Statewide '98 – Golden Gate in '98

In a city like San Francisco where suitable places for a Statewide are limited, the Russian Center at 2450 Sutter Street is a very excellent facility. With a few exceptions it housed all major events during the weekend.

The first Saturday event was the Institute starting at ten sharp that morning and chaired by Fran Ajoian. The syllabus was the work of Ruth Ruling. Featured teachers were Loui Tucker, introducing Israeli dances followed by Ned and Marian Gault who taught Austrian dances in the afternoon. We have often suspected this party is one of the reasons so many Past Presidents attend Statewides year after year. Then followed the Late Party featuring live music, Marcel Vinokur chairperson and music by Vecernica. That was it for Saturday but there was much more to come on Sunday.

Sleep? That was the survival kit for Sunday morning. That is for all except those who attended the 9:30 morning North/South meeting. The rest of us set our clocks for the 11 AM Installation Brunch. Master of Ceremonies Oscar Faoro was his usual witty self. Following a tasty brunch, installing for the South was Lila Aurich and for the North, Bev Wilder. Another fine concert by an unusually large and talented cast.

Folk Dancers We Should Remember

Max Horn

Our selection for this month's "Folk Dancer we should Remember" has not only been active in promoting folk dancing for a good number of years but is still today a very enthusiastic contributor. He is both your friend and mine, Max Horn. To mention Max and not include his lovely wife June would be inexcusable. Among other things she was Editor of Let's Dance magazine from 1977 to 1987. Then, too, his daughter Linda was editor from 1975 to 1977. But for the moment let us talk a little about that fellow Max Horn himself.

Much of the material furnished us by Max lacks exact dates so we will approximate them as best we can. He says, "I was raised in family of Fundamentalist Christian Faith where dancing and close touching of the opposite sex was frowned upon." Entertainment in this Southern California farming community was confined mostly to the home, the church and an occasional street fair. There was of course no TV, no radio, not even a theatre. Later due to family problems we moved to Northern California and attended high school at Loyalton. Music and dance now made its appearance in Max's life. He played in the high school band and later became a member of a school dance band, playing for school functions. One of these was a Friday night school program where there was a fiddler who also called squares. Max became interested and as a result learned to call and teach squares.

Along came World War II and Max joined the Marines. His travels brought him to the island of Samoa and there he picked up a few ideas on community activities involving music, singing and dance. Following his appointment to Officers Candidate school he was assigned to the University of California, Berkeley. Here he spent spare time learning to round dance and folk dance.

The war finally over he returned to Berkeley where he became Recreation Director for Westminister Hall, the Presbyterian Student Center. His job was catering lunches and to teach dance and games. Before finishing school he married one of the students. He says he had been studying at the School of Forestry and after completing school went up to Ukiah and became Personnel Director and then Logging Manager for the Hollow Tree Lumber Company, managing the logging road for the Masonite Corporation. During his stay in Ukiah he established two folk dance classes where the town population was but 10,000 people.

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Early in 1950 Max moved back to the Bay area, working at several jobs in the construction and lumber industry. He didn't have much time for folk dancing what with work and raising a family. In 1969 he lost his wife who died at Alta Bates Hospital of cancer while he was building a new wing on the hospital complex.

With the children now teenagers there was time to again take up folk dancing. This soon developed in a teaching schedule of five nights a week with a party or festival to go to each weekend. It was through folk dancing Max met June and they managed to find time to get married. From then on both Max and June have made their presence known through many contributions to the folk dance movement.

When the Greater East Bay Council had problems and the board actually voted to disband, Max stepped in, offering to be the President along with Genevieve Pereira as Secretary. As a result several other members stayed and the Council was able to keep going until 1998, unfortunately it was necessary to announce that due to declining membership there was no longer any way to continue. They have sponsored the annual February Festival of the Oaks, with Max as chairperson.

Max and June live on a farm outside the Contra Costa city of Martinez. During recent years many folk dancers have accepted invitations to join them for a real "Hoe-down down on the farm". Their farm has also been the site for such events as the 1996 Statewide picnic and served the same function for this year's "Golden Gate in 1998."

Many of us living in the city have never experienced farm life. You can get a taste of it down at Max and June's farm. They have other things to offer as well. There is a large collection of ethnic dolls. Their large collection of costumes is available for loan to schools and special functions and there is much more. Max and June also host animals from the Alexander Lindsey Junior Museum to give them a rest from being on display, and June cares for baby deer, raccoons and squirrels people bring in to the museum.

Something Max failed to mention when furnishing material for this article was the many jobs he has handled for the Federation. It has been this writer's observation that when there has been a request for a volunteer to handle a special job, the fellow who time and again raises his hand is Max Horn.

Max says the farm remains open for groups to use and probably will remain so for the next several years. Like so many of us who in our hearts will always remain folk dancers, Max feels their folk dance days may be approaching the end. Say not so Max, folk dancing needs you.

There is a "package fee" to attend all the music and dance events. This amount and some of our room rent helps pay expenses for all the 20 - 26 attending orchestras as they do not receive individual tips for the four days of playing.

SUGGESTION. Consider arriving on Wednesday afternoon. This gives you an extra day to settle in, unpack and do a little unescorted touring, or in this case to see one of the casino shows as the next four days will be too hectic to try to fit in a show. And as to leaving. Consider leaving on Monday. Last year in Pittsburgh where the last Extravaganza was held, two orchestras remained at the hotel after the Sunday afternoon event and took turns playing kolos in the lobby where we danced until after midnight.

ONE LAST ITEM, PLEASE - Do dig into your trunks and closets, HAUL OUT and BRING with you and WEAR your beautiful SLOVENIAN, CROATIAN and/or SERBIAN COSTUMES in the evenings during the entire Extravaganza. And even if you don't have complete costumes, dig out your embroidered shirts and blouses. And don't forget the OPANKI.

It's been 5 years since the Extravaganza has come this far West so don't pass up this great opportunity. Get your hotel reservations in early. You can always cancel later, if the need arises.

Dance & Costume in Thailand and Laos—Part 1: Dance — by Barbara Lynch

Since the early 1980's I have been researching the Hmong in America, their costume and their dance. In January, 1997 I had the privilege and pleasure of a trip to Thailand and Laos, part of the Hmong's original home. The Hmong have been called Meo, Miaou and Mio over the years since they came from southwest China in the 1830's and later. This Hill Tribe from the Golden Triangle area fought with the C.I.A. and American forces against Communist Vietnam. When the Americans left, the Hmong fled to Thailand and Laos or some were able to come to America. I first met them in the Visalia-Fresno area where I was teaching school. I was fascinated by the lovely handwork on their clothing and began researching.

In 1996 the Costume Society of America offered a tour to Thailand and Laos for 17 days after Christmas. The special opportunity was that the tour would be led in Thailand/Laos by Patricia Chessman Nana, who has written an excellent book on tribal costume. She was born in Laos and runs a textile business in Thailand. It proved to be the perfect opportunity and an excellent trip. During some research at the Huntington Library I had come across a reference to a German anthropological film that showed some of the Hill Tribes dancing in their villages. I couldn't locate the film, but knew I wanted to see and do dance on this 1996-97 trip.

What we saw was temple dancing and social (nightclub type) dance. I danced with a young man in a park adjoining a restored temple. He and his friends had a boom box playing current popular music. Western "Rock and Roll" seems to have conquered the world. With Asian instruments and a slight Asian twist, the music was quite danceable.

We faced each other, not touching, and mostly moved our arms and hands while keeping a soft beat with our feet. I followed his lead and imitated his gestures. When I took the initiative to pivot slowly, he didn't pick up my lead, so I quickly returned to following. I bowed, with 'prayer hands', when my bus had to leave.

Several days later in a country village on the Mekong River, all of us women got up to dance to the band which was playing in the small restaurant at lunch. We were sort of in groups or solo and used the same soft arm and hand gestures, somewhat like simple temple dancing.

I asked this band, in sign language, if I could sit in and play the drum, a lovely native instrument. They graciously assented, and I have the photos to prove it. All it took on my part was courage, curiosity and respect.

At another small town hotel, a local dance group performed. This was the familiar temple dance of Asia and India. The women wore elaborate headdresses, costumes and bells on their ankles. Mostly they stepped with feet flexed up toward knees and they used the marvelous, intricate hand gestures. One dance had what looked like village folk movements, but it was overlaid with story and temple gestures.

Recently the Asian Museum at the De Young in San Francisco had celebrations for S.E. Asia New Year. These celebrations include dancing like what we saw in the home countries. These programs have included dances that are temple style and village style. Often the village dances include young people/children and are charming to watch. Three's a Crowd

(U.S.A.)

Three's a Crowd is an original dance by Ned Gault, a part of the New Trios Project. It was presented in a cameo appearance of Ned and Marion Gualt at the 50th Anniversary of the University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp at Stockton in 1997. It was also taught at the 1998 Statewide Institute in San Francisco. It is one of several new trio dances presented by the Gaults.

Cassette:

Statewide Institute 1998 "Joys of Quebec" A/4.

2/4 meter

Formation:

Trios (W-M-W), all hands joined in a single circle, facing center.

Steps:

Begin each Figure with ML, WR foot unless noted.

Buzz Turn CW* both beg R.

Two-Step* Dancers may scuff heel of free ft fwd on the floor on the last ct &.

Balance fwd and bkwd (2 meas): Step fwd on L (ct 1), step on R beside L while raising heels slightly off the floor (ct &), step in place on L (ct 2). Step alternates but on ct 1 the step is bkwd.

Steps described for the M, W use opp ftwk.

The New Trios Project

This project grew out of a conversation I had with Ace Smith, long-time friend and fellow teacher, at the UOP Folk Dance Camp many years ago. We noted that there are lots more women than men in folk dancing, but there are relatively few good, easy dances for trios, such as Troika, Mason's Apron, Western Trio Mixer, etc. to teach to new dancers. He thought that we ought to gather a group of dancers who were experienced in music and dance styles and had teaching ability, find good pieces of music, and, as the Scottish dance people say, "devise" some interesting trio dances for the recreational folk dance field.

Like many good ideas, this one didn't get off the ground. The group never happened, and Ace died several years ago. In late 1994, I was looking for mixers and trios to teach to a new beginning class, remembered Ace's idea — and the New Trios Project was born.

Each of the dances in the Project has started with a nice piece of music, which makes one want to dance to it. The dance grows onto the music, keeping to the general style of the music's roots. Many of the dances are progressive; some are not. Most are beginning level, but a couple are more complicated. The most important thing is for the result to be enjoyable. Sometimes the ideas come together quickly. Other times much refining and reworking is necessary to make it move smoothly and feel good to dance.

It has been a fun project. There's no end in sight and if people dance the dances, that's great. Thanks, Ace, for a really good idea, and I dedicate my efforts to you!
