President's Message

What type of tree is this?

There has been a debate in folk dancing for a long time about couple versus



line dances. Back in the 30s, when folk dancing we know today was started, it was all couple dancing. In the 50s, a new branch started – line dances, mainly from the Balkans, which by the 70s had become a major branch.

Since then we have seen many new branches. Dance groups focus on just Greek, Scandinavian, Hungarian, Scottish, Israeli and others. I know that, as line dancing became more popular, some of the dancers moved to square dancing and contras.

In my opinion, the tree of dancing, having grown many new branches, is still as healthy as it ever was, especially when you step back and look at the whole dance picture. Have any of you dropped by the Friday Night Waltz session in Palo Alto? The energy and the feel of those events are just like the folk dance events of the 70s. Or have you looked at the vintage dance scene? And how many different dance camps and workshops are available?

I started dancing in 1973, and all I did was line dancing. In 2002, my wife and I branched out into ballroom and from there moved into Hungarian (we have gone to Budapest three times now just for the dancing). In the ballroom scene, we found that we especially liked West Coast Swing, and we are currently working with a private dance teacher on that. And all of this started with a beginning folk dance class at SF State University!

Now I have a confession to make: I currently dance mostly couple dances. On a normal week I attend a couple's Hungarian class, a West Coast Swing class, and a West Coast Swing party. On the second Saturday, we are off to the Peninsula Council party and then the second Sunday is a West Coast Swing party in San Mateo.

So, to sum it up, folk dance could be seen as a victim of its own success. We like new dances and sometimes these new dances lead to a whole new branch of dances. How many of you have done the Lambeth Walk, an American dance from the 1920s?

The way I see it, there is so much dance out there that no one can know it all so we specialize.

So many dances, so little time!

Celebrate the Vernal Equinox at Mandala

Mandala will be celebrating the coming of spring with Tanya Kostova on **Thursday, March 22**. The Bulgarians celebrate the coming of spring as well as the birth of their country for the entire month of March. They begin with the Martenitsa tradition on the first of March, also known as Baba Marta.

Tanya Kostova inherited her passion for traditional music and dance from her family, primarily from her maternal grandmother, one of the leading singers in her village. Tanya received her master's degree in choreography, stage directing and educational arts from the prestigious Academy of Music and Dance Arts, Plovdiv. As a choreographer and

researcher, she has concentrated on songs, dances, costumes and culture of Rhodopes, Trakija, the Sredna Gora region, Bulgarian Roma and other minorities.

As a teacher, she directed educational programs for the inclusion of children in traditional dance for grades one through

eight in Bulgaria. She has also has taught both children and adults for many years in this country.

Tanya will lead us in dances and also explain some of the culture related to this special time of year. She has made some special Martenitsas and will be selling them, in case you want to carry the memories home with you. We will also have snacks to share, to which you may contribute, if you wish.

Come dance with us and learn about the legend of the Martenitsa and find out what a grumpy grandmother has to do with spring!



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HOW ABOUT THAT HAMBO?

In the February 2018 issue, p. 13, the History Channel noted that the Hambo has been one of the most popular, if not THE most popular, dance done by local international folk dancers for over 70 years. It has been danced consistently at parties and festivals since it was introduced in the early 1940s. Because of that distinction, some historical data about the Hambo, condensed from a variety of sources⁽¹⁾, is provided below. Our thanks to Roo Lester for taking her time to review and comment on this article.

It's hard to find a folk dancer who hasn't heard of the Hambo. It is perhaps the most well-known of the folk dances in Sweden, with Swedish cultural groups around the world, and with American folk dancers. With a considerable and interesting history, this unique dance warrants a bit of closer study.

The Hambo has been danced continuously for at least the last 100 years. It is basically the same dance throughout Sweden, yet one can see regional as well as individual characteristics. It is a couple dance in 3/4 time, danced to music played with a strong accent on the first beat. The hambo is a dance with a fixed pattern, and tunes almost always have a corresponding eight-measure structure.

There are two schools of thought regarding its origin. The first potential origin is the polka-mazurka, a dance with many turns that was popular in Europe during the second half of the 19th century. The term "polska-mazurka" can also be found in notebooks used by Swedish musicians from the beginning of the 20th century. However, the mazurka today in northern Europe is played faster, with a short hop on the third beat, which is completely different from the hambo.

The Polish dance Powolniak, taught by Ada Dziewanowska at Stockton Folk Dance Dance in 1977, is remarkably similar to the Swedish Hambo, except that it is done at twice the speed. (There are examples on YouTube; search for "Powolniak dance.")

The other theory is that it derives from the polska, a musical and rhythmic form found in Sweden for over 300 years. The polska is to Sweden what the jig and reel are to the British Isles. The polska has played a role in Swedish music and dance since the beginning of the 17th century and, according to Gordon Tracie⁽²⁾, reigned supreme as the national dance of Sweden for nearly 250 years, well into the 1840s, the favorite of nobility and folk alike.

The version of the polska that has outlived many of the others in popularity up into the present

generation is, of course, the Hambopolska, now generally known as simply the Hambo. Despite the toll of folk traditions, the Hambo has remained a popular dance throughout all parts of Sweden. According to Tracie. the Hambo is today, as much as ever, dear to the heart of every Swede who knows it. The Hälsinge Hambo bears a reasonably close resemblance to what international folk dancers call the Hambo.

There are also several theories about the origin of the word "hambo." Some folk etymologists contend it comes from the place-name Hanebo

in the province of Hälsingland, where folk dancing has long enjoyed a particularly lively existence. "Hanebopolska" is, in fact, known in certain dance circles.

Another theory is that it is a corruption of the German city name Hamburg. This is substantiated by the fact that, in Swedish literature on dancing from the first part of the 19th century, there are references to dances called "Hamburg-polska," "Hamburger-polska," and "Hamburska." It seems likely that the name "Hamburg-polska" may have been used in Sweden to designate a "newfangled" way of doing an old dance. Because Germany is one of Sweden's closest southern neighbors, it is not inconceivable that a German city, Hamburg, was given credit for this imported finesse which modernized an old dance. There are also Hamburgska and Hamburska dances in the eastern part of Sweden.

In 1965, the province/cultural area of Hälsingland began a Hambo Competition (Hälseingehambon), held annually in early July. Though not the only Hambo competition, it is the most well-known outside of Sweden, and it has influenced the style of the Hambo. It has provided a lot of visibility for the dance, and for many years 1,500 couples participated. The event still exists today though it has changed some and is not as popular as it once was.

W Moim Ogródecku

(Poland)

W Moim Ogródecku (VUH MO-yem oh-gruh-DETS-kuh), also spelled W Moim Ogródeczku, means "In My Garden." The group that sings this song is Rokiczanka, based in Rokitno near Lubartow in Lubelskie county in Poland. This dance was choreographed and first taught by Ira Weisburd at Margate, Florida in 2014. It has been introduced to folk dancers in the United States, Canada, the Netherlands, Belgium, Bulgaria, Germany, Australia, and most recently in Warsaw and Lodz, Poland to wide acclaim. It was also taught by Lee Otterholt at the Laguna Festival 2016 and by Sanna Longden at the Festival of the Oaks 2017. Dance descriptions by Ira Weisburd, Lee Otterholt and Andrew Carnie are also available.

Music: 4/4 meter CDs: Ira Weisburd 2015, 2016 International Folk Dance Tour; Laguna Festival 2016

Formation: Circle of individuals, hands start in V-position, facing center.

Steps & Styling: Proud and joyous.

4 meas		INTRODUCTION. Start right after the shouted call, with the main melody.
	I.	STEP, TOGETHER, STEP, TOUCH; STEP, TOUCH, STEP, TOGETHER.
1		Facing ctr, with L fist on L hip, fingers pointing back, and R arm raised, fingers pointing up: Step R to R (ct 1); step L next to R (ct 2); step R to R (ct 3); touch L next to R (ct 4).
2		Step L to L (ct 1); touch R next to L (ct 2); step R to R (ct 3); step L next to R (ct 4).
3-4		Repeat meas 1-2.
	II.	TURN, TURN BACK.
1		Still facing ctr, with both fists on hips, fingers pointing back: Step R to R (ct 1); step L next to R (ct 2); step R to R (ct 3); pivot on R (CW) to face out of circle (ct 4).
2		Three steps in place: L, R, L (cts 1, &, 2); repeat with opp ftwk (cts 3, &, 4).
3		Step L to L (ct 1); step R next to L (ct 2); step L to L (ct 3); pivot on L to L to face ctr (ct 4).
	III.	GRAPEVINE AND HEELS.
1-2		With joined hands in V-pos, moving L, 8-step grapevine: Step R in front of L (ct 1); step L to L (ct 2); step R behind L (ct 3); step L to L (ct 4); repeat (cts 1-4).
3		Drop handhold and place fists on hips, fingers pointing back. Cross R heel in front of L (ct 1); step L in place (ct 2); step R next to L (ct 3); cross L heel in front of R (ct 4).
4		Step R in place (ct 1); step L next to R (ct 2); step R heel fwd, bringing arms and hands fwd (ct 3); step back on L, bringing arms out to sides (ct 4).
	IV.	TURNING AND HEELS INDIVIDUALLY.
1		Step back on R (ct 1); step L fwd, hands returning to hips (ct 2); half-turn CW with two steps: step R heel fwd, twd ctr, while starting turn, R arm and hand sweeping out and around parallel to floor (ct 3); finish half turn by stepping L, returning R fist to hip (ct 4).
2		Still facing out, step back on R (ct 1); step L in place (ct 2); step R heel fwd, bringing arms and hands fwd (ct 3); step back on L, bringing arms out to sides (ct 4).

Still facing out, step back on R (ct 1); step L fwd, hands return to hips (ct 2); half-turn CW with two steps: step R heel fwd, away from ctr, while starting turn, R arm and hand sweeping out and around parallel to the floor (ct 3); step L back (twd ctr) to complete turn, return R fist to hip to end facing ctr (ct 4).

Step R in place (ct 1), step L in place (ct 2), stamp R next to L (ct 3); either take hands in V-pos to repeat Fig. III or place L fist on hip and raise R (ct 4).
