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President's Message

Last weekend I was at a folk dance event, and heard tell of a youngster's wondrous observation when he was brought to a similar event, "Look at all the grandmas and grandpas!" Truly, since folk dancing is a recreational activity that one may continue to participate in at a rather advanced age, for many clubs the majority of the dancers are in their sixties or older. In some of my prior messages I have commented on the need to bring in new blood to keep international folk dancing alive for a new generation of dancers. This month I will let you know about Federation assistance for a successful effort to do just that.

Many of you are probably familiar with Al and Teddy Wolterbeek, long time folk dancers and teachers who now reside in Shingle Springs. They initially were asked to assist members of a local high school German Club to learn German dances for an Octoberfest event. The students responded very enthusiastically and soon requested instruction in other folk dances as well. Now they have performed dance exhibitions at venues such as their school and the Camellia Festival in Sacramento last March, and several students have assumed teaching roles within their group, with the Wolterbeeks providing assistance as facilitators.


Seeking a novel way to encourage these neophyte dance instructors, Teddy came up with the idea of sending several of them together as a group to the Stockton Folk Dance Camp this summer. While the students were enthusiastic over the concept, financial backing would be needed for this to occur. That's where the Folk Dance Federation stepped in.

The Federation was happily receptive to the idea of providing the requested financial assistance and quickly adopted a proposal to offer half-scholarships to each of four students, on the condition that the Stockton Folk Dance Camp provided them with half-scholarships to complete their tuition.

I am happy to report that all were accepted, and I hear they had a wonderful time during their week at Stockton. They studiously attended the various dance classes, and even put on a performance during the talent show. What a fine opportunity for them to meet and dance with other dancers from around the globe, and to see what joy dancing brings to young and old alike. I am sure that for these fortunate students are very appreciative of their week at camp, and are eager to put their new knowledge to work. I'm glad we were able to help make that happen.


At 1:30 PM, Sunday, your dancing pleasure resumes with the festival folk dance program until 5 PM, with exhibitions at 2:30 PM.







Myslivecká

Czech Republic

Myslivecká (MEES-lih-vehts-kah) is from the Chodsko region of southwestern Bohemia. A popular party mixer, the name means "hunting dance." Myslivecká was taught by Radomil Rejšek and Eva Rejšková at the Stockton Folk Dance Camp 2000.

Cassette: Dances from the Czech Republic, Stockton Folk Dance Camp 2000, Side A/9. 2/4, 3/4 meter

Formation: Cpls in Closed-Ballroom pos* in a circle with M back to ctr.

Steps and Waltz*, Buzz step*, Closed-Ballroom pos*, Open-Ballroom pos*, Styling: Stamp* (all stamps take wt unless noted).

Note: The music is in 2/4 meter except for Figs I and III (Waltzes) which are in 3/4 meter.

* Described in Steps & Styling (rev. 1996) published by Folk Dance Fed. of CA. Inc.

Measures 2/4, 3/4 meter PATTERN

4 meas INTRODUCTION No action.

I. WALTZ

- 1-24 Beg M L, W R dance 24 waltz steps turning CW and moving in LOD. On meas 24, end facing in LOD in Open-Ballroom pos. Release joined hands (M L, W R).
 - II. PROMENADE
- 1-16 Beg M L, W R walk 32 steps (2 to a meas) in LOD. M may wave L arm occasionally at other cpls. W R arm is relaxed at side. <u>Alternate Pattern</u>: Ftwk given for M, W dance opp ftwk. M walk 6 steps in LOD (meas 1-3); stamp L,R,L (meas 4, cts 1,&,2). Repeat with opp ftwk (meas 5-8). Repeat meas 1-4 (meas 9-12). Walk 8 steps in LOD (meas 13-16).
- 17-32 <u>M:</u> Releasing ptr, continue walking in LOD. M may clap on each ct 1. <u>W:</u> Turn to R and walk in RLOD on the outside of the M circle. Hands are relaxed at sides. At end, M take new ptr (next approaching W) in Closed-Ballroom pos.
- III. WALTZ
- 1-24 Dance Fig I with this new ptr.

- IV. PROMENADE
- 1-32 Dance Fig II. End with a new ptr in Closed-Ballroom pos with R hips adj.
 - V. BUZZ TURN WITH PARTNER
- 1-16 Ftwk same for all. Turning CW as a cpl, dance 32 Buzz steps: Push off from ball of L (upbeat); step on R ft (ct 1). Repeat exactly. <u>Alternate Pattern</u>: Buzz 2 steps (meas 1); stamp L,R,L (no wt on last stamp). Repeat meas 1-2 seven more times. <u>Optional Ending</u>: On meas 16, M stand and raise joined hands (M L, W R) above W head. With 3 steps, W walk under joined hands, turning to R and end facing ptr. Acknowledge ptr.

INSURANCE ISSUES: OCTOBER ALREADY!

Although our insurance year runs from January 1 through December 31, the insurance company needs 45 days to process applications. (Ridiculous IIt doesn't take 45 days to put out one measly piece of paper. It's just that our company puts out 10 pieces of paper each day and we have to get in line.) Sooo...October is when our dance clubs need to start assembling information for their insurance applications. It's very simple. All that's needed is:

1. A Roster of the names, addresses and telephone numbers of each dancer to be insured in the club.

2. A List of each place where the club dances with the dates they dance there and the Nature of the dance function there.

3. Money to pay each dancer's insurance premium and a \$5 administrative fee to cover Postage, telephoning and the like.

4. Of course, it's assumed the club is a member of the Folk Dance Federation of CA., Inc., so Dues to the Federation are needed, i.e., \$25.00

Most of this information for items 1 and 2 can be taken from the current year's records and a 2001 calendar. For items 3 and 4 our letter with the 2001 rate will be sent out to each club late in October. Applications will be due at the Bachers by November 13.

So, we encourage you to get started now, before the Thanksgiving/Christmas season has you paralyzed.





Bob Young, a member of Palomanians Folk Dancers, Menlo Park, California, recently wrote this most interesting article which he felt may help folk dancers to prepare lists of dances or dance programs. I certainly was happy to receive this information and believe many others will benefit from it. Thanks, Bob. – NADINE MITCHELL, Editor

In international folk dancing, we quite often find the need to write the name of dances using the alphabet of the country of origin whenever that alphabet uses letters that are recognizable in English, For example, we write the French word Bourrées with the accent mark on the first e. We do not write the foreign letters of alphabets that are difficult for English-speaking people to read, such as Russian or Greek.

The marks above or below certain foreign letters, such as the é in the example above, are used to indicate pronunciation or to distinguish the letter in some other way. These marks are called diacritical marks.

We can type many of these diacritically-marked letters on today's computers without having to buy a separate program.

In Microsoft Word, Larry Miller points out that you can use ASCII codes with the ALT key, using the numerical keyboard for the code number. For instance, ALT 130, using the numerical keyboard, produces é. There are thirty code numbers in ASCII, between 128 and 165 that you can use.

Carlos Ruling says that typing CTRL-W will bring up foreign letter symbols in Word Perfect. In some Microsoft Word programs, using Insert/ Symbol also gives you access to similar foreign letters.


A nice description of Alphorns with photos, plus CD's! His performances include "Concerto for Alphorn and Orchestra." I kid you not.
