The camp we are joining has a dance every night with live music and a large dance floor, and it invites everyone to come and dance. They also offer dance classes in the morning, and Laura and I will be teaching classes about partner dancing and West Coast swing. Popular San Francisco Bay dancer **Fred Chi-hung Ho** lost his battle with cancer on Saturday, August 18, 2018, at the age of 55. Fred and his wife Violet attended classes and dance events in San Francisco, around the Bay area, including three trips to participate in Stockton Folk Dance Camp. Fred and Violet enjoyed folk dancing and were perfect partners both in life and on stage.

A native of Hong Kong, Fred moved to San Francisco with Violet in 1991. He worked at the University of California, San Francisco as a Pharmacy Tech for 16 years, and in the First Data Bank as a Pharmaceutical Analyst for seven years.

Fred was creative and artistic and had a sense of beauty. With his fashion design background, he designed and made folk dance costumes for Violet and was her personal hairdresser for dance performances and venues. He designed posters for folk dance venues and events. He also helped choreograph performance dances.

ETHNOGRAPHIC TRAVEL IN TRANSYLVANIA AND BUCOVINA

When I heard about a trip being organized by Sonia Dion and Cristian Florescu, master Romanian dance teachers, I decided to join them on their 10-day group tour to Romania, along with several members of Kopachka Folk Dancers. We were 40+ dance aficionados from the US, Canada (Quebec), Germany, Sweden, Italy, England and Romania.

The tour was based out of the university town of Cluj-Napoca in Transylvania (see map), where Camelia and Neluţu Motoc, good friends of Sonia and Cristian, have directed a school of ethnic Romanian dance for 25 years.

The tour's focus was Ethnographic Travel in Transylvania and Bucovina, encompassing day tours

out of Cluj, dance classes, museum visits (wooden spoons and decorated eggs) and – the best part – village festivals specifically for our group. We spent one weekend in Bucovina, a region northeast of Transylvania, in the green and rainy hills where storks sat in four-foot-wide nests



atop light posts. In each town we visited, the villagers



all came out to greet us dressed in ethnic costumes, with bread, tuica (a red liquor distilled from fermented fruit) and music. There was a performance, dinner, and dancing for everyone. Camelia and Neluțu's students, so professional and talented, performed three times for the group. The youngest was eight years old.



At the town of Frata, we were serenaded by incredible violinists led by Sandorica and more dance performances over a feast of goulash and polenta. As we were leaving, the village organizer for the evening came aboard the bus to say goodbye, in Romanian of course. Cristian translated, but you could tell the host wanted to say something in English, to really communicate his feelings. All of a sudden he held up his arms as if to embrace us and said "Barack Obama!" The bus passengers, of course, burst into applause. It was a nice little cross-cultural highlight.

Near the end of our stay we headed up into the hills near Cluj to the village of Marisel, in even more rain, for a ride on horse-drawn carts used in the fields,

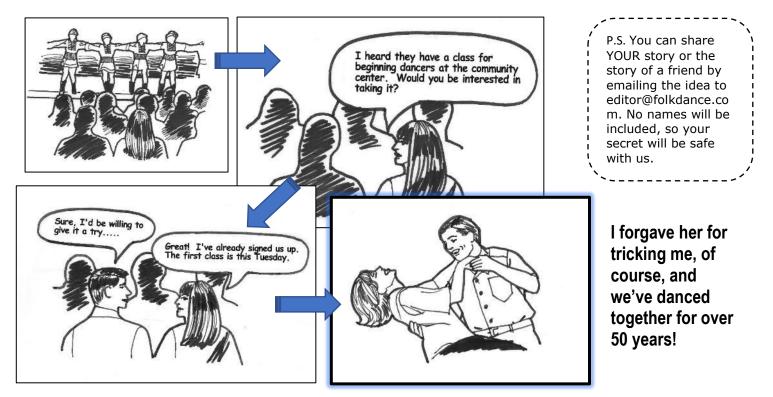
not for tourists. Greeted to a buffet of hors d'oeuvres, more tuica, and incredible musicians, we ended the evening dancing around an enormous bonfire with the villagers.

This was a well-thought out and organized trip, but so much more. It was very much a celebration of



Romania, its customs, songs, dances, costumes and feasting culture, in Dracula country! I'll be teaching many of the dances we learned at Kopachka Folk Dancers on Fridays in Mill Valley. 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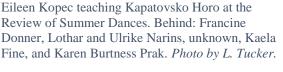

GERRY (JERRY) WASHBURN – Take Two

Several readers contacted me regarding the article about Gerry Washburn (September 2018). I am now better informed.

First, Dwight Fine, who attended Stockton for several years in the 1960 and 70s, informed me that Jerry did, in fact, attend Stockton Folk Dance Camp. (I came to realize that when I reviewed the Stockton attendance cards, I found a Jerry Washburn, but thought it was a man. It didn't occur to me that she might have spelled her name with a "J"). Jerry attended Stockton Camp six times between 1958 and 1969. Former Camp Director Bruce Mitchell remembers her being "an excellent dancer." Cookie Brakebill also remembers Jerry being at Stockton Camp, that she had a tiny 18-inch waist and wore her hair in a ponytail.

Teddy Wolterbeek called to tell me they were both in Millie Von Konsky's performing group (which Bruce remembered as well), and that Jerry idolized Millie to the extent that the other girls were reluctant to say anything negative about Millie in Jerry's presence for fear of her becoming upset.

Jane Tripi wrote to tell me that Jerry taught a dance class every Thursday evening at the Montclair Rec Center (where Jane has her own class) until very recently.

Margaret Harrison said her husband danced with Jerry many years ago, and he thought he remembered Jerry being in charge of the costumes for Millie Von Konsky's Dance Arts performing group. Margaret's five nephews attended St. Brendan's School and probably took classes from Miss Washburn.

For the **Insurance Chair**, a knowledge of insurance would be an asset, but it is not required. Because the insurance program is already in place, this is now largely a clerical position. Training will be provided.

The **Statewide Chair** (it could be co-chairs), would be in charge of organizing the Statewide Festival in May 2020. It isn't too early to start working on this event because popular venues, teachers, and musicians are often booked years in advance.

Golya

(Eastern Transylvania, Romania)

This medley of dances, from the Hargita region, was presented at Stockton Folk Dance Camp by Cristian Florescu and Sonia Dion. Many villages in Eastern Transylvania have slightly different versions of these (and several other) "small dances." Golya (GOH-eeah) is the Hungarian word for stork. It is a dance done primarily by ethnic Hungarians in Transylvania. The other dances in the medley, Şapte Paşi (meaning seven steps) and Roatele (meaning wheels), are danced by everyone in the village.

Opening Formatio		Circle of cpls facing CCW in Varsouvienne pos (see figures).
Steps:		Walking, Running, Side-Close-Side, Step-Lift, Pivot.
<u>Meas</u>	4/4	4 Pattern
None		INTRODUCTION. There is no musical introduction at the beginning of the recording. No action on the first four measures of the first dance.
	I.	GOLYA. (The stork)
1		Beg R, three walking steps bkwd (cts 1-3); lift R heel (ct 4).
2		Beg L, three walking steps fwd (cts 1-3); lift L heel (ct 4).
3		Repeat meas 1.
4		Beg L, two walking steps fwd (cts 1, 2); step L next to R (M may stamp) (ct 3); hold (ct 4).
5		In place, raise joined hands and bounce slightly at the knees while M helps W to twist upper body to R (cts 1-2); keeping joined hands raised, M helps W to twist upper body to L (cts 3-4).
6		Repeat meas 5.
7		Release L hands. Beg R, M takes three steps in place (cts 1-3). while W turns CW in place under joined R hands with 3 steps; small lift of R heel while raising L (slightly) with knee bent (ct 4).
		Men may choose to dance with the free L arm down, or with the arm raised or behind the back (elbow bent at a 90° angle) and step heavily in place.
8		Take Varsouvienne position facing CCW. Beg L, three walking steps fwd (cts 1-3); lift L heel slightly (ct 4). M steps heavily with flat ft.
9-24		Repeat meas 1-8 twice. On the last ct, M replaces small lift of L heel with a step on R as M need L free for the next dance in the medley.

	II.	<u>ŞAPTE PAŞI.</u> (Seven Steps)
1		Beg M's L, W's R, four running steps fwd moving CCW around the circle (cts 1-4).
2		Continue moving fwd three running steps (cts 1-3); M lift L heel; W lift R heel (ct 4).
3-4		Repeat meas 1-2 with opp ftwk and direction, moving bkwd (CW) around the circle.
5		Beg M's L, W's R, step side-together-side moving away from ptr (cts 1-3); lift heel of standing ft (ct 4). Gradually change arm pos from Varsouvienne to Open position: standing side by side, M's R hand joined with W's L hand at chest level. M's L hand and W's R hand are free.
6		Repeat meas 5 with opp ftwk and direction.
7-8		Beg M's L, W's R, four step-lifts (step, then lift heel of standing foot). M moves fwd (CCW) while assisting W to turn CW under their joined hands (M's R, W's L).
9-10		Repeat meas 5-6.
		During measure 10, M moves in a semi-circle to end facing W and CW, in Ballroom position: ptr slightly offset to L.
11-12		Beg M's L, W's R, four step-lifts. Cpl rotates one (or two) full turn(s) CW while also moving CCW around the circle of the dance.
13-36		Repeat meas 1-12 twice. On the last two meas, cpl makes less than one full turn so W ends facing M and CW.
	III.	<u>ROATELE</u> . (The Wheels)
		Cpl facing each other in shoulder-shoulder blade pos, W slightly offset to M's R side, M facing CCW, W facing CW.
1		Beg M's L fwd diag L and W's R bkwd diag R, step-together-step (cts 1-3). Lift heel of standing ft (ct 4).
2		Repeat meas 1 with opp ftwk, but continuing to move CCW (M fwd, W bkwd).
3-4		Repeat meas 1-2, but cpl adjusts slightly in meas 4 so that M's back is to ctr.
		During measures 1-3 W's steps are larger than M's. W moves side-to-side with small curving motions (<i>croissant</i>).
5-6		Two full rotations CW as a cpl while moving CCW around the circle, using four pivot steps.
7-48		Repeat meas 1-6 seven times.

<u>Notes</u>: The dance sequence crosses the musical phrase frequently (6 meas figure, 8 meas phrase) and comes out even the last time. On this recording the dance medley is done once through.

for you. It will open your mind to new rhythms, cultures, and activities. If you are looking for a healthy, broad-minded and interesting group of fun-loving people to join forces with, this is the bunch.

I attended the first week of Stockton Camp this year and found it was like living in a joyful alternate reality, set apart from the frustrations and sameness of everyday existence. You eat, learn, and dance with a friendly group of

people on a college campus for a full week. The food is healthy and fresh, and the setting at the University of the Pacific in the summer is green, charming, and peaceful.

Camp is a chance to learn about different cultures in a way far different from reading about them. Instead, you actually incorporate the rhythms and cadences of a culture into your very being. You hear the words and intonations of their music and songs, see their colors and costumes, meet the very accomplished teachers from other countries and experience their good-natured humor, and so, in a sense, get a visceral feel for a culture and a people. In my opinion, it's the next best thing to traveling to their country.

Yes, there are challenges. If you are over 60 as I am, you have to learn how to pace yourself if you want your feet to remain happy and your energy levels kept high into the evenings of the sixth day. My recommendation (which I learned in advance from my local Redding teachers Julie East and Lenore Frigo) is to bring multiple pairs of shoes. That way your feet can never complain too much about any one pair. You should also have good socks that wick away moisture and help prevent blisters if you have this tendency. I found some interesting antichaffing stuff called "Body Glide" which helped with this problem.

And if you're fairly new to this, as I am, it helps to remind yourself that you are dancing with folk dancers and teachers of long standing in their respective communities. Give yourself a break, get enough sleep, and just dance along with the flow of things.

In closing, I would encourage anyone who is interested in this experience but living with a restricted

budget to apply for scholarships to help defray the costs. This includes scholarships offered by the Folk Dance Federation, your local groups, and a Stockton Camp work scholarship. People who have never attended Camp before have priority.

Folk dancing is an activity for all ages that challenges you physically, mentally, and emotionally. There are many dancers at Stockton in their 70s and 80s who know that exercise and healthy fun are the elixirs of life. But young people are especially encouraged to attend, as the hope is they will carry on this amazing learning experience into future generations.

Many thanks to all the organizers and people who, often behind the scenes, keep camp spinning so smoothly year after year. See you next year at Stockton Folk Dance Camp 2019!

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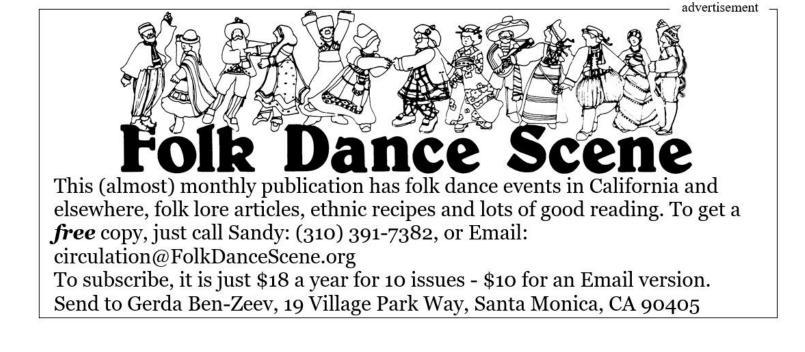
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
