# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Last month I was saddened to learn that Lucy Chang had died. She meant a lot to all of us, and Laura and I are no exception.

Soon after Laura and I returned to folk dancing in 2003, after a break while we raised a family, we met Lucy and her husband Richard at



Marcel's Tuesday evening class and his monthly dances. We quickly became friends. Lucy was outgoing, friendly, and enthusiastic. Lucy shared our love of folk dancing, and was soon active in the Federation. Laura and I served on the Federation Board with Lucy and saw her drive to give back all the joy folk dancing had given her. She later volunteered to be on the Research Committee at Stockton.

Not long after Marcel's monthly parties ended, Lucy stepped in to keep the tradition alive by creating the Moveable Feet Club. Her original plan was to have a once-a-quarter dance event, but it soon became something more, nearly once a month, including themed parties, workshops with visiting teachers, and fund raisers for local charities.

We are all so sad that she is gone, but so happy she was here.

# THE REDWOOD DANCE SQUAD

I am excited to announce our Rapper team, **the Redwood Dance Squad**, **will be performing at Statewide 2020 in Petaluma**. The performers are ages 11 to 15. Some have being learning Rapper for two years, while others have been doing it for a few months.

You may be wondering what Rapper Sword is and how is it different from Longsword. Rapper sword dancing originated in the coal mining region of northern England in the early 1800s. It is unknown if it is a

variant on Longsword or if they evolved simultaneously. Rapper sword dancing is done much faster than Longsword, as the swords bend and swivel, it allows for quick fancy figures and lots of spinning and flipping. Rapper was originally danced by coals miners in pubs as a way for them to earn money. The swords are generally thought to have

originally been pony scarpers,

used by miners, although another theory is that they were worn out saw blades. Many coal miners also did clogging, and so the basic step of rapper is a clogging step.

Some of my students and I had the opportunity to learn Rapper Sword at the Bay Area Country Dance Society's Family Week, a dance camp designed, as the name says, for families. We all got so hooked on Rapper that we arranged to have the teacher, Rhonda Cayford, to come to give us private lessons in Willits. After those lessons, my students took a leadership role and taught the other children rapper too.

The only thing holding us back was that we had to borrow swords. I had looked online and Rapper swords are rare and expensive.

Then Bruce Hamilton surprised us with a gift of six rapper swords!! He thinks the swords came from his dance teacher, Mary Judson, in Pasadena where Bruce was exposed to Rapper in college in the late 1960s. He told us, "Folk dance was part of the women's physical education

curriculum, and the teacher did quite a bit of English dance. For May Day, the folk dance club learned a maypole dance, a few Morris dances and a Rapper sword dance. We didn't know a thing about the context, but had a lot of fun doing them."

While we are attending Statewide in May, my students will be volunteering and attending the parties and workshops. If you enjoy our performance, please consider donating to our group. The kids are raising money to attend the Bay Area Country Dance Society's Family Camp again to learn more Rapper, as well as French Canadian dancing, contra and English dancing. Last year at camp, my students also taught some Israeli dances to the other kids.

# We Love Lucy... Remembering Lucy Chang

After a valiant and courageous battle which lasted almost two years, Lucy Chang succumbed to cancer in February. The folk dance community lost a much-loved and well-respected member who did so much and was an inspiration to all.

Lucy was a Past President of Folk Dance Federation. She was instrumental in organizing the annual Officers Ball, served on various Federation committees, and headed the Moveable Feet dance club which hosted parties and workshops throughout the year. These events usually featured well-known and popular master teachers and were always well attended.

With disbelief and sorrow, some of Lucy's many friends have shared their thoughts:

"So sad that Lucy is gone, but so happy that she was here."

"She will always be with us when we dance."

"Wisdom, power, grace."

"...a force for good."

"Lucy is a true angel and will always be. She did so much to help foster dance and inspire our community to join in dance. She showed amazing courage and stamina until the end..."

"Lucy Chang was a bright light and an amazing person whose struggle never let her spirits down."

"She was an active and bright light in all of our lives and we will miss her greatly."

Dancers also shared some of their memories of Lucy:

"Lucy was a great gift to our dance community. She gave so much of her time and talents, even when her time was running out. She had the forethought to leave Moveable Feet a year's worth of dates, venues, themes, and MCs -- what a legacy!"

"...such a cheerful. positive, enthusiastic lady, and so gracious. Lucy had such a variety of interests and was so accomplished. I don't think any of us, outside of her family, realized how many facets the jewel that was Lucy truly had. The world is a little dimmer because of the absence of her light."

"Everyone knew Lucy as the strong, creative, well-organized go-getter who was the force behind the Moveable Feet events that have become so popular. There was a less obvious, softer, sensitive side of Lucy, whose feelings were easily hurt, and who cared a great deal about people, animals, the planet, the arts, and of course, dance. Lucy will be remembered with great appreciation for her tremendous contributions to the folk dance community and will be missed for the bright, caring, sensitive, socially conscious person that she was. RIP, our red-booted friend."

"When I think of Lucy, I remember more than the words she spoke. I remember the example for living that she set. I think of her courage and strength in the face of what were insurmountable odds, of her open and frank discussions of her condition and her ability to think beyond herself and to be interested in others, their stories, their lives. To remain a giving and caring person. She is a model for us all."

"I first met Lucy and Richard in Menlo Park many years ago. They were dancing with Marcel's group on Tuesday evenings and I was dancing with the Palomanians in the next room on the same nights. The two groups had been combined, occasionally for a few dances, and I immediately noticed Lucy, admiring her enthusiasm and excellent dancing. As time went on, we became friends and shared our dancing addiction. In addition to dancing together frequently in the Bay Area, both Lucy and Richard came down to Solvang over several years to Danish Days in September, for very full weekends of folk dancing, in the street. People thought we were entertaining the tourists, which we probably were, but in reality, we were the ones rewarded the most with our enjoyment of dancing together. It was always such a memorable pleasure to dance with her. We will miss her greatly."

# **Marian Gault – A Long Life Dedicated To Dance**

Marian Gault will be 100 years old this April and she has spent the bulk of the 100 years dancing, primarily folk dancing.

Marian grew up in Idaho, lived in Hawaii and Yosemite National Park, traveled many places in the world, and now lives in Monte Sereno, a town on the southern end of the San Francisco Bay. In college she studied fine arts and education and, after graduating, taught in the public schools, mostly at the junior high level.

Both Marian and her husband Ned began dancing as ballroom dancers. Marian got hooked on folk dancing when she worked in Yosemite and attended classes held for the park employees. She moved to San Jose and met Ned in an adult education class taught by Ned's parents. In 1958, Ned's parents decided to stop teaching and Marian and Ned took over that class, an advanced class with over 100 dancers in it. This was the heyday of folk dancing when the Adult Education Program schedule included twelve large classes a week and enough dancers to fill the San Jose Civic Auditorium for their annual festival.

In 1962 they were married, with the local dance groups giving a huge party for them. Ned became president of the Folk Dance Federation of California (1964-66). Marian and Ned both served in many capacities for the Folk Dance Federation and have been members since the late 1950s.

Lawton Harris invited them to teach at Stockton Folk Dance Camp in 1963. They remained on the teaching faculty of the Stockton Camp for 28 years, first teaching tangos and later presenting the teaching techniques for folk dance classes and the basic repertoire classes. Marian, as an artist and calligrapher, designed the syllabus covers for 25 years and did the artwork for publicity. Because of their long study of German and Austrian dances, they twice taught as specialists in the dances of Austria at Stockton Folk Dance Camp. The two of them also

choreographed several tangos, including Tango Poquito, El Gaucho Tango, Tango Campana, and La Encantada Tango. She and Ned still teach a once-a-week folk dance class in Santa Clara.

In 1966, at the urging of dancers in their classes, they formed the Ensemble International, as a performing folk dance group. For 37 years, Marian and Ned directed, taught, managed, and were choreographers for Ensemble International, which included many performances and full concerts all over California, and three performing tours in Europe. In the 1990s, Ensemble International's concerts were part of the City of San Jose's Performing Arts Series at the Montgomery Theater.

Ensemble International was a nonprofit organization, and Marian did all the correspondence, bookkeeping, reports, and grant writing, as well as designing and making many of the folk costumes worn by the dancers. She scheduled rehearsals and danced in all the performances.

Happy 100th birthday and congratulations to Marian on reaching this remarkable milestone – and thank you for all you have done in your long life to promote international folk dancing.

She was a soloist and ballet master with Filip Kutev Bulgarian Ensemble while working with children and youth doing stage performances and establishing dance therapy in Sofia.

Gergana has written two books and more than 70 articles on Bulgarian dance and intercultural communication. She has organized summer culture seminars in Bulgaria and has taught dance workshops in Europe, Asia, and North and South America where she teaches dances from all ethnographic regions of Bulgaria. She co-founded the Theater



Department of the New Bulgarian University in Sofia and still works with the Theatre Total in Bochum. For 23 years, she was director of the Dance Archive at the Bulgarian Academy of Sciences.

Lucy was always a doer and this dancer's memory is just one example of that:

"'What do you think about me organizing a couples workshop?' The breakfast table was set with berries, brie, eggs, and other culinary delights. Lucy and Richard hosted me many times in their home, and we had great conversations over amazing breakfast fare. That day, I said, "Yes, do it!" – and she did."

We will remember Lucy as an accomplished folk dancer who was proficient in a wide variety of international folk dances -- Scottish, Balkan, Hungarian, Scandinavian, and many others. She not only taught the steps to dances -- she also made sure to teach their correct styling as well. She paid great attention to detail which was appreciated by fellow dancers as evidenced by the following comments:

"We'll all be dancing with you in our hearts, Lucy, and trying to keep up to your standards!"

"I was thinking when I go to Statewide, she would be one of a few dancers I'd love to watch when they dance."

Lucy had a way of making everyone feel like family. A few years ago, she started referring to me as MM – short for Mei Mei, which means "younger sister" in Chinese. So I asked her what the Chinese word was for "older sister" and she told me that it was Jie Jie. From then on, we always called each other by those names.

We will all greatly miss Lucy and our hearts go out to Richard, her husband and dance partner, and to their daughters, Alex and Sam.

Dear Lucy, you inspired us all and we are reminded of Irving Berlin's quote – "The song is ended, but the melody lingers on." Rest in peace.

Honoring Lucy's wishes, her family and the Moveable Feet Club will be holding a dance event in celebration of Lucy's life on a date to be determined.

# Kazundzha

(Roma, Bulgaria)

Kazundzha (kah-zuhn-DZHAH) is derived from the Turkish word "kazan," meaning boiler or cauldron. An older version of this dance is from Varna in the Dobrudzha region of Bulgaria. Having lost the context of its old name and meaning, the dance is becoming very popular in contemporary Bulgarian clubs for folk dances.

In 2019, at the Festival of the Bulgarian Diaspora in La Nucia, Spain, it was announced that the main horo of the event would be this dance. It was sent in advance to the participants of the Festival. Thus, 61 Bulgarian groups learned and danced this one figure.

This dance was presented by Gergana Panova at the 2019 Stockton Folk Dance Camp at University of the Pacific.



Do you remember decals? Raise your hand if you put a Folk Dance Federation decal on your car's back window! Dick Rawson came across one in his files, scanned it and shared it with *Let's Dance!* (By the way, the name "decal" is a shortened form of *decalcomania*, from the original French *décalcomanie*, a technique for transferring prints onto pottery.)

These old-style decals were dipped in water and then carefully applied to the desired surface, often glass. The water softened the glue so the decal would stick, but if you left the decal in the water too long, the glue dissolved and the decal failed to adhere. The industry terminology for them is a water-slide or water-dip decal, as opposed to the now much more common vinyl stickers. Today's vinyl decals are vinyl with an adhesive backing that is transferred by peeling off the base – no need to use water.

According to the advertisement in the July 1981 issue of *Let's Dance!* (right) decals like the one above sold for 50¢.
