

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President's Message

Confusing vision and strategy.

I have said many times that I hope for a renewed vision and enthusiasm for folk dancing in the next decade, as well as a new sense of purpose for the Folk Dance Federation. I have been talking about this with many of you at meetings, over dinner, during vranjanka...

Recently it has occurred to me that there is a pothole in these kinds of visioning efforts that we need to be aware of. That pothole is confusing vision and strategy.

The vision is a view of the future, of potential, of dreams and wishes. Strategy is the method for laying the roadbed between today's purpose and the realization of vision.

In the folk dance movement there is a vision of hundreds, even thousands of dancers of all ages having fun at a dance event. There is a vision of a large influx of teenagers taking to folk dancing the way that they have taken to other dances throughout recent memory. It is a magnificent vision, but if we do not realize it immediately, are we failing?


No. It seems that we lose sight of the small triumphs in the face of our large vision. We must look to identify the strongest parts of our organization and work on moving out from that center of strength rather than expecting to immediately reach that grand vision.

So, take heart and find satisfaction in the slow building on current strengths. Use those strengths to branch out into new projects and programs, new enthusiasms. Don't forget the vision, but also do not be discouraged if it is not reached on the first attempts to stretch and grow.





Teaching Folk Dance in the Schools? Pourparler

Perhaps you might be interested in attending the third annual "Pourparler" in Evanston, on September 23-27,1999. This is a get-together for people who teach folk dance in schools or community situations (the word means to chat or parley and do we ever!). The first Pourparler was an experiment on my part to see who was out there: Held in Evanston in October 1997, it brought 25 interested and interesting people from around the U.S. and was the foundation for the new network. The Utah contingent put on a great Pourparler in Park City this past September and 45 people came—a large contingent of schoolteachers who love to teach folk dance. Šotyš from Záhorie

(Slovakia)

Šotyš from Záhorie (SHOH-teesh from ZAH-hohr-ee) translates as the schottische from the ethnographic region of Záhorie, which is located in western Slovakia (the area around the capital city of Bratislava). This couple dance was especially popular during the end of the 19th century and again during the period between the two world wars. It came to Slovakia via European dance masters who traveled around teaching such dances as the mazurka, waltz, polka, schottische, and quadrilles. Vonnie R. Brown learned the dance in Slovakia in 1995 from Jano Blaho of Bratislava, and taught it at the 1998 University of the Pacific Stockton Folk Dance Camp.

Music:

Cassette: Slovak and Czech Dances, Vonnie R. Brown, Side A4;

2/4 meter

CD: Slovak and Czech Dances, Vonnie R. Brown, Band 4.

Formation:

Circle of cpls in Closed-Ballroom pos, M with back to ctr, joined hands extended down in LOD.

Steps and

Pivot*, Closed-Ballroom pos*.

Styling:

Ftwk described for M; W use opp ftwk. Beg with outside ft (M L, W R).

* Described in the "General Glossary" of Steps & Styling (rev. 1996), published by the Folk Dance Federation of CA, Inc.

Measures

2/4 meter

PATTERN

4 meas

INTRODUCTION: No action.

I. SEVENS

- Step sdwd on L in LOD (CCW) (ct 1); step on R next to L (ct &); repeat twice more (cts 2, &, 1, &); step sdwd on L to L with slight accent (ct 2); hold (ct &). Steps are with the whole ft. Move extended leading arms (M L, W R) up on ct 1, down on ct &, etc., ending with them up (meas 2, ct 2).
- Repeat meas 1-2 with opp ftwk and direction (RLOD, CW). Now move arms (M L, W R) down on ct 1, up on ct &, ending with them down (meas 4, ct 2).

II. CHASSÉ, STAMP, PIVOT

- Slide (chassé) sdwd in LOD: make large step to L on L (ct 1); step on R next to L (ct &); take large step to L on L (ct 2); hold (ct &).
- Both turn 1/4 to face RLOD. Releasing Closed-Ballroom pos, and swinging joined inside hands fwd while outside arms swing out to side, step on R (outside ft) (ct 1); stamp fwd on L (no wt) (ct 2).
- Resuming Closed-Ballroom pos, turn once CW as a cpl with 4 pivot steps (2 steps per meas). Extend leading arms (M L, W R) and move them up in a relaxed manner on each ct 1, down on each ct 2. End in original pos with M back to ctr.

III. CHASSÉ, LEG SWING, PIVOT

- 1-2 Repeat Fig II, meas 1-2 except that on meas 2, ct 2, swing inside leg fwd instead of stamping.
- 3-4 Repeat Fig II, meas 3-4 (pivots).
 - IV. CHASSÉ, LEG SWING, WOMAN TURNS
- 1-2 Repeat Fig III, meas 1-2.
- Moving slightly fwd in LOD, M walks fwd with 4 steps while W turns CW once or twice with 4 steps under joined hands (M L, W R). M R arm can be held down, up, or be swung fwd on the & cts to "push" the W skirt.

Repeat dance until the end of the music.

An alternative pattern is to do Figs I and II twice and then do Figs III and IV twice.

How To Find an Honest Man: A Fable

From Zadig by Francois Marie Arouet de Voltaire, c. 1740. (As retold by Craig Blackstone)

There was a king in an ancient land who was troubled with dishonesty among his ministers. He was constantly cheated and robbed. The Receiver-General of the kingdom set the example as a matter of course, and the others followed it faithfully. The King knew of it; he had changed his treasurer frequently, but he had been unable to alter the established custom of dividing the King's revenues into unequal parts, of which the smaller was always rendered to his Majesty and the larger to his ministers.

Finally he consulted with a travelling sage, who informed him of an infallible way to find an honest man. "You have only," advised the sage, "to require those who make themselves present for the office of treasurer to dance, and the one who dances most lightly will indubitably be the most honest man."

"You are jesting," said the King. "That is a fine way of choosing the receiver of my monies. What? You suggest that the man who cuts the best caper will be the most honest and cleverest financier?"

"I do not claim that he will be the cleverest," replied his advisor, "but I assure you that he will infallibly be the most honest." He spoke with such confidence that the King thought he had some supernatural secret for divining financiers, but in fact his plan was quite simple.

That very day, he had it publicly announced that all who sought the office of lord high receiver of the regal revenues should present themselves in garments of light silk on the first day of the moon of the Crocodile, in the King's chamber. Sixty-four applicants appeared on the given day. Violinists had been summoned into a room nearby. All was prepared for the dance. But the door of the room was closed, the office-seekers had to pass along a rather dark little gallery. A soldier came to fetch and introduce each candidate, one after another, by means of this passage, where each was left alone for a few minutes. The King, as advised by the sage, had spread out all his treasure in the gallery. When all the claimants had arrived in the chamber, his Majesty commanded that they should dance. Never did men dance more heavily and with less grace. All held their heads down, their backs bent, their hands glued to their sides.

One alone performed his steps with agility, his head held high, his arms outstretched, his body upright, his legs straight. The King embraced the excellent dancer and declared him treasurer, and all the rest were chastised and fined with the greatest justice in the world, for each, during the time he had been in the gallery, had filled his pockets with the King's treasure and could scarcely walk.

MORAL: Heavy of foot means light of finger; or, the upright man won't let you down. [Or, worldly men can't dance worth beans]

Then, on Sunday, March 7, the long-awaited and much-anticipated Pageant with wonderful exhibitions by our own Council clubs and also out-of-town groups as well as some excellent ethnic groups from our area are on tap for your enjoyment. Can you tell? We're **EXCITED!** We're smiling! So, please, everyone come.

One more comment on our January 9 "Hello Happy '99" Party. We were so happy to have out-of-town visitors from Sausalito and Napa join us. It always makes us happy to share our good times with our folk dancers from other areas. Thanks for coming.

Three Council clubs are featured this month. The first one is BBKM (Benevolent Brotherhood of Kolo Maniacs). This club meets once a month for a party and I'm told have a great time! Barbara Bevan, our talented Editor of Latest Steps, has been in charge of this group for ten years although the club has been in existence for approximately 20 years so we are happy to acknowledge this club as a long-time Council member and mainstay of our Sacramento folk dance family. Some of BBKM's members belong to other Sacramento Council clubs. BBKM's purpose is to bring line dancers together from various groups and locations. A few times each year they have live

music at their parties. Barbara tells me all levels of dancers are welcome, as well as beginners.

Our second featured club is the First & Last Dancers. This club is a country western couple and line dance group. The First & Last Dancers are fun-loving and energetic. Just watching them perform makes people smile and feel like joining in the fun. The waltz, swing, and two-step as well as a number of international folk dances have been integrated into their dance program.

They have been in existence since January of 1990. There are 10 officers who are called board members that serve yearly. Hard-working Eda Scheuffele, Demo Chairperson, sees that all the demos and parties go along without a hitch.

Along with dancing for the sheer joy of it and having monthly parties, it is important to know that this club is a service club, founded to put dancing to good use. This means they do numerous demos at skilled nursing facilities for the enjoyment of the residents. They also perform at community functions. The club costume is red, white and blue and the emblem is a star. Their motto is "The club with the Christmas Spirit all year long." They do as much all year long as during the Christmas season. Locally, they have adopted the Bruceville Skilled Nursing Facility at which they hold weekly bingo parties for the residents where they award approximately 2,000 prizes per year. When they perform for these homes they distribute handmade corsages to each resident, about 1,000 per year. Because of all the activities, the club was awarded "Volunteer of the Year" in 1996 by the Northern California Activity Directors Assn., which was a very big honor.

Some of their members are also members of other council clubs.

The third group to be mentioned is the Tuesday Dancers, a recently-formed group under the very capable leadership of Barbara Bevan and Bruce Mitchell. This club has been in existence for two and a half years. They meet on Tuesday afternoons between 1 and 3 PM. The group consists mostly of retirees and the type of dancing offered is non-aerobic, gentle but interesting dances. Many dancers from other clubs participate in these Tuesday afternoon sessions. They do all levels of dances. Beginners are welcome.
