President's Message

As most of you are aware, the Folk Dance Federation of California has its own website on the Internet, thanks to the efforts of Joel and Barbara Bruxvoort. Over the four years since it was initiated, the Federation website has been our window to the electronic world, informing others about our events and publications, and offering some dance descriptions such as Salty Dog Rag.

Last year, Joel modified the website to insert a counter, which not only counts the number of times that the web page is accessed, but also identifies the country of origin for each contact to the website. Using this counter, we can now keep track of the locations from which the contacts to our website are coming. Remarkably, the Federation website has already received contacts or "hits" from well over fifty different countries.

A review of Joel's records demonstrates how truly international in scope are both interest in folk dance and use of the Internet. Not unexpectedly, the continent with the highest number of nations accessing our website is Europe; we have had two or more contacts from all of the following countries: Austria, Belgium, Croatia, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Russian Federation, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, and Yugoslavia.

After Europe comes Asia, with each of the following nations providing multiple contacts: Hong Kong, India, Israel, Japan, Korea, Lebanon, Malaysia, Philippines, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, Taiwan, Thailand, and Turkey. North and South American contacts included: Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Mexico, Trinidad and Tobago, the United States, and Uruguay. From Australia/Oceania, we have received contacts from Australia, New Zealand and Tonga. The only nations in Africa from which we have received multiple contacts are Egypt and South Africa.

More surprising than the great diversity of countries in which the web hits have originated is the frequency of hits from particular countries. I expected that most of our hits would have come from the United States, but that is not the case. Of nearly 1850 contacts representing the top 50 originating nations, some 629 contacts came from Japan. That is over 1/3 of the total. The only other countries with more than 100 contacts were the U.S., with 199, and the Netherlands, with 143. Canada and Australia each originated over 90 hits. Between 50-70 hits were from both Belgium and the United Kingdom; between 40-49 were from Taiwan, Singapore, Italy, Finland and Portugal; between 25-39 we find France, Germany, Philippines, Denmark, and Greece. Fifteen more nations generated between 10 and 25 contacts.

It is really exciting to me to realize the worldwide interest in International Folk Dance, and that our Federation is truly a resource to the world. And we will now be expanding that presence, as at the last Assembly meeting it was decided to open a credit card merchant's account which enables the Federation to accept credit cards worldwide for purchase of Federation publications over the Internet. We may soon become a worldwide supplier of dance descriptions because of our fine library of dance description publications produced by the Federation. We can all be thankful for the fine work of the Dance Research Committee over the years in producing these publications. We can also be appreciative of Joel's efforts to develop and improve our Internet presence.

In addition to the dance bands, there will be live music for listening both evenings in the **Kafana**. If you find yourself hungry in spite of all the turkey, lunch and dinner will be available on site; however, both require advance purchase (call, write, or e-mail us for a pre-registration form for meals and the Festival. **King of Falafel** will provide lunches and **Bistro E Europe** will provide dinners. MÂDRO

(E.Trakija, Bulgaria)

Mâdro (MUH-droh) translates as "wisely." The dance is known also as Mâdroto ("the sage") or Corbadzijsko Horo ("the master's or rich lady's dance"). From the town of Kotel in Eastern Trakija, Mâdro is a traditional women's dance of welcome for their husbands, seasonal laborers back from weeks or months abroad. The dance originally consisted of only one step-close basic step, performed in a slow, light, subdued and feminine way. The composition described here is based on a version taught by Belco Stanev, choreographer from Varna, Bulgaria.

Cassettes:

Folk Dances from Bulgaria, UOP Folk Dance Camp, Side B/5:

Folk Dances from Bulgaria, JL1990.01, Side B/15.

Rhythm:

7/8 meter = 2/8+2/8+3/8, counted here as 1, 2, 3, or Q Q S.

Formation:

Closed circle facing LOD, hands joined down in V-pos.

Styling:

Trakijski: feminine, subdued, and somewhat solemn with light and bouncy movements. The shoes are a kind of slipper that dictate and explain the styling. The lacy and heavily ornamented

dress and jewelry also influence the modest performing style.

Measures

7/8 meter

PATTERN

INTRODUCTION. None.

I. MOVING IN LOD

- Facing LOD with wt on L, touch ball of R ft fwd in LOD and rotate torso slightly CW, so that L shldr moves back (R fwd) (ct 1); step on full R ft fwd in LOD, rotating torso and shldrs slightly CCW (ct 2); squaring shoulders, step fwd on L in LOD (ct 3). A gentle, subtle hip action accompanies the rotations and shoulder movements.
- 2-3 Repeat meas 1 twice.
- 4 Step fwd R, L, R (cts 1-3).
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 with opp ftwk.

II. MOVING IN LOD WITH LIFTS (Ritardando)

- 1-3 Repeat Fig I, meas 1-3, but raise heel of L slightly after meas 3, ct $\underline{3}$ (ct $\underline{3}$ &).
- 4 Ritardando (music slows down): Step on R (ct 1); raise heel of R ft (ct &); step on L (ct 2); raise heel of L ft (ct &); step on R (ct 3).
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 with opp ftwk.

III. FORWARD, BACK, AND SIDE, CLOSE

- Turning to face ctr, raise hands to W-pos and step fwd on R, leaving L ft on floor (ct 1); take wt off L ft (ct 2); bouncing on R, raise L leg behind R with bent knee (ct <u>3</u>).
- Leaving R ft on floor, step back on L (ct 1); take wt off R ft (ct 2); bouncing on L, raise R ft in front with bent knee (ct 3).
- 3 Leaving L ft on floor, step on R to R (ct 1); take wt off L (ct 2); close L beside R with wt (ct 3).
- 4 Repeat meas 3, but do not take wt on L on ct $\underline{3}$.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 with opp ftwk.
- 9-16 Repeat meas 1-8.

IV. MOVING TO CENTER AND BACK

- Continuing to face ctr with upper body leaning slightly fwd and arms extended fwd, step diag fwd R on R ft (ct 1); bending R knee, strike ball of L ft next to R heel (ct 2); brush L ft fwd (ct 3); rising on ball of R ft, bring L leg fwd with straight knee (ct &).
- 2 Repeat meas 1, stepping diag L with opp ftwk.
- Repeat meas 1-2, but on meas 4, ct <u>3</u>, close R ft to L heel with a stamp, no wt.
- 5 Straightening upper body, move bkwd from ctr, stepping on R, bending R knee and leaving L ft on floor (ct 1); take wt off L ft (ct 2); bounce on R, raising L leg in front with knee bent (ct <u>3</u>).
- 6 Repeat meas 5 with opp ftwk.
- 7-8 Repeat meas 5-6.
- 9-14 Repeat meas 1-6.
- 15-16 Release and lower hands to sides, turning CW once in place, while dancing Fig. I, meas 1-2.

Sequence: Dance sequence: Fig. I, twice; Fig. II; Fig. II, Fig. IV; Repeat all; Fig. I.

SACRAMENTO COUNCIL

Editor's Comment: This month I wish to welcome Vick Vickland, Council Vice President, who will submit articles for the Sacramento Council. Thanks for your help, Vick. I appreciate it.

Vick reports that Sacramento has kicked off the fall season of folk dancing, with a number of groups that were dormant for the summer, coming back to life in early September. A beginner's party, with a Halloween theme, will be held on Saturday, October 28, 2000, at the YLI (Young Ladies Institute), 27th & N Streets, in Sacramento. People who expressed interest in folk dancing at this year's Camellia Festival, and at the Friday evenings' "Dancing in the Street" in June in Old Sacramento, will be given invitations to attend. Local folk dance teachers will be asked to teach some of their clubs' easier dances. Experienced dancers are asked to attend this event, and help draw new dancers into the fold.

Our folk dance performance at the State Fair was a great success, thanks to Irene Oxford, who coordinated it, and to the approximately 50 dancers who participated. A variety of dances, both line and couple, was included in the performance. The event was in a central area of the fairgrounds, at 1:00 o'clock, near the food booths, which provided an excellent spectator attendance. "Where to Dance" lists were passed out to about 25 interested spectators. We always hope that will draw some new dancers.

The Sacramento Folk Dance and Arts Council has agreed to sponsor the Statewide Festival on the weekend before Memorial Day weekend in 2002.

Pourparler 2000, a conference of national recreational folk dance teachers, was held in Sacramento September 14 to 17. It was co-sponsored by the National Folk Organization, the Folk Dance Federation of California, Inc./North, and the Sacramento International Folk Dance and Arts Council. They sponsored a Friday evening dance for local dancers as a "thank you" to Sacramento for holding the event. Oxford. This is a name familiar to people in the folk dance community, not only in Sacramento but also throughout California.

Jim and Irene Oxford began folk dancing in Mt. Shasta with the Dudes and Daisies Folk Dance Club. They were members of the Mountain Mixers, the Hedge Hoppers and the Square D, which was a square dance group. They next came to Sacramento and joined Whirl-A-Jigs and Pairs and Spares and are charter members of Pairs & Spares. They also formed Kaleidoscopes from a beginners class they taught at the Clunie Clubhouse in Sacramento. Also, they were honorary members of the Left Footers Folk Dance Club because they taught the dance "Left Foot One Step." Jim was privileged to hold the office of president in every club he has been affiliated with.

Jim and Irene were instructors of Family Circle for many years. They accepted this position as a memoria tribute to their son, Ted. Many will remember Ted Oxford, a shining light in folk dancing for too brief a time Ted followed in his parents' footsteps (and dance steps, too). All three were invited to call squares at all Federation, Regional and Statewide Festivals throughout California. They also called at the local weekly (yes that's right, in those days in Sacramento, there was at least one party every Saturday night) parties it Sacramento. Ted belonged to the Buttons and Bows, with Omega Graham, and the Dionysians exhibition group, and he was the square dance caller for the Goofers Teen Square Dance Group. He was also a dancer and choreographer for a teenage exhibition group called the Silhouettes. This group was scheduled to perform it Europe but unfortunately, Ted passed away before that occurred. Ted was awarded a Sacramento Counci scholarship to the Stockton Folk Dance Camp for two consecutive years but his untimely death occurred two weeks prior to his second year. Ted will always be missed by all those who knew him. One can only imaging how far this talented young man could have gone if his time had not been cut short. However, his talent and enthusiasm should be a beacon for young dancers today.

Jim and Irene continued in Family Circle for fifteen years until insurance issues became a problem. For tha reason and the fact that the children were growing up, the decision was made to dissolve the club.

Jim was President of the Sacramento Folk Dance Council from 1964 to 1965 and Irene served in that capacity from 1997 to 1999. They both served the Federation and the Sacramento Council in various roles over the year and continue to do so to this day.

Jim instructed at the Rio Hondo Teachers Training Class for the Federation. His agenda was "Sound Systems and One-Night Stands."

Jim and Irene both taught weekly folk and square dance classes for the Sacramento City Recreation Departmen for twenty-five years. They also did one-night stands at regional fairs, churches, lodges, retirement facilities weddings, scout meetings, malls, etc. In 1955, they attended a square dance course class as "guinea pig dancers." Their job was to exactly follow the caller's instructions. Jim had such a good time with their goofs that he was handed the mike, given an "idiot sheet" to memorize for the following week and so began their career to be square dance callers.

At one time the Kaleidoscopes, under the direction of Jim and Irene, had the largest membership of all the foll dance clubs in Sacramento. Club members appeared on Channel 10 Television Station for a Sears commercia and danced on a morning show, too.

For twenty years the Oxfords hosted New Year's Eve parties in their home where there was "standing room only." They also had summer-long patio dance parties and classes. The Kaleidoscopes differed from other folk dance clubs in that their program consisted equally of traditional folk dances and basic square dance figures. The club costume was pink and green and the badge was a kaleidoscope consisting of those same colors with figures of dancers in the center doing a "kaleidoscope" of dances. The club, along with many others, decorated the Memorial Auditorium for Camellia Festivals throughout the years.

For fifty years Jim and Irene have been going strong. They are still active well into the new millennium. They are currently members of Pairs & Spares Folk Dance Club and the First & Last Dancers (country line dancing). Jim is Vice President of Pairs & Spares; Irene is Hold-Over Officer for the Sacramento Council and is on the Executive Board of the Federation serving as Chairperson of the North/South Committee. Irene is also on the Board of the First & Last Dancers. These are their official titles. Both of these popular people serve on numerous committees, call squares, dance at various functions around the city, and other activities too numerous to mention. Irene's love is decorations and you can always depend on her to "fancy up" a room for a folk dance event. Just look for "happy faces" all around the room and you'll find Irene. At the same time look for a tall, blonde fellow in western wear. That's Jim. He is always willing to call a square or contra and can be depended upon to offer instructions, when needed or requested, on folk dances, new and old.

Anyone who knows Jim and Irene are aware that they are loyal, dedicated members of the clubs they belong to as well as the Sacramento Council and the Federation. They never miss a club class night or party unless it is absolutely impossible to be there. They are equally dedicated to the other groups, as well. They tirelessly bring their music equipment to classes and parties and call squares willingly. They are usually the first ones at Pairs & Spares class and party nights and the last to leave. As members of the First & Last Dancers, which is not only a dance club but a service organization, you can find them serving on bingo nights at a local convalescent home, often dancing with that group and Pairs & Spares to entertain the residents, and generally spreading a little fun and laughter to those around.

Their true loves are each other, family and folk dancing. Oh, and let's not forget their little dog, Misty!

We are all richer for having this couple in our midst. We know we will continue to reap the results of their experience for a long time to come.
