

President's Message

In messages from previous months I have described how folk

dance and culture gives us a release from an unpredictable life as well as an appreciation of cultural art and ancestry. Once we recognize the wonder of a culture, then sharing and practicing it makes us feel more a part of the world and our neighbors become our likely friends. Furthermore, anyone can tell you you can count so many health and social benefits by dancing. But there are many examples of the idea that dance can also be



an engine of ethical development only as supported by ordinary individuals or grassroots organizations with a powerful mission.

Dance is not only a form of self-expression, it is also a huge global uniting factor; no matter who you are, dance comes naturally, as it could be argued that the human body is designed to dance. It is something anyone can do, no matter what another denies. If you are making an concious effort to move, you have the origins of dance. This is why dance is so important; no one is excluded or denied on a large scale. Dance can therefore unite the human race as one, an increasingly important factor not only as the world becomes more globalized but as people come together as a group seeking to express themselves differently. Dance helps us understand cultural differences.

Professor Rebekah Kowal is a University of Iowa dance researcher exploring the way dance became an avenue for social change in the 1940s and 50s. During this period, more U.S. citizens began attending dance performances by global performers and likewise more American dancers began learning and performing dances of other cultures. Just then the United States had a very restrictive immigration policy. But policies began to change after World War II later prompting an entire shift with the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1965.

"The experiences audiences had with otherness somehow helped them to feel more like we were living in a cosmopolitan nation, that they wanted to welcome foreigners instead of being afraid or protectionist," Kowal claims.

Empathy, the core of the human capacity for compassion, is the foundation of the profound and invaluable power of dance to communicate across any language. Neuroscience researchers have found empathy is a cognitive, affective, and kinesthetic dimension—that it is a physical as well as an emotional experience. Studies have shown that an individual simply witnessing another person performing a movement, expressing an emotion, or behavior can fire an identical set of neurons to those neurons activated by the one actually engaged in the action. So, while hearing a story about injustice usually does evoke some sense of indignation in most people, watching a performance of a dance about that injustice will move you. You feel the motions and emotions that people make when they are expressing pain, loss, fear, or more, and cannot help but identify with the message being danced.

Mallika Sarabhai, director of the educational dance and

theater company Darpana, uses narrative dance to communicate social change and understanding through empathy. As a child growing up in India, Sarabhai realized the power of dance to advocate meaningfully for justice. In a TED talk she explains how her mother created a dance piece illustrating the dowry suicides by young brides in rural Gujarat. That dance attracted the attention of the then prime minister to ask for the first inquiry into the phenomenon. By narrative dance, Darpana helps teach audiences a multitude of social issues, from violence against women, to religious intolerance, to simple hygienic practices to curtail waterborn infectious disease in rural areas.

The idea of dance as a vehicle of ethical development is also behind the organization Dance 4 Peace, now renamed Move This World. This global enterprise was founded by dancer Sara Potler, following work she did in Bogota, Colombia on a Fulbright fellowship to study the use of arts in civic education. Potler has developed a K-12, dance-based curriculum to explore themes like conflict resolution, diversity appreciation, and resistance to negative social pressure.

Likewise, in a country referred to as "the worst place to be a child," Abraham "Abramz" Tekya has been using dance to empower, rehabilitate, and heal his community. He is the founder and director of Breakdance Project Uganda (BPU), a non-profit organization that engages young people in hip hop culture in order to build leadership skills and promote social responsibility. Since 2006 BPU has been a catalyst in creating jobs and opportunity for Ugandan youth. BPU's core principle is that everyone is a student and everyone is a teacher with something positive to give. This is why the kids are not only taught how to dance in the free program, but also how to teach others to dance. Many of the participating children come from extremely vulnerable social backgrounds and most cannot afford proper schooling. While participating, they get to discover and develop a skill in which they can take pride. In addition BPU partners with other organizations to give its members other education opportunities, formal or not, such as life skills workshops, media and skill training, and advocacy train-

Closer to home, Etang Inyand and Tammy Johnson are the Oakland-based bellydance duo, Raks Africa. They started a decade ago knowing they would be battling their image in society. The stereotypical view of a bellydancer is one of a young, slight, fair temptress, dancing for the pleasure of a man. Instead, they are full-figured African Amercian grown women dancing for the sheer joy of being in tune with their bodies. Against acceptance odds, they stook their claim as "Big bellied girls doing big things." As they danced it became clear to they could do more to improve the situation of young women in the community. In 2010 they founded the Girls Raks Bellydance and Body Image Program in North Oakland to make it clear to young women they are not alone. Far more than learning a choreography and wearing a company t-shirt design, the dance program provides proactive tools for young women who may struggle with body image and self-esteem. As participants, young women of all shapes, color, and sizes find an opportunity to have a body-positive experience, free of judgment, and competition through the art of bellydance. Girls Raks women find in themselves power to recover from the loss of loved ones, the loss of self-definition, and live a vibrant life of their own choosing. Recently, founders Etang and Tammy have sought a new direction taking the evolution

Dancer Demographics

One of the most frequently discussed topics in folk dance circles (or lines) is the lack of young and middle aged dancers at camps. First let's look at the lifecycle of a folk dancer. Young people (sadly few) are usually first exposed to folk dancing in high school or college, in programs presented by their church or synagogue, or as part of being brought up in an ethnic community. Others are the offspring of rabid folk dance enthusiasts. Sometime in their mid to late 20s or 30s they get married and have kids. They stop coming to camp from about 30 to 50 because in most cases there isn't a good place to park the kids for a whole week. Finally, after the kids have left the nest or are old enough to fend for themselves their parents may return to camp. Consequently, folk dance camps tend to have a small cohort of teens and 20 somethings, hardly anyone between 30 and 50, and mostly folks over 50.

Some camps offer a modest children's program, but one that really stands out is Csipke Tábor, the Hungarian dance and music camp in Michigan every summer. Last summer our director, Jozsef Salamon, brought over two people from Hungary whose career path is running children's cultural programs. There were 16 kids in the 2-5 age group and 47 kids in the 6-12 group (63 total), along with 130 other campers. The 2-5 group learned simple songs, dances, dance games, arts, and crafts. Besides songs and dances, many in the 6-12 group also received substantial music instruction. Kids 13 and over participated in the adult dance and music classes. The kids also had a job to do – every morning about 2 dozen of them marched thru the hallways of the dorms playing their instruments and singing the Hungarian "Good Morning" song to get everyone up in time for breakfast.

Hiring two facilitators to run a children's program may seem extravagant, but the numbers look pretty good. Those 63 kids are paying customers (about half the adult rate), plus their parents can now come to camp. Several parents have told me that their kids literally beg them to go to camp every year. Also, these kids will be the next generation of folk dancers having been exposed to a very positive and fun folk dance environment (unlike some high school gym classes I can think of).

I don't want to understate the role of ethnicity here. About 90% of the adults are Hungarian-American and want their kids to learn their culture. Most of the kids are bi-lingual and are happy to accommodate the few that only speak English. As mentioned earlier, several other camps offer some sort of child care, but Csipke Tábor's commitment to having a serious children's program seems to be paying off. People are even willing to come to Michigan in the summer, where it's hot, humid, and the mosquitoes are so big the local merchants could sell the pelts.

Finally, I'd like to share an anecdote from camp 3 years ago. One afternoon the guys were in the dance hall learning the verbunk (19th century men's military recruitment dance) from Sárköz (south western Hungary). After about an hour, the teacher wanted us to try doing it to live music. Alas, the professional musicians from Hungary were over at the lake swimming. The teacher rounded up three 8-year olds with violins, sang the melody to them, and they played it for us. Of course, the Hungarian musicians got a lot of teasing later ("Why are we paying you to do what these kids can do...").

Folk Dance Camp "Balkanot"

Roberto Bagnoli's January 2016 Folk Dance Camp "Balkanot" was held at Lake Garda, Italy. The town, Castelletto di Brenzone, like many others on this North Italy lake, is almost totally abandoned in winter (It's foggy and cold). The camp is located in a convent, Garda Family House, renovated to include modern hotel accommodations and a gym, used for dancing. The dining room was well-suited for conversations, with about six rectangular tables for 10.

There were about 60 dancers (all ages) at this folk dance camp, half of them from Italy, the other half from Germany, plus a few from Switzerland and 3 of us (Ping, Sally & I) from the US. It was natural for the Italian, German, and English-speaking dancers to sit where their language was spoken, and I had a chance to join different tables at the various excellent meals.

Roberto taught mostly Israeli dances, intermediate to advanced, which many of the attendees enjoyed: Bachazotrot, Tfilot, Baruch Eheye, Debka Chayim, Hanahar. Sonia & Cristian Florescu were also there, and taught Romanian dances, easy to advanced: Joc Din Rebrisora, Cadaneasa di Macin, Corlu Aroman, De Cobanie, Petrecere, and Tuche, Tuche, which was a good review for me.

Also on the teaching staff was **Eddie Tyso**n, a Dutchman specializing in Bulgarian dance (who choreographed Ogneno Horo). He taught (intermediate to advanced)

Cetvorno Horo, his own choreography to the Svatba music, Sobrali se Site Momi, Sira, Mitalo Jabulka, Brusni Curvul, and a Zumba-type exercise dance done to Bulgarian music. Other dances taught (I forgot by whom) were: Adje je M'en Vais (French), Phiravelman Kaly Phun (?), Im Gusanes (Armenia), and Espresso (fast Romanian Rom).



Pet Je Kumi

(Croatia)

Pet Je Kumi (PEHT yeh KOO-mee), meaning 'Five Countrywomen,' is from the region of Medimurje in the far northwest corner of Croatia. This flowerbed of Croatia, cradled between the Mura and Drava rivers, is an area abundant with musical and dance tradition. The humble villager found a way to express the most important values of his existence through thousands of recorded songs. These songs reflect the daily life of the people — work in the house, in the farmyard, and in the field, the joys and sorrows that are the inseparable companions of life. All this leaves telling marks on the songs and dances of a nation. This dance was presented by Željko Jergan at the 2015 Stockton Folk Dance Camp at University of the Pacific.

Music:

2/4 meter

Resonance of Croatia, Track 6

Formation:

A closed circle of alternating M and W in W-pos.
