

WE NEED A COMMERCIAL!

The scene is a picnic on a sunny beach. Two women are unpacking picnic baskets, while another woman is smearing sun screen on the face of a little girl. Two men are standing near a grill, and one of them is flipping meat pattics. A group of children squeal when they and the sand castle they are building are swamped by a wave. A woman sleeps in a lounge chair, a magazine open across her face. A man wipes mustard from around the mouth of a grinning boy. Two people walk holding hands towards the horizon lit with a sunset.

In every scene there is a conspicuous can of popular soft drink - on a table, in someone's hand, cradled in a mound of sand.

I don't know about you, but this kind of commercial never makes me want to go to the store to buy that popular soft drink. It makes me want to invite a bunch of my friends to have a picnic with me on the beach!

My point is this: International Folk Dancing needs a commercial. It needs a commercial like the one for that soft drink. It needs a commercial that will make the viewer want to invite a bunch of their friends to attend a local folk dance class. It needs a commercial so eye-catching and entertaining it will be digitized and copied and sent as an attachment to hundreds of emails with the subject line: "Watch this!" and "Doesn't this look like fun?" It will be so popular it will show up on websites that specialize in frequently-watched commercials.

The storyboard. When producers set about to make anything visual, they start with a storyboard, like an outline for a novel. The commercial I'm envisioning would be snippets of action that would run something like this:

Start with a darkened hall. A few people enter the room as the lights come on. You see a sound system being hooked up, turned on, and tested, while more people arrive. Then there is music and the dancers form a circle. Then a mixer, and you see swirling couples, smiling faces, some flirtatious glances. On the side, an older man shows a younger man an intricate step. A woman coaches a young couple on position of hands in a couple dance. The pace quickens. There is a sudden whirl of action for flashes of some fast dances, hands reaching, arms on shoulders, feet stamping, brows being wiped.

A father dances with his daughter, a mother dances with her son, two children copy a dance behind a line of adults. It would end with a slow dance, couples leaning in, children nodding off in a corner on a pile of jackets. You'd hear: "Who wants to join us for a nightcap?" and there would be hugs goodbye, as the lights go out. Then a black screen with: "Dancers hold hands with the nicest people. Join our circle. www.letsdance.com."

And who's going to make this commercial? I don't see anyone else taking up the task, so I think it's going to have to be us!

The plan! We can make it an amateur production and get a few people to take some video footage of their dance classes. We would have to establish a gathering point, so videographers could send their raw footage to someone for processing and editing. Then it would be a matter of hiring a professional videographer to assemble and edit and smooth

out the edges to tell our story. Or we could make it a completely professional production, hiring someone from the beginning to go to various locations and shoot the raw footage. I have a fantasy that somewhere someone is reading this and saying to themselves, "You know, I bet my son/daughter/ friend/neighbor would be interested in this kind of project."

Of course this is going to cost money, and we may have to get creative. One option is to tap the Folkdance Promotion Fund. Another is asking each of the dozens of dance venues in California to take up a collection and pitch in a few hundred dollars each. Perhaps there are grants available for the promotion of the arts that could help us with this project.

Getting Viewers. Then there's the distribution issue. I can't foresee paying for airtime on any major television network, even late at night. I do see our exciting, artistic, thoughtprovoking commercial being forwarded around the world via the Internet, and uploaded to web pages. Every dance instructor with a website, every dance class with a website, every dance festival or workshop with a website - they could all have this commercial available at the click of a mouse button.


Oh, and that web address at the end of the commercial would have to be developed, beginning with listing of places to dance in California and expanding as other locations join our efforts. The web page could be as simple as a static document listing dance locations alphabetically by city, with a contact phone number and/or email. Frankly, if the commercial is ever produced, the web page will be the easy part!

Christmas in Bulgaria

This letter from Anna refers to her Christmas, 2002, however, you might be interested to hear a little about customs in Bulgaria through her experiences.

This Christmas has been anything but prosaic! The snow had gone from Sofia and I thought a "white Christmas" would be nice, so went to the delightful town of Bansko (pop. 9,000), located 160 kms from Sofia at the foot of the Pirin mountains. It's the most recently developed centre for skiing and so does not attract large numbers of foreign tourists but more Bulgarians, this time of year anyway. Bansko was founded in the 10th century and by mid 18th century was very prosperous with traders and merchants; craftsmen and artists; icon painting and wood working schools. The architecture is interesting & many of the National Revival stone and timber buildings were built behind fortress type walls to shield inhabitants from Ottoman occupiers.

On Christmas Eve the streets were practically deserted, not surprising as traditionally this is the day for families to gather together and everyone else was on the snowfields. The streets and pavements were very icy but there was snow and I got my "white Christmas." Difficult as it was to walk around, I none-the-less spent much time exploring. In the evening I planned to eat at the small hotel at which I stayed but discovered the mehana in the basement was not, after all, open. Imagine my surprise when the manageress then invited me to dine with her family, and the cook, and a guy who helps out at the hotel! I never cease to be amazed at the warmth of Bulgarian people. There were platters of grape leaf and rice rolls, cabbage and rice rolls, stuffed capsicums, legumes, sauerkraut, meat and homemade bread. A coin is put inside the bread, whomever gets that will be wealthy the next year! Some people also put inside tiny pieces of a branch from a tree which have been marked, the number of marks signifying luck, love, good health etc.

There was wine, and to finish, banitsa, the cheese pastry of which Bulgarians (and I) are so fond. The manageress had pinned pieces of paper rolled around a toothpick, on top, with New Year wishes. It seemed fortuitous that I should pick the piece of banitsa labelled "abroad."! Finally we had the Bulgarian equivalent of baklava – delicious! Uneaten food is left on the table overnight, supposedly for relations who are no longer with us.

Just before Christmas I saw many people walking around with small branches from a tree (the same used to put inside the bread). I was told that in some families, popcorn, peppers etc. are attached, then the branch is used to "beat" a family member on the back whilst saying "Merry Christmas" and this person in return gives money. Then there are the Koledari (Koleda meaning Christmas), they dress in long woolly cloaks and carry sticks, and go around the houses singing Christmas carols. In return they are given a type of bread in the form of a ring, which is put on the stick. However, three young men came to the mehana I was at on Christmas night, and the manager wouldn't let them in; he said they would want money.

On Christmas Day everyone was out and about, and all the shops were open. I went to the Orthodox church (1835),

beautiful inside, there were many people coming and going. Six men with magnificent voices sang in perfect harmony, unaccompanied, in amongst the chanting. I stayed a while just to listen to them.

I then came across musicians in the square and some gypsies imitating Kuker dance. They had no costumes or masks but did wear the large bells around their waists, and had the sticks, and jumped up and down, warding off evil spirits. The music was great. Another group of musicians walked around the streets, they were also a delight to hear.

On Christmas night I went to one of the many mehanas in Bansko. Cosy, typical restaurants, many of which occupy the 19th century stone and timber buildings and this time of year, with log fires blazing. This one was quite small but there were three super musicians, and room enough to dance. They played only Bulgarian music and when people started dancing Horo, I joined in. It was a fun evening and just when I was thinking of leaving, the manager arrived with a glass of wine for me to have "on the house." He was amazed that someone all the way from Australia could do Bulgarian dances (told me he can't dance), said he was proud of me and therefore presented me with the wine! So naturally I stayed longer, danced some more, and left with a wonderful feeling of well-being, half skating back to the hotel on the icy streets!

A memorable Christmas indeed..

How to interest & involve Tekkies FOLKDANCE JUKEBOX

Everyone is looking for new ideas to involve younger and or more people in our passion, folkdancing. The Ethnic Express International Folk Dance Club in Las Vegas, Nevada has provided support to members who have laptop computers. Any laptop computer can be programmed to play much in the manner of a JUKEBOX (without the coins). The obvious reason laptops are most practical is the portability. Any computer, in fact, can be programmed in the manner outlined here, but desktops are too bulky for many locations. Joe Mayes, a neighborhood computer technician, in concert with Donna & Dick Killian has assembled a number of programs to effect the needs of particularly the folk dance community and, for that matter, any sector of music world.

The program, One by One, consists of choices to play only one piece of music and stop, or just one repeatedly, or the whole list and stop, or the whole list continuously. These programs include 1/2 inch large letter displays that are designed to accommodate the sight challenged user. The Pacemaker program provides speed, pitch & tempo adjustable music for the challenged of those areas where slowing, speeding or matching a pitch is the goal. A log that may be used to memorialize each dance session; in fact it provides the list of music played in chronological order.

Dance notes, or syllabus have been scanned to pdf files. This allows display of the entire instructions for dances displayed on the screen which may be enlarged. To date not all syllabus are finished; this is a work still in progress. We believe this support to our members by our club and making resources available to our members tend to increase retention, interest and involvement in our dance organization. Parties are a subject for another day.

North/South Folkdance Teachers' Seminar 2006

The traffic! Driving down 880S on Friday evening was a mess! (Thank you to my dinner companion who graciously waited for me). After a frantic day, the peaceful venue of Monte Toyon Camp outside of Aptos was a welcome sight. Nestled in a spectacular tranquil redwood setting, Helgesson Hall, with its cozy fireplace (not needed in the balmy weather), comfy couches and great dance floor set a perfect backdrop for a weekend retreat. A few paces beyond the hall, Cary Lodge had comfortable rooms and real bathrooms. Nutritious buffet meals were served in the nearby dining room. All the comforts of home, plus dancing. Bliss.

North/South was founded in 1973 by Nancy and Dean Linscott. In the 1970's one of the big problems at folkdance workshops was overcrowding! Dean and Nancy decided that what was needed was the opportunity for dance teachers to get acquainted, exchange views and experience master teaching under more ideal conditions, with an emphasis on style, teaching techniques and personal con-

tact. The Linscotts ran the camp for 15 years, and now a committee of volunteers has continued the popular seminar. A very large thank you goes to the committee of Laura Bremer, Mary Hancock, Dick Julian and Howard Scott and their helpers.

The Friday evening dance party was a bit slow to get started, as many others got delayed, but soon was going strong. It was gratifying to see so many people doing dances learned at Statewide. We were introduced to our two teachers, Eva Kish and Michael Ginsberg – who led us onto the floor with the plaintive sound of his flugelhorn. A very special moment.

Eva was raised in a bilingual Hungarian home. She helped form the Banevolks dance company while still in University, danced with the Bartok Bela Dance Ensemble in Hungary and brought her talents back to America, where she founded the Eszterlanc Dance Ensemble in 1977.

Michael learned to dance in New York City, dancing at the Herman's Folk Dance House. As a teenager, he was already formulating how he could present the dances he learned in a clearer manner. Shortly afterwards he began teaching. He has traveled extensively in Bulgaria and Yugoslavia, studied with Pece Atanasovski in Macedonia and taught at all the popular folk dance camps — in the US and in many other countries. Multi-talented, he is also the director of the Zlatne Uste Balkan Brass Band.

In the morning Eva, who teaches Hungarian dancing, lead the first class, promptly at 9:00 am. She immediately had us leaping and jumping. That will wake you up! (Note: Since, in my experience, very few teachers have a warm up session, we need to take responsibility for our own bodies and do some warm up before classes.) It was obvious how passionate Eva feels about Hungarian dancing. She would like folk dancers to

have a "vocabulary" of Hungarian steps that we can incorporate into improvisational Hungarian dancing. To take a series of movements and "chew them like a piece of bread" until we get everything out of them. She advised first learning a limited number of steps, being creative within that constraint, and then adding movements to that solid base of knowledge.

Hungarian dancing definitely took me out of my comfort zone. I don't do much partner dancing or Hungarian dancing, but I was definitely drawn to the music and rhythm. I now have a small vocabulary of Hungarian steps, enough to talk baby talk with, and ready to enter adolescence. I'll never have the option, as Eva did, to grow up in the Hungarian culture where the steps come to her as naturally as breathing. As generalists who learn all kinds of ethnic dances, many of us will never be experts in any one ethnicity, but we do have the joy of sampling music and dances from all over the world. Learning the steps and then striving for the styling is a labor of love, and I hope to be in love with it for many more years.

After a short break, it was time for Balkan dances with Michael. He started out leading a simple dance. Look and learn. Follow and copy. He wanted us to observe the texture of the dance, explaining that if you taped a pencil to the back of your head and danced in front of graph paper, the pencil line would form the texture. Don't try this at home! Then he had us go off on our own to see if we had the dance in our head and could dance it without copying. Scary stuff. We discovered what we didn't know and could also anticipate where our students might have trouble. Knowing what you don't know is quite valuable, especially as the dances became more challenging.

Many folk dancers who come to one class (or group) a week (or month), don't really want to learn dances on their own. They are quite happy following the leader. I was just

such a dancer for many years when a job and family obligations kept me over-scheduled. But for the group at N/S who were dance leaders and teachers, Michael's method of teaching was extraordinarily effective. Michael's Sunday session consisted of him putting on the music for each of the dances he taught and having us (each on our own – no peeking) try to dance it! Consequently, I really learned the dances well and have even taught two of them already. The repetition necessary to get them from my short term memory into those long term memory banks will be the next step in the learning process.

Michael jokily reported his point system for workshops – first, points if you can recall if you've ever done the dance before! More points if you know when it starts, more if you can recall some elements of the dance, and the winners are the rare people who can do the whole dance. In that group of advanced dancers, it was inspiring to see that there were people in the last category. The dances he taught were Ciganko, Dolgoto, Haskovska Lesa, Myatalo Lenche, Romski Cacak, Tsourtoughouzou and Ramno Velesko.

The weekend also included a Saturday night party and culture corners with Eva and Michael. Eva showed us an old black and white video of Hungarian dancers in authentic costumes, partly to show how the movement of the full skirts influenced the movements of the dance. She touched on a great deal of topics, including the struggle between village style dancing and choreographed pieces – but that's another article. Eva also explained how in International Folkdance one could learn twenty dances a month, but for Hungarian you might take three months to learn one dance.

Michael recounted his experiences of appearing with his band at several of the prestigious Mesecina Concerts in Guca, Serbia. His easy story telling manner and humor kept us all (almost all) awake and amused, despite the long day and cushy couches. He also told us about Roma communities and festivals in the Bronx and how traditional music unites the generations of family members, whereas in the United States music often separates the generations. Finally he treated us to a short concert on his flugelhorn. The Serbians in the group were quite moved, as were the rest of the group.

Most injury related claims result from "slip & fall" incidents. Some tips to prevent or manage "slip & fall" accidents:

- * Check floor surfaces regularly for spills. Clean up immediately!
- * Watch for tripping hazards both inside and outside premises.
- * Check lighting of steps and entrances. Ask facility to replace any burnt out lights before you dance.
- * Place skid-resistant mats at entrance during inclement
- * Monitor restrooms for hazardous floor conditions...and adequate lighting.
- * If an accident occurs, write an accident report promptly.

Looking for 1 or 2 or 3 good people to learn the insurance procedures for the Federation.

A little history for perspective:

Frank and Elsa Bacher have been doing our insurance since 1991 when we changed from a private broker to United Square Dancers of America Insurance Program. With the private broker a small club paid \$150.00 per year; obtaining a certificate for an Additional Named Insured cost \$125.00 extra. Small clubs were in a real bind. With USDA at that time a small club of 12 or fewer paid \$32.00; there was no fee for naming an Additional Insured (and still isn't). The rate per dancer was a modest \$2.50.

At present: Frank is no longer doing insurance. So Elsa is doing it alone. Not a good plan for the organization.

Could your club dance without insurance? Probably not, as schools, churches, halls, vets buildings and camps all require users to be insured, most to the \$1 million level.

We are looking for a few good people to step forward to learn the procedures and participate in providing dance insurance. No insurance experience is needed. Frank and Elsa had only willingness to be "middlemen" record keepers and paper shufflers. This is an all year round job, very busy from October through January and sporadically throughout the remainder of the year. It requires attention to detail and timeliness.
