




President's Message

Time flies when you are having fun. As I reflect on the activities since June, the Federation has introduced a couple of programs. First to report is the change to a new insurance program under Great American Insurance Company for the General Liability and Hartford Life and Accident for the Accidental Death, Dismemberment and Medical that provide greater coverage at less cost and with fewer documentation tasks for our members than previously. To make the

transition from the old insurance plan to the current one as seamless as possible to you, our members, all prorated costs from existing member clubs will be absorbed by the Federation until June 30, 2012. Starting on July 1, 2012, clubs who wish to be covered under the Federation's plan will start paying into the self-funding program.

So are you coming up with a slogan for the Federation to use? In the last publication, I announced the Snoopy Award, to be given to the winner of the best slogan. Snoopy says: To live is to dance, to dance is to live. The Federation is looking for original slogans to use that project and reflect our love of dancing, singing, music, and friendship. Deadline for submission of slogans is November 1, 2011. Submit your entries to me at LucySChang@gmail.com. I know that folk dancers can be very creative. Get a group together while dancing a Lesnoto and come up with slogans.

Our campaign to attract new and returning dancers had a great start. The first in our series of New Dancers Festival was held on June 26, 2011 in Sunnyvale, hosted by the South Bay/ Peninsula dancers. By all accounts, the new dancers, the teachers, our angels, volunteers, the committee and even our magical MC, Loui Tucker, had a great time. The sign-in sheet had 123 participants, of which 70 indicated they were new dancers, and 29 indicated on the survey that they wanted to know more about folk dancing. We prepared "come back and dance with us again" packages containing a CD and steps of the dances taught as well as fliers from the local and immediate surrounding groups announcing their specialties. Many thanks to the teachers for donating their valuable time to this endeavor. Special thanks to David Heald and Stephanie Johnson who came all the way from Solvang to give us Cumberland Square. The many volunteers played a huge part in the success. Please see Denise Heenan's wonderful article on this Festival.

The Sacramento dancers are hosting a Beginners Festival on September 15, with weekly classes to follow. 


Help us celebrate Labor Day, September 5, in San Rafael at lovely Gerstle Park!

Coming from north of San Rafael (101): Take the Central San Rafael exit (Heatherton). Turn right on Third Street, one way west bound.

On Third Street, watch for D street, turn left. Go up D until you come to Bayview Street, at a stoplight signal and turn right. Turn left at Marin St., Turn right on San Rafael Ave. Look to your left—there it is. It has a rock wall.

The Federation Archives - What A Resource!

BACKGROUND. About two years ago, the Federation Archives Committee (Adony and Becky Beniares, co-chairs) put out a call for any folk dance-related documents, media, and memorabilia so that the Committee could begin to assemble and organize a resource that would be available to Federation members and researchers in general. This past spring the Archive Committee members, plus a few other interested dancers, met at the Beniares home in Sunnyvale for what was billed as a Sorting Party. The over 90 boxes (you read that right - ninety boxes) were opened, the contents sorted, organized, and inventoried, and then put back into boxes that were labeled.

The Archives Committee has made some suggestions about what to do with older media such as cassette tapes (maintain for decorating purposes, donate, review, copy, convert to other media, recycle the excess, etc.), but of particular

interest should be the video tape collection and the photographs. At the present time, all of the items are in a locked storage facility in Sunnyvale.

THE PHOTOGRAPHS. These are primarily black and white photographs of varying sizes. Most are not labeled or dated, although a few have just a name or two or just a date. The Archives Committee plans to gather some of the "village elders" who are interested in sitting down one afternoon this fall at a more-or-less central location to review and label these photographs. If you consider yourself a "village elder," or otherwise want to attend, please contact Loui Tucker (loui@louitucker.com or 408-287-9999) who is collecting the names of people willing to participate. We will pick and date, time and place, and let potential participants know.

VIDEO TAPES. Some of these videotapes were made by the Federation Research Committee starting in the mid 1980s when camcorders first became available. Someone videotaped the many and frequent workshops in California, and Bruce and Mary Wyckoff maintained them for several years. The box of videotapes eventually found its way to the Federation archives. Because videotape players are becoming less and less common, it was felt that converting them to DVD format would be helpful, and this has been done. Both the videotape and DVD version can be made available to researchers upon request. Given sufficient lead time, digitized video clips can be made and be emailed.

On the Federation website you will find a list of the dances that were filmed along with the teacher.

USING THE ARCHIVED MATERIALS. If you want to see any of the archived materials mentioned here or on the Federation website, the first step is to get in touch with someone on the Archives Committee: Becky and Adony Beniares (beni@pacbell.net) or Loui Tucker (loui@louitucker.com or 408-287-9999). Let them know what you'd like to see. Depending on the item and what you plan to do with it, arrangements will be made to (1) photocopy and mail a copy, (2) scan and email a copy, (3) mail the item on loan with the expectation that it will be returned in the same condition by a certain date, or (4) set a date for you to visit the storage unit and review the item(s) at your convenience.

If you have items in your closet, basement, attic or storage unit that you would like to add to the archives, particularly if you can see from the inventory that we don't already have those items, please get in touch with an Archive Committee member.

Romania Redux

In 2009 I traveled through Bukovina & Moldavia with Theodor Vasilescu on his annual folkdance tour. A group of us were eager to dance through Dobrogea and Transylvania this summer but Theodor had to cancel the tour. We contacted Active Travel through Velko Kasamov, the cycling guide whose expertise I enjoyed last summer in Bulgarian. They arranged a custom tour for us that included folk dance lessons and performances. Cristian Caprioara, our patient, personable and competent guide, began learning Romanian folk dance 3 years ago for his wedding and has continued weekly lessons with Mr. Frunza in Brasov.

Along the route we also hiked through a breathtaking gorge in Piatra Craiului National Park and at scenic Lake Balea on the Transfagarasan Road. We lingered for extended wine tasting and lunch at the Ostrov vineyard on an island in the Danube and enjoyed sampling Tuica (brandy) made from various fruits at the Palinca de la Teo tasting room in Sighi-soara

Sightseeing in outdoor museums, fortified churches, medieval cities, Roman ruins, and much more kept us fully engaged for 12 days. It was a treat to travel back roads with a small group of 9 eager participants in a nimble minibus. Motoring down from the mud volcanoes of Berca on "Sambata Morilor," an Orthodox special day to remember deceased loved ones, Cristian stopped the bus so we could chat with a woman and taste her Koleva, a sweet prepared from grains, walnuts and honey, to honor the dead.

We enjoyed accommodation in several boutique hotels during the tour-- the Venezia in Bucharest, the Casa Wagner in Sighisoara, Casa Matei in Berca and Gheiotelul Pension near Avrig. Other hotels/pensions were clean, comfortable and pleasant. In the Delta we transferred by boat to the Delta Paradis Hotel, located on a canal of the Danube River, where we enjoyed watching birds and dining on fresh fish on the veranda. Our planned boat tour of the Delta was first shortened by folks' reluctance to get into the ill maintained boats. Their apprehension was affirmed when a motor failed. Fortunately a local fisherman supplied tools and a new fuel line for the boat. We returned to the dock before the mosquitoes woke up and danced merrily in the spacious restaurant. Ping Chun and I

both brought laptops with music files for impromptu evening parties. A highlight of the tour was our final dinner in Bucharest with Lia and Theodor Vasilescu. After the professional performance concluded we bravely danced Hora Munteneasca and Balta Dreapta, dances we learned in Berca, for Theodor and then followed his lead in favorite dances he has introduced to the folkdance community.

The custom tour included accommodation, breakfasts, English speaking tour guide, bus and driver, 4 dance lessons, and several performances.

Contact information for Cristian (also a ski instructor & mountain guide) and Active Travel is below. I recommend that anyone traveling in Romania dance a few horas, wander a mountain path and toast your friends with a glass of tuica.

Dance-on-the-Water to Portugal 2011

Dance-on-the-Water cruises have been traveling and dancing around the world for over twenty-five years. In June I joined them for wonderful a trip to Portugal. We started in Lisbon, traveled up to Oporto by bus and then cruised up the Douro River. Mel Mann and his wife Esther led the trip, assisted by Roberto Bagnoli, our dance leader. It was Roberto's first trip with Dance-on-the-Water and I hope it won't be his last.

Before going to Portugal, despite all my historical reading of Portuguese explorers, I had a vague impression that it was the little sister of Spain. I was wrong. Portugal definitely has its own culture, foods, dances, music and language pronunciations. My education began on day one, with a visit to the Fado Museum (thank you Kay) - a style of music unique to Portugal. I had downloaded some fado onto my iPod before the trip to immerse myself in Portugal musically, so I was slightly familiar with it, but learned much more at the museum. There are two basic styles of fado - Lisbon and Coimbra. In Lisbon fado is sung by a solo performer, but in Coimbra it is often performed by groups of male university students. Two guitarists accompany both styles. One plays the melody on a twelve-stringed Portuguese guitar (descendant of the English guitar introduced into Portugal by the British), and the other supplies the rhythm on the six-stringed viola. The intensely melancholy songs are usually about love (naturally), or express sadness and longing, but in Coimbra may occasionally contain humor and political undertones. The museum was a marvel - you could cocoon in a comfy chair with headphones and listen all day. Fado Heaven. That was topped off by a visit to a live fado performance a few nights later.

Sometimes you have an experience that is worth your whole trip. That happened to me while we were still in Lisbon. I heard music and looked out the window of our lovely hotel -The Lisboa Plaza. Parading down the street was a large group of people of all ages, wearing traditional folk costumes. I ran to the lobby as they were entering the hotel and snapped pictures as they assembled in a private room reserved for us! After we all joined them, the group, called Rancho Folklorico da Ribeira de Celavisa, heartily demonstrated many Portuguese dances for us. The music was lively and played with joy and pride (two accordions, a drum and several small stringed instruments). Then they invited us to join them. I danced with a very nice young man, not even feeling like his mother for the moment. At one point a little girl about two years old wandered across the floor. I automatically held out my arms and she came right into them, wanting to be picked up. Beatrice gave me a big kiss and was soon sharing her cookie with me. I fell instantly in love with her. When I could tear myself away I went back to the dancing. Soon after, we invited the troupe to dance with us! The dances we shared with them were an eclectic mix - Passu Turrau, Hora Munte and Ordu. We all really enjoyed ourselves and the troupe appreciated our interest in their culture. A wonderful evening, despite a sad farewell to little Beatrice.

After the troupe left we continued to dance and to get better acquainted with our dance leader. Roberto, who lives in Italy, was first introduced to folk music and dance in Rome, eventually gravitating to performing and teaching. He subsequently studied various forms of folk dance under the guidance of renowned choreographers and teachers. In recent years, he has organized some of the most important annual folk dance events in Italy, such as, Balkanot, Maratona di Danza, and Camp Yofi, an Israeli Dance Camp in Lago di Garda. Currently, he teaches weekly classes in Italy, and various workshops and seminars throughout Europe, the US and Canada. He will be in Stockton again this year. Also check out Balkanot – a Balkan/Israeli dance camp that will be held in Italy, Jan. 2-5, 2012. The Website for more information is http://www.morenu.it/balkanot/english/.

A few of us knew Roberto from Stockton – in fact I can't imagine Stockton without him. Roberto has a knack for mixing fantastic music with vigorous interesting steps. I have taught some of his very creative dances to groups I dance with and they are frequently requested. On this trip we danced everyday, usually twice – either in the morning or afternoon, and again at night. From the many comments I heard, everyone on the trip appreciated his easygoing manner, direct teaching style, friendly approachability and subtle encouragement. His repertoire is very eclectic. And watching him dance is very easy on the eyes. Some of the dances he taught us were Mazurca de St. Andieu, Kirmizi Biber, Fel Shara, Hopa Diri Da, To Milo and the Portuguese dance Malhao. Come to the Albany Y Friday nights if you want to try some of them.

From the very first day we were drinking, umm, er, seeing many fabulous sights in Sintra, Obidos, Coimbra (I finally learned how to pronounce it –Kweembra) and Oporto – famous for the Port tasting houses that line the south side of the river. I still have visions of the gorgeous tile work on the houses, the challenging crooked cobblestone streets, the huge shrubs and flowers everywhere and the many castles, palaces, Cathedrals and monasteries presented to us by our fantastic guide Helena, to whom we had to bid a sad goodbye in Oporto when we boarded our ship.

Life suddenly became more relaxed, because now our rooms were traveling with us up the Douro River. The scenery was incredible in this lush wine-growing valley, with mile after mile, or should I say kilometer after kilometer, of rolling hills covered in terraced vineyards, interspersed with olive trees and wineries. And we saw the famous cork trees, learning that they take twenty years to mature and nine years to produce each crop of cork. They can live for over two hundred years. Cork is definitely needed, since the valley is a major source of port wine, of which we had several tasting sessions. We now know our white from our tawny and ruby. Well, maybe a bit more tasting is necessary to become expert.

One night we visited a local winery for dinner. Two musicians playing traditional music welcomed us to the tasting room and then led us to the dining room. After a hearty dinner we danced around the tables to their accompaniment. Another night a large band came on board to entertain us. They sang a mix of traditional fado and folk music. The singer explained the difference between a Coimbra guitar, which has a teardrop design and a Lisbon guitar, which has a rose or a spiral. Soon the crew joined the band and pulled people from the audience to participate. Fun ensued. A few days later, we also gave a short performance on board for the other passengers, who were Norwegian, Flemish and Belgian. Roberto led us in sev-

Eral of the dqnces he taught during the week and we ended with the Portugese dance Malhao. That was a big hit, especially with the crew, who sang along. Dance can communicate in all languages

Another night the ship hosted a Portuguese barbeque outside on the top deck. The thing I love about travel is that one never knows when fabulous moments will occur. One such spontaneous and very memorable evening eventuated that night. We had perfect weather for the trip, and that night was no exception. Grilled sardines are a local specialty and there were plenty to go around, as well as sausages, lamb, ribs, and much more. What made the evening really special was our talented on-board musician, Arsenio. He began to play the keyboard and sing - framed by a brightly lit bridge across the water behind him. We started dancing to old time rock and roll, the twist, the chicken dance, the stroll, YMCA, Latin dances and even did a cocek to one song. The evening wore on, and other passengers left, but several of us didn't wear out. The staff and crew joined the dancing and kept us going until late at night. The evening was a blast. I'd have to say it was the liveliest most fun crew I've ever cruised with. They were always ready to dance and have fun. Is that in their job description I wonder? Or is it just in the Portuguese genes?

What really makes a trip like this special are all the people you meet and bond with all week. In our group there were people from England, Japan, Italy, and all parts of the U.S. All united by a love of dance, travel and exploring other cultures. What could be more enjoyable than traveling with such a diverse yet compatible group? I have made long lasting friendships on these trips and my life has been enriched immensely. Many thanks to Mel and Esther, who are always there, ready to confront any problems that arise, and who keep us informed of the daily events, meetings and dance sessions. After going on several previous trips with them, it's easy to take them for granted, but their hard work and organizational skills are much appreciated. Cheers to Roberto for his wonderful teaching, good spirits and many new dances. Also thanks to Andre for always being willing to dance, to Kay for being a great traveling companion, to Francine for the great afternoon dance session when we played hooky from the daily excursion (and the dancing on the Monastery patio), to the pastry chef for dancing with me one night when everyone else went to bed, and to all the other new friends I made along the way.



Max Horn's daughter writes about experiences with her father

Editor-

My name is Linda Horn McElroy, and I am one of the daughters of Max Horn. My sister recently sent me copies of the flyer and some articles from Let's Dance about my Dad. I wish I could be there for the Picnic on Labor Day in honor of Dad, but I live in South Dakota now and will be unable to attend.

I would like to say that I was touched by the articles regarding Dad and June's farm and the happy times people had folk dancing there. I would like to tell you a little about my Dad and folk dancing.

I don't know exactly when he started dancing, but I know he and my mother folk danced before I was born, back in the early 50's. He taught her how to dance, which was no small feat, since she was blind. I believe I have some slides somewhere of him and my Mom dancing.

As the years passed, with the demands of work and family, they gradually stopped dancing. When Mom died in 1968, Dad took up folk dancing again. I still lived at home and was in Junior High School at the time. I started helping Dad teach dancing around the Bay Area, and we traveled as far north as Sonoma and as far south as Oakland to teach for various groups. We used to haul a sound system, record player and many boxes of records to every class. I remember going folk dancing every Saturday night, and very much enjoyed dancing in Berkeley and Vineburg. One of my favorite memories from that time was dancing "La Golondrina" with him for a public access TV show in Richmond. That music still brings back memories for me.

Sometime in the early 70's, I took over editing Let's Dance from Vi Dexheimer. I edited the magazine for several years, justifying each line by hand, since I did not have a computer. Dad was tremendously supportive and helped me by providing advice and materials. I continued to edit Let's Dance after I started college, but June took over from me in the mid-70's, not long after she married Dad.

Dad was a giving, selfless individual. He would give you the shirt off his back if you needed it. Over the years, we helped him remodel his mother's house in Goldfield, Nevada, driving all night to work for 2 days, then driving home again in time for work and school. He also helped finish his brother's house in Placerville after a stroke made my uncle unable to do this on his own.

After moving to Martinez in the mid-70's, his dream was to build a "folk dance barn", and the cement dance floor was the first step. With the nice weather, though, I think the open air format was the best thing.

I am touched to hear that people want to get together to remember Dad. Folk Dancing has lost one of its most ardent and passionate supporters. His legacy will be the many people who would not have otherwise learned to folk dance if not for him. Thanks again for the articles.

Maypole Festival

Do you have fond memories of dancing around a Maypole as a child? Maypole dancing is a form of folk dance from western Europe, especially England, the Basque Country, Sweden, Galicia, Portugal and Germany. While it is now associated with Victorian ribbon plaiting, the Maypole has much older and more primitive symbolism. In some cultures, the "tree" or Maypole had significance as a life-giving source and was celebrated in song and dance.

This may seem outside the realm of our traditional folk dances, yet historically it really is a dance "of the people". The Folk Dance Federation is embracing its rich folk history and planning to sponsor a Maypole Festival. This Festival could possibly be tied in with a festival in 2012 with singing, dancing, and a celebration of Spring.

DANCE ETIQUETTE Tip #1 --- Be courteous, be caring and be considerate when joining a dance. Avoid breaking into a line that has formed. Join at the end away from the leader.

Exception #1: If you know the dancers you are breaking apart very well and know they will not mind.

Exception #2: Dancers indicate by gesture or expression that you may break in.

Comments: The leader is typically on the right, but sometimes a dance leads to left or both ways. If you are not sure, watch the movement of the dance first. Also be aware of the composition of the line (or circle). Avoid squeezing in where it is already crowded; join where is plenty of space. For shoulder or belt hold dances, dance next to dancers close to your height and style.
