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# President's Message

Greetings once again. While serving as an officer of the Folk Dance Federation over the past five years, I have learned quite a lot about dance activities and opportunities available to us in California through the efforts of the various member clubs and councils within our Federation. The more I learn, the more I realize that I have only witnessed the tip of the iceberg of available dance opportunities.

In many ways, the Folk Dance Federation of California is a remarkable organization. Its membership consists of over seventy different dance clubs throughout northern and central California. This month I will share some thoughts on getting to know more about the clubs within our federation.

When was the last time you danced at a folk dance club other than your home club? For most of us, it has probably been quite a while, unless we dropped in on a local club while travelling out-of-town on vacation. However, as can be seen from the various activities listed in the Calendar of Events in each issue of Let's Dance, every month there are usually twenty or more special dance parties one can attend above and beyond regular dance classes or club dancing.

I invite you to take a good look at the Calendar of Events and find a party scheduled for a night you don't normally dance. Maybe once a month you might invite some other dancers from your club to go on a "field trip" to visit another club on its monthly party night. Or perhaps you might plan a club exchange, where your club attends the party of another club and their club attends your party. I've usually found that the more dancers there are at a party, the livelier the dancing, and the more fun people have.

When visiting a club for the first time, its a good idea to call the contact person identified for the event if you have any questions about their ability to accommodate your group and to get directions for the best route to take.

As a further measure to spur your knowledge of other clubs within the Federation, future issues of Let's Dance will feature articles which spotlight different Federation member clubs. Elsa Bacher has graciously agreed to present these articles, but needs the clubs to provide her with the necessary information. If you are interested in sharing just what is it about your club that makes it special, get in touch with Elsa at P.O. Box 263, Fulton, California, 95439. If we get enough of a response from you, this will become a regular feature of Let's Dance.



Jack McKay

(1921 - 1999) (Director of Folk Dance Camp 1967 - 1987)

Jack McKay was a native of Vancouver, Canada. He came to San Francisco when he was 18, and there entered San Francisco State College, majoring in Sociology. Jack often said that he took every course with the word "group" in it, setting the course for his life career in group work. In time he became Director of the San Francisco Council of churches' Senior Program and later Director of the San Francisco Support Services to Seniors, and a widening leadership role in professional committees working with the aging population.

The Jack McKay we knew and loved came to us in the field of Folk and Square Dance, a very important part of Jack's life. He helped start a folk dance club in junior college, became President of the Fun Club, and worked in the founding of the Folk Dance Federation of California in Lodi in 1942. After his Army service, where he moved from Private to Lt. Colonel, he resumed his folk dance life with the Fun Club, the Gateswingers of the Central YMCA, and the Mission Dolores Bells and Bows. He started two recreational square dance groups, the Square Cutters and the Caper Cutters. Jack had a tremendous knowledge of square and contra dancing, a fine teaching technique, and a beautiful "calling voice". All this led to a 10 year career as a caller and teacher. Eventually Jack and Lawton Harris, the Dance and Recreation Education Specialist at C.O.P, worked together on dance leadership workshops in the Bay Area. In 1947 Lawton started Folk Dance Camp and invited Jack to join the Committee of five in 1948. This began their close and life-long sharing of the conviction that folk and square dancing is primarily a form of social recreation where the bond of fellowship hold groups together.

When Lawton died in 1967, just six weeks before Camp's 20th year was to start, the University asked the Committee to choose a new Director from within the group. The Committee chose Jack, an ideal choice. Jack shared Lawton's philosophy of group recreation, had worked with him in leadership, and had a great relationship with hundreds of dancers.

When Jack served as Director of Folk Dance Camp, he found that he used everything he had learned from his college groups work courses, his Army service, his administration of social work programs, his career as a square dancer teacher, and the many years he had spent folk and square dancing. Jack's quality of leadership was uniquely his. He came to every meeting fully prepared to work through problems with the help of the members. His ability to trust those he worked with, and to delegate responsibility inspired members to develop their talents. Jack said that he never took votes in committee meetings, but worked with groups of conflicting personalities to reach consensus.

Jack had a wonderful partnership with his wife, June Rumery McKay, whom he married in 1966. Together they made their home in San Francisco a hospitable gathering place for friends in small groups, for committee meetings of many kinds and for PARTIES, PARTIES, PARTIES!!! In the last years of Jack's life he had physical disabilities, back problems necessitating a wheel chair, and complications from diabetes. In 1990 June retired from the University of California at Berkeley where she coordinated the English as a Second Language Program (ESL). June's devoted and loving care made it possible for Jack, after his retirement from his professional life, to continue his warm leadership to the end of his life.

Jack's last trip to Camp was on August 1, when June drove their van to Camp for the Memorial Service for Sally Harris. Jack was visibly happy with the warm greetings from the many campers who were there for the start of the second week of Camp.

Jack died at home from complications from diabetes on September 3. Jack is gone - but the encouragement and leadership qualities he gave to those of us privileged to work with him will live in our hearts always.

#### A well-loved man, Jack McKay He is the spirit of Folk Dance Camp.

A memorial service is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. on September 25, at the Lakeside Presbyterian Church, Eucalyptus Drive and 19th Avenue in San Francisco. June McKay address is 227 Lawton Street, San Francisco, CA 94122.

#### **Scotch Cap**

(England)

Scotch Cap was originally published in 1651 in *The Dancing Master* by John Playford. The dance was reconstructed by Cecil Sharp in 1916. The name Scotch Cap might refer to the crowning of Charles I in Edinburgh in 1633. It was presented by Marianne Taylor at the 1999 University of the Pacific Stockton Folk Dance Camp.

Music:

Cassette: Popular English Country Dances of the 17th and 18th Centuries Side A/42.

Score: Barnes, Peter. *English Country Dance Tunes*. The Country Dance and Song Society: A Capella Books: Chicago, 1990.

Formation:

3-couple Longways set: Dancers in two parallel lines, partners facing, M with L shldr twd head of the hall (usually where the music is located). Hands free at sides.

Steps and Styling:

Light walking/running steps (2 per meas). Commonly beg with R (not required).

<u>A Double</u>: Three light springy steps and a close or four light springy steps in a specified direction, as in "forward a Double."

<u>Arm R</u>: Ptrs move fwd, hook R elbows and turn once around CW with six light springy steps (cts 1-6). Without changing step or rhythm release arm hold and move back into original position with two more steps (cts 7-8).

<u>Arm L</u>: Repeat action, but hook L elbow and turn CCW.

<u>Siding</u>: A movement of courtesy keeping eye contact with ptr. Moving in a CCW arc dance forward a double, exchanging places with partner. Retrace pattern, moving in a CW arc to return to original position.

 $\underline{Slip}$  (2 per meas): Move sideward by springing to side on the leading ft and stepping on the trailing ft next to the leading ft.

<u>Two-hand Turn</u>: Both hands joined and held at shldr height, M hands are on the bottom supporting W hands on top, arms easily extended. Turn CW, 2 steps per meas.

Measures

6/8 meter

**PATTERN** 

Chord + 1 note <u>INTRODUCTION</u>. No action.

#### I. <u>UP A DOUBLE AND BACK; CHANGE PLACES</u>

A 1-4 All up a Double and back.

5-8 That again: repeat meas 1-4.

#### Scotch Cap—page 2

- B1 9-12 W 1 and M 2, W 2 and M 3, facing diag to the L, balance back (take 2 steps bkwd) and change places with each other, passing R shldrs.
  - 13-16 M 1 and W 3 change places, passing R shldrs.
- B2 17-24 Repeat meas 9-16 to orig places.

#### II. SIDING; FALL BACK AND TURN

- A 1-4 All dance Siding with ptrs.
  - 5-8 That again: repeat meas 1-4.
- B1 9-12 Taking hands at the sides, all back a Double and forward.
  - 13-16 M 1 with M 3, W 1 with W 3, and Cpl 2 with ptr, Arm R.
- B2 17-20 Repeat meas 9-12.
  - 21-24 All Two-Hand Turn ptrs once around.

#### III. ARMING; PROGRESSIVE HEY

- A 1-8 All Arm R, then Arm L with ptrs.
- B1 9-10 Taking hands on the sides, M Slip *up* four steps, *while* W Slip *down* four steps.
  - Beginning with W 1 and M 3 giving R hands, dance a Progressive Hey to places: 1st two pass by R hand, give L to next they meet, all give R to ptr, turning to orig places.
- B2 19-24 Repeat meas 9-16, but M Slip down while W Slip up, and the Progressive Hey begins with M 1 and W 3 giving L hands to begin, all turning ptrs to place by L hand when they meet.

With live music, callers often repeat the dance from the beginning. There is no progression. At the end, acknowledge ptr.

# COSTUME: Two Magazine Reviews

by Barbara Lynch

Folk dancers who are interested in costume, performance and textile handwork will enjoy two excellent magazines: <u>Dress</u> and Piecework Both have articles on ethnic costume and handcrafts.

For example <u>Dress</u> 1996, vol. 23, has an article by Patricia Williams, "Festival Folk Dress, Government and Tradition in 20th Century Czechoslovakia" She includes fascinating details such as:...women wore homespun, block print Indigo clothing until WWII. Or, a landlord prescribed a specific color for his male peasant's jacket lapels so the "lord" could quickly identify his men in the villages. Williams did her research in Czech/Slovak Republics in 1992-93 and 95, so her information is current and first-hand, with photos.

In the same issue of <u>Dress</u> is "Dress as Social Policy in Women's Dress in a Southwest Turkish Village," Author Charlotte Jirousek was a Peace Corps volunteer, 1964-69 who returned in 1971and 76. She summarizes the long history of dress codes in Turkey, but concentrates on Mustafa Kemal Attaturk's reforms in 1920's. He began a policy of mandating European clothing for both men and women as part of his program to "Westernize" Turkey. The attempt to control/influence attitudes and behaviors through government-prescribed dress codes is still apparent today in countries such as Iraq, Iran, etc.

<u>Dress</u> is a journal published yearly by Costume Society of America C.S.A. celebrated its 25th anniversary in Pasadena in 1998. Conventions are yearly and rotate in locale. In 2000, Williamsburg is the site. Always there are excellent speakers and tours behind the scenes in museums, factories, artists' studios, etc. The Association's regional newsletters and travel tours are also exciting. (see article in <u>Let's Dance</u>, July-Aug. 1998 of a tour to Thailand/Laos) The \$60.00 a year membership has been really useful (and fun) for me in the 20 years I have been a member To join: Costume Society of America, 55 Edgewater Dr., P.O. <u>Piecework</u> is a magazine published by Interweave Press, which also publishes specialty, softbound booklets about beading, knitting, quilting, etc. There are extensive advertisements for supplies, classes and specialty travel tours. Subscriptions to <u>Piecework</u> cost \$24.00 for 6 issues yearly. Address: Interweave Press, 201 E. Fourth St., Loveland CO 80537-5655 ph. (800) 645-3675.

One issue of <u>Piecework</u> I thought especially good was about "Blue" around the world. Mainly concerned with indigo, articles were about Japanese, Hungarian, Cornish (British), Nigerian, Slovakian and 19th century American handwork. Techniques used were quilting, shibori, sashiko, block printing, knitting and resist dye. Visually this issue was stunning.

<u>Piecework</u> is available at newsstands and bookstores, but neither Dress, nor the British Costume Society's journal is available except by membership in the societies. The Textile Arts Council library at the De Young Museum in Golden Gate Park has back issues of <u>Dress</u> and <u>British Costume</u> in their reference library.
