse Danse Lett Ut På Foten contains turdans, songleik and songdans, and is used as an instruction manual. His book, Norske Dansetradisjonar, analyzes Norwegian dances and gives extensive background information. Some of the material in this survey has been translated and extracted from his writings.

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Stopparen

(Norway)

Stopparen (STOHP-pahr-en) is a version of a dance widely known throughout northern Europe and the United States. The American melody is known as "Put Your Little Foot." Stopparen is unusual because it contains both 3/4 and 2/4 meters. Eqil Bakke filmed the dance and included the original description in his book Danse, Danse, Lett Ut På Foten, Noregs Boklag, Oslo, 1970. Stopparen was presented by Alix Cordray at the 1995 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp in Stockton, CA.

Norwegian Dances, Stockton '95 Side A/2. Cassette:

3/4, 2/4 meter

Formation: Circle of couples (M back to ctr) in Shoulder/Shoulder-blade* pos with M L hand a little higher than R on W back. Couples may also be in Norwegian Waltz pos which is the same as Closed-Ballroom pos* except that joined hands (M L, W R) are both palm down with M hand on top, his fingers curled around the outer edge of W hand.

Steps and Styling:

Polkamasurka step (3/4 meter, 1 to a meas): Moving sideways, step on L to L side (ct 1); step on R beside L (ct 2); bouncing on R, swing L ft slightly out to L and back to where it was beside R, (ct 3). Step repeats exactly. May be danced starting with R ft.

Stop (2/4 meter, 1 to a meas): Stop R: Stamp R ft beside L without wt (ct 1); do a small bounce on L (ct 2). Stop L would use opp ftwk.

Norwegian styling: All steps have a low, bouncy quality which originates in the flexion and extension of the ankles and knees.

Measures

3/4, 2/4 meter

PATTERN

3/4 meter

2 meas

INTRODUCTION No action.

I. POLKAMASURKA AND HALF TURNS

- 1-2 Beg M L, W R dance 2 Polkamasurka steps sdwd in LOD (CCW).
- With 3 steps beg M L, W R, turn 1/2 CCW as a cpl to exchange places ending with M facing ctr. M take small steps almost in place. W take larger steps: step sdwd R on R, step L next to R, step sdwd R on R.

2/4 meter

- Beg M R, W L dance 1 Stop step.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 with opp ftwk and direction (turn CW). End with M back to ctr.
- 9-16 Repeat meas 1-8

II. HALF TURNS

- 1-2 Repeat Fig I, meas 3-4 (turn 1/2 CCW and Stop).
- Repeat Fig I, meas 3-4 with opp ftwk and direction (turn 1/2 CW and Stop).
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4.

III LONG TURNS

3/4 meter

1-3 Beg M L, W R dance 3 steps per meas, turning CCW 1½ times while moving in LOD. End with M facing ctr.

2/4 meter

- Beg M R, W L dance 1 Stop step.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 with opp ftwk, turning CW but still moving in LOD.
- 9-16 Repeat meas 1-8.

SEQUENCE: Dance pattern as written three times.

The Viper Tango

(U.S./Argentina/Europe)

The Tango from Argentina found fertile soil in Paris in 1911, and quickly grew into a dance craze that outshown the modest success that the dance had enjoyed in its native country. The Parisian Tangomania peaked in 1912-1914, with a basic vocabulary of steps that is preserved in the "Parisian Tango" taught by Richard and Melanie Powers at the 1989 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp in Stockton, Ca. By 1914, the tango craze had spread throughout Europe and to the United States, expanding its step vocabulary month by month.

The "Viper Tango" (El Viborita) is a companion piece to the "Parisian Tango," to exemplify the alternate steps seen in Early Tango, many of which disappeared before 1920. The Viper Tango is a selection of some of the more sensuous early tango steps, with an emphasis on playful interplay between dancers.

The Viper Tango was taught by Richard Powers at the 1992 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp.

Cassettes:

"El Viborita" (The Viper) by Eduardo Arolas, ca. 1914.

2/4 meter

R. Powers special cassette for Stockton 1992, "El Choclo" also works well.

Formation:

Cpls in ballroom pos both facing LOD (CCW).

Steps:

Reverse Turning Corte: (2 meas = 4 cts) In ballroom pos, advancing ptr (either M or W as directed) walk fwd 2 steps L,R (cts 1,2) then step fwd L, beginning to turn 1/4 CCW as a cpl (ct 3); step R to R

continuing turning 1/4 CCW (ct &); step bkwd L (ct 4).

S-S-Q-Q-S

(Retiring ptr walks bkwd R,L, turning 1/2 CCW on R, sdwd L, fwd R.)

There is a slight down-up-down undulation in the 3 turning steps.

Ebrio (Drunk) Grapevine: (2 meas = 4 cts) In ballroom pos, with M facing outward diag RLOD, M walk bkwd moving diag twd ctr 2 steps L, R (W fwd R, L) (cts 1,2); M turn slightly CCW and step L sdwd to L twd LOD (W step R to R) shifting to R hip to hip (ct 3); M step fwd on R across in front of L (W bkwd L) diag twd LOD (ct &).

S-S-Q-Q

Molinete: (4 meas = 8 cts) In Ballroom pos, M step L fwd but slightly to L then rock bkwd on R (W bkwd R, fwd L) turning as a cpl 1/4 CCW in place (cts1,2); S-S repeat 3 more times, for a total of 8 steps, turning once CCW.

Generally the steps are describe for the M, and W dances the counterpart unless otherwise directed. Although the music is 2/4 meter with 2 cts per meas, the dance is more easily counted with 2 meas together. This results in 4 counts in the description for each 2 meas pattern. The Molinete is 4 meas resulting in a total of 8 counts for this pattern.

Styling:

The body is held firmly erect without stiffness, knees always somewhat flexed to maintain a smooth carriage of the body. Movement is precipitated from the center of the torso, not with leg extensions (i.e. body moves an instant before the feet, which stay under torso.) Movement is smooth, without undulation (except for the turning corte.) Feet move with a toe-lead, and a slight degree of turnout, keeping the feet close to the ground while in motion. "Imitate the sinuous grace of the tiger."

Measures

3/4 meter

PATTERN

4 meas

<u>INTRODUCTION</u>. No action other than taking ptr in ballroom pos.

I. PROMENADE: REVERSE TURNING CORTE

- In ballroom pos with both facing LOD, beg ML, WR walk 4 steps fwd in LOD, S-S-Q-Q (cts 1,2,3,&). M step fwd on 4th step on R, toe turned out 90° to R. M holds with wt on R (knee slightly bent) and sweeps L around in a CW circular arc twd the W, turning 1/2 CW to face ptr. Meanwhile, W holds on L and sweeps R in CCW arc twd M, both keeping toes close to floor during the arc (ct 4). End in Ballroom pos, M facing RLOD, W LOD.
- Dance a Reverse Turning Corte reversing directions where M is the advancing ptr. Move in RLOD M fwd, W bkwd, and turning 1/2 CCW (cts 1-4).

II. BACK THE WOMAN; REVERSE TURNING CORTE

- In ballroom pos, M beg R, walk fwd LOD 4 steps S-S-Q-Q (cts 1,2,3,&); on the 4th step, M step fwd on L and sweep R fwd and under W L in a CW arc, toe close to floor, while W holds 4th step on R and flicks her L heel straight up in back (ct 4).
- Dance a Reverse Turning Corte reversing directions where W is the advancing ptr. Move in RLOD, W fwd, M bkwd, and turning 1/2 CCW (cts 1-4). End in ballroom pos, M facing outward diag RLOD.

III. EBRIO GRAPEVINE; MOLINETE

- Moving sideways in LOD making sawtooth or zig-zag pattern, dance the Ebrio Grapevine step (cts 1,2,3,&). Assume ballroom pos and repeat the 4 steps of the Ebrio Grapevine step (cts 4,5,6,&). For cts 7,8 repeat the first 2 steps of the Ebrio Grapevine step (cts 7,8).
- 5-8 Dance a Molinete step turning once CCW in place.

Repeat dance from beginning.



He also served as a Scoutmaster in San Francisco.

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

The Folk Dance Federation of California announces its 51st Statewide International Folk Dance Festival to be held in San Francisco on Memorial Day Weekend - 1996. Folk dancers from around the state and nation will be rushin' to the newly renovated Russian Center for four days of fun and festivities (May 24-27). Highlights will be a three-hour institute on Saturday with master teacher Yves Moreau, and a concert on Sunday afternoon directed by Bruce Mitchell (Director of University of the Pacific's Stockton Folk Dance Camp). The final event will be a barbecue/picnic on Monday with outdoor dancing "on the farm" in nearby Martinez. Starting Friday evening and in between everything else will be one dance party after another; some we anticipate will feature live music. A brand new event this time will be an ice cream social on Saturday evening before the after party.
