

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President's Message



Dancing on the Internet

Launching Your Research Project Via the Internet

Did you know that there are many library catalogs available to you for searching via the Internet? If you have set out to do a research project on an aspect of folk dancing, you may have been frustrated by the small amount of material at your local library. To save yourself the time of traveling to a nearby college library, only to meet with disappointment there too, I suggest that you start your search on the Internet.

You probably are familiar with using your local library's computer catalog to find information on various topics. Many libraries offer their catalogs for people like you who want to search them via the Internet. I think this was first conceived for the convenience of students who could search for library books from their dorm rooms, but it is a great boon to people doing research in specialized subjects such as folk dancing. Once you identify that a library has books that would be valuable to your research, you can travel there to do your research or, knowing the title and author, you can go to your local library and see if an interlibrary loan can be arranged.

A few catalogs to try:

The good news is that some libraries have put their catalogs right on the World Wide Web, so you don't need any fancy telnet helper applications to access them. The University of Texas at Austin (http://dpweb1.dp.utexas.edu/lib/utnetcat/) is one such. A search on the subject "folk dancing" came up with 689 resources, including books published internationally (in Spain, Ukraine, Bolivia, Hungary, Venezuela, etc.). You can also access the New York Public Library's catalog directly via the World Wide Web (http://catnyp.nypl.org). Their large folk dance collection covers 800 subjects with thousands of entries from International Folk Dancing in Alaska by Bruce Boltelho to Romanian folk dramas to celebrate New Years Day.

In February's Let's Dance, there is an article mentioning the folk dance collection at the University of Pacific. The University of the Pacific's catalog can be accessed via Telnet. (See "How to get started with Telnet" below.) You can go to their library's web page (http://www.cs.uop.edu/library/pacman.htm), click on the link to the catalog, log on (with the user name "library") and search on the subject of "Folk Dancing" and find that they have the book The Folk Dances and Festivals of Panama, for example, by Lila Cheville; or there's, The Teaching of Ethnic Dance by Anatol Joukowsky. Many of the local public libraries and community colleges offer their catalogs on the World Wide Web-some with and some without Telnet. Give them a try next time you have a project to research.

How to get started with Telnet:

Most library catalogs are available through a part of the Internet called "Telnet." Telnet was initially set up as a service where you dialed in to a specific telephone number to access a specific computer. While you can still access these catalogs this way, I prefer to go to them using the World Wide Web. To do this, you will need a small, shareware, helper application. (AOL users note: this is all explained for you at Keyword: Telnet) You can get a Telnet helper application by going to Shareware.com at "http://www.shareware.com." Shareware.com is a reputable source for free computer programs called "shareware." These programs are distributed by the author at no charge or with the request that you send in a small registration fee (usually around \$10). On Shareware.com you can find a Telnet helper application for the type of computer you have.

Once you have the helper application installed, look up the web site of the college near you and follow the links to the library, and then to the library catalog. When you click on the link, a window will open on your screen and ask for your login name. In my experience, most of these will accept a login name of "guest" and a password of "guest, " or the referring web page will have instructions. Once you have logged on, you will then see a main menu that will instruct you on how to search the database. This may seem to be a lot of trouble, just to search a catalog, but if you are considering a long drive to reach the university, plus the time spent finding the university library, finding the catalog, finding that they don't have the book you need, and then driving all the way back home, this whole Telnet business begins to take on a certain appeal.

Poydyom miliy

(Russia)

Poydyom miliy (pigh-DYOHM MEE-lee), a dance whose title translates as "Come, my darling," is a girls' khorovod (round dance) from central Russia. It is based on traditional patterns found in girls' dances but it is not a traditional dance. The dance was researched by Hennie Konings who then introduced it in the Netherlands in 1995 and taught it at the University of the Pacific Stockton Folk Dance Camp in 1996.

Cassette:

Konings - Stockton 1996, Side A/1.

3/4 meter

Formation:

Single circle of cpls, W to R of ptr, facing in LOD (CCW) with hands joined in V-pos. Although Poydyom was originally introduced as a dance for two girls, it was taught as a

cpl dance (1 M, 1 W). The following description matches that teaching.

Steps and Styling:

A walking step is used throughout the dance, 1 step to a ct. When stepping forward, land

smoothly on the ball of the ft rather than the heel.

Footwork is the same for all.

Measures

3/4 meter

PATTERN

8 meas <u>INTRODUCTION</u> No action. Begin with vocal.

I. WALKING IN THE CIRCLE

- A 1-4 Beg R, walk 12 steps in LOD.
 - 5-6 Continue walking 6 more steps, slowly raising hand joined with ptr to above head level. Keep other hand down in V-pos.
 - 7 Release hand joined with neighbor.

W: With 3 steps, walk under raised joined hands turning 1/2 CCW to face out of the circle, ending in ptr's place.

M: With 3 steps, walk fwd to end in ptr's place, facing out of circle.

Join R hand with new neighbor in V-pos to make one circle facing out; walk fwd 3 steps (L,R,L) away from ctr.

II. TOWARD CENTER AND OUT

All steps are small, continuing on the balls of the ft.

- B 1 Step bkwd on R (ct 1); bending R knee, strike L heel on floor near R toe (ct &); step bkwd on L, R (cts 2,3). At the same time, smoothly raise joined hands, elbows straight, above shldr level.
 - 2 Still backing up, repeat meas 1 with opp ftwk, but move arms smoothly into W-pos.

- Repeat meas 1, but raise joined hands above head level.
- Release hands, turn 1/2 CCW in place to face ctr, stepping L,R,L (cts 1,2,3). At the end, rejoin hands (which are still above head level).
- 5-7 Repeat ftwk of meas 1-3. Keeping elbows straight, gradually lower joined hands to V-pos.
- Step L,R,L in place while turning 1/4 CW to reform the circle, facing in LOD. Ptrs have exchanged places.
- Repeat dance as written 4 more times. Ptrs exchange places each time.

III. ENDING

- B 1-4 Beg R, walk 12 steps in LOD.
 - 5-6 Turning 1/4 CCW, walk 6 steps twd ctr of circle. On last step, bend L knee slightly and nod twd dancers across the circle.
 - 7-8 Beg R, walk bkwd 5 steps; on last ct of meas 8, step on L beside R.

With hands still joined and facing ctr, bow from the hips (done without music).

Louky (LOH-kee), a non-partner dance from western Bohemia, is performed to a folk song about a young girl who goes to a meadow to meet her lover but he does not appear. Bill and Louise Lidicker, who have been teaching the dance in central California, learned it from Živana Vajsarová at an institute in Benešov, Czech Republic in July 1996. Živana has extensively researched and taught folk dance with her father, František Bonuš.





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

The Folk Dance Federation's Statewide Festival-1887

Approximately fifty years ago, when Southern California Folk Dance Clubs were beginning to form their Federation, the first 'Statewide Festival' was held in Ojai, California. The two branches, Northern and Southern, decided to alternate hosting these Festivals on the Memorial Weekend in May. Two years ago, 1995, that tradition was celebrated at the 50th anniversary of Folkdance Festivals held in the city where it all began, Ojai. Last year, per tradition, the Statewide Festival was held in Northern California, San Francisco, to be exact, and what great fun that was.

This year's Statewide Festival is scheduled to be held in Southern California and the committee is working hard to organize the *Folk Lore Express* for a visit to the beautiful and historic city of Whittier. The YMCA on Hadley and Pickering will be the site for the institutes and dance parties while the wonderful auditorium of Whittier High School, around the corner from the YMCA, will be the site of the Dance Concert.

Today, December 7, on a visit to the city to make further inquiries, I found myself engulfed in a seasonal Holiday Parade. What a great atmosphere of camaraderie, participation, pride and fun there was in the air of the little city as I struggled to reach my destination through side

floats, drill teams and Santa himself put on their annual show.

Like all cities everywhere, there are problems. The city is changing, but it still has its historic tradition of being a Quaker Center, it has Whittier College and Rio Hondo College among others. Just East of the 605 Freeway on Whittier Boulevard is Pio Pico State Historic Park. It has Turnbull Canyon Road which is a scenic drive along the mountains that separate Whittier from La Puente. As we discover more about the area we will share with you.

whittier is bounded by the 605 Freeway on the West, the 5 Freeway on the South, the 57 Freeway on the East and the 60 Freeway on the North. Surrounding communities clockwise from the North are: El Monte, City of Industry, La Puente, Rowland and La Habra Heights, La Habra, La Mirada, Santa Fe Springs, Pico Rivera, Montebello, Monterey Park and Rosemead.

Folk Dancers We Should Remember

Lucile Czarnowski

In our search for folk dancers we should remember there is no one who fits this category better than Lucile Czarnowski. Unfortunately she no longer is with us and we have had great difficulty locating who was close enough to her during her lifetime to enlighten us regarding her early life history. She was also the recipient of many awards about which we also lack information.

Lucile Czarnowski became President of the Folk Dance Federation of California in June, 1945. She was to say the least a very charming lady. Her University of California, Berkeley, Associate Professorship in the Department of Phisical Education added dignity to the folk dance movement just by name association. Before mentioning the little we know about her world wide recognition, our early remarks will center on her folk dance contributions.

Early during her term of office as President of the Federation she educated folk dancers in the proper way to write dance descriptions. As a result many of the dances were being described in single sheet form. This was later a great help to the Committee of Henry "Buzz" Glass, Alice Jameyson, Clarice Dechent and Homer Davis when preparing Volume I, Folk Dances from Near and Far.

Lucile authored in "Let's Dance" magazine many useful articles during her term as President. Probably the most outstanding and one calling for much research appeared in the December 1945 issue titled, "The modern revival of the folk dance." Here she traced the movement down through time with reference to such well known sources as the English Folk Dance Society, the relation of traditional music to dance and the International Convention of Popular Arts held at Prague from October 7 to October 13, 1928, created by the League of Nations. Whether or not she attended the latter we are not certain.

During the early part of the year, 1946, she assisted the South in organizing as a Southern Section of the Federation. The first Statewide at Ojai also took place while she was in office.

During his Presidency of the Federation, 1943-44, Ed Kremers appointed Lucile Czarnowski the first Research Chair Person, a committee she headed for seven years. The high standard she set as Research Chair Person has continued in the same excellence under Chair-Persons Mildred Buhler, Dorothy Tamburini and at present, Ruth Ruling.

Contributions made by Lucile Czarnowski we should not forget were the dances she introduced such as Royal Empress Tango and the early California arrangement, "Waltz Contra Dance". As to the latter, she did considerable research of early California dance and related arts. Both of the above mentioned dances were popular with folk dancers for a considerable time.



Lucile Czarnowski's research in folk dance preceded the California Folk Dance Movement. Following extensive travel in Europe during 1938-39 she brought back folk and square dance material which she added to the curriculum of her department at the University of California. About what one might consider her most prestigious award we are lacking in detail. Several reliable sources have verified that at some point in time she traveled to Sweden to receive this award. We regret our inability to state anything further on this. The possibility exists that a "Let's Dance" reader may come forward with better information and if so we will make it known in a later edition.

As a Past President Lucile Czarnowski continued her association with California folk dancing until poor health prevented further participation. Folk dancers owe a great deal to Lucile Czarnowski and she certainly should and will be remembered.

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
