



Let's Dance, July/August 2001

Salsa

(Pan-Latino)

Salsa (SAHL-sah) is a Latin couple dance whose origins in music and dance are the Cuban son. The Cubans and Puerto Ricans living in New York simplified the rhythmic structure, added new melodies and harmonies, to create a new sound. The basic step is taken from what used to be the New York mambo. In mambo the step begins on ct 2; in salsa, ct 1 or 2 (Here it's ct 1). The present description is based on the presentations by Susan Cashion at Mendocino Folklore Camp 1996 and Stockton Folk Dance Camp 2000.

Music:	CD: Salsa Dance (The Rough Guide), World Music Network, 1999; Best of Salsa, EUCD-1319; 20 Best of Tropical Dance Music, EUCD 1243; Salsa Picante, Laserlight 15 156. Salsa Artists: Oscar d'Leon (Venezuela), Celia Cruz (Cuba), Willie Colón (Puerto Rico), Ruben Blades (Panama). 2/4 meter
Formation:	Couples are scattered at random on dance floor; partners face with hips aligned.
Position:	Closed Position: Join hands (ML, WR) with palms fwd at M's eye level. MR hand is under WL shldr blade. WL arm rests on MR shoulder. Double Hand Hold Position: Join hands at chest height - ML hold WR, MR hold WL.
Styling:	Feet are flat, remaining close to floor with knees bent. Arms are held steady. Feeling is smooth and suave, but also heavy, down, and sensual. M leads into the dance by shifting his lead L hand from in front of body out to side at eye level. He can embellish, for example, by circling hands CW down, then CCW up and out. He can also use small foot and body movements to augment the rhythm. Figures are initiated and repeated at the will of the man and comfort of the woman.

Measures	2/4 meter
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PATTERN

I. BASIC STEP

(closed or double hand hold pos; description is for M; W: opp ftwk and direction)

- Leaving R ft on floor, step fwd onto full L ft, bending knees as L hip drops (ct 1); leaving L ft on floor, shift wt back onto full R ft, as hips move back (ct &); step on L beside R (ct 2).
- 2 Leaving L ft on floor, step back on full R ft, bending knees as R hip drops (ct 1); leaving R ft on floor, shift wt fwd onto full L ft, as hips move fwd (ct &); step on R beside L (ct 2).
 - II. SIDE STEP

(closed or double hand hold pos; description is for M; W: opp ftwk and direction)

- 1 Dance Fig. I, meas 1, but step on L to L on ct 1 and return to original pos on cts &,2.
- 2 Dance Fig. I, meas 2, but step on R to R on ct 1 and return to original pos on cts &,2.

Salsa, pg 2

- III. <u>BACK STEP OPEN TO LEFT AND RIGHT</u> (closed pos; description is for M; W: opp ftwk and direction)
- 1 Leading W by pushing off with L hand and using R hand to twist W CW, M step on L across behind R and turn 1/4 CCW (ct 1); step fwd on R with R hip beside WL hip (ct &); step fwd on L, turning 1/2 CW and releasing R arm from W back (ct 2); put L arm on W back, as W rests R hand on ML shldr (ct &).
- 2 Omitting the initial push off, dance meas 1 with opp ftwk and direction.
 - IV. <u>OUTSIDE (CW) TURN FOR WOMAN</u> (closed or double hand hold pos)
- 1 Dance Fig. I, meas 1.
- Releasing R hand, M dance Fig. I, meas 2, raising L hand (WR) to lead W (L,R,L) in a CW turn.
 W: step on L across in front of R (ct 1), continuing R, L to complete turn (cts &,2).
 During the turn, M keep W close.
 - V. <u>INSIDE (CCW) TURN FOR WOMAN</u> (closed or double hand hold pos)
- 1 Dance Fig. I, meas 1.

- Releasing R hand and raising L hand in front of face to lead W in a CCW turn (L, R, L), M dance Fig. I, meas 2, while traveling CW, so that W makes less than a full turn. If both ptrs are comfortable, the turn in Fig. IV or Fig. V may be repeated (ftwk alternates). M keeps L hand raised to continue turning, lowering L hand and placing R hand on W back to stop the figure.
 - VI. <u>CROSS BODY LEAD</u> (closed or double hand hold pos)
- M step fwd on L (W bkwd on R) (ct 1); M step bkwd on R, pivoting 1/4 CCW (W step fwd on L) (ct &); leading W across in front of him with a strong R arm lead, M step on L to L (W step fwd on R) (ct 2).
- 2 Pivoting 1/4 CCW, M step back on R (W step fwd on L, pivoting 1/2 CW to face M) (ct 1). Now facing in direction opposite to original, ptrs dance cts &,2 of Fig. I, meas 2 (cts &,2).
 - VII. OPEN BREAK WITH CW COUPLE TURN (closed pos)
- 1 Releasing R hand from W back, M step bkwd on L, pulling with elbows slightly bent to create tension through ML arm and WR arm (W step bkwd on R) (ct 1); M step fwd on R (W step fwd on L) (ct &); M step fwd on L, bringing W into closed pos slightly to his R side (W step fwd on R, positioning ft between his and her bodies) (ct 2).
- 2 Pivoting CW, M step on R across behind L (W step to L) as cpl turns CW as a unit (ct 1); M step sideways to L (W step on R across in front of L) (ct &); M step on R across behind L (W step sideways to L) (ct 2). The total amount of turn is optional.

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VIII. <u>OPEN BREAK WITH ARM-PUSH</u>

(During this figure M and W change places.)

- 1 Dance Fig. VII, meas 1, cts (1, &); M step fwd on L (W on R) and bring W to MR side, stretching WR arm to side in front of M chest, and placing MR hand on inside above elbow of WR arm (ct 2).
- 2 M: Releasing L hand, push on WR arm with MR hand, and step fwd R,L,R, turning 1/2 CW. W: step L,R,L, spinning 1 1/2 CW to end facing M.
 - IX. <u>COMBINATION 1 WOMAN TURN, MAN TURN, WOMAN TURN</u> (closed or double hand hold pos)
- 1-2 Dance Fig. IV, M turning W once CW (L,R,L) under raised (ML WR) hands.
- W dance Fig. I, meas 1, as M turns once CW (L,R,L), changing WR hand from ML to MR, behind M back.
- 4 M dance Fig. I, meas 2, turning W once CW (L,R,L) under raised R hands.
 - X. <u>COMBINATION 2 DOUBLE HAND TURN, WOMAN HANDS BEHIND MAN NECK</u> (double hand hold pos)
- 1 Dance Fig. I, meas 1. M swing joined hands up and together.
- 2 M dance Fig. I, meas 2. W turn once (L,R,L) CW under joined hands, which become crossed.
- 3 Dance Fig. I, meas 1. M lower and then raise crossed hands.
- 4 Dance Fig. I, meas 2. M raise W arms over his head, placing W hands on back of his neck.
- 5 Dance Fig. I, meas 1. M release W hands and lower his arms.
- 6 Dance Fig. I, meas 2. M bring his hands up to insides of W elbows, pushing her arms out so that they release from his shldrs. Ptrs return to double hand hold or closed pos.

XI. WINDOW

(double hand hold pos)

- 1-2 Dance Fig. I. M increase separation of ptrs slightly, releasing R (WL) hand, taking WR hand in his R, and joining L hands underneath.
- 3 Dance Fig. I, meas 1, with R hands at head level, L at chest level, forming Window at eye level.
- 4 M dance Fig. I meas 2, raising hands and turning W once CW (L,R,L). L hands end on top of R.
- 5 Repeat meas 3, enjoying Window with L hands on top.
- 6 Repeat meas 4, but W turns once CCW (L,R,L), ending with R hands on top.
- 7-8 With MR hands lassoing his head and L hands following, M leads W CCW around his back. As W moves to R behind M, she continues to face him, returning to original Window position with L hands on top.
- 9-14 Repeat meas 3-8, reversing arms and directions. Repeat meas 3-14 as desired.
- 15-16 To return to closed or double hand hold pos, Dance Fig. I, as M repositions hands.

XII. <u>WALK AROUND</u> (double hand hold pos)

- 1-2 With R hands joined (L free), M pull W gently to the R in a CW circuit around behind him, placing and holding WR hand on MR shoulder.
- 3-4 As W moves to left behind him, M extend L hand to L, offering it to W, who is embracing his upper back with her R arm. W place her L hand in ML hand, and together they wheel turn CW.
- 5 To end figure, M releases R hand of W, who moves in front of him.
- 6 M turn W once CW (L,R,L) under his L arm. To return to closed pos M place and release WL hand behind his neck.

XIII. PRETZEL

(double hand hold pos)

- 1 Dance Fig. I, meas 1. Keep both hands joined (ML with WR, MR with WL).
- 2 M turn 1/2 CCW (R,L,R) under his raised L (WR) arm, ending with L hand over head and R hand behind his back. W turn 1/2 CW (L,R,L) under her R arm, ending with R hand over head and L hand at waist. Ptrs look at each other, roughly back to back with L sides together.
- 3 M step to L (L,R,L), gently pulling W (R,L,R) behind back to MR (WL), ending with R hips together, MR (WL) arm above head, ML hand at waist, and WR arm behind M back.
- 4 M turn 1/2 CCW (R,L,R) under his R hand; W turn 1/2 CW (L,R,L) under her L hand. Ptrs end facing in normal double hand hold pos.

XIV. WOMAN TURNS THRICE (double hand hold pos)

- 1 Dance Fig.I, meas 1
- 2 Releasing R hand (WL), M turn W once CCW (L,R,L) under his L hand. Retaining ML (WR) hand hold, M lower joined hands to waist level and lead W to his R.
- 3 Pulling W firm R arm to his L and then releasing, M lead W into a CW spin turn (R,L,R).
- 4 Catching WR hand in his R hand, M lead W in a CCW turn (L,R,L) under his R arm.


BILL AND LOUISE LIDICKER

From time to time we write articles about hard-working folk dancers who have contributed greatly to international folk dancing. We want to give credit to two very deserving people known by many. Charlotte Weber asked Bill and Louise Lidicker to provide the information on themselves for this article and what follows is a comprehensive history of their folk dance activities. Charlotte reports that Bill and Louise were elected to be Honorary Life Members of the Berkeley Folk Dancers. She says we all know how much they contribute to that club but doubts that many know how extensive their efforts to the total folk dance movement have been. We would agree with Charlotte when she says, "folk dance seems to bring out the best in many people."

In the Beginning: Louise started folk dancing in 1970 with the Napa Valley Folk Dancers led by June Schaal and Charlie Emerson. About a month after starting, she learned Zillertaler Laendler, and was

hooked. The next year she also joined the Women's Napa Valley Folk Dancers, a group which danced, at many community events and Folk Dance Festivals in Northern California. They appeared at many community events and Folk Dance Festivals in Northern California. They also appeared yearly at the Camellia Festivals in Sacramento when they were held in the Veterans Memorial Building doing dances from Mexico, Germany, Portugal, Philippines, and early California. The beautiful costumes they wore were designed by June Schaal and made by the dancers. In 1976 they took part in the Bicentennial Pageant at Statewide in Hayward, an event that was attended by so many dancers that they could hardly move on the huge dance floor when the first Hambo was played.

Bill started folk dancing in the Berkeley Folk Dancers Beginners Class in September 1964. The teachers were Carol and Clarence Crooks. Before that his only dance experience was a weekly class in ballroom dance for one year (teachers were the Cliffords) and a brief series of Arthur Murray lessons when he was in college. In the fall of 1967 he entered the Advanced Class taught by Reva and Glen Ward. Their duet singing of square dances was an unforgettable treat. Aside from the Crooks, who were




Bill and Louise at an Italian Demo at Jack London Square in September 1994.

terrific, the BFD teachers that most inspired and influenced Bill were Hugo and Pat Pressnall.

In 1975, he attended both the Federation Institute in San Jose and the Camellia Festival. In 1976 he experienced the Bicentennial Statewide Festival in Hayward. There was no turning back!

Dance Training:

In addition to BFD and the Napa Valley Folk Dancers mentioned above, Bill and Louise attended numerous dance camps and institutes. A few of the major ones include: Stockton Folk Dance Camp -Bill has attended 19 times and Louise 15 times; Mendocino Folklore Camp; Feather River Family Camp.

Other festivals were Statewide (attended all of those held in the north since 1976 plus one in Ventura and one in Ojai); Sonoma (attended many times); Kolo (started going in 1981); Federation Beginners (started in 1977); Camellia (Bill attended almost every year since 1975, Louise attended since 1971; San Jose (Peninsula Heritage) - Bill started in 1975 and has missed very few; Louise also probably started in the mid-1970's, Skandia (1984). They have also attended numerous workshops throughout the Bay Area.

North/South Teachers Seminar: Bill has attended all of these since 1984, Louise since 1987. The only one they would have missed as they were out of the area was in 1989 when the seminar was cancelled because of the Loma Prieta earthquake.

Scottish Dance - Intensive training (Bill) in styling, course taught by Mark Post about 1978. Both were in the Scottish Country Dance Club of Augusta, Georgia (including exhibitions), 1989/90. Bill also danced with a Scottish group in London, 1971/72.

Dvorana Seminars - They have attended these week-long workshops in Czech and Slovak dances, held in the Czech Republic, in 1996, 1997 and 2000.

Square Dance - Louise square danced in Napa for 3 years and while living in South Carolina (1989 - 1990) they joined two square-dance clubs, completing a course at the level above Mainstream. There was also round dance instruction in the same groups.

Kopachkas - Irregular attendance at parties, workshops, and regular sessions starting in the late 1970's and regular members since 1994.

Other Dance Groups - Occasional attendance at Palomanians, Piedmonters, Hardly Ables, and others. Beginning in September 1982 and continuing for several years (at least to 1985) they were members of Nancy Linscott's Almonte Dancers (Mill Valley).

Administrative Jobs - Louise served as Secretary of the Folk Dance Federation of California for six years and as Historian for two. She worked closely with Genevieve Pereira in preparing the Federation

Directory for many years, and helped with the mailing of Let's Dance, finally taking over the job for a couple of years.

Bill served on the California Folk Dance Federation Beginners Festival Committee in 1987; 1988 (cochair) and reviewed draft bylaws for the Federation. He was Dance Night host for the Berkeley Folk Dancers many times, and served as Vice President in 1968, President in 1969, Dance Committee Chairman, 1975, 1985; served on the Herrick Hospital Committee many times; Bylaws Revision Committee, Tapes and Records Committee, 1986.

Bill and Louise were co-chairs of the Statewide Festival in 1996 held in San Francisco, and Statewide Advisory Committee in 1997; served on a Beginners Festival Committee; prepared the dance program

for the Festival of the Oaks; currently serve on the Federation Research Committee. They have published 10 dance descriptions in Let's Dance Magazine and have two more in press. They prepared all the dance descriptions for Stockton Czech teachers (Rejsek's) in 2000 and 2001, including those for several workshops. They were co-chairs of BFD's Monte Toyon Weekend for 3 years and have been members of this committee for seven years.

Teaching Training - Bill has served on Folk Dance Federation Teacher Training Institutes and at Stockton Folk Dance Camp training courses given by Ned and Marian Gault. Louise attended several such institutes.

Teaching - Louise has done guest teaching with Berkeley Folk Dancers. She teaches the Rossmoor Folk Dancers, an afternoon class in Walnut Creek.

Bill's history at the Berkeley Folk Dancers includes guest and substitute teaching, family-type dances, participated as team teacher for the Advanced Class, started as a member of the team for the A1 class, continuing through 1986, and became a regular teacher (B level) in 1986. He also did occasional guest teaching with the Almonte Dancers.

Starting in October 1986, Bill and Louise became a teaching team for BFD, continuing to the present. They have taught all four class levels (6 years at the advanced level.) In 1989 they initiated the Savannah River Folk Dancers and continued it until March 1990.

They both have taught at Institutes at the Fresno Festival and the Heritage (Peninsula) Festival. Other teaching includes the Albany Y Friday Night Dancers; the BFD's Monte Toyon weekend; a two-day workshop in Taiwan, Taipei in March of 1998, where they also taught dances to three other dance groups; Mel Mann's Alaskan cruise, Dancing on the Water; and at Beginners Festivals for the Federation, where they were part of teaching team for at least six of these festivals.

Mostly for Children - The Lidickers have taught at the Oxford School, Berkeley; Children's Community Center, Berkeley; San Leandro Young Imaginations program; Albany Children's Center; Make a Circus, People's Park, Berkeley; Christmas in April, Berkeley; El Sobrante Elementary School; Berkeley High School, and a children's scout group in Aiken, South Carolina. One-Night Stands - Some of the more recent events which involved demonstrations as well as teaching include Lafayette Singles (Orinda) (Irish dances)); Elder Hostels; Alpine Club; Italian-American Culture Club; Family Caregiver's Alliance; wedding anniversary celebrations; (BFD) Multicultural Awareness Week dance party and community dances; Bastille Day picnic (Lafayette); Russian Clubs; Czech Festival.


Performances and Exhibitions - Louise was a member of the Napa Valley Women's Exhibition Group from 1972 to 1985. Bill has performed occasionally at Feather River family camp and Stockton Folk Dance Camp. He has been a member of Westwind International Folk Ensemble, participating in numerous performances. In 1995 he went on a three-week tour with the company to Bulgaria and Hungary. He also performed with the Young Audiences subgroup, appearing in 5 to 6 performances per year at Bay Area schools. Since its founding to the present, Bill has been a member of the Jubilee American Dance Theatre. He has been involved in performances including an Ethnic Dance Festival and auditions. This group also made a ten-day tour in Baja California, Mexico, as an invited participant in "1st Festival Internacional del Folklore Baja California."


Other exhibitions performed by both Bill and Louise include Columbus Day, 1992, at Jack London Square; Camellia Festival, Sacramento, 1996; Camellia Festival, 1999; Kopachkas, performed with their exhibition group on a number of occasions, including two Statewide concerts in 1992 and 1996; Czech Festival, 1999; 1989 - 1990, Georgia/South Carolina - performed with Scottish and Irish groups, as well as one square dance club; Mendocino Folklore Camp, exhibition of Czech dances.

Bill and Louise are Associate Members of the Folk Dance Federation of California, the Society of Folk Dance Historians and the National Folk Organization.

The above article is a testimonial to the hard work and devotion to folk dancing that Bill and Louise Lidicker have demonstrated for many years. We all benefit from their experience and teaching. The Folk Dance Federation, as well as all the other organizations they have been and are presently involved in, are richer for having them in our midst and we know there is much more we can learn from them in the coming years.
