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# President's Message

Lucy Chang, President of the Folk Dance Federation

As I said in my September 2012 message, actively listening to the needs and wants of our members is a priority for the Federation. Please email me continue to (LucySChang@gmail.com) with your ideas. I would like to report about our progress on the three themes that have emerged from your comments. The first theme is an increase in the involvement and support of live bands in our activities. I am planning a focus group for the 4th quarter of 2012 to help

ascertain how the Federation can most effectively and efficiently support this idea.

The second theme that emerged is a desire for increased support of couple dancing. Although I was a bit surprised that this is important to a significant portion of our folk dancing community, we are now actively discussing how hest to promote and encourage couple dancing. Many of us met our partners at folk dancing events. A popular initial approach is to sponsor a workshop for couple dances (including mixers) where we also review each partner's role and responsibility in these dances. "It takes 2 to tango."

The third focus is to promote the benefits of joining the Federation as an individual, club, or family member. I am happy to report some recent progress in this area. On Sunday, September 2, the Federation sponsored a 'Summer Camps in Review - from Statewide to Stockton' workshop with pot-luck snack break held in Menlo Park. This event was offered FREE to individual and family members and to all club leaders as a big 'thank you' for your loyalty and support throughout the years. Over 80 dancers participated and at least 5 nonmembers joined the Federation on this day. Our 13 volunteer teachers taught/presented 12 dances from 5 different camps. We also did an additional 6 camp dances by popular request. Thank you to all who came, brought snacks, and danced with us. Everyone's contributions made this a fun and successful event. We will continue to search for ways to promote the benefits of membership in the Federation.

Another successful event was the New Dancers Festival in Berkeley on August 25. Thanks to the Berkeley Folk Dancers for organizing and co-sponsoring this workshop. Bill Lidicker, co-chair, reported that over 21 new dancers signed in, and they were treated to 20 dances from around the world. I spoke with many of them and they expressed positive attitudes about folk dancing. The Redding Folk Dancers will hold the next New Dancers Festival on Saturday, Sept 22, at the Shasta Community College. Future festivals are being planned by the Del Valle Folk Dancers for October 21 in Pleasanton and by the North Bay Folk Dancers for October 28 in Petaluma. Ask your neighbors, co-workers, and friends to come and try folk dancing for enjoyable exercise to great music. Please go to the Federation's web site, www.folkdance.com, for more information.

# A Week in August in NM

Folk dance draws us to New Mexico - and limits our time, as we teach on Mondays at 1 o'clock. So we board Amtrak in the evening, arrive in Albuquerque before noon Tuesday, rent a car and drive to Socorro. Getting oriented, we chance upon the once a week, two hour farmers' market – buy small local plums, watch a man fire-roasting chiles in a hand-turned mesh drum on a trailer – he raked the scorched chiles out of the opened drum with gloves, to a plastic bag in a bushel basket for one of his customers. A block north of the square, the Old Town Bistro attracts us in its slightly askew old building. We pass a musicians' stage on the way in past the bar; musicians come and go through the patio as we dine.

Tourism Wednesday: first west to Magdalena - a miner imagined the madonna in the shapes of the mountains – reminds me of Mt. Tamalpais above Mill Valley and the Grand Tetons. The town was the second-largest rail head for shipment of trails'-end live stock from 1880 to 1971, and still has the old yards and ramps for loading. The old train station very attractively houses the library and has a deck connecting it to the boxcar museum, but the librarian is trying to get a grant for a new building better suited and proof against rain and snow. She says that 60% of the town is on welfare.

Onward to the Very Large Array, the worlds largest radio telescope, spreading it's Y of 27 big dishes kilometers out along double tracks on the plain. Dedicated in 1980, and massively upgraded in 2012, the site includes self-guided tours and a modern visitor center with a gift shop. The array

has been named after Karl G. Jansky, who serendipitously discovered radio waves coming from the center of our Milky Way galaxy in 1932.

Back to the New Mexico Tech campus to visit the Mineral Museum, then south to Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge: The visitors' center had closed at 4 p.m. We chose to drive the in-season north loop road – saw only one other car and a research truck with tracking antennas on top. Only a few birds – we'll have to come back.

Folk dance camp starts Thursday with registration at the dorms of NMT, lunch at the Masey Center and first teachings in the East Gym: Roo and Harry with Scandinavian – starting with the Family Hambo mixer – they ask for a show of hands for who knows the Hambo, then they teach the male and female steps in two circles.

Radboud Koop, a big Dutchman teaching Russian dances amuses with his portrayal of feminine styling, starts with an easy walking dance, then includes greater complexity in stamping, couples, quadrille and a Hopak – all to beautiful music.

Karina teaches drumming and African dance – great exercise for the mind and body. Nice programming, with breaks and snacks; and entertainment in the evening themed parties (pajama, blue, cowboys and aliens). Children served ice cream

and condiments at the first afternoon welcoming, and entertained us at the last party, as did a quartet of cowboy singer, two yodelers and a dummy. There were teens and young adults among the dancers - good signs for continuing folk dance tribes.

Sunday morning I awoke early, so we went back to Bosque del Apache. This time we saw ducks, cormorants, a turtle and big-mouth carp; then spent an hour in the visitors' center watching Quail, humming birds, squirrels and an oriole. The volunteer and his wife summer here from El Paso. They told us of the cougar, bob cats, elk and played bird calls to identify the crane we'd heard.

Back in time to dance the Russian dances, participate in the thank yous, eat, pack and go. A bit of a tour of downtown Albuquerque to find the hotel to return the car, then a walk to the station.

Monday we arrive in L.A., take the gold line to Heritage Square station, breakfast on the way home, unpack, then to Senior Center to teach – including the easiest of the Russian dances. Glad to be home!

# From Statewide to Stockton "Summer Camps in Review"

An excellent turnout for a new event!

We had the hall from 2:00 to 8:00 pm and we made good use of it. Teaching started at 2:30 and we took a break for a potluck around 6:00. I'm sure we needed a break to recharge. Clean-up started at 7:30. It was a full and rewarding day.

I talked to Lucy about the thoughts behind the event and here is what she had to say:

"During my tenure, I keep asking dancers to join the Federation and just about everyone says: "Why should I? What benefits do I get? I can read Let's Dance! from the copy at my clubs. I can go to web and get the latest info." While my response is usually that their donation is tax deductible, they are helping with scholarships, help us promote folk dancing programs, like the New Dancers Festivals, I get VERY little action to join. Last year we have the Membership Drive which was successful.

So I thought why not instead give a 'thank you' event to the members. Non-members would pay or join and the event would also be free. Coupled with this idea, is that we all go to workshops and camps yet we quickly forget the dances, or don't have a venue to meet up with camps dancers to do them.

I also wanted to have as many camps represented as possible, not just Stockton. I am very happy to show 12 dances, from 5 camps, taught/reviewed/presented by 13 teachers at the Summer Camps in Review. We also just danced to 5-6 more.

As you know, for all Fed Events under my tenure we have to break even or make money. Things do NOT have to expensive to promote folk dancing. I much prefer a pot luck or Costco dinners over catered meals. (You'll hear that the Officers Ball's dinner will he catered, but just so you know, that is not my choice.) If everyone contributes or volunteers, from teaching to decorations to music, no one is heavily burdened. But even more important to me is that we all are working together. But that is just me and my hippie way of thinking.

Our Federation sponsored this 100%, not any council. St. Bede's was available and the location is good. I asked Loui to MC as she is the best, as well as to teach Chef. She is just wonderful. (I will miss working with her after my tenure.) I asked other leaders and teachers to teach - all were enthusiastic. Susan as usual did the flier and name tags and was an all around resource. Sabine and Marion took care of the registration desk. I gave the music to Adony who made the CDs. Ann

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

If you do any kind of dancing and are reading this about Stockton Folkdance Camp, I have one word for you...Go! You won't be sorry. This year, under the new direction of Jeff O'Connor, camp was the most International ever. Dances were presented from the following countries — Argentina, Serbia, Japan, Romania, the Ukraine, Brazil, Africa, India and beyond. Even from the USA with Squares and Cajun. I arrived on Friday of the first week. After getting there and feeling the amazing vibes and buzz about all the teachers, I could have kicked myself for not going for both weeks. It turns out that camp is more than the sum of its parts — it's all about people, parties, and performances.

Two years ago Stockton was all about "the Wedding". Last year was the year of the Fascinators. So what was the predominant theme this year? In my opinion, it was the year of the teachers. They were all great personalities, strong teachers, had respect for one another and the dances, yet they were ready to have fun with each other and with the campers. They set the tone and I think camp was elevated to a high level of love and harmony. So let me present the stars...

Who knew I would fall in love with Argentine Tango? Pampa Cortés was the amazing teacher and his partner Gigi Jensen was a feisty force of nature and total match for Pampa in every way. You couldn't help but catch their love of Tango. The classes were stressful, yet fun and smooth, each minute a learning experience. Never have I been so mentally and physically immersed in a class. With each change of partner came new revelations. The one time I partnered with Pampa was a floating dream. He said that Tango is "a romance of the legs and conversation of the feet!" Pampa and Gigi gave an amusing and informative talk on the origins of Tango at a culture assembly, saying the music went "into the ears, through the heart and into the feet".

Richard Schmidt has such a forceful personality and amazing teaching ability that I couldn't stay away from his Polish classes. His amusing comments are too fun to miss. The flowing dance Sobótki was one of my favorite dances of the whole week. The music – wow. I also couldn't believe how quickly Richard got us to accomplish the very complicated Polonez that needed a camera on the ceiling to capture the pattern. Richard also taught a very fun gypsy dance about Janushka that I wish had been done at Once Over Lightly. I did it with Richard at an after-party and was spinning so fast that I almost fell over at the end. It was exhilarating. Some alcohol might have been involved.

The ever-popular Romanian teachers Sonia Dion and Christian Florescu taught a dance called Chef that was probably the hit of camp. Pronounced Kef. A gypsy dance with many parts and some killer slapping sequences. I also liked Hora Veche, a beautiful flowing dance. Shameless plug – come to the Albany Y to learn it! On Tuesday evening the band played a Romanian and Quebec Suite of dances to celebrate Christian and Sonia's Anniversary followed by the Anniversary Waltz. Then the adorable and talented Bruxwort children presented Sonia and Cristian (and other campers) with rubber ducks and flashing rings. So nice to see that all ages of

campers never grow up!

The Ukranian teachers Irina and George Arabagi presented wonderful dances. They are directors of the Ukranian Dance Ensemble Kalyna, right in our own backyard in Sacramento. The Hopak was very popular at camp. I loved the energy they brought to camp, their bright smiles, gorgeous style, and the many times they stayed at the after party. They always looked like they were having fun. They threw themselves with relish into all the parties, talent shows and other crazy camp activities.

Miroslav "Bata" Marcetic was a bundle of energy. You might remember that he taught at Kolo Festival last year. At the first Saturday Party they nicknamed him "Senor Rabbit" because of his bouncy dances and dancing. I loved how he always showed the dance before he taught it. His feet did things even he didn't know he was doing. His famous phrase was, "just watch". A stickler for styling, he wanted to turn us all into Serbian dancers. He kept saying "dance, not like walking to the store". If we didn't get it, he showed us again. We got it. His dances were so much fun. One afternoon he showed a video of his Academy of Serbian Folk Dancing to us at a culture assembly. All different ages of dancers performed and one group consisted of 75 children! So impressive. Serbian dance is alive and well in Toronto. Every city needs a Bata!

Everyone fell in love with Iwao Tamaoki, who taught Japanese recreational dances. He (with the help of Lee Otterholt) threw a great Oban party Saturday night. Most people were in kimonos and looked wonderful. I hope no one was insulted by my Hello Kitty outfit! After dancing in the beautifully decorated courtyard around the kimonoed Rumen on the drum, we headed to the banquet. The food was delicious sushi, tempura, pickled veggies, chicken teryaki. Well, I could have lived without the heavy rice balls for dessert, but the green tea ice cream served in an edible bowl was delicious. Later at the dance party a beautiful dance with glowing lanterns in the darkened room was a highlight of the evening. And a note about a young man named Kieta Urano who was Mr. Tamaoki's translator for the second week. Not only did he attend many of the classes all week, but also painstakingly wrote out Japanese character place cards for everyone at the banquet. Arigatou gozaimasu.

Another surprising star of camp was Lucia Cordeiro. She taught a very popular Brazilian workshop and Circular became a hot dance at the after parties. Christian and Sonia even did it everyday as a warm-up for their class. Lucia was tiny of stature, but big of heart and won over everyone who met her. And she's coming back next year as a full time teacher of Brazilian dances. Pampa will also be back next year teaching Argentine folkloric dances. Joti Singh also had two workshops of African and Bangra dances. She couldn't stay for OOL (Once Over Lightly) and Judy did a great job in recreating the dances. Bruce Mitchell did an afternoon workshop and so did some of the other featured teachers. And of course Jerry Helt was teaching advanced squares, calling squares at OOL and working overtime as auctioneer. What would camp be without our Square Dance Hall of Famer and the strains of Freddy Fender's "Before the Next Teardrop Falls"?

The other Saturday party was Argentinean themed. Unfortunately I had only been at camp one day and hadn't taken any of the Tango classes yet. But I did get to wear my hot red

Latin dance shoes. Pampa and Gigi did an amazing sensual performance after the banquet. One of the dances involved scarves and a small blanket that he seductively wrapped her in. Then Pampa demonstrated his boleadoras. They were Teflon balls at the end of long strings that clicked on the floor in rapid beats as he twirled them around. No poi balls these – these were manly balls. Apparently in the past they were made of iron and used as weapons. The following week at the Japanese party he had them lit up in the dark to mimic firecrackers and they were even more spectacular.

Jerry and Jill Duke arrived on Wednesday to teach a few Cajun dances and to host a Mardi Gras party. He was so much fun to have around, a local "treasure". The party started at dinner with a Zydeco Band called Zoom leading us from the auction to the Cafeteria and playing through dinner. No one ate much. We were having too much fun on the dance floor. Then later the costumes and elaborate masks people wore in the evening were amazing. The winner was definitely Marc in his blow-up suit with pink leotard and gold tutu, but Valerie was a vision in her teal outfit and mask. California Kapela was the camp band this year with a new accordion player named Chris Bajmakovich. Drummer Rumen Sali Shopov also taught the singing class this year, which sounded very lively and fun when they sang for us all at the end of the week. Susan Worland, Barbara Deusch and Evan Stuart rounded out the band and they were fantastic. Marion and I hosted the after party on Thursday night and had the band come for part of the night. They played some great village dances. Lee sang to a sexy slooow hasapico, and Bata led several Serbian dances. They threw in some waltzes, a polka, a pravo, etc. Your basic let-go have fun don't have to think too much party dances. After a week of body and brain drain it was welcome. Then I had a great time at the computer when the band left. I never got to eat or drink that night, but had fun being "in control". It also made me understand and appreciate the fluidity of the upcoming dance list! And thank you Adony for your help and for all the late night dancing. Kudos to Jeff O'Connor on his first year of directorship. Not an easy job! He has seamlessly taken over and worked tirelessly to keep a very diverse crowd happy. The atmosphere at camp was so harmonious and full of camaraderie from the teachers on down -- the director has to take a bow for that! Judging from his first year (and his upcoming second) camp has taken on a very Latin flavor. While I do love Latin dancing, (personal prejudice alert!) I do hope he won't forget the Balkans. I liked his welcoming orientation speech and Powerpoint presentation that included some guidelines for camp, folk dance etiquette and the introduction of the teachers, the committee and long time campers. # SECOND ROUND NDF – HOW'RE WE DOING?

On August 25, the Federation and Berkeley Folk Dancers cosponsored the second New and Returning Dancers Festival for the second year of this new experimental program. This time we think our timing was improved over last year when the corresponding party was several weeks after the beginning of our new beginners' class at BFD. This time it was 12 days before the new class was to begin, and we hope this will generate more recruits for the class.

For the number crunchers among us, here are some relevant figures. Although not perfect, our record keeping was significantly improved over last year. We had a total attendance of 76 that was composed of 15 organizing committee members and other teachers; 23 new dancers, 7 returning dancers, and 31 experienced dancers, many of whom brought a new recruit. Thus new and returning folks (30), the target of the exercise, represented 39.5 % of the total attendance. For last year, in comparison, when our numbers are less reliable, we estimated total attendance at 76, with new and returning dancers numbering up to a possible 31, giving 40.8% for our target audience. What a coincidence!

We decided this year to put more emphasis on teachers from local international dance groups. The teaching staff was 13 this year and 15 last year. We also scheduled more time for the festival last year, and were able to teach 23 dances plus show off 8 demonstrations. This year we taught 20 dances, mostly one-night-stand type, and again did 8 demonstrations. Two demos were interspersed between each set of 4 teaches. The demonstrations were carefully chosen to represent different levels of difficulty and a variety of ethnicities, half were couple dances and half non-partner (one was a couple progressive).

It is of course too soon to know how many actual new recruits this effort will produce, but we do know there were lots of smiling faces throughout the program, and feedback received was very encouraging. I would like to especially thank Adony and Becky Beniares for coming all the way from Sunnyvale to teach two dances, bringing their famous projector for announcing the program, and bringing their collection of international flags for decorations. The 13 teachers were all well-received, and we owe them our gratitude. We also appreciate that Federation President Lucy Chang came up from Menlo Park to welcome the group on behalf of the Federation. Finally, I thank the organizing committee that included my cochair Marija Hillis along with Louise Lidicker, David Hillis, Andy Partos, and Marian Snyder.



# Sunnyvale New Dancers Festival, 2012 - Another Fun-filled Day

The word has spread! The 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunnyvale New Dancers' Festival attracted new and returning dancers by offering a free afternoon of dance. # We have a promotion fund

Here are the procedures for acquiring a grant from the Promotion Fund:

- 1. The Promotion Fund Committee shall advertise grant availability by publishing its availability in *Let's Dance!* magazine and elsewhere as deemed appropriate.
- 2. Applicants must be members of the Federation or a Federation member Group. Whether an applicant has been awarded grants in the past will be considered by the PFC in its evaluations. The length of the applicant's membership in the Federation will also be considered in its evaluations.
- 3. The Chairperson shall report the winners of promotion grants to the Treasurer so that disbursements can be made.
- 4. The Chairperson shall report to the Federation Board of Directors the names of grant applicants, whether the applications have been approved or rejected, and the amounts of the approved grants.
- 5. Awardees will be required to submit a report within one month of the end of the use of grants, or periodic reports if the grant projects are lengthy in duration. This report shall describe the use of the funds, and other relevant information, such as the value generated by the grant. This report shall be submitted to the Chairperson, who will report to the Board.

# **SPAIN**

Spain is one of the most interesting countries of Europe for the dance ethnologist and folklorist. Few countries are so linked to our world in a historical thread beginning with Columbus and, through him, to Ferdinand and Isabella and the Moors before them.

Spanish dance is a vivid enactment of the personality of Spanish people—intense, impulsive, quick to anger or love, seemingly hiding nothing of their lust for life. It has been said that in a country of sharp contrasts in light and climate, as Spain is, sharp contrasts in temperament are to be expected. And so it is.

Of course, Flamenco is the most well-known of all Spanish dance, alas, not Spanish at all, rather the tradition of Spain's disenfranchised gypsy people of the South, believed by many to be descendant of the Moors. Accompanied by the jaleo, a combination of guitar, soul-searing song and hypnotizing palmadas, the gypsy dancer acts out the anguish of poverty and the intense urges of anger, pain, lust and domination. The famous zapateado can be traced to the Moors who Ferdinand and Isabella removed from Spain the year of Columbus' voyage. Flamenco is a great tourist attraction in Andalucia, southern Spain, and many have sought in vain for the real flamenco, to no avail.

It is said that in Andalucia, half the population contemplates the zapateado, while the other half creates it. Little wonder that the dance of Andalucia in southern Spain, the sophisticated and highly developed sevillanas, is the most important social dance, raised to a form of high art. This is the dance one envisions when Spain is mentioned. Here is the ultimate development of the castanet, its complex rhythms adding fire to this happy, spirited dance and Andalucian women compete as equal partners in the dance, giving and demanding on equal terms with her partner. The carriage is proud, even arrogant, the upper body the major focus, accented by sweeping gestures of the legs and intermittent sharp zapateados. The figures end with a spiraling pass by the partner, ending in a graceful pose, one arm high over head, back arched, gazing triumphantly, defiantly at the partner. There is no more vivid portrayal of Spanish life.

In the interior, Castile's warm, dry climate creates a milder, less animated dance. Women dance with sophisticated restraint and poise, as would appear proper in the political center of the country. The bolero and fandango are most well-known, characterized by a quiet, erect upper carriage and rapid, intricate footwork by both partners.

In Estramadura to the west, bordering Portugal, Moorish influence is still evident in dance and song. It is from this poor region that many of the Conquistadores came, seeking their fortune in the New World. It is certain that many of the Spanish families of Spanish California originally came from Estramadura, performing their dances in California's haciendas. The *jota* is danced here in an earthy style, arms extended upward as the horns of the bull and the upper body still in deference to the elaborate footwork.


The Levantine, which includes Valencia and Murcia, reveals in its dance influences from ancient Greece and Rome,

even the Moors. Dances are dignified and elegant, many revealing their Renaissance origins. The men's costume even has features of Greece and the Balkans. The *jota* is the major dance, aristocratic in character, not as lively as in the cooler north, but more so than in the warmer south.

Northern Spain's cooler climate produces more energetic dance forms, claimed by locals to be the oldest in Spain. Where dance is a solo demonstration in the south, it is a collective activity in the north, involving couples in circles and sets. Women continue to dance with downcast modesty in strong contrast to their aggressive southern counterparts.

To the east in *Navarre* and *Aragon*, the *jota* reaches its peak of perfection. These people are above all, independent, proud, stubborn, forceful and energetic and they dance the *jota* as if there were no gravity. Such is the character of vigorous mountain folk throughout Europe.

Finally to *Catatonia*, wedged in the easternmost corner of Spain; the *sardana* is the most well-known dance, a circle dance probably of Greek origin. It is danced in a series of long and short figures, each dancer expected to move exactly the same as the others. The music is usually played on instruments from the Renaissance. The *sardana* became a symbol of resistance to the Francan government, which had attempted to replace the Catalonian language with Spanish. It is still danced in sincere expression of Catalonian independence.

# Sobótki

(Poland)

Sobótki (soh-BOOT-kee) is derived from the Polish word "Sobota," meaning Saturday. This non-partner dance is done to a "chodzony" (walking) melody, the precursor to the Polonaise.

On the eve of June 23rd, the shortest night of the year, the Poles celebrate St. John's Eve, or, as it was known in pagan times, "Sobótki." Many celebrations included music and dancing, fireworks, boat parades and the lighting of bonfires. In some regions women celebrated the shortest night separately from men. Women threw herbs into the bonfire, hoping it would protect them from evil. Single women made wreaths from herbs and floated them down the river hoping that their future husband would find it and fall in love with them. It was called the "Throwing of Wreaths" (Rzucanie Wianków). Men jumped through the bonfire to test their strength and courage. Even today, traditional candle-lit wreaths are floated on the Vistula in Kraków during the St. John the Baptist feast, along with fireworks and bonfires to commemorate the holiday.

Steps & Styling: Walking Step: Extend R fwd, knee slightly bent until it becomes straight, moving ft

fwd with toes just above floor level (ct & before ct 1); step R fwd on ball of ft, straightening L (ct 1); step L fwd on ball of ft (ct 2); step R fwd on ball of ft (ct 3).

Repeat with opp ftwk.

Note: This step can beg with either R or L, and can be done fwd, bkwd and

sideways. Ct 1 is the longest step in relation to the next two steps.

Walking Step and Cross Step: Using the basic movement of the Walking Step, step on L behind R (ct 1); straighten both knees so R leg is fully extended with pointed

toes in front of L (ct 2); hold (ct 3).

<u>Floating Step</u>: On tiptoes, six small steps per 3-ct measure, keeping the movement fluid and flowing as if carrying a full glass of water on the head. Step can be done


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
