

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Wow! The Officers Ball was a great success this year due to the hard work of the Federation Board members and many volunteers. My thanks to all the teachers who took time from their busy schedules to come teach and to Bill Cope who came in during dinner to entertain us.



The next Federation-sponsored event is the **Festival of the Oaks** in February, put on by the Berkeley Folk Dancers. There will be a Board meeting during the lunch break, and anyone attending the Festival is encouraged to pick up their lunch and join us. You do not have to be a Federation member to attend.

On a more personal level, I wanted to share my thoughts on the three different ethnographic trips to different countries in Eastern Europe that Laura and I have now been on. I can say I would gladly go on any of these trips again if I had the time. From the countries I'm listing, you can probably figure out whose trip it was. This is not an endorsement of any particular trip and we plan to do other trips should the opportunity arise.

After visiting many of these local folklore groups, one impression I have had is that the local population finds it amazing that we (Americans) want to come to see them and learn about their culture. For example, I spoke with one young man in Croatia and asked him what he and his friends thought about us. He was very diplomatic, saying that they all found it interesting we would want to come visit them when only a small number of his friends were interested in their own traditions.

Another time I spoke with László Tihanyi, the artistic director for Eszterlánc Hungarian Folk Ensemble (based in the San Francisco Bay Area) and is from Hungary and got his dance training there. He has since moved here and was surprised to find a Hungarian dance class here (Todd Wagner's class that I attend) that was made up of mostly Americans. Recently, while we were learning a Hungarian dance from a village in Transylvania, László told the person he'd learned the dance from that he was teaching it to Americans. At first he

didn't believe it, until László showed him a video of the class doing it and was very touched that the dance was being taught here.

These folklore groups are happy to take the time to show us their tradition costumes, dances and traditions. They are all doing an amazing job of preserving or recreating the traditional costumes, and then doing the research to find the old dances.

On our recent 15-day Croatia trip, we saw eight different folklore groups and we had the chance to see their dances, and to dance and talk with them. We also got to enjoy a performance by Lado at an International Folkdance Festival in the town square at Varazdin. One of the local traditional events we saw was the Cow Ball in Slovenia. It takes place in the fall when the cow herds come back from the mountain pastures where they have been for the summer.

CELEBRATING DENISE HEENAN AND HER MILESTONE BIRTHDAY

Living all but nine years in the San Jose, California area, Denise Heenan, a fixture in the Bay Area dance scene, is celebrating her 80th birthday (which many people refuse to believe!). We decided we wanted to know more about her.

Born in San Jose as the second of five children, Denise danced from an early age, starting ballet at seven. Growing up, she took many dance classes and was always looking for more opportunities to dance.

She first participated in folk dance at San Jose State University where she was earning a teaching credential to go with her degree in home economics. At that time, Ned and Marian Gault were teaching two classes on campus, and Denise became a regular attendee. In fall of 1968, Denise signed up for additional dance classes, joined the Mexican performance group Los Lupeños, and saw a life-changing advertisement for the annual Stockton Folk Dance Camp. All this occurred after her divorce from Jim, her high school sweetheart and father of her son, Chris.













In 1969, Denise first attended Stockton Folk Dance Camp. She remembers that, during her first year, in addition to learning all she could, she was determined to learn the Hambo from Madelynne Green.

In 1971, Denise married Bruce Mitchell, future director of Stockton Folk Dance Camp, and moved to Sacramento. While living in Sacramento, Denise assisted Bruce with dance classes and events and, as part of the Sacramento-based performing group Camtia, performed throughout the state at festivals.

Camtia performed at the 1974 World Expo in Spokane, Washington, along with the children of the troupe members. Her son has never forgiven her for making him wear women's knee high socks as part of his costume. Lederhosen, constructed by mothers in the group, were also part of the boys' costumes.

Moving back to San Jose in 1980, Denise returned to college, adding kitchen design courses and certifications to her resumé, which led to positions at multiple design and construction firms.

Denise resumed folk dancing via Scottish Country Dancing and earned the very difficult RSCDS Teaching Certificate. As have others who have earned the certificate, Denise described it as being harder than any college course, with multiple written exams and live exams by instructors from Scotland. After completion, Denise began teaching the San Jose Scottish dance class.

Getting back into international folk dance, Denise first joined the Santa Clara Valley Folk Dancers, meeting many people who have become lifelong friends. In addition to weekly classes and monthly parties, she again attended Friday night folk dancing at San Jose State. In 1982, Denise began teaching the Santa Clara team, partnering with Ken Yates and Christa Werling.

In the mid-1990s, Ruth Ruling invited Denise to join the Palomanians (See *Let's Dance!*, November issue, p. 7) as an assistant teacher to Ruth, and Denise gradually introduced recreational folk dancing to the Palomanians. Given the group's dance repertoire, her experience in Scottish Country Dance also

served her well. As time passed, Denise took over the primary responsibilities of the group.

Denise has been the primary Palomanians teacher for more than a decade, recruiting new dancers to folk dancing, encouraging class members to teach, balancing her great pre-fixe programs with dancers' requests, and being one of the major drivers behind the growth of the Palomanians group. When developing a program, Denise favors dances that balance new and classic, partner and non-partner, easy and challenging, various nationalities, along with mixers and some of her personal favorites. In general, she dislikes seeing people sit out for more than a few dances and she reads a room exceptionally well.

In addition, Denise teaches at local festivals and parties and attends many other events and classes. In 2019, she was the first honoree during the Candle Lighting Ceremony at Stockton for her work and dedication to Stockton as a long-term camper (50 years), a former member of the Board, and five years of organizing the live Scholarship Auction.

When dancers were asked about Denise, the most common phrases heard were "marvelous dancer," "gregarious personality," "terrific friend," "lighthearted and focused," and "infectiously funny."

When asked about teachers and dancers who have influenced her, Denise thought of many, many master teachers, among them Atanas Kolarovski's spirit, Yves Moreau's humor and breakdown of steps, Marianne Taylor's thoroughness, Bruce Mitchell's organizational skills, Johnny Pappas' authenticity, and Sonia Dion and Cristian Florescu's light-hearted teaching style. One of the things Denise learned from Edith Thompson was that "You always want people to wish the party hadn't ended as opposed to wishing it would."

Lucy Chang did a fine job keeping the workshop running smoothly, interspersing the teaching with familiar dances, and reviewing the dances before dinner. Lucy has had a tough year and we are all amazed by her tenacity and resilience.

Other highlights of the day include some pretty spectacular decorations – balloons! flags! lights! – assembled by Kevin Greek and his team, a delicious meal provided by Marian Snyder and Marija Hillis (affectionately referred to as M&M Catering), and entertainment by Bill Cope, the Federation's favorite song-meister. I wasn't able to stay for the evening dance party, but I'm told Loui did her usual good job keeping people on the dance floor.

In addition to providing an entertaining day for local dancers, the Officers Ball is a fundraiser. Laura Douglass, Federation Treasurer reported that, pending any last-minute receipts for expenses, just over \$900 was raised by the Officers Ball this year. The 50/50 drawing should have divided \$440 between the Federation and the winner of the drawing, **Warren Jensen**. STOCKTON CAMP OPENED UP THE WORLD TO TRAVEL

In the summer of 2018, while at Stockton Camp, I was encouraged by Sonia and Cristian to sign up for their 2019 tour in Romania. I hesitated because it was right around the time of Stockton Camp. If I chose to go, I would have to resign myself to skipping a year of Camp. It took me several months to finally decide to go, especially with the strong suggestion to apply for a Federation scholarship to help make it possible. I had to plan ahead: I packed my car for Camp *before* leaving for Romania. I would be leaving *the morning after* my flight home arrived.

Although I was bit jet-lagged during Camp, it was good to be there: reconnecting with so many of my folk dance buddies, some of whom I only see at Camp, so many planned activities and – let's not forget – the dancing of both old and new dances, that typifies a Camp experience.

This caused me to reflect on the impact attending Stockton Camp has had on me, starting with my first time in 2001. It was there that I met Athan Karras, the Greek teacher that year. It was because of his informational flyer on the table in the lobby that I learned about a two-week Greek dance seminar on the island of Crete that included dances from several regions of Greece. A little voice said to me, "You've got to do this!" I felt I needed to go, not only to connect to my Greek heritage, but to broaden my travel and dance experience. It would be my first European trip going solo! What an eye opener that trip was, learning the variety of Greek dance styles, participating in the local culture, and having a taste of travel with the hospitality I encountered during my travels to Greece and in Greece.

During that time in Crete, I also met life-long friends from Canada (one went with me to Ahmet's tour this year). Stockton Folk Dance Camp has provided me with opportunities that have gone far beyond dancing on the UOP Campus.

That table in the lobby is always full of flyers with invitations to explore dance and culture at the source, traveling with master dance teachers and fellow dancers for an unforgettable experience. It has led me to Yves and France Moreau's western Mediterranean cruise with Roberto Bagnoli, Ahmet Lüleci's tours of Turkey, and Sonia and Cristian's Romanian tour. I guess I can say that attending Stockton opened the world to me, literally. Not only

in Stockton, California, but Europe and – next year – Japan!

Thank you to the **Folk Dance Federation Scholarship Committee** for providing me with a scholarship to be able to attend Camp this last summer. I hope to be able to attend every year as, I know, the Camp experience and all its connections to folk dancing and friendship has truly broadened my world, both personally and culturally.

NAME THAT DANCE

"I can name that dance in six steps." "Well, I can name that dance in four steps!" That's the challenge. Below are the kind of description you'd write for yourself if you were making notes so you could remember a dance. There are no beats, no measures, no speed, and no rhythm – just the steps.

Note: The steps may be from anywhere in the dance, not just the beginning. One descriptions is for one dancer's steps for a couple dance. No "give-away" terminology is used such a grapevine or Yemenite.

Enjoy!

- 1. Moving CCW, step R, lift L, step-together-step, step R, lift L, step L, lift R while pivoting $\frac{1}{2}$ to the L to face CW.
- 2. Facing center, point R toe forward, point R toe to the R side. Step back on R, step on L next to R, step forward on R
- 3. Moving CCW, walk four steps R, L, R, L. Face to center and sway on R to R. Sway on L to L. Step toward center on R and hold. Back up five steps. Stamp R next to L.
- 4. With hands in W position, move toward center three steps. Back up three steps. Step on R, touch L next to R. Step on L, touch R next to L. While bringing hands from W position to V position, take two steps in place R, L, and touch R next to L.
- 5. Walk CCW two slow steps (R, L), continuing CCW walk three steps quickly (R, L, R). Back up two slow steps (L, R), quick step back onto L, quick step on R next to L, step forward onto L.
- 6. Walk toward center three steps (R, L, R), back away from center three steps (L, R, L) Repeat moving in and out again. Moving CW, four "steptogether-steps." Moving CCW, four "step-together-steps."

HOW FAR IS IT FROM ARCATA TO LOS OSOS? CHUBRITZA KNOWS!

You may recall from a back issue of *Let's Dance!* that the northernmost members of the Folk Dance Federation are in Arcata, California. For the record, the southernmost members are in Los Osos, California, near San Luis Obispo. That's just over 500 miles and over eight hours traveling by car.

And the point of this information? Well, Chubritza, one of our well-known folk dance bands, made up of musicians (who are also dancers) who live in the Arcata area, recently played for the Bay Osos Folk Dancers in Los Osos! And we have photographic proof that it happened.

According to Craig Kurumada and Linnea Mandell, Chubritza's leaders, this was Susie Burke's brainchild. When Susie and Billy Burke moved to Los Osos a few years ago, Susie put together a relatively new and quite delightful choir in Los Osos called Balkan Central. For their debut concert, Susie asked Chubritza to accompany the choir and also share the stage with tunes from their repertoire. Of course, Chubritza was happy to work with Susie again, but the distance and timing needed a fair amount of hammering out.

The stars align, however. Chubritza member Meadow Lo teaches school music and is professionally acquainted with the Gilroy High School music teacher. This award-winning choir had scheduled their annual fundraising dinner on a day Chubritza could be there that coordinated with the trip to Los Osos. In return for playing for their community spaghetti feed, Chubritza members received a lovely meal and lodging with families, thus avoiding having to make the Arcata-to-Los-Osos drive in one day.

The Kincaid Fire had just got started, so Chubritza members were past it by the time it started closing roads. On the way back, however....

The Balkan Central concert program was eclectic and was a stretch, even by Chubritza standards. The choir had worked up an entertaining mix of genres. Besides classic Balkan choir songs such as Bre Petrunko and Što Mi e Milo, the program included a Mexican ranchera song and couple of folk tunes from the United States (It was a first for Chubritza to play a bluegrass number!). The day after the concert, Chubritza played for a very enjoyable folk dance party hosted by the Bay Osos Folk Dancers (see accompanying photo).

Craig and Linnea reported that their stay in Los Osos was the epitome of hospitality. The folk dance community was so welcoming in housing and feeding the band and participating in the weekend activities. Between activities band members got to enjoy the beauty of Morro Bay and some warm weather.

The trip back north to Arcata was more problematic. They kept their eyes on the fires along the way and debated whether to try their normal direct route on Highway 101 or take Highway 5 to Redding. Despite taking different routes back in three separate cars, the musicians all got home at about the same time, only to be told PG&E had cut off power for Humboldt County AGAIN.

Craig and Linnea both said the trip was a great deal of fun, though they did have to sacrifice ice cream and frozen and thawed meat from their freezers!

Remembering Nancy Linscott

December 3, 1930 - October 26, 2019

We are sad to inform you that we lost a beloved member of our California Scandinavian dance community last weekend. Nancy Linscott, founder of Scandinavian dancing in the Greater Bay Area, and founder of Scandia Camp Mendocino, passed away at the age of 88, on Saturday evening October 26, after sustaining a stroke the week before. Nancy had been living with progressive dementia for many years.

We will remember Nancy for so many things. She was an avid watercolorist, and had even captured the magic of the Mendocino Woodlands in some of her watercolors, one of which eventually became a Scandia Camp t-shirt illustration. She loved to play tennis, hike, backpack, and was a leader in the international folk dance community in the Bay Area as well.

More importantly, we will remember Nancy for her long dedication to building a Scandinavian dance community locally, teaching Scandia dancing for many years with her former husband, Dean Linscott, and eventually founding the Scandia Camp Mendocino. And Nancy did it all with great love and much grace! There was a time in the late 80s and early 90s when the monthly dances she led gathered over 100 people per evening!



Nancy's many contributions that helped establish a strong Scandinavian dance and music culture in the San Francisco Bay Area have enriched all of our lives, and are continuing to do so today. We were and are very lucky to receive the many gifts that she gave us.

Orovyanka

(Bulgaria)

Orovyanka (oh-roh-VYAHN-kah), meaning Little Horo, is part of the Vlach tradition in the village of Gigen in the Severnjashko (northern) region of Bulgaria, across the Danube from Romania. Gergana Panova presented this dance at the 2019 Stockton Folk Dance Camp at the University of the Pacific.

Music: 2/4 meter. Gergana Panova presents Bulgarian Dances, Vol. 4. A USB flash drive is available from Gergana Gerganafolkwang@gmail.com Video: 2019 Stockton Folk Dance Camp DVD. Camp videos can be viewed by contacting a Camp participant who purchased it. Formation: Open, mixed circle of dancers facing CCW, hands in V-pos. The first person in the line should be a man. Steps & Styling: Semicircle forming different shapes like a snake. Walking steps are large. <u>Triple Step</u>: Three steps in one measure: Leap R fwd (ct 1); step L next to R (ct &); step R

next to L (ct 2). If repeated, use opp ftwk. Can also be done bkwd and from side to side.

Measures	2/4 PATTERN
4 meas	INTRODUCTION. No action. The downbeat of the first step is preceded by 4 quick notes.
1	Facing CCW, step L fwd with L leg straight and extended (ct 1); step R fwd (ct 2).
2	Step L fwd (ct 1); stamp R next to L (ct 2).
3	Stamp R next to L (ct 1); hold (ct 2).
4	Moving diag R, one Triple Step beg R (cts 1, &, 2).
5	Repeat meas 4 with opp ftwk, moving diag L.
6-7	Repeat meas 4-5.
8	Facing ctr, dance one Triple Step beg R to R (cts 1, &, 2).
9	Repeat meas 8 with opp ftwk and direction.
10	Dance one Triple Step, beg R, into the ctr, bringing arms up to W-pos and yelling: "EE-soo OO-nah" (cts 1, &, 2).
11	Dance one Triple Step, beg L, out of ctr, bringing arms down to V-pos (cts 1, &, 2).
12-13	Repeat meas 10-11, changing call to: "EE-soo DOH-ah."
14	Repeat meas 10, changing call to: "EE-soo-TREH-ee."
15	Step L bkwd, bringing arms down to V-pos (ct 1); stamp R next to L (ct 2).
16	Stamp R next to L (ct 1); small leap onto R to face CCW while kicking L leg fwd (ct 2).

Sequence: Dance repeats with stepping L fwd, then repeat the rest of the dance as described. The dance repeats 11 more times.
