

DENISE HEENAN'S 80th BIRTHDAY PARTY – A Review

When Lothar first heard that we would be celebrating Denise Heenan's 80th birthday, he wondered who Denise was, since the Denise he knew would, by his estimation, be turning 65 this year, or perhaps 70 at most – but never 80! To his great surprise and disbelief, it was in fact Denise Heenan whose 80th birthday we would end up celebrating. And what an event it was!

Entering the dance hall at St. Bede's Episcopal Church in Menlo Park you first saw the tartan laid out on the edge of the center of the stage holding various sized candles. I counted them: there were exactly eighty of them. The attention to detail was really spot on! The room was so wonderfully decorated. For the Palomanians, the preparations for this party probably started extra early, combining their annual December pie party with Denise's 80th birthday celebration.

On the stage, the usual projection of the current and upcoming dances was on the left, and on the right was another projection that showed pictures of Denise and her family interspersed with 36 well-wishing slides that dancers had sent in, along with some funny ones, that said, for example, "I'm very proud that Denise was born during my presidency. – Franklin Delano Roosevelt (probably)."

Occasionally the playlist display would stop in favor of an "incoming communication." Many well-wishers (Yves Moreau and France Bourque-Moreau, Catherine Moreau and Nadia Genest (Yves and France's daughter and her partner), Murray and

some courage to disturb the arrangement by grabbing one of those mini-pies. We had to wait quite a while to see what the big, wrapped bundle next to the pies was. But eventually the three-story birthday pie-cake for Denise was unveiled. It had a Scottish theme with lots of paper images of Denise around the bottom layer, which was a 16" apple pie. The middle layer was a 12" gluten-free chocolate cream/gingersnap pie, and the top layer a 9" vegan pumpkin/coconut cream pie.

The playlist was a lovely mixture of line dances, couple dances, mixers and set dances, with plenty of requests thrown in.

After about 25 dances, there was a break. Nilesh Shah and Lon Radin wheeled a frame into the middle of the dance floor with a ring hanging down from the top. This turned out to be a carabiner from which the champagne-bottle-shaped piñata was



hung. Denise was blindfolded, handed a long stick, and allowed two swings. Only one of them hit the piñata, but it failed to open it. She choose the next person to try, and she handed the stick to Joe Graziosi. He hit the motherlode! The crowd rushed in to fight over the candy that was all over the floor. (Not really! They were all quite civilized about it.) And who got to

enjoy all that? About 105 people attended this event. Among them were some surprise appearances from folk dance dignitaries such as Joe Graziosi, Richard Powers, Bruce Hamilton, Yves Moreau and France Bourque-Moreau.

Everyone who attended was offered a party favor to take home that included a photo of Denise, some candy, a tea bag, and a dance-related refrigerator magnet. Denise received a memory album with lots of cards in which people shared precious memories and well wishes.

It was a great feast! A big thank you to the Palomanians!


MEET BRUCE HAMILTON

Bruce Hamilton will be coming to Statewide 2020 in Petaluma. We're excited to have English Country Dance in addition to Bulgarian and Turkish.

Bruce Hamilton is a thoughtful and energetic teacher of English and Scottish country dancing. He started dancing in college, and took up teaching in the early 1970s. He was one of the founding teachers of the San Diego Branch of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society, and moved to Mountain View in 1976. He founded the San Jose English dance and has taught English country dancing all over the United States and abroad. He is also a founding member of the Deer Creek Morris Men, a 15-year participant in The Christmas Revels, and past president of the Country Dance and Song Society.

Bruce has been focusing on non-choreographic elements of English Country Dance (ECD). He doesn't teach many new or complex dances (claims he can't remember them!), but instead focuses on skills that apply across all dances. He is interested in how the dancers move, how they give weight, how they match the music, how well they work with their partners, etc. In workshops



Bruce also reviews the fundamentals of turns, heys, rights and lefts, using dances that will help these people work on those skills.

He carries this focus into his sought-after callers' classes, which he's done for the last three decades.

He has taught at Mendocino Folklore Camp, Pinewoods Camp, Timber Ridge and Stockton Folk Dance Camp, and in five countries. By day, Bruce is a retired computer scientist and now helps out with his wife's dog and cat rescue organization.

We welcome Bruce to Statewide 2020 and feel fortunate to have him as one of our master teachers.

When I received the invitation last May from the San Francisco Recreation and Park Department and the San Francisco Parks Alliance to attend the initial planning meeting of the year-long celebration of Golden Gate Park's 150th anniversary in 2020, I jumped at the opportunity! When I attended the first meeting, I took along several old photos of early Changs' members dancing in the Park. We wanted to include Mandala, San Francisco Dance Circle, and GreekFeet in planning the activities. So far, I've gotten a nod from each of them. Jeanne Hughes of City College of San Francisco will lend us costumes from CCSF's large collection from their performance days. She also thinks teaching first-time dancers should be part of our programs. We got the needed support from the Folk Dance Federation, so we're good to go!

Just recently, I talked with one of the organizers to see what type of activities we can plan. She is currently working on the festivities for the opening day on April 4. She is excited about our maypole idea for the children and would like to find a very visible place for us, so we can easily catch the eyes and ears of those passing by. In addition to that exciting opening day, they will also provide us many other opportunities for activities throughout the year.

Bruce Wyckoff (August 8, 1928 - October 10, 2019)

Bruce Wyckoff was a past president of the Folk Dance Federation (1978-80). The photo on the right appeared in *Let's Dance!* magazine with the columns he wrote during that time period.

He was born in San Francisco and grew up in Burlingame. When Bruce's parents were students at Stanford they were folk dancers, so when Bruce went there, he joined a folk dance group. His wife Mary started at Stanford a year later. When girls in her dorm said they were going folk dancing, she decided to join them. That's how she and Bruce met.

They were married, had four children, and lived in Redwood City. They joined the Docey Doe Folk Dancers, which was originally a square dance group started by Mildred Buhler, but had changed to include more folk dances by the time Bruce and Mary joined. When the teacher left, Bruce took over as



their teacher and remained so until their club disbanded due to illnesses and aging. In the meantime, Mary and Bruce also joined the Palomanians in the 1970s. Bruce often said he wished we danced more German dances, possibly because of some German background. He also especially liked Scottish dances.

Bruce served the folk dance community in many capacities. He held several positions in the Peninsula Folk Dance Coucil, including more than one term as president. As mentioned above, he served as president of the Folk Dance Federation for two years. He served on the Folk Dance Federation's Dance Research Committee and its Institute Committee. He was largely responsible for the large collection of videos taken at Federation institutes. While president of the Federation, he wrote a column in *Let's Dance!* called a Moment of Concern (see p. 17) and another called Let's Do Squares.

His degree and career were in civil engineering. He was also an avid photographer, although it was reported that he had a hard time accepting digital photography. Bruce and Mary were world travelers and often regaled fellow folk dancers in their home to wonderful slide shows of their trips.

Bruce died in October 2019, having been in a care home for several months. A memorial service for him will be held on February 29, 2020 at the Congregation Church in Belmont.

This is a reprint of a column that appeared in the November 1978 issue of *Let's Dance!*, written by then-president Bruce Wyckoff (see p. 16). This "Moments of Concern" was his contribution to each issue, as well as another column entitled "Let's Do Squares."

A Moment of Concern

One of the duties of the Federation President is to appoint committees including any special committees which he feels are required. This is to announce that I have appointed a "Long Range Study Committee." The committee chairman will be Al Lisin. The committee members will be Vi Dexheimer and Frank Bacher. All of these people have long been active in Federation affairs and I have great confidence in them. I am asking the committee to identify any present or future problems facing the Federation and suggest solutions. Specific areas to which I am directing their attention include how the Federation may better serve an increasingly diverse Folk Dance Community and how to overcome dance programming problems which have recently become apparent. I am certain that the committee would welcome your comments and suggestions in these and other subject areas. The committee will be allowed one year for their work. Study concerning implementation of any committee recommendations will follow.

- 3 Step R slight fwd (cts 1-2); moving L hip fwd, touch L fwd with flat foot (cts 3-4).
- 4 Step L diag bkwd L (cts 1-2); step R next to L (ct 3); step L in front of R (ct 4).
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4.
 - II. WALKING STEPS.
- 1 Step R to R (cts 1-2); step L in front of R (cts 3-4).
- 2 Beg R, four steps to R (cts 1, 2, 3, 4).
- 3-4 Repeat Fig I, meas 3-4.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4.
 - III. GRAPEVINES.
- 1 Step R to R (cts 1-2); step L behind R (ct 3); step R to R (ct 4).
- 2 Step L in front of R (cts 1-2); step R to R (ct 3); step L behind R (ct 4).
- 3-4 Repeat Fig I, meas 3-4.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4.
 - IV. TRAVELING RIGHT AND LEFT. Face CCW and lower arms to V-pos.
- Step R fwd (cts 1-2); two steps (L,R) fwd (cts 3, 4).
- 2 Repeat meas 1 with opp ftwk, continuing to R (CCW).
- 3-4 Repeat Fig I, meas 3-4.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 with opp ftwk and direction, moving to L (CW). At the end, bring arms up to W-pos to start the dance from the beginning.

ENDING.

- 1-2 Repeat Fig IV, meas 1-2.
- Facing ctr, step R slightly fwd (cts 1-2); touch L fwd (ct 3); hold (ct 4).
- 4 Music slows dramatically. Step L bkwd (ct 1); hold (ct 2); step on ball of R slowly across L (cts 3-4).

Sequence: Dance Fig I-IV three times, then the ending.



Adventures of a Balkan Dancer at Israeli Dance Camp (continued)

Dinners were in another private room, with lots of choices for all manner of diets. Since I hardly knew anyone, I wound up sitting with a variety people from all over the country and having many interesting conversations.

I loved the schedule, with classes getting off to a slow start in the morning, and parties at night going late. However. Yes, there are several "howevers." People who know me, know I am often among the last people standing in the early morning hours at dance parties and after-parties. Here, I was in bed by 11:00 PM. I didn't know any of the dances – except for a few "oldies" done during the first half-hour warm up! Plus, I didn't have a partner, which everyone else seemed to have come with, and about half the dances needed one. Not that I knew any of the partner dances either, so having a partner wouldn't have helped me. A few very nice men led me through a few dances, but I couldn't blame them for wanting to dance with more experienced dancers. It was humbling for me, because usually I am one of those more experienced dancers.

I did try to follow the non-partner dances in the evening from behind the line. Many people encouraged me and were so nice, but there are so many turns! The dances are fast and they come flying at you every two minutes. The music all starts sounding the same and the dances all start looking alike. My hat goes off to everyone there who could keep them all straight – meaning most of the people there.

During the day, there were classes. The guest teachers, Mitch Ginsburgh and Yaron Malihi, were two of the most beautiful Israeli dancers I've seen. They glided around the floor with so much joy, it was a pleasure to watch. You could feel how much they loved what they were doing. Another "however." The Israeli teaching is sooo different from Balkan, where every nuance is excruciatingly salivated over. I once spent a half hour at a Greek seminar learning how to hold a handkerchief! Here, they teach the dance in ten minutes, any questions? No? Okay put on the music. It boggles the mind! I did manage to learn a few very nice dances, including one from our tireless organizer, Aaron. (And it was fun to meet his equally energetic parents.) I came away with a few dances I'd be able to teach to some of my groups, which is always my objective after going to camps.

Thanks to Loui Tucker for running an hour of classic International dances. I finally got a chance to work off some of the yummy meals and demonstrate that - yes - I am a dancer. I wish they could have seen some of the newer dances that are now gaining popularity in the Balkan world, however tame they might seem in the midst of all that Israeli dance energy.

To sum up, I was very impressed with the Israeli dance scene. There are many more young people involved than in Balkan dance groups. In the Balkan world these days, you only seem to find young people when there is also live music and alcohol. Israeli dance is definitely doing something right. If I was 10 years younger, I might be tempted to take the time, find a partner, and learn a few hundred dances!

It was nice to share my Jewish heritage at Shabbat and Havdalah, meet new people, enjoy the local wines, the dress up nights, enjoy the beauty of Wonder Valley with my latest iPhone camera, and experience something new. It made me appreciate Balkan dance in a new way – and to be more mindful and encouraging toward new people at the camps and groups I dance with.

A friend of mine from Greek dancing has started taking a ballet class. I wonder if they have a camp...




