Four other topics I'd like to address in my message: (1) Federation involvement, (2) youth musicians and/or dancers, (3) "middle-aged" dancers, and (4) developmentally delayed adult dancers. First, Federation involvement is actually a lot of fun. Yes, it does seem daunting to take on another responsibility that reaches beyond our own community. However, life is rich and full, and working with fellow Federation Board members provides very special opportunities. Seeing people year after year at festivals truly becomes more meaningful when you've worked with them on Federation events. Socialization outside the dance floor can be a great thing and is true to the cultures behind folk dance traditions. My wife and I have found being part of the dance planning also leads to tips about good books, places to visit, places to eat, ideas that help promote world dance in our communities, etc. Sometimes it makes faster connections for transport to/from events, new music, and even good wine, coffee, tea, or cake! Psst... Don't say it too loud but these days Federation work happens not only in person at dance events but a lot happens over the internet and phone! Thank you ahead of time for considering participating on the Federation Board or its committees, supporting Federation events and New Dancer Festivals, scholarships, etc.!

leading high school folks to dance. At this last April 27th San Francisco Blossom Festival there was a Children's Dance Session followed by a Maypole dance! I've also seen the youtube video of young San Francisco musicians and dancers playing Setnja and other tunes for fellow club dancers at Changs. Mendocino Woodland camps are producing/encouraging young musicians and dancers. Of course, the Greek Orthodox Churches are also fabulous examples of helping youth learn to enjoy both dance and dance performance. Is there any crossover for us there? What other examples are there? How can we support youth dancing in your community? I'd love to hear your ideas.

My third topic is "middle-aged" dancers. I'll let you decide exactly who qualifies as a "middle-aged" dancer! My point is that there is a plethora of them out there. In my experience, I continue to dance with folks who have raised their families and now have more time to devote to themselves. Some folks have come to our Chico dance events who retired and then moved to our area. Previously, they were dancers in other California communities. Others dancers who are new to us remembered doing international folk dances in school. Still others are busily exploring new leisure activities. I had one 50-year-old student who never learned to dance but was tired of not trying to learn!

Surely, one key is to market, market, market our dancing. Almost every week I send out e-mail Public Service Announcements to every local radio, newspaper, magazine, chamber of commerce, etc., that might list our upcoming activities. Teaching dance through our local Recreational District has also introduced me to many new middle-aged folks! Access to the Recreational District advertising has been tremendously helpful in attracting new dancers. Finally, doing international folk dance at local general fairs or festivals helps people know about us. But, make sure you have your promotional material ready to hand out there!

My fourth and last topic is about teaching developmentally delayed adults. I've been asked to teach world dances to a group of developmentally delayed adults. I've never done this before but do look forward to this exciting opportunity. I'm still waiting for the Department of Justice background check and whatever other personnel matters that need to be resolved. Meanwhile, I continue to ask all my fellow dancers for their ideas, suggestions, knowledge of related resources, etc., regarding this future dance opportunity. I extend my deep appreciation to those who have already given me great ideas for which dances to teach. You know who you are!

When they retired the group became the Village Dancers of the Valley. Barbara chaired a Statewide Festival in Modesto in 2004 that was enjoyed by all who attended. She was a regular attendee of Kolo Festival and often of Folk Dance Camp. She danced for many years with the Livermore Dancers.

Several comments sent for her memorial service held Jan. 11th were: 'She was a lovely dancer and infused great joy into her dancing.' 'Her enthusiasm for the dance was so infectious.' 'Barbara's knowledge of the steps and styling will be missed.' At her memorial service January 11th, dancers performed Joc de Leagane – a beautiful dance she had taught. She leaves two children Glenn and Terry Anderson, three step-daughters Jody, Sally and Wendy Summers and several grand-children. She had a Bachelor of Arts Degree in English and a teaching credential, was a computer instructor at the library, and had worked as an office manager. She loved designing and sewing costumes for performances and her passing leaves a hole in our valley dancing.

Norm Tiber

Norm Tiber lived with his wife Anne in Los Osos, California, just west of San Luis Obispo. The two of them lead the southern-most Federation folk dance club - The Bay Osos Folk Dancers. Though in good health, he was felled by a massive aneurism the end of March of this year. Ironically, Norm wrote an article about himself for April issue of the Folk Dance Scene, the magazine produced by the Folk Dance Federation of California-South. He may not have lived to see his article in print.

Norm was first exposed to dance in Brooklyn, New York, but really didn't embrace it as a life-long activity until he came to California where he attended classes lead by Sam Mednick, Beverly and Irwin Barr, as well as those held at Café Danssa and various venues of the Westwood Folk Dancers.

He and his wife moved to Los Osos in 1996, eventually took over the dance group that the Mednicks had started there, and the group has been going strong ever since. Norm also taught folk dance classes at Cal Poly at San Luis Obispo for ten years. Later he became enamored of Argentine Tango and that was his main dance focus in most-recent years.

Great Dancing at the 49th Anniversary Spring Festival, University of Chicago International House

Chicago Spring Festival is an irresistible package! At what other festival do you get the chance to have classes with Atanas Kolarovski, Ahmet Lüleci and Ventzi Sotirov, all on the same weekend, to dance to the music of Chris Bajmakovich and other virtuoso musicians, and to attend cultural sessions presented by Alex Marković? The classes, culture corners and parties surpassed my expectations!

The prospect of dorm rooms not being available at "I-House" this year deterred some folks from trekking to Chicago. Festival chairman John Kuo promised me a dorm room 2 blocks away and transportation "home" at the end of the party. He reserved a block of rooms at several dorms on campus, and I enjoyed staying at the friendly McCormick Seminary Guest Residence.

The weather forecast called for continuing blustery weather in the Midwest when I mailed my registration and booked air transport. I did wear long underwear under my skirt for the early morning walk to I-House.

Mounds of snow along the walkways reminded me that it was barely spring. No one skipped classes to sunbathe on the lawn, which was still scraggly and brown.

New this year was Saturday evening dinner at the Cedars of Lebanon Kitchen, a 5 star restaurant in the Hyde Park neighborhood. Course after course of delicious Mediterranean dishes rounded our table. After dinner we enjoyed the festival concert, which featured 12 accomplished local music and dance ensembles. The high level of skill and musicianship of performing groups in the Chicago area is due to the substantial population of Eastern European Americans, including former members of state dance ensembles and orchestras. My favorite performance was by Ellas. The male dancers exceeded each other in executing athletic, entertaining feats. (Each dancer of Ellas must keep an orthopedic surgeon on speed dial!) Among the audience were various consulates and dignitaries, plus friends and relatives of the performers.

The highlight of Spring Festival, the Saturday Evening Dance Party, followed the concert. Veselo Selo played kolos in the lounge while chairs were removed from the dance floor, then the musicians led us into the great hall. Throngs of dancers filled every corner of the dance floor. Young and old, "ethnics" and recreational dancers, parents and grandchildren took hands and moved together. Any dissension—current or historical—between political groups was far removed from the camaraderie, smiles and sweat we generated together. The giant windows of the great hall were opened. Chris Bajmakovich and Muzika4U, Angel Dobrev and Konstantin Marinov, Jim Stoyanoff & Orchestra Balkana, Balkanski Ritmi and others played for dancing until 1 am.

Only a dozen of us were on the dance floor at 9 am on Sunday for Ahmet's first class. Late arrivals put down their coffee cups & pulled on dance shoes for another day of classes. Alex Marković's cultural session Saturday featured a spotlight on how the paired dances Syrtos and Balos are danced on various Greek islands. He examined the differing musical instruments, styling & step patterns and rules of who

leads and who dances with whom on Naxos, Andros, Sifnos and Kithnos. Video he recorded, plus other sources, provided visual comparisons. Alex's Sunday culture hour reprised his doctoral studies--wedding customs among Rom and Serbian communities in the region of Vranja, Serbia. Sunday afternoon included reviews of festival dances. Numbers dwindled as folks left to catch flights and carpools home. Balkanske Igre, the festival sponsor (and source of volunteers who coordinated the nuts & bolts of the event) celebrated their success at a final dinner and dance party at the Adriatic Restaurant.

Northern Californians outnumbered us southerners among attendees at Chicago Spring Festival. They include Michael Lipsey, Eileen Menteer, John Burke, Keiko Trenholm and Fusai Senzaki Carroll. Atenas taught and demonstrated his dances with precision, but as we dance he broke into a solo of beautiful improvisation. Fusai continued leading the line. When Atanas again took the lead his feet were creating new patterns. He looked at Fusai to get back "on" while saying, "She makes mistakes." We always responded with laughter! Fusai prepared the dance notes for the syllabus and edited the video of Atanas, Ventzi and Ahmet, for which we are all grateful. Southern Californians included Carol Smith of Ojai, Dr. Jatila van der Veen and myself.

A bonus of attending spring festival is the opportunity to enjoy the architecture, art and culture of Chicago. One year Memo Keswick arrived 5 days in advance. My strategy is to arrive a day or two early each year. I enjoy walking through the University Quadrangles and gazing at the impressive buildings. One could spend an entire day browsing campus bookstores—Powell's, O' Gara, and Seminary Book Coop. It wasn't raining so I bought a book at Powell's and continued my walk. Also on or near the campus are the Oriental Institute, Robie House (designed by Frank Lloyd Wright), the science museum, and a lovely path around the lake. The next morning I caught the Metra commuter train to Millennium Station and enjoyed exhibitions at the Cultural Center and the Art Institute. Next year's cultural plans: the Field Museum and an architectural tour of the city.

Spring Festival could not take place without dedicated volunteers and sponsors, primarily the Center for Eastern European and Russian/Eurasian Studies, International House's Global Voices, and the Ensemble Balkanske Igre. Next year will be the 50th anniversary of Spring Festival and chairman John Kuo promises an even richer offering of music and dance—possibly beginning on Thursday March 26th. Lodging will not be a concern. Even if the guest rooms at I House are not yet available John has found numerous other facilities on or near campus ranging from shared rooms at \$25.00/night to the Hyatt! Choreographed dances!

Additional thoughts on Loui Tucker's article about choreographed dances

The reality is, if you are doing a dance, it is a "real" dance.

Years ago, I was at a live music event. As the band started playing a Paidushko, multiple lines formed, with dancers doing different versions. After joining in, a dancer next to me said, "let's get out of this line, and form a line doing 'the real' Paidushko." I informed this person that every line was doing a real Paidushko.

This situation arises because various master teachers periodically provide us with new arrangements of figures to a fundamental rhythm such as a Pravo, Rachunitsa, Gankino, Paidushko, etc. We get in the line that does the version we like or find familiar. The 'real' dance for a one person may not be the 'real' dance for another. It is often the one she/he learned first. Were all the dances real? Yes. Were all of them a choreographed arrangement of steps? Probably.

In the 1970's, after graduating from college, with a minor in dance, and receiving a teaching credential, I taught folk dancing professionally at local colleges and universities. Teaching dance was my vocation and my sole source of income. Like any business, success and survival depends upon key elements and practices. I took my occupation seriously and constantly analyzed and evaluated the components that were critical to success. In order to survive, my classes had to be fun, popular and engaging. The curriculum had to ensure that the diversity of students had a positive learning experience. Whether I was teaching a beginning International class, an advanced Balkan course, a Ballroom class, or was involved with a performing group, there were certain key elements necessary for positive results:

- Steps, footwork, and movements had to be physically attainable.
- Figures or patterns had to be easily learned or eventually mastered.
- Music and rhythms had to be heard, felt, enjoyed, and understood by participants.

Of these, I feel music is the most important. If you can't feel it, you can't dance it. Every dance that has become popular, is currently the rage, or becomes the next new fad is due to the music. If we love the music, it motivates us to want to continue to do the dance. The music (or song) is either beautiful, melodic, fits the steps (a.k.a. flow), or has a driving rhythm that compels us to move. All of our 'famous name' dance teachers have figured this out and have created dances or steps that fit the music. A newly introduced dance has no chance of survival if the audience cannot find the rhythm or feel the music.

We must remember that we are recreational dancers. Every dance we do, whether learned at a weekend workshop, on a tour, or at a camp such as Stockton FD Camp, Mendocino Camp, EEFC Balkan Camp, Pinewoods, Rikud, etc., is a dance comprised of traditional steps, usually elemental to a region. This is why we pay to go to camps and master classes. We want to learn the styling appropriate for the region (or subcultures within a region), hear the music, and learn about ethnic groups within a country.

When a master teacher finds a wonderful piece of music,

assembles interesting sequences of steps, and teaches us the dance, is the dance 'not real'?

It is interesting that some teachers admit to this. Others remain silent or say the dance is an "arrangement of steps based on fundamentals unique to the region." Does it really matter? If we like the dance, we dance it. For me, I find it quite refreshing and stimulating when a dance teacher says, "this music is so fantastic that I had to do something with it."

The editor's thoughts on Choreography

Some personal thoughts on choreography.

I know that the professional teachers have a need to come up with new dances to teach at the various camps and seminars and they do so to greater or lesser success. There are a few who don't need to write dances—the Scandinavian and Greek teachers for instance, although even with a rich resource to draw on, some do.

There are teachers who make a conscious effort to teach authentic folk dances, but, sadly, they are too few but much appreciated.

I have friends who delight in learning new dances for the joy of doing something new. Perhaps I'm becoming jaded, but learning something just because it is new doesn't have a hold on me. I want to have some quality in a dance. I agree with Howard—a dance needs to have good music, the music needs to go to the dance, it needs to feel like a dance, the steps need to be logical and not contrived as so many new dances do.

What does bother me is that in their eagerness to have something new to teach, too many local teachers don't give much attention to the quality of the dances they teach. They and their pupils fill the request dance lists with unimaginative, boring, similar dances. Sometimes with nice music that really has no connection with the dance.

Don't get me wrong, some of my favorite dances are probably choreographed. But they dance! Or have a flow and music that makes you want to do something. An example is Cesto. It is done to the Horo from Kyustendil, played by the great Bulgarian accordionist, Boris Karlov, with the Emil Kolev orchestra. I followed this behind the lines at Marcel's for years before I could get a teach of it. Now, there are those who will say that Cesto (or Cestoto if you prefer) means common dance and was done all over Bulgaria, the various villages doing different steps. That when Marcel Vinokur and Yves Moreau sat down and put the various steps together the modern dance was born (this was at one of the seminars Marcel once held).

I have been told so many things that have turned out to be myth, I don't really know what is truth or not. But in any case the Cesto we do undoubtedly was, to some extent, choreographed. Even though it is a called dance.

Probably a better example is Cekurjankino. But here again, what is myth and what not. Yves Moreau, Dick Crum and Dennis Boxell all did research in Cekur and all taught the same dance!

It beats me. What is choreographed and what not? I don't know and I don't care. I just know that when I love a dance and love the music, I want to do it.

Lyrids Folk Dance Festival

One nice benefit of folk dancing is that it travels well. My feet took me north in April. A festival in Vancouver seemed like a nice excuse to visit a friend in Seattle and the two of us drove up to the first annual Lyrids Folk Dance Festival. Good-bye Salt Spring Island, hello Lyrids. Alas, the Salt Spring Island Festival is no more, but a dedicated group of people from the Burnaby International Folk Dance group, "were unable to contemplate the end to such a magical event". They took the name Lyrids from the annual April meteor showers, otherwise known as April's shooting stars. The real stars were the volunteers for the festival, who made this one of the most organized festivals I have ever attended.

On Saturday, the two teachers alternated classes in the morning and again in the afternoon. I knew some of the dances from previous sessions with Ahmet and Bata at other workshops, and Stockton – but learned several more, and review is always helpful to solidify the dance in my brain and feet. The energy of the teaching raised the dancers to a high level. I also appreciated Ahmet saying that when you do something wrong, don't try to correct it or make a big deal over it – just smile and move on and have fun! Isn't that what it's all about? After the classes, each teacher presented a culture talk. Ahmet spoke about customs, foods, and dance rhythms of Turkey. Bata showed us a video of his dance groups in Toronto.

Lunch, dinner, and more snacks were served. Everyone signed up for a task, and many hands made light work of taking the tables and chairs up and down. My friend and I, and several more out-of-towners were even hosted by the chairperson, Dale Adamson, at her huge house about ½ hour away. Everyone we met was very friendly and welcoming.

Saturday after dinner, there were performances by Sophia Alexandra Meroniuk (who serenaded us throughout dinner), and the groups Kariatis, Gradina, Vuk Karadzic, and performances by our talented teachers. They were wonderful to watch while digesting our meal. Also, for those interested, the Shriners hosted a bar with wine and beer in the evening. A nice touch. Then the live dance music part of the day began — an evening party with the band Kafana Republik. I was surprised to see the familiar faces of Michael Lawson, who has played at Stockton and last year ran the singing classes there, and Steve Ramsey. Other band members were Ahmad Yousefbeigi, Flo Damian, Brandon Vance and the lovely singer Tali McGill. The band was fantastic. Lots of variety. George and Irina Arabagi

All of a sudden, Ukraine is in the news every day, but here in the Sacramento area, we have one of the largest Ukrainian Diaspora communities in the US for generations. A rough count would be 250,000 including George and Irina, who arrived in 2000. They had won a Lottery Green Card, and were just leaving the Moldavian National State Dance Company (JOC), where they had both been principal dancers.

Irina was born in the south-eastern part of Ukraine and she had already danced whenever and wherever she could, and pleaded with her mom to go to ballet school, where her mom enrolled her at the age of 6! She studied both ballet and folk dance. Recognizing Irina's potential her teacher encouraged her to audition at Kiev State College of Performing Arts.

George began dancing in his village Giurgiurleshti in the southern part of Moldova when he was in 7th grade. He played various sports and joined a local folk dance ensemble as their youngest dancer. After graduating from high school, he left the village to study at the Moldavian Choreographic College in Kishinev.

While dancing with JOC they worked with acclaimed choreographers from Bulgaria, Hungary, Czech & Slovak Republics, Croatia, Serbia, Romania, Macedonia and Russia. As soloists with a touring company they performed in more than 25 countries and within 15 Republics of the former Soviet Union. They write, "Our dance company always performed at the prestigious assemblies and important celebrations in Moscow in front of the leaders of the Soviet Union!"

For the high achievement and excellent performance George was awarded with the Title of People Artist of Republic of Moldova and Irina got the Title of Merited Artist of Republic of Moldova. Having achieved these heights, and with the clock ticking, they decided to come to the US and settled into West Sacramento, where there was a large Ukrainian population. Having a lifelong love of dance, and children, they organized the Ukrainian Children Dance Ensemble, Kalyna in 2001.

They have performed in California, Washington and Nevada for ten years, and now the former Kalyna dancers are students of prestigious universities of California.

Besides Kalyna, they organized two other Ukrainian children dance ensembles Sonechko and Veselka. The dances performed by the ensembles represent all regions of Ukraine. They have performed all over California, including the Sacramento Camellia Festival. What we in Sacramento have enjoyed so much about George and Irina, is the love that they have for the children, and the love that is returned to them by the children and their parents. The pride in their traditions is very meaningful to these families, and forms a strong bond.

They are very busy people; George is an Engineer, and Irina, a teacher. They have taught at Stockton Folk Dance Camp and will be on the faculty this summer. They were the featured dance group at the Sacramento Camellia International Folk Dance Concert this year, and brought the house down with their spectacular and beautiful dancing. We are very happy they decided to make Sacramento their home.

A NEW TAKE ON ADVERTISING

The Chico World Dancers have been making good use of National Public Radio's Public Service Advertisements (PSAs). The group's leader, Memo Keswick, who is also Federation President, has been the one spearheading this advertisement campaign.

Memo scans every local magazine and newspaper he comes across to see if there is an e-mail address to which he can send press releases or promotional text or public service announcements. Then, almost every week, he sends out a "PSA request" e-mail blast to every email address on his radios, newspapers, and magazines email list. He has been very lucky and several PSAs have aired or been printed for them. The local NPR folks are especially good about this.

Once the Chico State University newspaper sent their reporter and a photographer to one of the Chico World Dancers parties! Memo reported that they "looked so young and cute! They even got out and danced a little with us!"

Some newspapers and magazines prefer that someone post an advertisement online and sometimes Memo does do this as well. Because it takes time, sometimes it just doesn't get done.

Memo also "underwrites" programs on a favorite NPR station, KZFR. This costs \$100 for about 20 slots, 5 per week for a month. Occasionally he gets an extra week for free. Memo changes the wording from time to time, but it essentially says, "This program is underwritten by Blah-de-blah and by The Chico World Dancers, teaching and promoting world dances from Bulgaria, Romania, Serbia, Greece and more. Dances are held most Friday nights at the Chico Creek Dance Center and through CARD during the fall and spring. No partner is needed and all are invited. For more information contact Memo Keswick at 774-2287 or by email at memok@saber dot net." [Note: CARD stands for "Chico Area Recreation District" and is generally already known to the KZFR listeners.]

Memo has received phone calls and email from people who mention hearing or reading the advertisements. He says he underwrites to attract new dancers, to build name recognition, and to establish better connections with the KZFR DJs. He also does it because he loves Public Radio, one of his personal refuges for hearing volunteer DJs versus professional radio DJs.


