DIRECTIONS TO LIVE OAK PARK BY PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION:

Take the Richmond BART train and exit at the BERKELEY station (not NORTH BERKELEY). You can then walk north to 1301 Shattuck Avenue. Otherwise, on Shattuck Avenue near the BART station, you can catch (in front of "Games of Berkeley" store across Shattuck St) either a 7, 9 or 18 bus heading north; get off at Berryman and walk east (up a slight incline) one block to Shattuck Avenue.

DIRECTIONS TO LIVE OAK PARK BY CAR:

Coming from San Francisco or from points north on Highway 80, take the University Avenue exit in Berkeley; drive east to the end of the street (the street ends at the UC campus); turn left, proceeding north; at the 5th stop light, turn left; travel two blocks; turn right onto Shattuck Avenue and park. Live Oak Park is in the middle of this block.

Coming from anywhere south of Oakland, take Highway 880 North to the Highway 24 exit (to Walnut Creek and Berkeley); take the Berkeley exit (Martin Luther King Jr. Way) and follow signs to Martin Luther King Jr. Way; proceed north for 3 ½ miles to Rose Street and turn right; pass one stop light, short distance to stop sign (Shattuck Ave), go one more block to Walnut St turn left Live Oak Park is in middle of block, park. 

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Eye on Dance by Eileen

Kolo Festival 2011, 60 Years Young

The Yugoslav Folk Dancers' "First Annual" Kolo Festival was held in November of 1952 at Castro Hall, San Francisco. It was organized by John Filcich as a fund-raiser for "Vyts" Beliajus, who was ill with tuberculosis. I'm sure the organizers of that first festival could not have imagined that 60 years later it would still be going strong and would become one of the most popular festivals in the Bay Area. For its 60th Birthday, San Francisco's Kolo Festival moved to a new venue at SF City College. Well, not entirely new. In 1980 it spent one year at City College, but not in the gorgeous new Wellness Center - with two large rooms for dancing and great floors. This came with a nice bonus of easy parking in the school parking lots and close access to BART.

Kolo was held on the Friday and Saturday after Thanksgiving as usual. On Friday morning classes started at 9:20 AM. People arriving at that hour did not see all the worker bees who, the day after their Thanksgiving dinners, woke up even earlier to set up the rooms, sound systems, registration tables, etc. Much thanks to all of them.

Serbian teacher Miroslav "Bata" Marcetic taught the first dance class of the day, while Greg Jenkins was also teaching Brass Ensemble. Plenty of room and rooms for all. I was not familiar with Bata, but when he walked into the floor in his thin-soled beige leather dance shoes and demonstrated the first dance, he appeared to float. I was soon a fan and am looking forward to his teaching at Stockton this summer. Bata was a leading performer, soloist and choreographer with the Serbian National Folk Ensemble "Kolo" in Belgrade, Serbia and Montenegro (former Yugoslavia) for seventeen years. Now in Canada, he works in several dance associations and ensembles. In 2004, he established his own school of dance, "Academy of Serbian Folk Dancing" which includes more than 300 dancers of all ages. He showed some video clips of his talented group during his culture corner. The dances he taught at Kolo were lively and well received. Some popular ones were Krnjevacko (Retko) Kolo, Pre Picior and Vlajna. Steve Kotansky was the other dance teacher and taught the second class on Friday. Tanya Varim taught singing at that hour. Steve has been to Kolo Festival and other camps and workshops around the Bay Area many times. He has a great knack of selecting dances that I love paired with fantastic music. His earthy style was the perfect contrast to Bata's perky Serbian dances, making for two well-rounded days. A few of Steve's dances were Kcim, a slightly different version of Cicovata, Prinsko Cetvorno Horo and my absolute favorite, the haunting Vallje Hadje Merre Furken.

Unlike previous years, food and alcohol were not allowed in the dance rooms and there were no meals served at the Festival this year. However, a short walk took you to several interesting eateries and a ten-minute drive took you to West Portal, with its array of exciting dining choices. After lunch break the ageless John Filcich taught kolos for an hour.

Then a dilemma – while Bata taught his afternoon class, Steve gave his culture corner talk. The reverse of this problem happened again the next day. What to do?? I hope in upcoming years they can find a way to alter this scheduling problem for people who don't want to miss any of the dance classes, but love to hear the culture talks too. To add to the array of choices, singing with Mark Forry and Danilo Yanich also took place, as well as Balkan Ensemble Workshops. We should be thankful for this embarrassment of riches!

In Steve's culture corner there were some interesting discussions, with one touching on the continuing topic of what's "right"/authentic/etc. Unfortunately my extensive notes are in CA (aaach) and I am here in the Antipodes for a few months, but I remember Steve saying that each group needs to ask themselves why they are dancing. Is it to perform? Or to faithfully reproduce the culture of other ethnic groups? Or to have fun and socialize? Each group will have different answers that are "right" for them.

Between classes and parties many vendors set up around the main room and in the entryway. The Folk Motif had lovely items for sale, Mel and Esther Mann displayed their Dance-on-the-Water tours, John had his music CD's and videos for sale and a few other booths sold clothes and jewelry. One stall selling Turkish jewelry and coin belts at half-price was very popular. Common sights were women parading around the floor, modeling or making decisions on which coin belt to buy. The ensuing jingling contributed to the festive atmosphere.

The wealth of music and dance continued into the evening with lots of live music and party time. Friday started with Bitov Jam and then many amazing bands played continuously in two rooms both nights and in a Kafana set up at the end of the hall. The band Sviraj from Steelton Pennsylvania, who I first saw at the Tam Fest, played both nights and they were so great to dance to. The other bands were Novi Malesevski Zurli, Trio Zulum, Helladelics, Black Sea Surf who really rocked, Tam Jam on Saturday night, The Varimezovi Family, Agapi Mou and Brass Menazeri. A big thank you to the person who thought of buying a box of ear plugs and taping them to the door of one of the dance rooms! Da Mozem, Gradina and Friends, Trio Mio and The Black Hats were among the performers in the Kafana. For me, the afternoon classes are great, but the evening dance parties are what really make the festival. With the fantastic variety of bay area bands, the teachers joining in the dances with a variety of seasoned folk dancers and various other ethnic aficionados - the crazy unpredictability and sheer joy of it all made for another fantastic year.

Thank you to the Kolo Festival Board of Directors, John Filcich (Founding Director), Jerry Duke (Festival Director), Bill Cope (Music Director), Marion Earl (Registration Director), Miriam Berg (Treasurer), Jan Rains (President and Volunteer Coordinator) and Sharen Nyberg (Secretary). Additional thanks to Gary Anderson (Publicity Chair) and Rita Morgan (On-site registration coordinator). Also to the many helpful volunteers and work exchange folks who gave their time and energy. And here's to Kolo Festival's first 60 years! May it continue to thrive. If this year was any indication, it will have a long future.

Who the Heck is Erica Goldman?

I'm sure you've heard that Steve Kotansky and Erica Goldman will be teaching at this year's Statewide in San Jose. We all know and love Steve for his excellent teaching and unabashed enthusiasm. When he leads a dance, those of us in the line are magically transported to the country of origin. It's an amazing, true folk dance experience. Steve is well known and loved by us all.

That brings us back to the question, "Who the heck is Erica Goldman"? I first heard her name when Loui Tucker and Sabine Zappe suggested she be one of the teachers at Statewide 2012. I'd never even heard of her. I have to be honest. I was skeptical about Israeli as well. It's not that I don't enjoy it, but love it? Not so sure. We agreed to wait until I saw Erica teach at Stockton before making a decision.

Shortly into my first class with Erica I was enthralled. I decided to wait for one more class before announcing that I really wanted her for the San Jose Statewide that Loui, Sabine and I were organizing. Literally 5 minutes into Tuesday's class, I turned to the person dancing next to me and pronounced that we HAD to have Erica at Statewide. I remember saying, "This person HAS to be shared".

So who the heck is Erica Goldman? After taking her classes at Stockton, I can say with certainty that she is an extremely well-prepared teacher who knows her material inside out and backwards. Ask her what happens on the second half of beat 3 of a pattern and she'll tell you without hesitation. Ask her about styling, and she'll explain what the choreographer says as well as what most people do. From my perspective, the hardest thing about Israeli dancing is learning the fast paced choreographies. Erica cues the next pattern at just the right time BEFORE it comes up. You actually have a moment to think before the pattern changes. She also allows for a lot of practice with transitions. Most importantly her classes are fun!

I never would have guessed that Stockton was Erica's first experience teaching international folk dancers. Her selection of dances was inspired, from the fast paced and challenging Adama Veshamayim with the most exciting melody and my personal favorite of Stockton camp last year, to the medium paced, spunky Debka Medabeket and lovely, slow Kol Nedarai. Stockton might be Erica's first international folk dance camp, but I guarantee it won't be her last. I predict that she will become a very popular teacher within the folk dance community in a very short time. She's that good.

So who the heck is Erica Goldman? She is an upbeat, down-to-earth, polished Israeli dance teacher who loves people and likes to have a good time. I am so thrilled to share her at Statewide 2012. Those of you who went to Stockton know what a jewel she is. For the rest of you, come to San Jose the weekend of May 18 and find out. You won't be sorry!



Arlene and Mark's Amazing trip to Korça, Albania-August 2011

When Mark and I decided to attend Yannis Kostantinou's 25th Anniversary Seminar in Laimos, Greek Macedonia this summer, we wanted to include a side trip into Albania for three days as well. The first part of our vacation we spent an incredible 10 days in the Lake Prespes region with dance teachers from 11 different regions of Greece and attended nightly parties with various bands.

We had previously gone to Sashko Anastasov's seminar in Struga (next to Lake Ohrid), Republic of Macedonia in 2009 and tried to cross over into Albania then, but we didn't have enough time on that trip. Since then, Mark really wanted to try to go to Albania the next time we were close to the border.

I wanted to see if I could find a local tour guide who could customize our tour. I located a tour company on-line called "Tours by Locals" and was surprised and delighted to find a woman named Orieta Gliozheni who lives in Korça, and who had just opened a tour company there! I contacted her and let her know what we wanted to do. She was happy to accommodate all our needs for a three day trip to Korça. Orieta turned out to be quite charming and spoke perfect English.

We got a ride to the border...it was less than 1/2 hour away. Orieta was waiting for us there and we walked across the border, got our visas and were on our way! Carol Friedman, who teaches dance classes in Petaluma and Point Reyes, was traveling with us.

We opted to stay in a guest house rather than a hotel. This guest house was our first of many pleasant surprises. It was located off the main boulevard, but was a quiet and beautiful refuge from the traffic and heat. There was an older, elegantly dressed gentleman in the parlor. The guest house was a former private residence. We introduced ourselves and then he asked us if we knew who the "Blues Brothers" were...we said, "of course!"...He then showed us an oil portrait of John Belushi and Dan Aykroid on the staircase dressed as the Blues Brothers from Saturday Night Live! There was also a photo of Jim Belushi in the dining room. It turns out that this gentleman is a cousin. He told us that the rest of the family went to Chicago to open a restaurant and his family stayed behind.

We dropped off our luggage...the rooms were gorgeous...and then Orieta took us on a tour of the city. We didn't know what to expect and as Americans, we didn't know a lot about Albania. Korça is a lovely city. It's very European in style and there were a lot of people strolling on the streets. There is a lot of construction going on and people we saw seemed to be happy and prosperous. There were a lot of shops and restaurants. We had a delicious lunch and Orieta ordered a variety of dishes. The meat is halal and she was quite proud of the fact that the meat there is considered some of the best in the region.

One of the things we were interested in was to try to connect with a friend of Raif Hyseni's who is a musician. I study Alabanian singing with Merita Halili, Raif's wife, when she comes to Mendocino Balkan Camp so I really wanted to hear some music. Orieta was able to contact Zhani Struga, who is a traditional clarinet musician. She also contacted another band who plays a type of music called Serenata. These musicians

are hired to serenade people. Orieta set up a dinner where the two types of musicians came to play for us. This was definitely a highlight for us. I even got to sing a few songs with the bands! We spent a delightful evening being serenaded, eating delicious food, and even getting up and dancing!

The next day, we were treated to a traditional Albanian breakfast at the guest house. We had sticky buns, sausage, cheese, coffee, corn porridge, fruit and bread. It was all very delicious.

Orieta came to pick us up and we drove to a small village where we were going to take a boat ride to an old chapel. Orieta seemed to know everyone in the area and we had a private viewing of the chapel.

On the road back, we heard music playing. Orieta asked if we wanted to stop and check it out and of course we said, "Yes!"

There was a pre-wedding party going on and there were musicians (clarinet, accordion, tăpan) playing on a balcony and guests dancing, drinking and eating. They invited us in and offered us drinks and let me videotape the celebrations going on. This was just the "warm-up" to the actual wedding, which will take place in Korça. We stayed until the bride and groom and the wedding party got into cars to go to the city.

The next morning, we were fed another delicious, but different breakfast. We had some sort of rolled pita stuffed with cheese along with the other items we had the previous morning.

After that, we were surprised by Orieta taking us to an Asian museum in Korça. She knew the curator of the museum and he opened it up for us. We were the only people there. Apparently, an Albanian American soldier named G. Dimitri Boria fell in love with a Japanese woman when he was stationed in Japan during WWII. He was not allowed to marry her and bring her back to the USA since there were laws against Asian and Caucasian marriages at that time (in 10 states) and because of that, he felt that his homeland of Albania is where he would build his museum. They were allowed to go back to the USA many years later. He was a photographer and there were portraits of Eisenhower, the Empress, etc. in the museum. There were beautiful antiques from Japan, China, Russia, etc. there.

The next stop was the charming village of Voskopoia where we were taken the beautiful church of St Athanasius. It was built in 1721 and covered with gorgeous frescoes painted by two brothers, Constantine and Athanasius of Korça.

This village was also where we met Sofia, who wove amazing rugs. We visited her at her home. I collect rugs and plates when I travel. She and her husband were extremely nice, as were all the people we met in Albania. I bought a gorgeous blue rug from her. She and her husband farm the land in the spring, summer and fall, and she weaves the rugs in the winter when it's too cold to farm.

She gave us food and drink while we talked to her. I decided to sing a song that I knew, Chobankat, which I had learned from Merita. It turns out that the song is from her home village in Albania and also, her husband is a "Chobankat"...for those of you who do not know the song words, it's about the Vlach shepherds that provided wool for the sweaters, socks, etc., for the Albanian soldiers.

We ate lunch at a restaurant that specialized in a lake trout. As before, it was delicious! That evening, we went to a local park and Mark ordered a "hamborger", which was this enormous hamburger that included the french fries inside the bun! I wondered if this "hamborger" was the inspiration for the SNL skit about the "Cheeseborger, no Coke, Pepsi" skit? There was also a soccer game going on and since Carol is a soccer coach and fan, we went to the stadium to check it out. The game was between Korça and Tirana, so it was a huge deal.

We found a sports bar to watch the game with the locals...everyone was glued to the screen...but the game was late starting, police were kicking out fans that had climbed the fence to get in and someone set off a smoke bomb...Mark and I were glad not to be in the stadium!

Korça, Albania, turned out to be an even better place than we could have imagined. The people were warm, friendly, many of the young people speak English. The food is delicious, the city is immaculate and the Albanians take a lot of pride in their country. It is also extremely inexpensive by European standards. The dinner we provided for 11 people came to less than 100 Euros, even with beer and raki. We paid the musicians 100 Euros (there were 7 of them) to play for us for an entire evening.

The guest house, with full breakfast (I would rate 5 stars) was 50 Euro a night for our double room and 35 Euro a night for Carol's single room.

I would highly recommend all of you to consider visiting Korça. In addition to all we packed into three days (I didn't include everything we did!), there are lakes, rivers, and mountains to explore. Orieta was such a nice person as well as being really knowledgeable about her town. She took us to places that we would not have found on our own and as well, went out of her way to accommodate us!

If you are interested, please feel free to contact me about how to arrange a similar trip! I plan to go back and spend even more time in Albania!

Letter to the editor

The following is a response I received to an enquiry I had made about the "Gypsy" dances Todd was teaching the Advanced Balkan Class. I wondered about the use of the term "Gypsy". Here is his response. —Editor Editor:

In Hungary the gypsies call themselves "cigany" in Hungarian and "gypsy" when they are using English. The term gypsy now seems to have some cachet. For example, my favorite gypsy band is the "Szilvasi Gypsy Band", and their leader/ singer (Szilvasi) proudly refers to himself a gypsy (and always feels obligated to introduce me to the crowd as a gypsy from San Francisco, which I find somewhat embarrassing since my dancing sucks compared to the real gypsies). Similarly named is Kalman Balogh's "Gypsy Cimbalom Band" which toured the US last year.

On this last trip we went to a gypsy dance (with Szilvasi) on Tuesdays, took a gypsy class on Thursdays, and even went to a gypsy workshop in a nearby village (Fót) one weekend. The announcements for all these events, and the participants, only used the words cigany and gypsy (mostly cigany, very little English was used).

In Hungary the only place I see the terms Rom, Roma, or Romani is in "official" stuff, like newspaper articles about what the government is doing to promote human rights or educational development for the Roma.

Krajdunavsko Horo

Bulgaria (Severnjaško)

Krajdunavsko Horo (krigh-DOO-nahv-skoh hoh-ROH), meaning Dance from the Danube River Region, is a collection of variations that are popular among the Vlachs of Northwestern Bulgaria. Originally a nomadic tribe, the Vlachs (for Wallachia, a province of Romania) have settled in many regions of the Balkans. Dances with Vlach influence, often characterized by rhythmic syncopation and stamps, are known generically as Vlaško or Krajdunavsko. The variations described here were learned in the spring of 1979 from Jordan Jordanov in the Bulgarian town of Russe by Jaap Leegwater, who taught the dance at the 1986 Mendocino Folklore Camp and the 2011 Stockton Folk Dance Camp. Given the considerable differences in pattern, sequence and styling danced at these camps and elsewhere, here we follow Jaap's SFDC'11 presentation.
