

## STOCKTON FOLK DANCE CAMP 2019

It was another outstanding year at Stockton Folk Dance Camp, featuring the to-be-expected top-notch teaching staff, great dances, and several surprises!

The teaching staff was excellent. Joe Graziosi taught fifteen (!) Greek dances, and did not appear to be troubled at all by his knee replacements. Gergana Panova presented catchy, upbeat Bulgarian dances, including the popular, modern, party dance, Kazundzha (watch for it!). Richard Schmidt taught Polish dances with amazing and elegant sequences. Rebecca Tsai taught Chinese dances involving different types of fans and graceful movements. Maurits Van Geel taught an assortment of dances ranging from a sweet waltzing couple mixer, to a Cape Verdian, African-flavored dance, to a crazy-fast Roma dance. Tineke Van Geel very clearly taught Armenian dances, all with haunting music and nice hand motions. Gigi and Warren Jensen taught not just Argentine tango, but two other popular Argentine dance forms - Milonga and Vals Cruzado. This was rounded out by Tony Parkes calling American squares and contras at the right level of difficulty so everyone could participate and enjoy them.

I am sure there are at least a dozen dances presented this year that will be taught widely and will become part of our repertoires. There will be a report out shortly on the Federation's survey of the dances taught that will identify the most popular dances.

The afternoon ukulele class taught by Melanie Lawson (with assistance from her sister, Marcella, and brother, Michael) was well-attended. The class learned a lot very quickly, and sounded wonderful when they performed the music for one of Gergana's dances, Shumarsko. The Saturday Talent Show featured the combined ukulele class and singing class in Shto Mi E Milo! I never thought I'd hear *that* combination!

The live auction raised a record amount of money for the Scholarship Fund. My wife Hollis high-bid for some lovely Ashmolean teacups to replace my favorite teacup which broke recently, so I'm happy.

The politics got rather thick this year. Let me explain: As part of Wednesday night Polish-themed festivities, we had a mock political battle between the two largest Polish political parties. On one hand, there was the conservative PiS party (enthusiastically represented by Bill East and his lackies), and on the other hand there's the liberal PO party (jubilantly represented by Murray Spiegel and his flunkies).

A surprise entry into the two-way race was the normally insignificant Polish political force, the Feminist Initiative, represented by Loui Tucker. As Loui pointed out, there were more women than men there, so winning was inevitable! In the end, after much mud-slinging and a dirty campaigning, we all realized that Bill and Murray offered rather "pis-po" options, and the IF party triumphed. The balance of power was tipped when the wives of the PiS and PO party leaders joined the Feminist Initiative.

We didn't attend the second week, but were told the two parties were represented by Marian Snyder (the Berkeley Coalition) and Craig Blackstone (the San Francisco Coalition). The San Francisco Coalition promised to institute a mandatory, built-in-the-schedule Nap Time, while the Berkeley Coalition promoted air-conditioned stairwells and escalators, among other things. In the end, in the spirit of cooperation and bipartisanship (what concepts!), the two parties agreed to sit down, work out their differences, and together come up with solutions that would benefit our folk dance community.

This year also featured two remarkable 1000-piece jigsaw puzzles that were assembled in the lobby of our main dance hall. It took most of each week for the many participants to finish the two puzzles. One puzzle featured 60 scattered photos of teachers who had taught at least four times at Stockton Folk Dance

Camp, and the other showed nine of the big all-camper photos taken between 1948 and 2018.

Adony Beniares and his crew cooked up some wacky party games to keep us amused at the Polish Party. One member of each competing pair tossed rope rings at a wooden pole held erect in the between the other member's legs. The women pole-holders did as well as the men! (I'll just say that I did not volunteer for the ring-toss challenge!)

The Friday Time Capsule gave Joe Graziosi a chance to review some classic dances, including Dhivaratikos and Issios. The Greek-themed banquet on Saturday was sumptuous, ending with coffee, sweet desserts, and film clips presented by Joe Graziosi showing Greek dancing in Hollywood movies. I never knew Lucille Ball was in a Greek dance skit! You can see it too if you search on Youtube for "Lucy's Greek Wedding." Don't miss the shoulder-hold flips near the end!

Although we didn't attend the second week, we were told the Argentine Tango party at "Café Felix" was a big hit, and most dancers dressed up in their finery for the occasion. A special trio of musicians was hired to play typical tango music.

This is not so say that Free Range Organic, Stockton Folk Dance Camp's band of amazing musicians, wasn't up to the task. They surprised Gigi during the second week by playing for the Once Over Lightly evening review of dances. This widely talented and versatile quartet played music for Tony Parkes to call contras and squares, learned several of the pieces for the Greek, Bulgarian, and Armenian dances taught during the week, and entertained us with light jazz during the pre-auction wine-and-cheese reception.

This year was particularly interesting for Hollis and me because we attended the first week instead of our normal second week. It turns out there is a whole crowd of parallel-universe dancers we had never met before! Suggestion for long-time campers: try switching weeks now and then!

## A FAREWELL TO MENDOCINO FOLKLORE CAMP

In June 2019, I was a first-year Mendocino Folklore Camper. It was also my last time as an MFC camper. In the course of one week, I became part of the lifelong Folklore Family.

After 57 years of fun, family, and folk tradition, MFC closed its doors with a last, grand hurrah. It was my honor and pleasure to be present for the final year, sharing Israeli folk dance with a warm and welcoming group. In many ways, it was a typical camp, filled with the joy and delight that comes from friendship, dancing, and singing together, but there was also a poignant awareness that the end was coming.

Whenever a long-standing institution of the dance world ends, our community loses something. With MFC, we lost an atmosphere of sharing that I found unique among the camps I've attended. There was

certainly a full set of dance and music teachers, but the learning was collaborative. For example, Daniel Tuutau led sea shanties, and even a student notoriously bad at holding a tune (I'm not naming names... but me) felt warmly invited to join the harmony. Although the students in Souhail Kaspar's Middle Eastern drumming class had a wide range of experience and ability, they were still able to pull together a single, coherent performance the last night of camp -- a performance that was inclusive and inspiringly energetic.

Michael Ginsburg's Balkan dance instruction was more like a conversation than instruction. When he picked up his trumpet to play a dance he had just taught, participants experienced the mixing of rhythm and movement via the interplay between musician and dancer. Tzvetanka Varimezova not only taught Bulgarian singing, but she invited us to learn the art of cooking the perfect banitsa (egg-cheese-filo pastry). She effectively brought the whole camp into her family's kitchen in Bulgaria for home-cooked food and good company. Even the youngest attendees, with a little help from Meadow Lo, were able to participate fully in the community with their (shockingly good) kids' band.

This is, I think, the quintessential element in folklore. Each of us has a voice, a talent, and when we share it, we build a community. Whether that means leading a syrto or telling a joke at the campfire, each person is irreplaceably part of the whole.

Mendocino Folklore Camp, too, is irreplaceable. While this may have been the last year of MFC, it certainly wasn't the end. The memories from 57 years persist, first of all. However, the future is bright, too. I also believe that these things don't disappear but simply evolve, showing up as new incarnations. The call of folklore is strong and has endured for many years; it just remains to be seen who will take up the mantle and how the tradition will continue to grow.

<u>PENINSULA COUNCIL</u> – Adony Beniares Many Peninsula Council members went to the Stockton Folk Dance Camp and had a great time; we know all clubs will be sharing some wonderful dances over the next few months. Thank you to the Stockton Folk Dance team for another great year.

For July and August, the Peninsula Council shifted their parties to Sunday afternoon as a change of pace. The July party was French themed. Two French dances were taught, with Hollis and Lon Radin hosting the evening party. Many people were expressively happy with a 'change of pace' Sunday afternoon party. The August 11 party, being held as this issue goes to print, will also be an afternoon affair, featuring a review of some easy Stockton 2019 dances, with the main party theme being dances more than 10 years old. For the rest of 2019, (Sept 21, Oct 12, Nov 9 and Dec 25), the Council has secured its normal venue at St. Bede's Church in Menlo Park for all parties!

The Moveable Feet Team is hosting their annual Summer Camps in Review on September 7, at All Saints Episcopal Church in Palo Alto, with more than a dozen local teachers sharing dances from Stockton, Mendocino, Transylvania, and English-Scottish camps. The fun starts at 1:45 pm, with Loui Tucker hosting the workshop. A potluck at 5:30 pm is followed by open dancing until 8:30 pm. This is your chance to learn dances from summer camps and workshops that you were unable to attend.

The Saratoga Folk Dancers will hold their endof-quarter party on August 28, 7:30-10:15 pm at St. Archangel Michael Serbian Orthodox Church The theme of the party is **Don Your Denim**. These parties are always well-attended and the quarterly themes add even more fun.

**Todd Wagner's Tuesday Hungarian Class** has been on hiatus due to Todd's summer travel schedule, but **will be restarting soon**.

Leadership of the Peninsula Council is changing. After three great years as President of the Council, Hollis Radin is stepping down, but remains a member of the primary planning team. Another member of the primary planning team, Adony Beniares (me!), is the Council's new president. Lesley Bone (Finance) and Ellie Wiener (Secretary) agreed to stay on another year, and all members of the planning committee are also staying on for more great events in 2020.

Finally, as seen in this issue, the **Peninsula** Council is moving the Heritage Festival from

January to March. The 2020 Festival will now be on March 13-14. Many sources says this was written by Saint Augustine of Hippo (354–430 AD) over 1500 years ago. See Editor's Note.

I praise the dance, for it frees people

from the heaviness of matter and binds the isolated to community. I praise the dance, which demands everything:

health and a clear spirit and a buoyant soul.

Dance is a transformation of space, of time, of people,

who are in constant danger of becoming all brain, will, or feeling.

Dancing demands a whole person,

one who is firmly anchored in the center of his life,

who is not obsessed by lust for people and things

and the demon of isolation in his own ego.

Dancing demands a freed person,

one who vibrates with the equipoise of all his powers.

I praise the dance.

O man, learn to dance,

or else the angels in heaven will not know what to do with you.

Editor's Note: This poem is certainly inspirational, so I wanted to include it. However, it occurred to *Let's Dance!* Assistant Editor David Hillis to do some research. I only wish my own background had prompted me to check it out as well.

An internet search resulted in several web pages devoted to this poem. It dates, with a few variations, only to 1998. No one has been able to verify that Saint Augustine wrote the poem, and his complete works were digitized in 1993.

Other scholars have traced portions of the poem to the German writer George Goetsch. His poem has been variously translated as beginning: "I praise the dance, for it binds body, mind and soul together in man, it binds the isolated people to the community, it binds the community to space and time." Many other lines bear a striking resemblance to the lines of the poem reproduced here.

No matter who wrote it, it certainly expresses the sentiment of those of us who dance.



## **BALKAN CAMP 2019**

The East European Folklife Center's (EEFC) 43rd West Coast Balkan Music & Dance Workshop was held June 22-29 deep in the California redwoods, at Mendocino Woodlands. With dance instruction by Michael Ginsburg (Balkan), Petur Iliev (Bulgarian), Alex Marković (Serbian), and Caroline Simmonds (Greek), one could fill five classes a day with dance, or include instrument and singing classes taught by twenty-six world-class musicians and singers. Classes were tailored to suit both beginning and experienced students. A selection of ethnic instruments is available if you don't already have a gajda, kaval, dumbek, tambura, or tapan.

The Mendocino Woodlands was built by the WPA. The rustic cabins have glass windows, fireplaces, and balconies overlooking the hilly terrain. Each cluster of cabins has a bathhouse with toilets, hot water and showers, and electrical power. People may also bring their camper-vans, and/or pitch a tent in the meadow beside the beaver pond.

The dining hall provides three meals, all-day snacking, and a midnight feed, coffee, teas, and juice/punch. The kafana (tavern) offers bottled water, juices, and assorted beers on the honor system through the day. At night, kafana volunteers pour wines and selected liquors (ouzo! rakija!). Fortunately, campers get plenty of exercise, so it's possible to finish the week only a few pounds heavier. There are hikes and other outings (tide-pools! Big Tree Trail!) during the week to show campers the beauty of the North Coast. There is a swimming hole in the river near the camp.

At the Camp Store you'll find donated party clothes, costume pieces, hats, shawls, shoes and boots, souvenirs and Balkan-themed books. (Melissa always says her favorite clothes come from the Camp Store.) In addition, campers and staffers market their own CDs, jewelry, woodworking products, scarves, spare instruments, and so on. The shopping is great!

Dance classes are held in the dance hall, the singing classes are in the dining hall, while the music classes are outside under the redwoods. In the after-dinner period, faculty present informative folklore sessions, panel discussions, and group sings.





# So You Think You Can't Dance...

I can't tell you how times I've heard this from folks who find out I teach folk dance: I can't dance. I'm really bad at dancing. I'm left-footed. I have no sense of rhythm. My (fill in the blank: wife, partner, friend, PE teacher, mother...) refuses to dance with me.

I beg to differ. I fully believe everyone can dance. I fully believe that everyone can bring joy and fun into their lives through dancing.

How?

Well, the first thing you have to do is stop telling yourself you can't dance. The words you say, whether out loud or just in your head, are powerful. Telling yourself you can't dance is the primary thing that's keeping you from dancing.

Next, find a dance class that is warm, welcoming, and open to newcomers and beginners. Look for a teacher who works actively to integrate newcomers and beginners into the class. If you don't succeed with your first class, try another class (it's like trying on shoes!).

In my experience, 75% of adults can't tell their right foot from their left, so you're in good company. Here's the trick: when you are in a circle of dancers facing counter-clockwise (which is standard, for the most part, except for those pesky French and Croatians who tend to move clockwise), your right foot will be the one closer to the outside of the circle and your left foot closer to the center of the circle.

Then you need to relax. Relax your shoulders and your arms and your knees. Try to feel the rhythm through the hands you are holding. Listen to the music.

There are many who believe there is a rule of dance etiquette that beginning dancers are supposed to go the end of the line, out of the way of experienced dancers. I personally don't subscribe to this belief. In fact, it's much better for you to find two friendly experienced dancers and stand between them. I believe one of the very best ways to learn is by letting your fellow dancers help you. Also be aware that different people learn at different paces; some will learn

a dance immediately; others will need more time to figure it out.

Every single one of us, beginners to experienced dancers (including me!), makes mistakes. It's not a sin in folk dancing. There is no need to feel embarrassed. Just laugh and shrug it off. There is no need to say "Oops." Keep moving with the dance circle and the musical beat.

So go out, start dancing, and join in the fun. I promise it will make you a better, happier person.

There is no such thing as a non-dancer. There are only people have not yet discovered they can dance.

#### Mari Kiz – Mari Kız

(Gagauzia)

Mari Kiz (MAH-ree KUHZ) means Oh, Girl. This dance is from the Gagauzi culture and is danced to a Gagauzi love song. The Gagauzi people are from the same Oguz tribe as Turks living in Turkey now but, when migrating from the middle of Asia, the Gagauzi branch followed the north Black Sea path, and finally settled in the territories from Crimia to Bulgaria. Once there, most of them converted to Orthodox Christianity. Today the Gagauzi people speak a very clear Turkish dialect which is somewhere between Azerbaijani and Turkish dialects.

In 1994 the Gagauzi people were given an autonomous piece of land called Gagauzia. This independent country is located within the borders of Moldovia. Just as their language has many influences, in their dance culture you can find influences from Turkish, Pontic, Bulgarian, Romanian and Moldovan dances and music. Caspar Bik learned this dance from Dominike Karantzounis, a Dutch specialist in Romanian dances. Caspar presented Mari Kiz at the 2018 Stockton Folk Dance Camp held at University of the Pacific, in Stockton, California.

Formation: Circle of dances, facing center, hands in V-position.

Steps & Styling: Slow, with deep knee bends.

Measures	3/4 PATTERN
16 meas	INTRODUCTION. No action.
I.	ALONG THE CIRCLE.
1	Large step L across in front of R, bending knees (ct 1); step R to R (ct 2); step L next to R (ct &); step R to R (ct 3).
2	Large step L across behind R, bending knees (ct 1); step R to R (ct 2); step L next to R (ct &); step R to R (ct 3).
3	Repeat meas 1.
4	Large step L across behind R, bending knees (ct 1); sway R to R (ct 2); sway L in place (ct &); step R next to L (ct 3).
5-16	Repeat meas 1-4 three times.
II.	ANGLE TOWARD CENTER AND BACK.
1	Step L diag R, moving 45 degrees twd ctr (ct 1); 3 steps (R, L, R), continuing at 45 degree angle (cts 2, &, 3).
2	Step L in front of R with bent knee (ct 1); step R back, in place (ct 2); step L to L, now facing 45 degrees to L of ctr (ct &); step R in front of L with bent knee (ct 3).
3	Continuing to face diagonally L, step L bkwd (ct 1); 3 steps (R, L, R) backing up (cts 2, &, 3).

#### Mari Kız — continued

4 Facing ctr, step L behind R (ct 1); large sway R to R (ct 2);

sway L in place (ct &); step R next to L (ct 3).

5-8 Repeat meas 1-4.

Sequence: As noted above 5 times, then Fig I one more time.


