President's Message

MISSED OPPORTUNITIES

Opportunity #1

I am willing to bet you have a few folk dance-related t-shirts in your closet. You have t-shirts from Stockton Dance Camp and Balkan Camp and your local club and various dance teachers, right? Where do you usually wear them? To dance class, to dance workshops, to dance camp...

Do you wear them when you're out running errands? To the company picnic? How about your homeowners or neighborhood meeting? Attending a cooking class at the community center? Visiting the local farmers' market? When eating at your local restaurant?

I ask this because we miss so many opportunities to advertise and talk about folk dancing! Why wear your dance-related t-shirts to dance class? Everybody there already knows that you enjoy folk dancing and they do too! Those t-shirts need to be seen by non-dancers.

This year, make the decision to wear one of your dance-related t-shirts to a non-dance situation. See if you can get just one person to notice it and ask about it.

Opportunity #2

Have you ever had someone invite you to do something at the same time that you usually go dancing? What do you tell them? Does the conversation go something like this?

"Oh, sorry! I've got a class that night. Can we do it some other day?"

"I didn't know you were taking a class - what are you taking?"

"Um, it's a dance class..."

"Really!? I didn't know you were a dancer. What kind of dancing? Salsa?"

"Oh, just dancing. It's *mumble-numble-numble* dancing."

"What?"

"Oh, never mind. It would take too long to explain. Let's just pick another day."

The way we hide what we do, you'd think we participated in something illegal, or something spooky like an off-brand religious cult! Why are we so reluctant to engage people in a conversation about international folk dancing?

This year, resolve to explain to someone who asks just what it is that you do and talk about it with pride!

Opportunity #3

Your neighborhood or local community is putting on a fair or festival or jamboree or swap meet. There will be booths available and a stage for entertainment and raffle opportunities. Asked if you might have something to contribute, your mind goes blank. Who, me? Something to contribute? I don't have anything to sell, I have nothing to offer for a raffle and I don't do anything entertaining...

What??? You belong to a dance class or club! Surely you can get a handful of dancers to agree to wear something festive, meet at a specified time, bring a CD of music to play on whatever sound system is available - and dance! You don't have to develop any complex choreography or make coordinated costumes. Just show up and dance to some of your fa-

vorite tunes. Take the microphone and tell the audience what they are watching, how much fun it is, how it is good exercise and they can make new friends - and invite them to come to your class. Ask for audience participation. Pass out some flyers - either the ones for your own dance class or use the ones from the Federation website. Pass out coupons for a free dance class!

ASIDE: Bev Wilder once told me that his wife Ginny took him to just such a performance. After watching the dancing for a while, she asked him: "So, what do you think, honey? Doesn't that look like fun?" When he confessed that it did look interesting she said, "Good. I thought you might like it, I've signed us up for a local class and it starts on Tuesday."

This year, look for an event that will allow you and your group to showcase your dance class and then make it happen!

Opportunities #4-#10

Did you mention your folk dancing in your annual letter to friends and family? Is folk dancing listed under "Other Interests" on your resumé? Did you clip the flyers out of the last three *Let's Dance!* magazine and post them on bulletin boards in your neighborhood? Is a flyer about your own class or club posted at the facility where you dance? Do your co-workers, doctor, dentist, massage therapist, priest/minister/rabbi, financial advisor, attorney, and mechanic know you love folk dancing?

Somebody out there is waiting for their life to be changed by folk dancing - just as yours was! Don't make them wait any longer!

DIRECTIONS TO LIVE OAK PARK BY PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION:

Take the Richmond BART train and exit at the BERKELEY station (not NORTH BERKELEY). You can then walk north to 1301 Shattuck Avenue. Otherwise, on Shattuck Avenue near the BART station, you can catch (in front of "Games of Berkeley" store across Shattuck St) either a 7, 9 or 18 bus heading north ; get off at Berryman and walk east (up a slight incline) one block to Shattuck Avenue.

DIRECTIONS TO LIVE OAK PARK BY CAR:

Coming from San Francisco or from points north on Highway 80, take the University Avenue exit in Berkeley; drive east to the end of the street (the street ends at the UC campus); turn left, proceeding north; at the 5th stop light, turn left; travel two blocks; turn right onto Shattuck Avenue and park. Live Oak Park is in the middle of this block.

Coming from anywhere south of Oakland, take Highway 880 North to the Highway 24 exit (to Walnut Creek and Berkeley); take the Berkeley exit (Martin Luther King Jr. Way) and follow signs to Martin Luther King Jr. Way; proceed north for 3 ½ miles to Rose Street and turn right; pass one stop light, short distance to stop sign (Shattuck Ave), go one more block to Walnut St turn left Live Oak Park is in middle of block park.

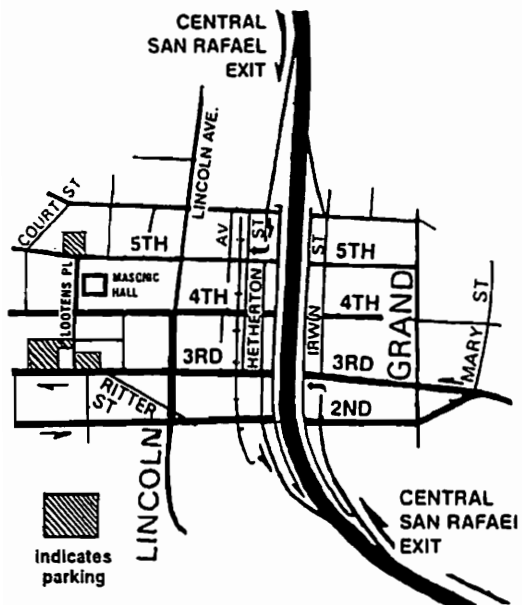

Dancing with Friends at Christmas

Christmas Day Dance Party

On the evening of December 25th the Peninsula Folk Dance Council hosted a new event - an all request dance party at the Council's normal venue, St. Bede's church in Menlo Park.

The event was set in motion when John Nicoara, a long-time folk dancer and teacher, told friends about growing up in the Romanian community in Detroit where they got together every Christmas evening to dance, eat and share season's greetings. Inspired by the story, a group of eleven dancers decided to organize a dance like that for Christmas 2009. A flier was developed, emails were sent out and announcements were made at as many clubs as possible.

St. Bede's hall was beautifully decorated with tables covered with folk tablecloths, walls and counters were festooned with Greek flags and two Christmas trees were decorated with dolls in folk costumes and flags of various countries. The combination of the decorations and the hall's lowered lights made it the perfect venue for a dance party.

More than 50 dancers, along with friends and family, some from as far away as Benicia and Santa Cruz, came to dance and share their holiday stories. Coffee and punch were provided and most people brought a snack to share, although almost everybody was still full from their holiday dinner.

During the three-hour party, a wide range of nearly 60 dances was played, from old favorites that included Shopsko Oro, Zillertaller Laendler and two Kujawiaks, to newer dances such as Elerinka and Krivatvorena. In order to ensure that

guests and beginners were able to participate, easier dances such as Liljano Mome, Idam ne Idam and Lerikos were played throughout the night. At any one time, over half of the crowd was dancing, while others took the opportunity to snack and chat with friends, some of whom they hadn't seen for more than a year.

A nine-foot screen displayed the name of the current dance along with the upcoming playlist to help people learn the dance names as well as plan their evening. Kolo Festival 2009

This year Kolo Festival was back at the Croatian American Cultural Center where it was held in 2007. The Center has a good dance floor, access to BART, and is centrally located to all Bay Area suburbs. It only took about 40 minutes to get home to Orinda. Parking can be a challenge, but it only had to be done twice, and Saturday was easier without midweek parking restrictions. Once inside the hall the outside world was magically swept away. I felt that everyone who came really enjoyed the excellent teachers, the dancing and especially the great musicians.

Friday morning started out with Bulgarian dance classes by Yves Moreau and mostly Greek and Macedonian by Jerry Duke. Yves is always entertaining, mixing humor, fun dances and outstanding teaching. He frequently throws in little interesting facts. How many of you know that *krivo* means crooked and *pravo* means straight? We are so lucky to have Jerry Duke here in our own backyard. He is a treasure. I've written tons about the two of them in past articles – which I'm sure you all have saved. Among the dances taught over the two days by Yves were *Triti Pati*, *Pravo Cepelarsko*, *Zensko Kapansko*, *Arnautsko* (a personal favorite), *Batuta*, *Kardamska Zborenka* and *Proletini Buenek*. Jerry taught *Damat Halay*, *Stankina*, *Troriou*, *Kabana Mitro*, *Patrula* (*Patrounino*), *Aptaliko* and *Moureki*.

If that wasn't enough, there were more teachers! Bob Gardner (accompanied by Sharon) and Sani Rifati on Friday and Saturday afternoons, respectively, taught a great mix of Greek (*Epiros*) and Romani dances. But wait, that was still not all. John Filcich taught *Kolos* after lunch and singing classes were held by *Dragi Spasovski*. And it was great to see Marge and Anna Gajicki in the corner with all their wonderful costumes and treasures. We were treated to a wealth of styles and cultures from all these very knowledgeable people.

And speaking of culture, there were two very interesting culture corners by Yves and by Sani. Yves showed us a video that he took on a recent trip to Albania from the Folk Festival of *Gjirokastrë*, which takes place about every four years. Footage included traditional Albanian iso-polyphonic music, as well as traditional dancing. Albanian polyphonic music has been UNESCO-recognized since 2005 as an "intangible cultural heritage."

Sani's talk was equally interesting. He talked about the Romani culture and answered many questions from the audience, which led to lively discussion. He stressed that he would not write up notes for his dances, because it would be unfair to put us into a box. I know there are many people who would argue that we could not continue keeping dances alive without the notes, but philosophically I can see Sani's point. It would make for an interesting debate.

On to food! Delicious meals were available in the Croatian Center at lunch and dinner times. Vassil Bebelevov and family served Bulgarian food on Friday and Ani Toroyan served middle-Eastern "fusion" on Saturday. For those who

ventured out into the neighborhood, many delicious restaurants were within easy walking distance. You could have chosen from Salvadorian, Mexican, Vietnamese or Italian just to mention a few of the places on Mission Street. There were also some ubiquitous fast food outlets, but when learning ethnic dances, it seemed logical to sample ethnic food.

Each evening, after an amazing day of dancing, eating, reviewing, socializing and getting cultured, the actual fun began. Partying was our dessert, better than any confection. The bands and live music were the best ever. I'm not just saying that. One of the reasons was that the bands in the main room alternated between the stage and the floor, which resulted in almost no down time. One night as one band on the floor ended, the band on stage picked up the last note and just kept going. Kudos to the person/people who organized that - it was brilliant. Another reason was the variety of music, which offered us chances to do many different dances. And the quality of our Bay Area musicians just gets better every year. Also the *Kafana* always had a crowd of happy dancers enjoying the great music, while others sat, drank, chatted and listened, much like village life where some of these dances originated, I imagine. I hope you are nodding your heads while reading this and NOT saying, darn I should have gone.

Mozhem*, and *Verna Druzhina*. We were so lucky to have had all of that amazing talent over the two days.

Big thanks to the committee and their other volunteers without whom Kolo could not exist. Thank you Jerry Duke, Jan Rains, Miriam Berg, Marion Earl, Bill Cope, Lacy Cope, Gary Anderson, and Judy Yamahiro, with help from Board member Sharen Nyberg and Kolo Festival founder John Filcich. Great job guys!

Kolo Festival is so important – it is a time-honored festival of the Bay Area and important to Folk dancing in general. If festivals like this one start to fade away it will be very sad. It's so great to get out in the real world to live music and joyous crowds to share in the love we have of this wonderful thing we do. If we have to beg people to support/volunteer for a festival like this one, then folk dancing is surely doomed. Go for the love of it. I hope there are many people who still love it as much as I do. 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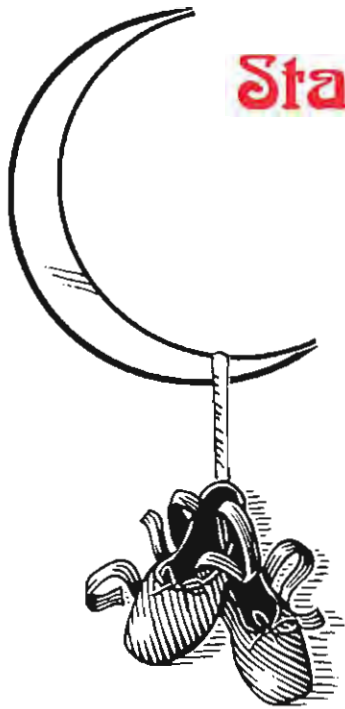

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Harmanlijska Râčenitsa

(Trakia, Bulgaria)

Harmanlijska Râčenitsa (hahr-mahn-LEE-skah ruh-che-NEE-tsah) is a line râčenica from the region around Harmanli in Eastern Thrace. It was observed by Yves Moreau at a folk festival in Haskovo, in June, 1966, and presented by Yves at the 2009 Stockton Folk Dance Camp held at The University of the Pacific. The dance can be done to any basic 8-measure Thracian râčenica.

Music: CD: Yves Moreau Stockton Folk Dance Camp 2009, Band 4 7/8 meter (QQS)
Video: 2009 Stockton Folk Dance Camp DVD, Volume 1*

Formation: Mixed open circle. Hands in W-pos. Weight on Left, face center.

Styling: Earthy, with a slight knee bend.

Measures	7/8 meter	PATTERN
1-16	<u>INTRODUCTION.</u> No action; instrumental. Start with song.	
	I. <u>BASIC FIGURE</u>	
1-2	Step on R to R, arms move to R at 45-degree angle (ct 1); pause (ct 2); step on L behind R, arms move L to starting pos (ct 3). Repeat with same ftwk, arms, and direction (cts 1, 2, 3).	
3	Step on R in place with marked knee bend (ct 1); transfer wt lightly onto ball of L ft (ct 2); step on R with marked knee bend (ct 3).	
4	Repeat meas 3 with opp ftwk.	
5-6	Large step fwd on R, arms swing fwd and down (ct 1); L ft crosses slightly in front of R (ct 2); slight lift on R (ct 3). Lunden Reinlender

(Norway)

Lunden Reinlender (LOON-dehn RYHN-lehn-der) is a couple dance choreographed by Lee Otterholt from traditional motifs. It is described here as a progressive, but it can be done as a non-progressive. "Lunden" means "the grove" and "reinlender" is a Norwegian schottis. The music is a popular song written by Kristen Bråthen Berg (Jeg gikk meg ut i lunden grønn; see lyrics below). A song dance (Lunden Grønn) was taught using this same music by Alix Cordray in 1992 at Stockton Folk Dance Camp. Lunden Reinlender was taught by Lee Otterholt at Stockton Folk Dance Camp, University of the Pacific, in 2009. We thank Lee for his generous help in improving this description.

CD: Balkan and Beyond – Stockton 2009, Band 9. 2/4 meter
Video: 2009 Stockton Folk Dance Camp, DVD (can be viewed in the library of the U of P, or by contacting a camp participant who purchased it.)

Formation: Couples facing CCW (LOD) in a circle. M's R arm is around W's waist and W's L hand is on M's R shoulder. M and W use opposite ftwk throughout.

Steps: Basic reinlender: Step fwd on outside ft (ct 1), step fwd on inside ft to be near or a little ahead of opp. ft (ct &), step fwd on outside ft (ct 2), lift on same ft letting inside ft move gently fwd of supporting ft (ct &). Repeat with opp. ft wk.

Styling: The "hops" are slightly more exuberant than Swedish "hops", but are basically heel-lifts. On these lifts, the opposite ft remains low (close to the floor) and moves slightly ahead of the supporting ft. Movements are flowing.

Measures	2/4 meter	PATTERN
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1-4 INTRODUCTION (start with vocals)

I. BASIC REINLENDER AND ROTATION

1-2 Moving in LOD, dance two Basic reinlender steps.

3-4 M step in front of ptr and take shoulder/waist hold; rotate CW for 2 complete turns moving in LOD with 4 step/hops (cts 1,&,2,&; 1,&,2,&); M start with L, W with R.

II. COUPLE TURNS AND ROTATION

1-2 Keeping shoulder/waist hold, M dance in place while guiding W to her R across to M's L side and then to her L back to his R side. The step is the Basic reinlender (cts 1,&,2,&), and the cpl rotates a little CCW (meas 1) and then CW (meas 2). The W can either step sideways, first to the R (meas 1) and then back to the L (meas 2), or turn to face somewhat fwd and move in a small semi-circle to the R and then turn on cts 2,& to face the other way and dance back to the M's R side. The M's lead will guide this choice of style.

3-4 Repeat Fig. I, meas 3-4.

III. PARTNERS TURN AWAY AND ROTATION

- 1 Partners turn away from each other, M to L and W to R and dance one energetic Basic reinlender step, M going twd ctr. of circle and W twd the outside (M starts with L ft, W with R). On cts 2, & (step-lift) M turn to L, W to R to face twd ptr [some variation in the timing of the turn is okay].
- 2 Dance twd ptr, M starting with step on R ft, W on L, with one Basic reinlender step. On ct 2, M claps, and on ct & slaps outside of L ft with L hand. It is important to end this meas with ptrs close enough together to move smoothly into the next step. On ct 1, M can occasionally step fwd on R ft with emphasis.
- 3-4 Repeat Fig. I, meas 3-4.

IV. COUPLE TURNS AND PROGRESSION

- 1-2 Repeat Fig. II, meas 1-2.
- 3-4 With 4 step-hops (as in Fig. I, meas 3-4) M turns over L shldr and dances back to W behind. W turns over R shldr and dances fwd (LOD) to meet new ptr ahead..

The dance goes through 4 times, and then on the fifth time it ends with Fig. II. An optional ending is for ptrs to bend knees on meas 4, ct 2, and the M to lift ptr straight up on ct & with the W assisting by jumping (pushing down on M's shldrs, and if desired bringing ft up behind), and then the M gently lowers the W back down.
