DARGEDIR & TRACKEDIC

I have been asked the following questions: "Why does the Let's Dance Magazine seem to publish information too late for people to attend some functions?" "Why is the information sometimes inaccurate?" "It seems as if we are the last to get our two cents in and by the time the issue we want material in the deadline for that issue may already be past due and at the printer's?" "How can we have the opportunity to send our club articles or other material in and make sure it is in and on time?" Also, I have been told, "I can't think ahead two months in advance. Why is this necessary?"

Well to tell you the truth, our Editor needs to receive her material by or on the 15th of the month, which is her deadline. She needs about seven to ten days to type and edit the material. The Layout Artist needs the same amount of time to arrange the magazine. The Printer needs two weeks to fit our job into his time schedule. After the printer has finished the magazines go to the mailing house where it is labeled, sorted into specific areas by area code, zone, etc. They need close to ten days to two weeks to fit that into their schedule also. Then the post office delivery time has to be considered. All of this adds up to close to two months, which explains the need to get material in on time to the Editor. By the way, the last issue was delayed a week because the post office did not deliver the original material to the Layout Artist and it had to be resubmitted. All these things are subject to human error. For example computers malfunction, mishandling by the post office, information getting to the Editor late, etc. Also, depending on where people live they receive the Let's Dance at different times, which may have something to do with the second class mailing. The only thing that I can think of for a shorter deadline time would be to send the paper first class and discontinue some of the above functions that require two weeks time. This would not, in my mind's eye, be a very good thing. Hopefully I have answered these questions. Please be patient. We are trying our best to satisfy everyone and that is very hard to do.

I would like to thank those who have helped us over this last year in preparing the articles according to our deadlines and sending them to our Editor so she can do her job as best she can. Thank you. We know that it is very hard to project plans two months ahead with everything else going on and we appreciate your efforts in this matter. Even as President it's hard for me to think ahead for my monthly message to you so I know what you are going through.

We are approaching our two months when we combine our May/June and July/August issues. For example, the deadline for May/June is March 15 and for July/August it is May 15. By the way, this information is posted at the bottom of the inside cover of Let's Dance. For those of you who have just started to receive our magazine please be aware of this as it happens every year.

As your President I want to know your problems and present them to our board of officers. If possible, some of these can be taken care of and some can't. Remember as President I have no vote on any subject matter but can and will bring suggestions in your behalf to the Board. I have noticed that some of you have corresponded with me about

my President's Messages and I do appreciate your response. That makes me feel that what I'm doing, whether it be bad or good, at least you are reading it and making comments. Please continue. That's the only way I know what you need or want. Whatever you do, do not, I repeat do not, sit and be upset with things. If you think your suggestion could make a difference don't keep your thoughts to yourselves. Let me know. I want to hear from you. Like I said, if I can do something about it, I will try, ok? Enough said.

Please let our Vice President, Manuel Castaneda, know of your clubs' activities for this summer; if your club will be dancing, closed, or having special functions that you think would be important to list in his Calendar of Events. Some of us might want to attend these this summer. I know that there will be dancing on the farm at Max Horn's. Max and June have donated their time, efforts and their home for these events. Thanks, Max and June. Some of the clubs do dance all year long, and maybe there might be some events available for people that haven't attended before and would like to participate in yours. So, make sure you send this information to him.

I hope to see you at some of the functions during the year.



Directions to Event:

City College of San Francisco is located off Interstate 280 in San Francisco.

From the North, exit at Ocean Avenue, take immediate right turn into parking lot, look for the signs to North Gym.

From the South (Daly Ćity), take Geneva Avenue Exit, turn left across I-280, turn right on Howth. Go straight into parking lot, look for signs to North Gym.



Kokiče

Bulgaria (Western Thrace)

Kokiče (koh-KEE-cheh), from the region of Panagjurište in Western Thrace, was learned by Yves Moreau from Cvetan Cvjatkov in Pazardzik in January 1970. Rhythmically the dance is of the same group as Gankino, Kopanica, and Krivo Horo. Yves taught the dance at the 1970 Mendocino Folklore Camp and the 1983 Kolo Festival.

Music:

LP Record: Balkanton BHA-734, Side 1, Band 5.

Rhythm:

 $11/16 \text{ meter} = \frac{2}{16} + \frac{2}{16} + \frac{3}{16} + \frac{2}{16} + \frac{2}{16}, \text{ counted here as } 1, 2, \underline{3}, 4, 5 \text{ or } Q, Q, S, Q, Q.$

Formation:

Short mixed lines facing diag R of ctr with belt hold, L over R, or hands joined down in V-pos.

Styling:

Small, sharp, and light steps, as in Gankino and in other West Thracian dances (Sedi Donka,

Bucimis, etc.).

Measures

11/16 meter

PATTERN

8 meas <u>INTRODUCTION</u>. No action.

TRAVELING STEP (precedes each figure)

Facing and moving in LOD, step R, L (cts 1,2); lift on L, raising R ft slightly across L shin (ct <u>3</u>); step R, L (cts 4,5). Repeat cts 1-5.

I. OSNOVNO (Basic Step)

- Turning to face ctr, step on R in LOD (ct 1); step on L behind R (ct 2); step on R to R (ct 3); lifting on R, close L to R and bounce twice on both ft (cts 4,5).
- 4 Continuing to face ctr, repeat meas 3 with opp ftwk and direction.

II. GRADI (Building or Adding)

- Turning to face ctr, step on R in LOD (ct 1); step on L behind R (ct 2); step on R to R (ct 3): lift on R, bent knees together, raising L ft to L side near ankle, toe fwd and heel turned out (ct 4): step on L beside R (ct 5).
- Repeat meas 3, cts 4,5 with opp ftwk (cts 1,2); thrust L ft fwd slightly to L with knee straight (ct 3); hop on R (ct 4); step on L behind R (ct 5).

III. BIJ OTPRED (Hit Forward)

- Turning to face ctr, step on R in LOD (ct 1); step on L behind R (ct 2); step on R to R, pointing R ft slightly R of ctr (ct 3); bending fwd from the waist, touch L toe next to R (ct 4); step on L slightly twd ctr, pointing ft slightly L of ctr (ct 5).
- Repeat meas 3, cts 4,5 with opp ftwk (cts 1,2); straightening body, thrust L ft fwd slightly to L with knee straight (ct <u>3</u>); hop on R (ct 4); step on L behind R (ct 5).

IV. NA MJASTO (In Place)

- Turning to face ctr, step on R in LOD (ct 1); step on L behind R (ct 2); step on R to R, while kicking L ft out to side with knees close together (ct 3); click L ft to R ft sharply (ct 4); hold (ct 5).
- Hold (cts 1-2); thrust L ft fwd slightly to L with knee straight (ct <u>3</u>); hop on R (ct 4); step on L behind R (ct 5).

V. S LEVJA (With the Left)

- Turning to face ctr, step on R in LOD (ct 1); step on L behind R (ct 2); leap onto R, raising L knee fwd (ct 3); touch L heel diag fwd (ct 4); hold (ct 5).
- Repeat cts 4,5 (cts 1,2); thrust L ft fwd slightly to L with knee straight (ct <u>3</u>); hop on R (ct 4); step on L behind R (ct 5).

VI. STRANI SKOČI (Side Leaps)

- Turning to face ctr, step on R in LOD (ct 1); step on L behind R (ct 2); keeping knees together, leap low onto R to R (ct 3); leap onto L to L (ct 4); pause (ct 5).
- Leap onto R to R (ct 1); pause (ct 2); leap on L to L (ct <u>3</u>); touch R heel diag fwd to R (ct 4); pause (ct 5).

SEQUENCE: Usually the leader calls changes in Figs I to VI, which always alternate with the TRAVELING STEP. There are 18 eight measure phrases in the BHA-734 music, with a two measure break after the 9th phrase. Yves called Figs I-VI four times each, adding an additional TRAVELING STEP during the break, half-way through Fig V. After Fig VI (phrase 12), the Figures were repeated in order, twice each. With hands joined in V-pos, Figs I-VI may be danced interchangeably by individual dancers.

Pandalaš

Bulgaria (Dobrudža)

Pandalas (pahn-dah-LAHSH) refers to a fleeting thought or idea. The dance, also called Kucata, is popular throughout Dobrudža. The figures described here are from many variations popular in southern Dobrudža, learned by Yves Moreau in December, 1969 from Danco Illiev, leader of a folk dance group in the village of Reka Devnja, Varna District. The dance was introduced by Yves Moreau at the 1973 Mendocino Folklore Camp.

Music:

Record: Balkanton BHA 734, Side B, Band 1.

Cassette: Jaap Leegwater, JL 1990.01, Side B/4.

Rhythm:

Meter: 7/8 = 1-2, 1-2, 1-2-3, counted here as 1,2,3 or Q,Q,S

Formation:

Mixed short lines, hands joined forward in W-pos, leader on the right.

Steps:

Each Figure ends with a stamp on R. Whether or not weight is taken depends on continuation. Knees are bent, upper part of body erect; the feeling is heavy. Joined hands in W-pos are

Styling: Knees are bent, upper part of bo normally close to the shoulders.

Measures 7/8 meter

Pattern

8 meas

INTRODUCTION No action.

I. ENTRANCE STEP (not repeated)

- Facing and moving in LOD (CCW), lift slightly on ball of L ft while touching heel of R ft fwd (ct 1); step fwd onto R (ct 2); step fwd on L (ct 3). Repeat 6 times (7 in all).
- 8 Stamp lightly R, L, R, turning to face slightly R of ctr (cts 1,2,3).

II. TRAVELING STEP

- Facing slightly R of ctr and moving in LOD, lift on R by straightening knee with wt on ball of ft, as L ft crosses in front of R close to floor, and arms are pushed down and back in a short motion (ct 1); step on L in front of R, releasing arms and bending knees slightly (ct 2); step on R in LOD, as arms swing slightly fwd naturally (ct 3).
- 2-4 Repeat meas 1 three times, starting with arms down and fwd.
- Raising arms to W-pos and facing ctr, stamp L without wt (ct 1); hold (cts 2-3).
- Dance grapevine in RLOD, stepping on L to L (cts 1,2); step on R in front of L, as arms move fwd (ct 3); step on L to L as arms swing down (cts 1,2); step on R behind L, as arms swing back (ct 3).
- Step on L to L, as arms swing fwd (cts 1,2); stamp R beside L with wt, as arms return to W-pos (ct <u>3</u>).

III. TRAVELING STEP WITH LEAP-SCUFF-STEP

- 1-5 Repeat Figure II, meas 1-5.
- Facing slightly left of ctr, leap fwd onto L, bending R knee and raising ft behind, while joined hands move slightly fwd at chest level and elbows are raised behind and slightly above level of hands (ct 1); scuff R ft fwd, as arms and hands move fwd and slightly down (ct 2); step heavily fwd onto R, straightening elbows, as hands push fwd and up, to end slightly above shldr level (ct 3).
- Stepping back on L diag to L, swing arms down (cts 1,2); continuing bkwd L, step on R, as arms swing back (ct <u>3</u>).
- 8 Repeat Figure II, meas 8. Do not take wt on final stamp before Fig IV.

IV. MOVING TO CENTER

- Facing ctr, bounce on L, touching R toe fwd to R (ct 1); repeat ct 1 (ct 2); step fwd onto R (ct 3).
- 2 Continuing twd ctr, repeat meas 1 with opp ftwk.
- 3-4 Repeat meas 1-2.
- Leap vigorously onto R,L,R, bending knee of unweighted leg and kicking ft up behind (cts 1,2,3)
- 6-8 Repeat Figure III, meas 6-8.

V. LEAPING GRAPEVINE

- Facing ctr and moving in LOD, make a large leap sideward onto R, raising L leg fwd with knee bent (ct 1); hold (ct 2); make a large leap onto L across in front of R, raising R leg fwd with knee bent (ct 3).
- 2 Repeat meas 1, except that leap onto L is behind R.
- 3-4 Repeat meas 1-2.
- Jump onto both ft a shoulder-width apart (cts 1,2); jump onto both ft together (ct $\underline{3}$).
- 6-8 Repeat Figure III, meas 6-8. Take wt on final stamp before Fig VI.

VI. TRAVELING STEP WITH EXTENSION

- 1-2 Repeat Figure II, meas 1-2.
- Repeat Figure II, meas 1, cts 1,2 (cts 1,2); turning to face ctr, leap to R onto R, raising L ft behind with knee bent and raising arms fwd high (ct 3).
- Bending both knees deeply with wt shared, lower arms to close W-pos (cts 1,2); straightening knees and transferring wt to R, push arms into fwd W-pos (ct <u>3</u>).
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4. At the end of the dance, thrust arms up and fwd on final ct.

SEQUENCE: The figures may be called in any order by the leader, but are almost always danced in the order given here. The Balkanton music fits the following sequence suggested by Yves Moreau:

Fig I (once), Fig II (twice), Fig IV (twice), Fig V (twice), Fig VI (twice),

Fig II (twice), Fig III (twice), Fig IV (twice), Fig V (twice), Fig VI (once).


