When Loui Tucker and I first started to organize the New Dancers Festivals back in February 2011 at the Festival of the Oaks, we were delighted that Berkeley (Bill Lidicker) and North Bay (Gary Anderson) were willing to host a venue in addition to Sunnyvale. San Francisco (Luiselle Yakas) joined shortly thereafter and will host in April 2012. Happily, we now have added Central Valley on February 10, 2012 (Judy Kropp). In addition, Sacramento (Barbara Bevan) offered an evening program dedicated to new dancers in September. This is exciting to see that clubs are offering to host programs and festivals for new dancers, which eventually benefit all groups and clubs.

The Sunnyvale festival in June attracted 70 new and returning dancers, and the Berkeley venue offered 31 new dancers a view of dances from around the world. Initial reports from the Petaluma festival indicate 25 new dancers had a lot of fun on November 6. We want new dancers to be repeat customers. We can proudly state we have increased the visibility of folk dancing in our communities, and we will continue on this path with your enthusiasm and help. Several clubs have mentioned that they are experiencing an increase in attendance. Kudos to everyone. These clubs are in the running to win the Federation's Cup. Hooray!!!



Our teachers came from a variety of local groups and taught 20 dances to the beginners (and experienced angels who were there to help). The teachers in order of appearance are Leanne Schy, Israeli class; Carol Friedman, Snap-Y Petaluma, Point Reyes Folk Dancers; Susie Shoaf, Kopachkas, Ashkenaz; Elsa Bacher, Novato Folk Dancers, Petaluma Folk Dancers, Santa Rosa Folk Dancers; Nadav Nur, Kopachkas, Ashkenaz; Marilyn Smith, Santa Rosa J.C. folk Dancing class and Eileen Kopec, Greek, Albany Y Folk Dancers. (Some of us went to Papa's Taverna, Lakeville Road, afterwards and did the dances Eileen taught. And ate some Greek food.)

Some of the new dancers commented that they had danced in the past and didn't know it was still being done. Is there anything we can do to get more publicity? Maybe more of those who have danced will come back to us.

This was the third in a series of New Dancer classes that the Folk Dance Federation is sponsoring. The next will be in the Central Valley on February 10, 2012 (Judy Kropp). See flyer on page 10. San Francisco (Luiselle Yakas) will follow in April, 2012. We wish them all the success we had. We won't really know how successful we are until we see how

actually come to our classes. That remains to be seen.

It takes a lot of work to put on an event such as the New Dancers Festival. First of all we want to thank all the teachers for the great teaching they did. There was not a walk around mike for the teachers and they had to try to make 120 people hear them. They did so very well. I hope none of them have sore throats!

Again, many thanks to you Adony!

Young Brides, Old Treasures

This exquisite show in Santa Fe is almost worth a trip to New Mexico: it centers on 27 wedding dresses worn by Macedonian women, mostly Orthodox Christians, during the period from 1890 to 1950. The dominant colors are red, white and black, with generous accents of gold and silver. Displayed in one large room, the overall effect is dazzling. Their richness also draws you in to want to admire and scrutinize each individual costume. The outfits are on simple mannequins, so that the intricate pleating, weaving, embroidery, beading and fringes adorning the various layers can be seen close up and from all sides.

Seven regions of Macedonia are used in classifying dress, and the dresses in the exhibit are arranged accordingly. Most of them are from Debar and Reka in the northwest; Brsyak, which covers almost a third of the country between Albania and Greece; and Shop, a strip along the Bulgarian border (not to be confused with Shop within Bulgaria...). A smattering of dresses come from villages in the wide plain of the Vardar river that flows through the capital, Skopje, and down the middle of the country toward Greece. One of the fascinating things is to see the general similarities of the costumes within each region, but also their individuality, because of traditions particular to a village and the preferences and artistry of the creator. The more elaborate outfits consist of up to nine garments, including: a shift or chemise, dickey, vest, jacket, blouse, skirt, apron, cap and headscarf and below, hand -knit socks. The "layered look" was definitely in! Jewelry is the finishing touch, usually coin necklaces and a belt with a large, fancy buckle.

According to the exhibit curator, Macedonian girls would start learning embroidery at around age 7 and graduated to spinning and weaving of cotton, wool and linen. Silkworms were also raised in some areas to provide thread for weaving or embroidery. The girls' wedding outfits were the zenith of their achievement and status. After the ceremony, they wore parts of them for up to three years or until giving birth to their first child.

"Young Brides, Old Treasures" opened at the International Folk Art Museum in October and runs through January 6, 2013. The museum has become the permanent home of the most comprehensive collection of Macedonian folk costumes in the western hemisphere, since the Macedonian Arts Council (based in New York) initiated it in 2005. We found out about it from a folk-dancer in our local Albuquerque group, and accompanied her to the opening festivities. It was a very special and memorable afternoon.

Many of the costumes were recent donations to the museum by none other than Ron Wixman, the legendary folk dance teacher, and Bernard Ziobro, a gentleman who spent several years as a diplomat in the former Yugoslavia. (The rest were donated several years ago by the Macedonian Arts Council.) Both men were present and happy to point out details about the costumes, explain their cultural meaning and tell stories about how they acquired them. We heard bits and pieces, such as: traditionally, women were buried in their wedding chemises, so that in the after-life mothers would be able to recognize their daughters. Their faces might be old, wrinkled and much changed, but the embroidered dress they had

poured their art and soul into as girls would remain magnificent, unique and instantly recognizable. For that reason, the dresses were not collectors' items until the tradition eroded and died out. Ron Wixman also recounted seeing women tearing up embroidered garments to use as rags in the '60s and '70s, and felt that trying to acquire the dresses and accessories was not abusing contemporary Macedonians, but a means of saving beautiful examples of their former culture. A heartwarming counterpoint to this story was that a young Macedonian visitor to the museum was delighted to see a dress from her town on display and said it was similar to her grandmother's wedding dress, which she had inherited.

Besides the exhibit, there was music and refreshments at the opening. A local Balkan band, Avenue East led by percussionist Polly Tapia Ferber, started playing on a raised stage in front of an audience of attentive visitors. Bill and I stood in the back, poised to start dancing, when the young Macedonian woman came up and asked eagerly if we were going to dance. Off we went, soon joined by her sister and our folk dance friends from Santa Fe and Los Alamos. The Macedonian sisters were obviously experienced dancers, with an innate feel for the subtlety of the rhythms. They were great to watch, and they were beaming, obviously happy. It turned out the sisters had been living in New Mexico, one for as long as eight years, and had no inkling that a local community of Balkanophiles existed in their midst! As time went on, inspired by the stirring music and the joy of the dance, many members of the audience, young and old, got up to join the line. The dance floor got packed. The finale was Makedonsko Devojce led by Polly singing and playing the Tapan surrounded by multiple rings of dancers. It was wonderful.

We hear that more special events will be scheduled during the period of the exhibition, including a concert on December 4 by Welcome to Bohemia, a balkan-klezmer-cabaret band, and in June 2012 by the Goddess of Arno, a Balkan band based in Albuquerque. Come join us!

Bruce has figured it out! He started a brand new dance class for couples, doing some really old favorites, like Corrido and Ada's Kujawiak, as well as some really new favorites like The IDS Cha Cha and Tokyo Polka. Sprinkle in a few silly party dances once in a while and you have a winner with the Mitchell touch! He's having a ball and so are the 25 or so dancers in the group so far. Most are seasoned dancers who miss the old favorites. Some are seasoned but never actually learned those old couple dances, and some are new to it all.

It keeps it challenging and Bruce was ready for a new challenge.



Eye on Dance by Eileen

Tamburitza* Extravaganza 2011

*The tamburitza is the most popular and most common of the national instruments of the Croatian people. It is a stringed instrument related to the Russian balalaika, the Ukrainian bandura and the Italian mandolin. Its name originated from the Turkish language and made its first appearance in the Balkan region in the 14th Century.

San Francisco was fortunate to be the host city this year for the Tamburitza Extravaganza, an annual event held in cities all across the country. The Hyatt Airport Regency Hotel was the 2011 venue. The hotel, which is conveniently located right off Hwy 101, is shaped like a square surrounding a gorgeous atrium containing restaurants and bars. A perfect setting for the festival. This was a world I didn't know existed, but want to visit again.

My roommate and I (we stayed at the hotel – they had a special rate for Tam Fest folks) met on Thursday evening in time for a dance workshop by the multi-talented Jerry Duke, who did a great job teaching basic Croatian dances to a room full of eager students. That was followed by the welcoming concert/dance. It is all about the music! Most people were there to listen, and in talking to some of them, discovered that they go to this event faithfully every year no matter where it's held. There were still many dancers, but the dance floor was not a crush of people. I recognized a few Bay Area dancers and a few noted teachers. Several of the twenty – yes twenty – bands played over the course of the evening and we soon had some favorites. One was Sviraj, who will be at Kolo Festival.

The next day was filled with bands playing in various locations, including Knuckles, the sports bar. Filled with appreciative music lovers, great bands and good food (not to mention the free popcorn), the atmosphere was electric. I kept wondering what the regulars and waiters thought of the bands and tamburitza enthusiasts. We met many nice music lovers from all over the country, some of whom were also taking time to explore the Bay Area. In between bands we managed to catch a dance workshop by Billy Burke. One always hopes to improve one's drmes technique and Billy really can help with that.

The hotel foyer was filled with vendors selling beautiful jewelry, clothing, CD's, DVD's and other treasures. The Folk Motif had wonderful items and of course John Filcich had a booth. He would be receiving the President's Award the next day. John said that he wished that Kolo Festival could be more like the Tam Fest. I asked what he meant by that. He said, "It's more real." I asked what he meant by more real and he said, "Less polite. Forget about having the proper handholds just dance." What I think he meant was more relaxed, more joyful and more ethnic. Well, you can't turn the whole Bay Area dance community into ethnic Croatians! I think the closest model for what he is talking about are the local Greek festivals where food, drink, music and dance all meet and less experienced but very enthusiastic people join the dance lines. Not perfect styling, but definite fun ensues.

The evening program on Friday started with a concert of ten of the bands performing. They were amazingly varied, from traditional to modern, large, small, one all women, etc. The bands came from Ohio, New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Washington, Arizona as well as California. The ballroom was packed. After the concert, two bands played in the main ballroom for dancing. At the same time bands were playing in six other rooms! For the person that doesn't want to miss anything, it can be maddening – but in a good way. An embarrassment of riches musically. Bedtime doesn't seem to mean much at this event. After a very late night (or rather early morning) of crazy fun dancing we collapsed into bed, only to hear the next day that some bands played all night.

The rest of the bands held their concert the next day and then unfortunately I could not stay for the Saturday banquet and dancing later in the day due to a family commitment. Now that I have attended my first Extravaganza I will make sure to clear my calendar for the whole weekend the next time this event is anywhere near the Bay Area. I hope that will be soon!

North/South Teacher's Conference

I shouldn't have gone. It was Yom Kippur. Gulp. One is supposed to spend the holiday with family, atoning and fasting. But my older daughter was out of town and the rest of my family do not celebrate the Jewish holidays. And North/South is one of my favorite weekends. And I missed it last year when I was in Greece. So... I chose to be with my folk dance family. Dance is my heart's religion anyway. I sat quietly amongst the gorgeous redwood trees at Monte Toyan, plugged my ears with a recording of Kol Nidre on my iPod and then hit the dance floor. (I just got an email from a friend to look on the bright side - now I have something to atone for next year!)

The schedule for the weekend is generally the same every year – a great Friday night party, classes and culture talks on Saturday, followed by another great party and then reviews and a farewell lunch on Sunday morning. Monte Toyan is also a beautiful venue (well the beds could be improved) way up in the hills above Aptos. Reminder to self – next year bring a mattress pad. On the other hand why bother? I'm always up really late dancing anyway.

The teachers this year were Ahmet Luleci (Turkish) and Anthony Ivancich (Spanish). They each presented one dance Friday night as a way of introduction. Anthony was new to me, as were his Spanish dances. Anthony has been dancing, performing, and teaching in the Los Angeles area for many years. In high school he became a performer with the Gandy Dancers and in 1960 he danced with the Westwind International Folk Ensemble, eventually becoming a co-director. Anthony was one of four men who started the Hungarian performing group, Betyárok, along with Don Green, Dick Oakes, and John Tiffany. He has done much research on the dances of Spain. He had a straightforward but gentle and very effective teaching style. His dances included Bolero de Caspe and the very fun Seguidillas de la Gomera. Anthony also introduced great music and castanets to the group.

Not to be outdone, the multi-talented Ahmet introduced us to Turkish spoons for one of his dances (Elmalarin Yongasi) and later showed us different holds and different patterns for the spoons. I had a slight advantage having learned a few of the dances he taught on a cruise last month. Among them were Adi Ceyran, Vardali and the haunting Uc Kiz Bit Ana. And since it was a Teacher's Seminar, his tips for teachers were greatly appreciated. One remark that resonated with me was how valuable it is for beginners to dance next to an experienced dancer.

Ahmet also gave a very interesting culture comer. He started by telling us how he first started dancing - at a very young age of course. He said that in Turkey, dancing is like sports. Every school has dance classes, like PE here. There are competitions between schools and everyone takes pride in their dance ability. The smaller the town, the more important dancing is, and the town will have one main style. He said with live music, the music is the primary focus. With recorded music, the dancer is primary. Interesting. Also

each region has its own yelling style! But in all regions in Turkey the dance should have one leader and the line should stay together.

If you read my Kolo Festival article last year, Ahmet continued on that theme – about what is "wrong". This topic seems to stir up a lot of animated discussion. Ahmet said that when he was in a performing group in Turkey they argued about every last step, arm position and turn. But when they went back to the villages, people could care less about any of that. Villagers change things from day to day depending on lots of things, like their mood, the weather, the surface, the music, possibly some alcohol may be involved. Since we, the International Recreational Folk Dance Community, are dancing for our own enjoyment and are not performing, we should learn to relax. There is no wrong!

Well... not quite. He did say that if someone choreographs a dance they say is from a region, but disrespects the traditional movements of a region, then that is wrong. You need to have knowledge of the area. But that things evolve and change. He finds people doing his dances and telling him that he is doing it wrong! He said that the dance is now theirs. He wonders why no one complains when musicians play a piece of music differently. That's okay, musical expression. But if a dance changes, everyone complains. He's encouraging us to let go and improvise. Whew. Ahmet had so many interesting things to say, I hope I interpreted them correctly. I wish you all could have heard him. It's a vast topic with many sides and if you have an opinion send it in to Let's Dance!

There was still plenty of time for dancing! Saturday night there was an all request dance party and I compliment everyone for the wonderful varied list that accumulated. The dancers that come to this seminar are a talented bunch of dancers and teachers. Dancing with them is what makes this weekend so unique. Special thanks to Laura Bremer for keeping the music rolling all weekend. And many thanks to the committee including Laura, Marion Earl, Mary Hancock, Richard Julian, Carol Maybrier and Howard Scott.

Yet again it was a fantastic weekend.

A Gathering of the Village Elders

Over the past months, the Federation Archives Committee amassed a medium-sized box full of mostly black and white photographs of varying sizes. They appeared to be from the 1940s up to the early 19870s. Most were not labeled or dated, although a few have some names or a date or a location. Almost thirty 'village elders' were invited to meet and review the photos and get as much information onto them as possible. After all, what's the point of maintaining old photos if you don't know anything about them!?

A date and time were finally agreed upon, and 11 dancers from around Northern California gathered at the home of Bill and Louise Lidicker in the Berkeley Hills. After a potluck lunch, they attacked the photos, armed with pencils and magnifying glasses.

"This is Sue and her partner Dick. What was their last name?"

"This looks like Marge, but who's she dancing with?"

"Look! Everyone was dancing barefoot!"

"I have no idea who these people are!"

"Oh, this guy! He was a terrific dancer! I wonder what happened to him..."

"This was the group from Southern California that used to perform... what was their name...?"

And so it went. Three hours later, a bit more than half of the photos had enough additional information to put them in the "Done" pile, but there were still lots of photos left unidentified or untouched. The Archives Committee will hold another session with the remaining photos, probably after the December holidays

The Federation Archives—What A Resource!

BACKGROUND. About two years ago, the Federation Archives Committee (Adony and Becky Beniares, co-chairs) put out a call for any folk dance-related documents, media, and memorabilia so that the Committee could begin to assemble and organize a resource that would be available to Federation members and researchers in general. This past spring the Archive Committee members, plus a few other interested dancers, met at the Beniares home in Sunnyvale for what was billed as a Sorting Party. The over 90 boxes (you read that right - ninety boxes) were opened, the contents sorted, organized, and inventoried, and then put back into boxes that were labeled.

We will pick and date, time and place, and let potential participants know.

VIDEO TAPES. Some of these videotapes were made by the Federation Research Committee starting in the mid 1980s when camcorders first became available. Someone videotaped the many and frequent workshops in California, and Bruce and Mary Wyckoff maintained them for several years. The box of videotapes eventually found its way to the Federation archives. Because videotape players are becoming less and less common, it was felt that converting them to DVD format would be helpful, and this has been done. Both the videotape and DVD version can be made available to researchers upon request. Given sufficient lead time, digitized videoclips can made and be emailed.



Syrtós Kitrínou

(Greek)

Syrtós Kitrínou (seer-TOH kee-TREE-noo) was choreographed by Maurits van Geel in 2008. "Kitrínou" translates as "Geel" in Dutch, or "yellow" in English. While the choreographer prefers the Dutch pronunciation as shown, it should be noted that the correct pronunciation in Greek is "seer-TOS KEE-tree-noo." The music is a Greek Gypsy folk song, "Nas balamo," that is intended for listening, not dancing, and is not in Syrtós rhythm. The song version used for the choreography is sung by Eleni Vitali. This dance was presented by Roberto Bagnoli at the 2011 Stockton Folk Dance Camp at the University of the Pacific.

Music: 4/4 meter CD: Ethnic Festival 2011 CD, Track 6

Formation: Mixed open circle, facing center, hands joined in W-pos.

Steps and Softly bouncing throughout the dance. Steps are low to the ground.

Styling:

Measures 4/4 meter PATTERN

INTRODUCTION: 4 meas; no action.

I. TRAVEL; TOUCH & SWING R; REEL BACK TWICE; TRAVEL

- Bounce on L, lifting R from the floor at the end (ct &); with a gliding motion, step R to R (ct 1); step L behind R (ct 2); step R to R (ct 3); step L across in front of R (ct 4).
- Touch R fwd (ct 1); hold (ct 2); swing straight R leg slightly to R (ct &); swing straight R leg to L above the floor in front of L (ct 3); swing straight R leg to R (ct 4).
- Bounce on L (ct 1); swing R a little further to the side and behind L, and step R behind L (ct 2); repeat meas 3 cts 1-2 with opp ftwk (cts 3-4).
- Bounce on L, lifting R to R (ct 1); step R to R (ct 2); step L in front of R (ct 3); step R to R (ct &); step L across in front of R (ct 4).

II. TRAVEL; TOUCH & SWING R; REEL BACK ONCE; TOUCH & SWING L; TRAVEL

1-2 Repeat Fig I, meas 1-2.

Bounce on L (ct 1); swing R a little further to the side and behind L, and step R behind L (ct 2); touch L fwd (ct 3); hold (ct 4).

Swing straight R leg slightly to R (ct &); swing straight R leg to L above the floor in front of L (ct 1); swing straight R leg to R (ct 2); step L across in front of R (ct 3); step R to R (ct &); step L across in front of R (ct 4).

L TURN VARIATION IN MEAS 2

With straight leg, step R across L, turning CCW (ct 1); step L in place, continuing to turn (ct 2); step fwd on R to ctr, bending R knee and bending body fwd (ct 3); step bkwd on L, straightening (ct 4).

Sequence: Fig I and II as many times as the leader decides; the turn variation, done in Fig I or II, as the leader calls. Although Roberto did not teach it at Stockton, a traveling turn to the R can be done in meas 4 of Fig I, as per a video of a Dutch class performing it at http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=xoWLhP2293I: Bounce on L, lifting R to R (ct 1); step R-L-R, turning CW (cts 2, 3, &); step L across in front of R (ct 4).

Note re the lyrics: While the song is in Greek, the chorus is in a Gypsy dialect. The non-chorus words were found at http://www.musicolog.com/forum_cevap.asp?ID=1184 (see second entry under "Replies") and at the YouTube video referenced above under "Video." The spelling differs from what was provided by Roberto Bagnoli in his notes for Stockton camp. For the third line of the chorus, which differs from the usual version of the song, the second word corresponding to what Eleni sings was found in a Greek comment on the YouTube video at http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=j3Fply9xJ-w&feature=results_video&playnext=1&list=PL4B35033D9BB690D3. The chorus and its translation should not be taken as definitive.
