

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This month I would like to concentrate on the importance of Assembly Meetings. Our last Assembly Meeting, which was held at the Fiesta de Sonoma, was poorly attended. Now, I don't know if it's the hour or the place that these meetings are held that causes such poor attendance or maybe it's the fact that dancers don't know what they're about or why we have them. So, I'm going to try to explain the reason for these meetings.

ASSEMBLY MEETINGS: The reason for holding these meetings is to conduct the business end of running the organization, i.e., festivals, institutes, statewide festivals, scholarships, etc. By attending, you, the Associate Members of the Federation/North and Club Representatives, can find out exactly what is going on. The Club Representatives that you appoint have a voice in our voting procedures, will express your opinions and desires, all of which helps promote the folk dance movement. Although Associate Members are welcome to attend these meetings and be involved they cannot vote. That's why it is important to have the Club Representative that you appoint within your club attend.

I don't know what the problem is for small attendance but I would like to find out. Could it be the time or the location? As I have said in previous President's Messages, there are just a few of us making the recommendations that ALL of us have to follow. I, for one, don't feel that this is a democratic way to do business. DO YOU? Please talk to your club presidents and see if there is some way that we can get more representation at these meetings. I am not, repeat not, pointing fingers at all of those who are diligent in helpful ways by doing their part in supporting the Federation. There are a lot of you out there and I appreciate all of you.

Also, I know that many of you love to dance and attend these festivals but are not aware of all the work that goes into putting one of these on. All Federation festivals accompanied by flyers are listed in the monthly Let's Dance Magazine. The time of the Assembly Meetings is always on the flyer and may be listed in the Calendar of Events. Would it be possible to arrange to be there early enough to attend these meetings?

This is a personal comment. I am now beginning my last year serving as your president. I know I have concentrated heavily on certain subjects. I tend to be passionate about what I believe in and what I do. Hopefully I have not offended anyone by my comments. I want to make the Federation a better place for EVERYONE. I want people to have fun, enjoy themselves and feel that they count and belong to an organization that cares about them. I do care about the people.

I hope to see many of you at the Treasurer's Ball in December at Sonoma. There will be an Assembly Meeting preceding the dancing.

Insurance Issues: 2003 Premium and Dancing Safety

In November our 61 dance clubs will pay insurance premiums for the year 2003. The premium rate has gone up to \$3.75 per dancer, an increase of 30 cents; for a club of 12 dancers or fewer the premium is \$45.00. This is the largest increase we have experienced in one year; previously there was none or 5 to 10 cents.

We all know our dance population is getting older. Our Insurance Coordinator explains that nationally there have been several broken hips this year, among other things. In the Federation program we have experienced several broken wrists from falls. Our accidental injuries are about half while dancing, half otherwise.

Medicine is continually advancing in techniques and skills, which is wonderful for us as patients. But the price tag is high and only going higher.

What can we do to help hold the lid on insurance costs? Something we can do is be conscious of dance safety. This includes the facility: it's entrance area (especially in rainy weather), its floor (is the surface too slippery or sticky with dirt, are there broken tiles or loose boards), its lighting, changes in level, chairs in good condition, parking lot lighting and surface potholes, restrooms. We can alert others in the group to hazards we recognize. Teachers need to keep an eye on skill levels of their dancers and not go beyond physical abilities.

As closely as safety rules are followed, accidents can and will happen. That's why we have insurance! Happy dancing.

What more could you ask for?



The conference begins Thursday afternoon with registration and a board meeting, followed by a get-acquainted social hour. On Friday and Saturday, the conference will focus on: (1) official business: presentations/discussions relative to recreational. educational performing folk dance, festivals (CIOFF and IOV), and other folk-related topics; (3) dance workshops; (4) a festive banquet, and (5) folk dance concerts from regional local groups. On Sunday, the conference concludes with an early morning general membership meeting. Sandwiched between all these activities will be the usual networking and camaraderie.

Come and take classes from renowned teachers. We are glad that **Bora Ozkok (Turkish)**, will be joining us again this year. Bora has taught Turkish dancers in all 50 states and in 20 other countries. He was the first master teacher to introduce Turkish folk dance and music to North America. We are particularly proud that his first major teaching job was at the 1970 Kolo Festival.

In addition, we are tickled pink to have four newcomers to the Kolo Festival: Kathy Hindman (Serbian), and "Kete" Ilievski (Macedonian), Sani Rifati (ROM), and Mary Sherhart (Singing).

Cathy has made a number of research trips to the former Yugoslavia. She has taught the material that she has collected to all folk dancers all around California. Also, she helped form and continues to work with two Serbian dance groups.

"Kete" began dancing in elementary school. He worked for many years as a dance leader, artistic director, and award-winning performer and choreographer with the dance ensemble "Koco Racin". He has given lectures, seminars and workshops in Europe and North America.

Sani grew up in the Rom culture of Kosovo, where as a teenager he performed in two dance groups. He has given a myriad of dance workshops in Northern California and on the East Coast and is a resource for traditional Romani dance and music.

Mary has done extensive research in Bulgaria: while there she also sang with the professional ensemble "Varna". She has taught throughout the U.S. and Canada and currently performs, directs and teaches in the Pacific Northwest.

The Kolo Festival starts on Thursday night with a turkey dinner and all-request dancing to recorded music. Dance and singing classes will be taught during the day on Friday and Saturday. You are welcome to catch your breath, eat a meal, and enjoy the culture corners at lunch and dinner in the Kafana.

There will be evening dance parties in two rooms to outstanding live Balkan bands from 8:00 PM to 1:30 AM on Friday and Saturday. When you have danced yourself to exhaustion or just want to relax, there will be music for listening on both evenings in the Kafna. Come in and rest your twinkle toes. There will be a music and dance concert from 6:30 PM to 8:00 PM on Saturday night. Lunch and dinner in the Kafna will be available by pre-registration only. Those with a penchant for folk music, folk crafts, books, costumes and accessories will love to pursue the on-site vendors wares.

Both beginning and seasoned dancers are invited to come and enjoy the evocative music, dancing, singing, foods, and art work of the Balkan regions. Partners and previous dance experience are not required. Tickets are available in advance at a discount or at the regular price at the door. Youths 11 through 18 years of age are half price and children 10 and under are free.

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
SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

Izručàna

Bulgaria

Izručàna (eez-roo-CHA-nah), a men's dance from the village of Manastirište, is one of the most beautiful and most difficult in Northern Bulgaria. The fact that the musical phrase has four or eight measures, while the dance figures are seven measures long, makes Izručana an interesting example of periodic synchrony between music and dance. Not only the dance figures and the music cross phrased, but in Figure II, and again Figure III, a single pattern $2\frac{1}{2}$ measures long is danced twice during measures 3-7. so that the repeated dance pattern is shiften by one count with respect to the musical accents.

Music:

CD:ILBD#8 (Bulgarian Folk Dances – Summer 2001,) Band 4.

2/4 meter

Cassette: ILBD#8 "Home is Where the Heart is," Side A/3.

Formation: Dancers mixed in an open circle led from the right, hands joined down in V-pos.

Styling:

Lively and energetic with crisp and well-defined movements.

2/4 meter Meas

Pattern

INTRODUCTION, No action during slow melody, Begin after four bells.

I. TO THE RIGHT, FORWARD AND BACK

- 1 Facing ctr., step squarely on R to R as straight arms move forward sharply to about 45 degrees (ct 1); hop on R (ct 2); step onto L beside R as arms move down (ct &).
- Repeat meas. 1, but extend straight arms fwd. to about 90 degrees on ct. 2. 2.
- With straight arms fwd., leap fwd. again onto R, L (cts. 1-2). 3.
- H on L, touching ball of R ft. diag. R fwd. (ct. 1); hop on L raising R sole sharply across 4 in front of L ft. (ct. 2).
- 5. L bkwd. onto R, L, R, while lowering arms in an arc (in, up, fwd., down) (cts. 1 & 2).
- Leaning slightly fwd., leap fwd. onto L, pushing straight arms back and bending R knee 6. to raise ft. behind thigh (ct. 1); Scuff R heel fwd. beside L, while straightening body and beginning to raise straight arms fwd. (ct. 2).
- Raising straight arms fwd. to 90 degrees, hop bkwd. on L (ct. 1); stamp R heel beside L, 7. no wt., and begin lowering arms (ct. &); leap bkwd, onto R, L as arms are lowered to sides (cts. 2 &).

II. TO THE RIGHT AND CIRCLE CCW TWICE

- 1-2 Repeat figure 1, meas. 1-2.
 - F ctr. with straight arms extended fwd. at 90 degrees, leap diag. fwd. R onto R (ct. 1); 3. Leap fwd. twd. ctr. onto L (ct. 2).

- 4. Leap onto R across in front of L (ct. 1); leap bkwd. onto L (ct. 2); stamp R heel beside L, no wt. (ct. &).
- 5. Lowering straight arms smoothly, leap bkwd. to R onto R, L (cts. 1 &); raising straight arms fwd. to 90 degrees, leap diag. fwd. R onto R (ct. 2).
- 6. Leap fwd. twd. ctr. onto L (ct. 1); leap onto R across in front of L (ct. 2).
- 7. Leap bkwd. onto L (ct. 1); stamp R heel next to L, no wt. (ct. &); lowering straight arms smoothly, leap bkwd. to R onto R, L (cts. 2, &).

III. LEAPS, CLICKS AND HOPS IN PLACE

- 1-2. Facing ctr., repeat fig. I, meas. 1-2 but in place with arms down.
 - 3. Step on R in place, while moving flat L ft. slightly to L (ct. 1); click inside L sole to R ankle (ct. &); hop or lift on R in place (ct. 2); step on L beside R (ct. &).
 - 4. Step on R in place (ct. 1); step on L in place (ct. &); hop or lift on L in place (ct. 2); stamp R heel beside L ft., no wt. (ct. &).
 - 5. Step on R in place (ct. 1); step on L in place (ct. &); step on R in place, while moving flat L ft. slightly to L (ct. 2); click inside of L sole to R ankle (ct. &).
 - 6. Hop or lift on R in place (ct. 1); step on L beside R (ct. &); step on R in place (ct. 2); step on L in place (ct. &).
 - 7. Hop or lift on L in place (ct. 1); stamp R heel beside L ft. no wt. (ct &); step on R in place (ct. 2); step on L in place (ct. &).

SEQUENCE: Figure changes are called by the leader, Iliana danced these in the following order: Fig. I, thrice; fig. II, thrice; fig. III, thrice; these were repeated; then fig. I, thrice; fig. II, thrice; fig. I, five times as the music speeds up to the end of the dance.

The music then returns to the slow melody of the INTRODUCTION.

Thanks to all the folk dancers who submitted the recipes and **Editor** produced this wonderful book.

BAKED GLAZED SQUASH

2 1/2 lbs. butternut squash 1/3 cup packed brown sugar. 2 tbs. butter 1/4 tsp. paprika

Slice squash in one-inch thick pieces; remove seeds, arrange squash rings in a 13 x 9 x 2 inch baking pan. Cover with foil.

Bake at 350 degrees until almost tender, 45 to 60 minutes. Meanwhile, in a saucepan, combine brown sugar, butter, paprika, ½ tsp. salt and a dash of pepper. Cook and stir until bubbly. Continue baking, uncovered, until squash is tender, Serves 8.

INDIAN CORN STICKS

1 cup corn meal ½ cup all-purpose flour 3/4 tsp. salt 1 cup milk

Mix corn meal, flour and salt. Add milk, egg and shortening. Beat until smooth.

1 egg 2 tbsp. shortening (melted)

Fill well-greased corn stick pans almost to the top. (If corn stick pan is not available, pour into greased 8 x 8 x 2 inch baking pan). Bake at 425 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes. Serve hot corn sticks with maple syrup, if desired. Makes 10 to 12 corn sticks.

AMERICAN INDIAN STYLE

Indians made use of most everything they could find on the land as a source of food. The tribes who roamed the plains lived mostly on meat. The farming groups lived mainly on corn, beans and squash. Potatoes were important in some areas. Almost all Indian groups ate wild plants, roots, berries and nuts. Whenever they could, they collected maple sap.

Plants, such as sassafras and wintergreen were used to make a kind of tea. A type of beer, made from casaba, corn, peanuts, or potatoes, was enjoyed.

The American Indians harvested corn or maize many years before Columbus discovered America. They found the cranberry, which they called "bitter berry." They used the cranberries to make permican, mixing them with dried venison and fat.
