President's Message

We are a diverse group of people:

- Some dancers have a choice of local dance venues that meet every week; others are able to dance only twice a month on Sunday afternoons.
- Some groups have 5 dancers; others have 50.
- Some dancers limit their dance choices to the Balkans; some dancers attend classes that specialize in Scandinavian or Israeli dances or American line dances; some dancers attend classes that offer a full smorgasbord of nationalities and ethnicities.
- Some classes have few or no men and dance only nonpartner dances; other classes have a balance of men and women and their repertoires include couple, set, and progressive dances.
- Some prefer dancing to live music; others are content with recorded music.
- We dance in living rooms, on outdoor decks, at dance studios, on basketball courts, in church halls, in school cafeterias, and in community centers.
- At some dances classes the youngest dancer is 65 years old; at other dance classes there are dancers in their 20s.

The dances we do show an amazing variety and not just in their ethnic sources:

- Some are done to only a specific piece of music, while some can be done to any piece of music with a specific rhythm and pattern.
- Some have one short pattern done repeatedly; others have multiple sections.
- Some have dance steps that must be memorized and performed precisely; some have variations that can be employed as desired; some need a leader who calls or signals which step patterns to use.
- Some are actually a medley of several dances from the same region.
- Some were created in the last year; while some have been done for centuries in their country of origin.
- Some were added to our repertoire this year; others have been in the repertoire consistently since the 1950s.
- Some come from a single village in a single country; some are done only on specific holidays or special events; some are done throughout a country as well as by natives of that country living elsewhere.
- Some were created for performance and were learned by folk dancers for recreational enjoyment.
- Some, despite having foreign-sounding names, were created in the United States specifically for the international dance community.
- Dances are done by individuals, in couples, in circles, in lines, in sets and in squares and many other configurations. We join in simple handholds, belt holds, front and back basket holds, shoulder holds, ballroom position, skater's position, and on and on.

So what's my point? We are different in so many ways and so are the dances we do. Because of that, we need to find a way to get along, to tolerate, perhaps even embrace, our many differences.

We are having a hard enough time getting new people into our dance venues. Why chase away someone who likes Dance X by telling them the dance isn't "real?" Who benefits when somebody decides to set limits on what is an acceptable dance? Acceptable to whom and who gets to decide what dances are acceptable? And what do you tell the dancers who have learned and like that "unacceptable" dance?

Try putting the shoe on the other foot, so to speak: what would happen if someone were to decide that henceforth, dances having more than two parts will no longer be accepted in the repertoire (too difficult to remember!). When we make rules about what dances should and should not be accepted, we skirt some dangerous territory. It has been said that a wise man does not take the reins of power unless he is ready for those same reins to be wrested from his grasp and used against him.

Square dances, round dances, and contra dances were once sheltered under the umbrella of international folk dancing. Those groups and their dancers left our dance floors for good in the 1960s when a large number of non-partner dances entered our repertoires. We rarely include those types of dances in our repertoire mow, and square dance groups and contra dancers have eliminated any taint of international folk dances in their programs. Can we afford to alienate another group of existing dancers and divide us again?

Does this sound like Rodney King's "Can't we all get along?" plea? Perhaps that's all I'm saying. Can we be more accepting of the likes and dislikes of our fellow dancers? Enough with the crossed arms and looks of scorn! Think before you criticize another dancer's choices. You may not like the dance that's being done, but there is a group of people on the floor dancing that is clearly enjoying it. Take the three minutes to have a drink of water, visit the restroom, chat with a friend, or step outside for a breath of air. Just don't rain on another dancer's parade, or in this case, dance floor!

Letter

Dear Let's Dance,

"More REAL Folk dances"

Todd Wagner's article "Let's Do More REAL Folkdances" was a breath of fresh air on the subject of folk dance nomenclature, or taxonomy, or what the H-- to call a lot of the new dances we do in International Folkdance. People who make a career of teaching at folk dance camps and festivals are under pressure to come up with new dances each year. But there are no new European dances to collect -- all the real folk dances were collected a generation or two ago and we either know them or they were lost and forgotten. So the teachers do a little stitching and sewing and put together a couple of pieces of choreography containing some elements of folk dance and present them as new dances they have discovered.

There are two problems here. The first is one of dishonesty. Unlike in Israeli dance, which is all choreography and the artists who produce new Israeli dances are called choreographers, the specialists in the ethnic dances of various countries sort of pretend that they are presenting something authentic, even though they cobbled the dance up after their last trip to the dance festival in (name country). And new folk dancers grow up being told that they are learning a folk dance from (name country). Which is living a kind of lie.

The second problem is that most choreographed ethnic dances stink. Real folk dances have evolved over hundreds of years through a process of natural selection. They fit the music. The movements are not forced and awkward. They are beautiful and deserve the love they get.

To return to the analogy of Israeli dance, at Israeli camps and festivals new dances are introduced by the choreographers and most of them also stink. The difference is that most of the stinkers are quickly forgotten, while a small number of good ones enter the repertoire and are taught and danced. But each year in International Folkdance flashy, difficult, awkward, complicated, weird new faux folk dances are introduced and danced for a year or two, or forever. Even though many of us soon come to loathe them.

I'd like to see International dance camps or festivals change their contracts for teachers as follows: All choreography must be called choreography and no choreography can be given an ethnic or national label. We would need some new names for this category of dances, such as Balkan Choreography or Ethnic Choreography. As new generations become folk dancers, isn't there a duty to preserve what is genuine and graceful in folk traditions, instead of passing on this hodge-podge of real and fake ethnic folk dances?

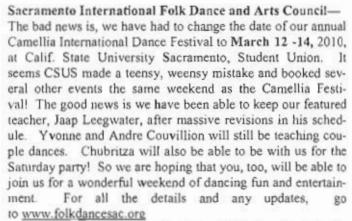

MARCEL VINOKUR - PART TWO

DANCING ON THE PENISULA

[This is a continuation of the interview that appeared in the November 2009 issue of Let's Dance! magazine. As stated before, this is not a word-for-word transcript, but is based on the interview and written materials provided by Marcel.]

1956-1961 - Setting up the first dance class

In June of 1956, Marcel moved to the San Francisco Bay Area and became a resident of Palo Alto. After sampling the various local dance clubs, Marcel found a folk dance group to his liking: the Millbrae Highlanders, taught by Walter Grothe. [The Stanford dance group was closer and might have been a better fit, but it was restricted to people associated with Stanford.] The Millbrae Highlanders had, by then, become a small group, including Larry and Ruth Miller and Sam and Lillian Cohen. Marcel also joined a madrigal group and found some people with whom to play the recorder. He also joined the local Democratic Club and, in addition to his full-time job at Lockheed, had a full life.

In early 1957, Lockheed announced the formation of a recreation program. Several colleagues, notably Dan Bershader, a professor in Marcel's field whom Marcel knew from dancing in Princeton and in Washington, suggested that Marcel start a folk dance class. Lockheed did not have the new recreation building completed, and it was suggested that Marcel contact the City of Palo Alto regarding a dance venue. They offered him the multi-purpose room at Fairmeadow Elementary School in South Palo Alto.

Marcel's class started there in June 1957 with 31 students, and grew to over 60 dancers at one point. Most of the students initially were Lockheed colleagues and members of Marcel's madrigal group. Marcel began teaching the dances he knew from his years of dancing on the East Coast. Dances Marcel taught that first quarter that are still done today were Hambo, Road to the Isles, Mayim, Miserlou, Cumberland Square, Troika, and Doudlebska Polka.

The Federation and the Peninsula Folk Dance Council sponsored institutes every couple of months where dances from Stockton were taught. Marcel also attended every Kolo Festival starting in 1956. Marcel's repertoire continued to grow and he taught some of the newer dances from the local institutes and workshops.

1961 - Dancing Takes a Back Seat to Local Politics

In the summer of 1961, many people became concerned about plans to tear down all the houses on one side of Oregon Avenue in Palo Alto to build an expressway. Marcel was no stranger to political battles, having gotten involved in getting a park in his neighborhood instead of an apartment building, and setting up a precinct organization for the successful election campaign of the first residentialist city councilman in Palo Alto. When Marcel started writing letters to the local newspaper opposing the Oregon Expressway, the head of the Palo alto Recreation Department told him he could not both work for the City as a folk dance teacher and publicly oppose a City project. Marcel chose to fight the expressway, and gave up his dance class at the end of the summer of 1961. He wound up being one of the leaders in the fight to stop the Oregon Expressway, but lost the advisory election in the spring of 1962.

1962 - Back to Dancing

Marcel might have given up folk dance teaching at this

point if it had not been for Shirley Eastman. She was a Menlo Park resident who had started taking his folk dance class in 1959. She convinced the Menlo Park Recreation Department to hire Marcel to help build their fledgling recreation program. Marcel resumed teaching in a multipurpose room of an elementary school in Menlo Park in the summer of 1962. Most of his former students were no longer dancing, so he started over with primarily new dancers.

The new Menlo Park Recreation Center was completed in the September of 1963, and he moved his class to the dance studio. New dances that Marcel introduced that quarter (and that he still teaches) were *Milondita Tango*, *Roeh V'Roah*, *Debka Halel*, *Shibolet Basade*, *Sestorka*, *Sitno Zensko Horo*, and *Sopsko Horo*. With its wood floor and a central location his class grew rapidly.

In the fall of 1963, Shirley Eastman asked Marcel to come to the Peninsula School, a private school her daughter attended, to teach some dances at lunch time to the students. Because of his flexible work schedule, Marcel was able to fit in these classes once a week for a few months. This seemingly insignificant project had far-reaching consequences – a wave of enthusiastic, young dancers.

1964 - The Youth Movement

When Shirley's daughter graduated from the school in 1964, the dancers wanted to continue so Shirley started teaching a teen class on Friday nights at the Menlo Park Recreation Center. The initial group of teens included children of dancers at Marcel's adult class. Shirley and Marcel also started to jointly run occasional Saturday parties at the Old Burgess Gym.

When the older teens outgrew Shirley's class, they moved on to the available adult classes – Stan Isaac's class on Thursday night, and Stanford on Friday. Only a few of the advanced teens came to Marcel's class, which was too advanced for most of them.

In 1966, Neal Sandler, a former member of Westwind International Folk Ensemble in Los Angeles, came to Marcel's class and recruited some of the dancers as a nucleus to form Westwind North. Among them was Alix Cordray, the best of Shirley's teens. Alix went on to become a co-director of Westwind, until she left for Norway in 1975 for a computer job. While living there she studied Norwegian dances and became enough an authority to teach them at camps in the U.S.

Steven Kotansky was another teen dancer from that time period who was recruited to join Westwind by Neal Sandler. Steve is now a much-respected folk dance teacher specializing in Balkan and Hungarian dances.

Many teens, who were learning folk dancing outside of school, started dance clubs and classes in their high schools, which generated even more enthusiasm and demand for dance classes.

1965 - Dancers Go Camping

Peter Scott, a post-doctorate student at Stanford had been an active folk dancer at UC Berkeley. He and his wife joined Marcel's class around 1964, and Peter was responsible for getting dancers to go camping in Yosemite on a weekend in May, beginning in 1965. Starting with a handful of people, it quickly grew to a large group, and they found venues to dance on Saturday night, preceded by a potluck. At its peak, the camping/dancing crowd had close to 100 people, including children. For most people, it was the only opportunity to camp

and hike at Yosemite.

1965 - The Balkan Explosion

The next few years saw an explosion of Balkan dances and all the special workshops Marcel attended besides the Kolo Festival. An organization called Kolo of San Francisco had 4th of July weekends at the Tourist club starting in1966. Atanas Kolarovski taught there in 1966 and 1968. Dancers from Aman Folk Ensemble taught in 1971.

Neal Sandler had taken over a class started by John Skow, moved it to Taraval Street, and called it Mandala. There were many workshops held at Mandala. Marcel attended workshops there with such dance luminaries as Marty Koenig, Dennis Boxell, and Yves Moreau. Miriam Lidster had seminars at Stanford, where Marcel learned Hungarian dances from Andor Czompo in 1966, 1967, and 1968. The first Scottish dance that Marcel taught – Rest and Be Thankful – he learned from Stewart Smith at Stanford in 1965. Marcel attended Mendocino Camp twice. Marcel himself sponsored many workshops at Burgess Gym, including ones taught by Atanas Kolarovaki, Yves Moreau, and Zoran Vasiljevic. A number of our favorite Balkan dances were first introduced at those workshops.

1967 - Santa Cruz Added to the Schedule

In addition to camping, the other activity Peter Scott started came about when he joined the faculty of the new UC-Santa Cruz campus in 1965. He wanted to have folk dancing there and saw to it that Marcel was hired to come down Friday evenings to teach folk dance for beginners in January 1967. It was only the second year of the campus and there wasn't much else going on, so the classes were large. Marcel soon started to drive over to Santa Cruz in the afternoon to teach an advanced class (thanks to that flexible work schedule!). He also arranged for Kathy Kerr to be hired to teach an additional section. (Kathy was an accomplished dancer from Marcel's Menlo Park class who also taught classes on the Peninsula and went on to teach folk dance at Oregon State University and later at the University of Iowa.) This continued until the spring of 1975 when a full time person was hired.

Another teenaged dancer from that era was Marcus Holt (later Moskoff). Marcel took him to Santa Cruz when he was still in middle school. One summer in Seattle Marcus learned how to make Bulgarian instruments. Following that, he organized his first band, Koza, with Santa Cruz students, and made some of the instruments. Their first public appearance was at Kathy Kerr's wedding in the Vinokurs' back yard.

Marcus spent a year in Bulgaria studying how to play Bulgarian folk instruments while still in high school, and he produced several LPs of Bulgarian dance music. He also did some research on dances in Bulgaria, and taught them at dance camps and at Kolo Festival.

1971 - A Pivotal Year

Marcel continued to teach on Fridays in Santa Cruz and on Wednesdays in Menlo Park, plus occasional parties at Burgess Gym on Saturdays. The only problem Marcel faced was having a single large class with a wide range of dancing experience and abilities.

Then, in 1971, two events occurred that changed the status quo dramatically: in February Marcel was laid off from Lockheed and in July Burgess Gymnasium burned down.

We hope that it will be a comfort to her family and friends to know that Myrtle's best legacy will be to perpetuate her passion.

Eye on Dance by Eileen

North/South Teachers Conference 2009

The annual North/South Invitational Teachers Conference is held every year at the peaceful setting of Monte Toyon in the hills above Aptos, but the conference started very unpeacefully this year with a bit of drama the morning of the event. One of the scheduled teachers, Boris (Kete) Ilievski,

could not get a visa from Canada into the US at the very last
minute. Yikes. One can imagine the resulting phone calls.
Consider how hard it would be
to drop everything and jump
on a plane with only a few
hours notice, and ready to
teach three classes at a weekend seminar. To our surprise
and delight, Mihai David
agreed to do just that and
saved the day. And he did it
with grace and good humor.

The conference started on

Friday night with an evening of pre-programmed as well as request dances, becoming all requests after the programming ran out. Our other scheduled teacher, Larry Lynch (luckily with no dramatic calamities) gave a short taste of a simple Irish dance to whet our appetites. Monte Toyon provides us northern Californians a chance to see friends from "down south", which to me is anything south of San Leandro, but dancers came from as far south as the L.A. area, and it was a pleasure to catch up with everyone. There was visible relief when Mihai arrived. I think we heard the committee exhale. Then we danced into the night despite the early schedule of classes the next day.

The next day, meals were served buffet style in the dining hall, and while not gourmet, they were wholesome and nutritious. The home baked cookies and bread were especially delicious. And having a chance to socialize during mealtimes was a rare treat. You know how it is – you start a conversation, a great dance comes on and the conversation is history. Having meals together, one can actually finish a conversation. Marcel Vinokur and I hashed out hours of baseball lore and playoff speculation. Wait, I think we still didn't finish that conversation. As if one could.

After a hearty breakfast Saturday morning, the two teachers had a class each in the morning and then another class in the afternoon. I say two teachers, but all the attendees were teachers, and the purpose of the weekend was to help make us better teachers. That aspect was not addressed as much as it could have been, but with Mihai having no time to prepare, it was completely understandable. It did not detract from the fantastic dances we learned from him. His energy was unflagging and his joy and talent was obvious.

Mihai David was born in Bucbarest, Romania. At age ten, he attended the School of Choreography in Bucharest and continued there for eight years, studying classical ballet, character dance, modern dance, and folk dance. While at the school, he danced with the UTM ensemble, directed by Theodor Vasilescu. Mihai immigrated to the United States in January of 1967, danced with the Boston Ballet Company, and had his own exhibition group within the Detroit, Michigan, Romanian community. In 1969, Mihai dropped into a folk dance coffeehouse, where members of the Folk Dance Federation South invited him to teach Romanian dances. His folk dance teaching career was launched. Mihai has since taught all over the world, and has introduced many of the most popular Romanian dances being done in the United States, Canada, Australia, and the Orient, which include Cimpoi, Ciuleandra, Rustemul and Floricica Olteneasca. At North/South this year Mihai taught Hora Ploii, Hora de la Putna, Batraneasca de la Ciocanes, Brau Banatean, Hora Pe Gheata, Braul Butran, Sarba La Fluier, Batuta and Hora Petrechoiaia. It sounds like a lot, but they were so much fun we didn't notice. Sunday was a welcome review day, so we could get the dances into our heads and feet.

On to Irish. Folk dance seminars are definitely eclectic. Larry Lynch was born in San Francisco of Irish parents. He began dancing in his home as a child with his grandfather, a dancer and fiddler. Larry is a former United States Champion Irish step dancer. He, along with his wife Shaina taught us many figures in several set dances. We did not rotate partners as we rotated around the floor, so let me thank Susan and Valerie for their great leading. I did learn some new phrases, like battering (no need to call the domestic violence squad), around the house and wheeling. For those in the Bay Area interested in Irish set dancing, check out the San Francisco Irish Cultural Center, and there is a group that meets in Cupertino.

Larry brought copies of a book he wrote, called Set Dances of Ireland: Tradition and Evolution. There are 36 sets described and illustrated with graphics along with the text, which includes interviews, maps and commentary about the areas where each dance originated. I couldn't possibly go into everything Larry told us about Irish dancing – it would take another whole article. For those interested there are many good Websites and of course Larry's wonderful book.

Speaking of books, Mihai told us in his culture corner that a book about him will be coming out in the spring. No title yet, but look out for it. If it is anything like the preview he related to us about the story of his defection into the United States in 1966, it will be fascinating. If you are down in Southern CA, check out his group in West L.A. on Friday nights.

For me, one of the highlights of the weekend was the Saturday night party. You can't beat dancing on a great wood floor, with a cozy fire blazing, accompanied by delicious snacks and wine and with energetic and enthusiastic dancers. The programming and request selections were excellent. By the end of the evening, the stay-up-late crowd was mostly women. We had a blast. I'll say no more. What happens at North/South stays at North/South. Dancing of course!

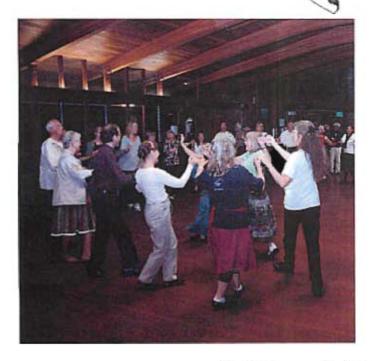

As if all this dancing and learning is not enough to pack into the weekend, you will also be able to watch concert type performances by several dance groups.

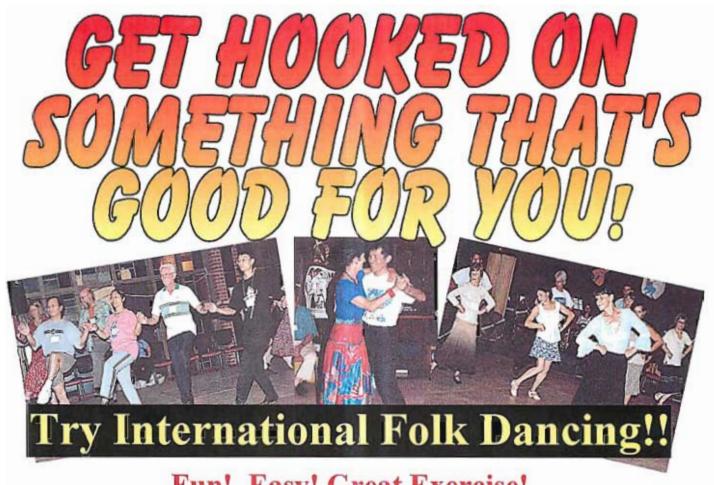

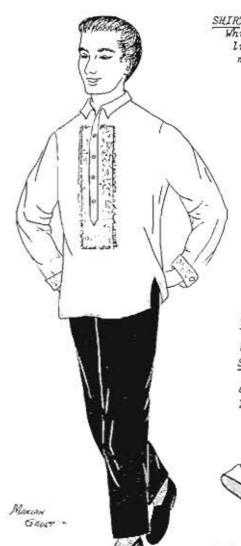

Drianovska Ráčenica II

(Bulgaria)

Drianovska Râčenica II (pronunced dree-AH-nof-skah ruh-tche-NEE-tsah) is a line *râčenica* from the region of Drianovo in North-East Bulgaria. In 1998, Yves Moreau introduced a dance called Drianovska Râčenica, with different and slower music (*a capella* song), and therefore decided to call this one *II*, to avoid confusion. The version described below was introduced by Belčo Stanev, in Germany, to the popular folk song *Trâgnali mi sa Drianovskite bulki*. Yves presented this dance at the 2009 Stockton Folk Dance Camp, held at The University of the Pacific.
