

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President's Message

Greetings once again. As we pass through another Winter, we find two major events of the Spring dance calendar rapidly approaching: National Dance Week and the Statewide Folk Dance Festival. Having already mentioned the Fresno Statewide in my comments last month, in this column I will focus on National Dance Week.

For those of you who may not know, National Dance Week was initially celebrated in 1978, when the United States Postal Service issued four postage stamps commemorating dance forms popular in the United States: Folk Dance, Ballet, Modern Dance and Theater Dance. As shown by those stamps, our culture expresses the art of dance in many different forms, and the concept of a National Dance Week was intended to collectively promote an appreciation of all of these different ways of dancing.

After a hiatus of several years, National Dance Week was resumed as an annual event in 1993. Its purpose, according to the mission statement adopted by a committee of delegates from across the country, is as follows: "To heighten the awareness of Dance and its contributions to our culture. Dance is good for the mind, body and spirit." I couldn't agree more, and I expect you feel the same way.

This year, National Dance Week will run from April 21 through April 30. Its theme is "Kick In And Be Counted". Many dance groups across the nation will be doing just that, offering special performances and events throughout the "week". In the San Francisco Bay Area, a multi-page listing of events is being prepared and will be widely circulated. Every event included in that listing will be free of cost and open to the public.

If your dance group hasn't already done so, please consider scheduling a public event during National Dance Week. Check with your local library or cultural arts affairs office for assistance in promoting your event, or to learn of National Dance Week activities in your vicinity which you can attend. Let's all take advantage of the opportunity for publicizing our clubs by promoting the joy and benefits of dancing.



"MILLENNIUM MERRIMENT" WELCOME, ACTIVITIES AGENDA AND Y 2 KAME TO FRESNO!!

We wish to welcome you to Statewide 2000 "Millennium Merriment" to be held on May 26, 27, 28 and 29, 2000. This is the Folk Dance Federation's 55th Annual Statewide Festival. For your dancing pleasure this will be held on the real wood floor of the California State University, Fresno South Gym, Campus Drive and San Bruno Avenue, in Fresno. Refresh yourself in the adjoining hallway between the Gym and the Dance Studio with food and drinks available at nominal cost. Arrangements for parking on campus, including RVs, are being made for this holiday weekend. The Ramada Inn University at Freeway 41 and Shaw Avenue is the headquarters hotel. Two other motels are within walking distance of this Statewide Festival.

For your convenience, a block of 20 ground-floor rooms has been blocked out at the Ramada Inn University. These rooms are available for you on a "first come, first served" basis at \$66.00 plus 12% hotel tax for up to 4 people. When making your reservations call 1-800-241-0756, and mention by name the Folk Dance Festival. Your reservation must be guaranteed with a credit card or an advance deposit by May 25, 2000. Check-in time is 3:00 PM and check-out time is 12:00 Noon.

For those of you arriving on Friday, registration will be from 7 – 8:00 PM in Room 133 (the Dance Studio). Dancing follows in the same room from 8:00 PM until midnight. This will include a mixture of your requests so bring your music of your favorite dances. There will be some programmed folk dances and a special appearance by Bora Gajicki playing his accordion for your enjoyment. Bora will also teach you a few Serbian folk dances during this evening. Snacks will be available to you during the dancing.

Registration begins in the South Gym at 10:30 AM on Saturday. At 11:00 AM, following registration, Kevin Hall, national award recipient, will teach an institute of dances of Ireland. A dance syllabus is included with the institutes for you to write your additional notes and insights in.

Lunch will be from 12:30 to 1:30 PM. For your convenience food booths will be available from 11:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

From 1:30 to 3:00 PM an institute of folk dances will be taught by a teacher to be announced later.

At 3:30 PM, Kevin Hall will call Irish Cellidhs and an Exhibition of dances from Ireland will all be done to live music with dancers wearing beautiful costumes.

Following at 4:30 PM until 5:30 PM will be a program of folk daces to finish out your afternoon.

At 8:00 PM, a live band will be playing Armenian music in the South Gym until 10:00 PM for your dancing enjoyment. Across the hall in Room 133, a program of folk dances will be held from 8:00 until 11:00 PM. An Ice Cream Social will be from 10:15 to 11:00 PM out on the lawn

next to the South Gym. Finish dancing with a "by your request" after-party in Room 133 at 11:00 PM until midnight. Bring music of your favorite dances and have yourself a grand time.

Your dancing pleasure resumes at 11:00 AM on Sunday with a warm-up Dance in Room 133. Six local teachers will each teach you their favorite folk dance. Also, bring along music of your favorite dances and dance to your requests. Admission: free.

Lunch is from 12:30 to 1:30 PM. For your convenience, food booths will be available from 11:00 AM until 8:0 PM.

From 1:30 PM to 4:30 PM, Bora Gajicki in the South Gym will teach an Institute of Serbian folk dances. Joining Bora during this Institute will be a teacher to be announced.

For your enjoyment, beautifully costumed exhibitions, including Tanza directed by Billy Burke, will be from 4:30 to 5:45 PM in the South Gym. Admission: free.

At 7:00 PM, the festival program of folk dance begins in the South Gym. A Kolo Hour follows at 8:00 PM. The festival program of folk dances resumes at 9:00 PM until 11:00 PM. Across the hall in Room 133, also at 9:00 PM, "Svirac", from the Bay Area, will provide live music for your Bulgarian and Macedonian folk dancing from 11:00 PM. Finish your evening of dancing with a "by-your-request" after-party in Room 133. Bring music of your favorite dances and enjoy yourself.

A picnic with a "by-your-request" dance will conclude Statewide 2000. Starting at 10:00 AM and going until 3:00 PM, this picnic will be on the lawn next to the South Gym. For your dancing pleasure, bring the music of your favorite dances for requests. Your meal choices are BBQ chicken or vegetarian. Hope to see you here for "Millennium Merriment."



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INSURANCE ISSUES: SQUARE DANCERS CODE OF CONDUCT

The United Square Dancers of America has a Code of Conduct which we feel almost all folk dancers are familiar with through practice, but I think it's very well written and deserves publication. Paragraph three regarding avoidance of alcoholic beverages is well put. Our insurance specifically does NOT cover accidental bodily injury sustained while dancing if the insured is intoxicated or under the influence of any narcotic unless administered on the advice of a physician.

We send the Code to each club insurance contact each year. We recognize that not every point applies to folk dancers, e.g., neckties. However, the underlying philosophy of making the dance an enjoyable experience for everyone is always valid.

CODE OF CONDUCT

"Square Dancers everywhere are encouraged to comply with an appropriate Code of Conduct which will enhance the public image and the pleasure of the movement to all dancers and non-dancers, as well.

Among the unique aspects of this wholesome activity is the attractive attire which is an intrinsic part of the image of the Square Dance. Accordingly, the wearing of appropriate apparel is as important to the enjoyment of the participants as it is to those watching. Not only should the clothing of the dancers be appealing to the eye, but also functional to the others within the square. This includes the wearing of long-sleeved shirts and ties for the men and full skirts for the ladies.

Avoidance of alcoholic beverages both before and during dances is essential to insure the enjoyment for everyone. A single drink can severely diminish the response time required to execute the intricate moves of the dance. Square Dancing in itself has the capability of providing sufficient exhilaration to warrant abstinence from alcohol on dance nights.

Courtesy to others is important at all times. This includes personal cleanliness, as Square Dancing is an energetic recreation which can be offensive should adequate precautions not be taken.

The welcoming of others into the dance and into the squares is an integral part of the social aspect of Square Dancing. Walking out of a square at any time is considered a severe insult. At the end of the dance, no one should leave the square before thanking everyone who contributed to the joy and the fun of dancing together.

Conforming to the accepted and generally taught hand positions and maneuvers for execution of the movements helps to eliminate any uncertainty among the other dancers. Proper styling while dancing is as important to the enjoyment of the Square Dance as is the proper execution of the movements.

Adherence to these guidelines should be encouraged from the very early stages of beginners class. The best means of achieving this is through example by experienced dancers and leaders and by the incorporation of ethics into the educational process during the class."

DANCES OF THE RAGTIME ERA - 1910-1920

Recently Carol Teten, President of Dancetime Publications, asked for a review of her dance video of the ragtime era. Carol has over 40 years of experience in teaching and performing dance and was the Artistic Director of DANCE THROUGH TIME, a 20-year old theatrical dance company that performs the dances. DANCES OF THE RAGTIME ERA - 1910 - 1920 is the second of a series of dance videos Carol has produced.

This is a teaching video that, in my opinion, will enable anyone who is interested in ragtime dancing to be able to learn the dances shown. Carol's accompanying narrative to the couple dancing is easy to understand and the dance steps are shown both in full shot and then in a close-up of the feet. I felt anyone could learn the steps of the dances without a problem. The dances broken down are the Animal Dances (Fox Trot, Horse Trot, Kangaroo Hop, Duck Waddle, Squirrel, Chicken Scratch, Turkey Trot, Grizzly Bear), Castle Walk, Tango, Maxixe and Hesitation Waltz. Historical information, photographs and drawings, along with the appropriate fashions and music of the time accompany each dance routine. The length of the video is 50 minutes.

Since folk dancers are now enjoying vintage dances and there are several vintage clubs established, I feel this video would be a valuable tool to use to perfect their dances.

I would recommend this video to anyone who is interested in learning to do vintage dances and who wants to find out more about the history of this particular type of dance.

Hylkeen hyppely

(Finland)

Hylkeen hyppely (HOOL-keh'en HOOP-peh-loo) is also known by its Swedish name Själaskuttan (SHAWL-ah-SHOOT-tahn). In both languages it means "seal's jump". The dance is from Kemiö Island in the Turku Archipelago. It was taught by Jussi Aronen and Lennu Yläneva at the 1999 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp, and also by Susanna Daley at the 1977 Camp.

Music:

CD: 1999 Tanhukurssi (musician: Timo Hukkanen), Band 2.

3/8 meter

Record: Suomen Nuorison Liitto, Side A/6.

Formation: Cpls in circle, facing LOD (CCW) or in column formation; W is on M's R. Inside hands joined at chest height, outside hands down at sides or in fists on hips (wrists straight).

Steps and Styling:

With live music, the musicians can tease the dancers by varying the length of the pause following the jumps in Fig. I, and the number of bounces in Fig. II.

<u>Buzz</u> step (3 to a meas): In this dance the Buzz Step always starts with the R ft, and is rather flat-footed. To move L or turn CW, step on R in front of L (ct 1); step on ball of L to L (ct &). To back up, step on R (ct 1) and then back on L (ct 2) so relative position of feet remains the same. Step repeats exactly.

Mazurka step (1 to a meas): Step fwd on outside ft with light stamp (ct 1); step on inside ft slightly in front of outside ft (ct 2); hop on inside ft, lifting outside leg in front and giving a slight kick fwd and back (ct 3). Step does not alternate.

Measures

3/8 meter

PATTERN

2 meas

INTRODUCTION: No action.

I. MAZURKAS WITH JUMPS

(If dancers are in a column, the column moves fwd and then circles to the L (CCW), ending up back in a column by the end of the figure.)

- 1-3 Beg. with outside ft, cpls dance 3 Mazurka steps fwd in LOD, inside hands held fwd.
- Step fwd on outside ft (ct 1); jump on to both ft turning to face ptr, with knees bent, heels together, toes out (cts 2); hold (ct 3). Joined hands (MR, WL) still held high and to the side.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4, but on jump (meas 8, ct 2) turn back to back with ptr.
- 9-10 Cpls dance 1 Mazurka step fwd and jump face-to-face as in meas 4.
- 11-12 Repeat meas 9-10, but on jump turn back-to-back with ptr.

- 13-16 Repeat meas 1-4.
- 17-32 Repeat meas 1-16, but on meas 32 release hands and back away from ptr slightly on the jump.

II. SEAL POLSKA

Dancers raise elbows to shldr level with back of hands almost touching in front of chest. Hands hang loosely from wrists representing flippers of a seal (the flipper pos). If column formation is used, dancers remain in this formation for this entire Figure.

- 1 Dance 3 Buzz steps twd ptr.
- Entwine forearms with ptr, elbows still at shldr level, and hands maintaining flipper pos (M's arms go under, behind, and then over W's arms). Dance one turn CW with 3 Buzz steps.
- 3 Disentangle arms from ptr and dance 3 Buzz steps bkwd to starting place.
- 4+ Bounce lightly down and up in place: with heels on floor, bend knees (ct 1), straightening knees rise onto balls of feet (ct &); repeat two more times (cts 2,&,3,&). At this point the musicians add 6 more beats, so the dancers continue bouncing to the end of the phrase (9 bounces in all).
- 5-8+ Repeat meas 1-4+.
- 9-10 Dance 4 Buzz steps twd ptr (cts 1,2,3,1); jump on to both ft turning (M L, W R) back-to-back (ct 2); hold (ct 3).
- Pause, hold flipper pos and bounce lightly 3 times (as in meas 4).
- Jump to face ptr (M turns R, W L) (ct 1); bounce lightly twice (cts 2,3).
- 13-14 Entwine arms as in meas 2; with 6 Buzz steps, dance 2 complete CW turns.
- 15-16+ Disentangle arms and back away from ptr with 3 Buzz steps (meas 15); repeat meas 4+.
- 17-32+ Repeat meas 1-16+. On meas 32+ the musicians add 12 more beats for a total of 21. During these last 21 beats slowly bend knees as if sinking into hole in the ice.



MILDRED BUHLER (1909 - 2000) - Submitted by Bruce Wyckoff

Mildred Buhler, a true pioneer in Folk and Square Dancing, passed away the evening of January 13. She leaves two daughters, one son, grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. When she was elected to be Corresponding Secretary of the Federation for 1945-46 she listed her accomplishments as organizer of the Redwood Docey Doe Club and instructor of eleven other groups. She also had her own radio show in those early days.

Mildred is known principally for square dancing. She was introduced to square dancing by Lloyd Shaw who was Superintendent of Schools in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Dr Shaw is credited with the renaissance in American square dancing that has occurred since World War II. She organized the Docey Does (now called Docey Doe Folk Dancers) in 1941. It is one of the oldest clubs in the Bay Area, preceded only by Changs, Gateswingers and Berkeley Folk Dancers. There was also the Junior Docey Doe Club for teenagers and a group or younger children. Each group had its own distinctive costume and did exhibitions all over the state.

Docey Doe held a 25th anniversary party in 1966. We were privileged to have her as a guest and she called squares. Each 5 years since she celebrated with us, most recently at our 55th anniversary in 1996. Although the name leads one to think that Docey Doe only did squares, the following program from an Installation Dinner on November 12, 1949, shows otherwise:

One of the first things done by the Federation when it was formed in 1941 was to establish a Dance Research Committee to standardize dances. Mildred was a member from 1946 to 1952 and Chairman from 1949 to 1952.

Mildred was heavily involved in starting the Stockton Folk Dance Camp, as a member of the first Camp Committee in 1948, along with Vera Holleuffer and "Ace" Smith, assisting the director, Lawton Harris. She was on the faculty for four years, 1948-51. Her most recent attendance was in 1997.

In 1952 Mildred went with her husband, Jake, to London, England, where he was sent by his employer, a bank. She was no less active in London. In Let's Dance of June, 1953, Peg Allmond reported that "The Woodberry Down American Square Dance Club sponsored the first jamboree ever held in London. Five hundred dancers plus 50 guests attended and Mildred Buhler called a tip." The program of the 40th anniversary of the Society of Square Dance Clubs in England listed Mildred Buhler as "Founder."

Mildred was gracious and energetic to the end. In her living unit at Dominican Oaks near Santa Cruz she taught a weekly class in Square Dancing and also one in Country Western (now called line dancing).

Folk Dance Scene

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



Roots World Recording Reviews

Roots World is a site based on input from DJ's with World Music radio programs all over the world. The site aggregates top ten lists from the DJ play lists. The above link, however, takes you to the meat of the site with reviews of many new World Music releases. On the left hand column you see a list of the most recent reviews. However, you can access the archives by doing a search, or by clicking on one of the geographic categories at the top of the main frame. In some cases, the review has audio files of music or interviews with the artists. Also where available, the review has a link to the Amazon.com page selling the CD. The Amazon link is useful for us folk dancers because it occasionally lists the tracks on the CD, although in my opinion, CD Now (www.cdnow.com) does a better job of giving a thorough discography and audio links.

Real Audio

www.real.com

Real Audio is one of the programs you need to play audio on your computer. If your computer asks you how to open a .ram file, that's Real Audio. However, the good news is that it's free. Don't be fooled by the information on the web site that says it costs \$29.95. There's a stripped-down free version that's perfectly good for our purposes. As you can imagine, the link from the home page to the free version is a tiny icon near the bottom of the screen. It says "real player 7 FREE" and there's a text link under it saying "Free Download." That's the one you want!

Kereshmeh records' site has some interesting reading about different types of Persian music, plus its unique instruments. It's also a beautifully designed site, worth checking out for structure and elegance, plus the use of real information rather than the normal recording-company brochure.

Global Village

"The news of the world in the world of music" is an outstanding site you could spend a lot of time with—next time you're at home on a rainy Saturday. There's interviews, music, commentary, bibliographies...Try the Global Village Audio Postcards for the most interesting snippets...for example, the one from Bruce Cockburn and Youssou N'Dour. The Kamkars postcard is great music to play as you explore the rest of the site. In Focus highlights important stories covered on the program. A recent addition was a spotlight on wedding traditions from around the world. The Countries section allows you to review Global Village reports, and each includes links of interest! The Swedish link even has a few survival language lessons.

The MIT list of Radio Stations on the Internet wmbr.mit.edu/stations/list.html Look down the list for the category "Bitcasters" to find radio stations that broadcast on the internet. This is also the easy way to find your local radio station's website—something that's not always straightforward! You might try www.kpfa.org for a wide variety of programming. Look at the program guide to see which show is playing while you're surfing the Internet!
