

WE HAVE A NEW FEDERATION GROUP: THE TAMIL DANCERS OF FREMONT

The Tamil Dancers of Fremont have joined the Federation. This group of dancers is primarily a performing group, but all are welcome to attend their monthly rehearsals. The current members of the group are recent immigrants who came to the United States from India since 1990. All of them were born and raised in Tamil Nadu. The members meet and practice once a month on the second Saturday in Fremont, and have started performing at Indian festivals and gatherings in Northern California.

Contrary to what many believe, Bollywood dance is not the traditional dance of the people of Indian origin. Indian children born and raised in the United States mistakenly believe Bollywood dance is an actual Indian traditional dance when it is not. One of the group's purposes is to promote true cultural folk dance to help connect with people of Indian origin, and to dance with family and friends at various festivities. Traditional dance forms are a missing piece in the rich culture they wish to share with their children.



There are many folk dances in Tamil Nadu (see map), and this group is learning many of them. However, the group's primary focus is one of the oldest of all folk dances from Tamil Nadu, called the Big Bell Dance, which dates back to Tamil Sangam Period (2800+ years ago). The group chose this dance because it is reportedly

nearly extinct. It was performed during the King Era in the


Why did this group join the Folk Dance Federation? To translate a common Tamil saying: "To us, all towns are our own, everyone our kin"

Sangam Period during festivals, holidays and celebrations. This particular dance is still performed in a small part of India, but only a few

dancers and dance groups in India are doing research on their own and documenting the dance history and dance moves. This local group of Tamil Dancers is part of the movement to bring this dance from near extinction back to life.

assistance in learning this dance. They then connected with local like-minded Tamilans and started practicing in Fremont. A few of the dancers know the dance steps from performing it when they were children. Their stated goal is to bring this dance out from behind closed doors and make it live long.

A distinct challenge in bringing back The Big Bell Dance is that the classic leg bands of heavy bronze bells used in the dance are not commercially available for purchase and are manufactured only in a few places. To maintain authenticity, the leg bands are still made the same traditional way and strapped around legs using cords. *continued on p. 12.*

MEET THE CANDIDATES

In April, Federation members will gather to choose the next President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. The candidates for Secretary (Clem Dickey) and Treasurer (Laura Douglass) are running again for their respective offices.

ULRIKE NARINS

I'm Ulrike Narins, a candidate for the office of **Federation Vice President**.

I grew up in Austria where I did ballroom dancing in my teenage years and some acrobatic rock 'n roll in my early twenties. In 1994 I moved to the United States with my son, Lothar, and started work as a software developer in San Francisco.



I am still doing this full time. I am married to a musician but non-dancer.

Until 2008 I didn't know such a thing as international folk dancing existed. Lothar did a year abroad in Tuebingen, Germany, where he was introduced to folk dancing. When I researched where we could do folk dancing in San Francisco, I discovered that Changs was just two blocks from my home. Since 2009, my son and I have been dancing at Changs; since 2011 I have been treasurer of the club.

I took the folk dance class at City College, Angel Tam introduced me to Peninsula Council parties at St. Bede's, and I became involved with the Moveable Feet Club. In 2017, I attended Stockton Folk Dance Camp for the first time and have been back every year since. I have participated in North/South three times, as well as Festival of the Oaks, the Federation's Officers ball, the Heritage Festival, Kolo Festival and many workshops.

When I travel, I search out folk dance opportunities. This way I have danced in South Bend, Indiana, New York City, Vienna, Austria and St. Poelten, Austria, and many places in Japan. I also attended the Ontario Folk Dance Camp.

For Changs' 80th Anniversary Party Lothar and I arranged a medley of nine dances for eight people. Together with my son, sometimes on my own, I have been teaching at Changs frequently and at Summer Camps in Review.

I feel that folk dancing is one of the most rewarding activities there is, as it connects people

across all walks of life, strengthens body and mind, broadens your horizon and fills you with joy, and so much more.

It would be an honor to serve the folk dance community as the vice-president of the Folk Dance Federation.

MARIAN SNYDER

I'm Marian Snyder, a candidate for the office of **Federation President**. I started dancing when I was 6 years old. town. If you are a Hitchcock fan, then a trip to the nearby towns


of Bodega and Bodega Bay may suit you (come see the birds!) or visit the library in Santa Rosa, where Uncle Charlie left a shadow of a doubt.

FESTIVAL OF THE OAKS – A REVIEW

The **Van Geel Triple Header** took place February 6-9 at three locations in the San Francisco Bay Area. It started with a workshop with the Saratoga Folk Dancers on Thursday night, and ended with the Moveable Feet workshop in Palo Alto on Sunday afternoon, but the Big Event was the all-day, long-standing Festival of the Oaks put on by the Berkeley Folk Dancers (BFD) at the Veterans Memorial Hall in Albany (just north of Berkeley).

All of our local Veterans Memorial Halls (built in the 1930s) are grand to begin with, but the added banners and flags were a nice touch and focused the room on international folk dancing. In addition, a section at the back of the hall was set up with racks for the BFD costume sales, and several long tables held an impressive array of edibles – bagels, muffins, rolls, spreads, and fresh fruit, plus hot and cold drinks. In the kitchen, a group of Festival Committee members aseembled the ingredients for the lentil soup and Asian salad that would be offered for lunch, and the tables in the adjacent dining room were already covered with table cloths and flowers. The weather cooperated and dancers began arriving at 9:00 when the doors opened.

The dancers ranged in age from 11-year-old Evelyn Kartini to 92-year-old George Fairbrook. Total attendance was around 130, a testament to extensive publicity and the draw of the two popular teachers. Tineke and Maurits Van Geel are the new 'power couple' in international folk dancing, following in the footsteps of teachers such as Paul and Gretel Dunsing, Una and Sean O'Farrell, Yves and France Moreau, and Cristian Florescu and Sonia Dion.

Maurits commented that the last time he was in the Albany Veterans Memorial Hall was for Statewide 2018. He had recently retired from a full-time position as director of a professional dance company in Amsterdam, and was looking forward to spending time in his home woodshop. That appearance at Statewide, however, changed his life. He and his wife Tineke have since been asked to teach together at numerous dance workshops in the United States, and were currently on a three-week tour taking them from Florida to California. We were very lucky to have them presenting dances from their

The morning workshop was well-paced and offered a variety of styles, ethnicity, speed, and complexity, from the light-footed Kučevačko Kolo from Serbia, to the elegant, centuries-old Ronde, a



specially-prepared CD.

mixer couple dance from the Netherlands via France. Although Tineke is known for her expertise in Armenian dance (she taught two Armenian dances), she also taught a Bulgarian dance, and was fully capable of reviewing and emphasizing the appropriate styling for the dances Maurits taught. It was clear they had collaborated in selecting the

dances so each of the three venues had different dances. While there was some overlap, no single dance was taught at all three venues, and each venue featured one unique dance.

Lunch was the aforementioned lentil soup and Asian salad, with bread and cheese, and brownies for dessert. Then the snack table was reloaded with more cookies, chips, guacamole, veggie trays and other yummies. You could not possibly go home hungry!

The afternoon included a performance, a review of dances taught in the morning, and more dancing, again with a wide range with something for everyone. Hours spent dancing with friends are hours well-spent, don't you think?



DANCING REVIVAL SWEEPING OVER ALL PARTS OF CALIFORNIA

Ten years ago, Mama Gravander's was an old world

place on Washington Street known soberly as the School of Swedish Applied Arts. The liberal Nordic element found it a place for close sentimental ties with the homelands. Once a week was Smorgasbord night and open house for visitors, and after dinner a house-shaking evening of folk dancing in the basement. A Chinese artist, Song Chang, and his wife, Harriet, were the first to perk up and see folk dancing as a healthy, comradery affair for all Californians and an inexpensive kick during hard times.

Chang organized the basement crowd, taught them more folk dances, and this was the group that moved into the William Tell House and gave it a reputation for peasant costumes and old country dances.

Chang's dancers were also the forerunners of a folk dancing frenzy that has sent the schottische, square dance, and polka to all parts of California. Changs International Folk Dancers, now a club of 250 members, was the first club of the giant California Folk Dance Federation, which presently has 250 clubs throughout the State. At parades, fiestas, jamborees and carnivals it is almost a slight if there isn't a place on the program for folk dancers. Clubs are being organized and joining the Folk Dance Federation at the rate of five to ten per month and oldsters of 70 are among the best dancers in some clubs.

Typical of the Folk Dance Federation's 25,000 members are the solid citizens in their 20s, 30s and 40s continued on p. 20



who are teachers, dentists, lawyers, doctors, engineers, real estate agents, Army and Navy officers, beauty shop owners, nurseryman, photographers and secretaries and, almost unanimously, they think popular dancing a waste of time. Folk dancing, they say, builds up the feet and ankles, keeps one limber, and able to run without panting.

The craze is becoming big business. Record stores keep all the folk tunes in stock and rented public address systems blare out the music in halls. Fancy white calfskin dancing boots for men start at \$11.95 a pair. The women buy ballet slippers or sandals. The skirts, blouses, dirndls, petticoats, panties, waistcoats, Tyrolean hats, knee-high socks, and britches are items of the well-dressed dancers and keep specialty shops humming.

Dance instruction in groups costs from 50 cents per person per night and up.

Dan J. McDonald, San Francisco contracting salesman, retired from business to stay at the full-time job as President of the Folk Dance Federation.

Song Chang's group still meets five nights a week at 1630 Stockton Street, starting at 8:30 pm. William Sorensen, a civilian engineer employee of the Navy, is the president. Chang teaches beginners himself on Monday nights. The club has \$9000 in its treasury. It also has about 1,000 outsiders practicing the dances in hopes of eventual membership. Those who dance with grace and style, Sorensen explains, and who also know 150 dances, and have good character, are admitted.

In the eastern part of the United States, folk dancing is quite popular with ethnic groups, but here in California it is running wild in popularity among all types.

ROO LESTER ON BASQUE DANCE

The area commonly referred to as the 'Basque Country' is divided between France and Spain. There are 3 provinces in France and 4 in Spain. Those living in this area do not necessarily recognize the borders and travel freely across the border. The Basques call their language Euskara (eh-oo-skara) and themselves Euskaldunak (literally, those who speak Euskara), suggesting the central importance of language in defining the Basques as a cultural and ethnic group. Euskara is unique, bearing no relation to Indo-European languages, or indeed to any other language group. Some scholars have suggested that the Basques, who also share certain genetic characteristics, may descend from the Stone Age inhabitants of the Pyrenees.

Within the Basque Country, each area has its own rich cultural elements and dances. Most of the dances are regional though now also found in the urban dance groups. People of all ages dance. There are ritual as well as social dances. The majority of the dances are for men, though today women are joining in some dances where historically they did not. At any festival/fiesta one will find a variety of dances including opportunities to participate. The dances are primarily for the feet and legs, with the upper body held proudly and still. Arms may relax at one's side or be held in the air and include finger snaps. They tend to be danced on the front or ball of the foot and may include ornamentations of hops, leaps and beats like in ballet.

One of the most well-known Basque dances comes from the Baztan Valley in the northern part of Narvarre. Baztan Dantza is a men's dance although for more than fifty years it has been danced by both men and women. Bolant Dantza and Lauetan Erdizka are from the Valcarlos area of northern Navarre, to the east of the Baztan Valley, originally ritual dances for men and today danced by all. Hegi and Maiana are Jautziak dances, referring to the type of step patterns and are also from Valcarlos. They are both primarily recreational dances now.

In the mid-19th century, many Basques migrated to the United States, perhaps attracted by the gold and silver rush or lack of land to call their own. They settled almost exclusively in the western states where many became sheepherders. As with most immigrants, the Basques in the United States reproduced elements of their native culture in their new home. Summertime Basque Picnics have offered an occasion for community members to gather and enjoy their Basque heritage in the form of food, athletic competitions, music, and dance. Folk dance groups have become a particularly important mechanism for preserving cultural forms and fostering a sense of ethnic identity among young people of Basque descent. According to Nancy Zubiri, author of A Travel Guide to Basque America, most adults now active in the Basque community performed in dance groups as children.

Ivan na Ganka dumashe (ee-VAN nah GAHN-kah DOO-muh-shay) means "Ivan said to Gana." Iliana Bozhanova choreographed this dance, Sborenka, to the song, Ivan na Ganka dumashe. She taught it across the country in 2019. It was presented in California in the Fall of 2019 in San Jose, Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, and San Diego.

VICK VICKLAND

Elbert "Vick" Vickland, the folk dancer and singer many of us knew well, passed after a bout with cardiac and kidney failure on January 19, 2020. He was tenderly well cared for in his last days by his sons Jim and Mark and their entire families.

Vick began his dance career with his mother. He was often his mother's partner as a young child and as a growing teen. He grew to really love it and continued for the rest of his 84 years, dancing primarily in the Sacramento and Foothill areas of California. Vick served as President of the Sacramento International Folk Dance and Arts Council and the Folk Dance Federation (2005-2007).

He was able to take his innate talent onto international cruise ships and Mississippi river boats as a dance host. He enjoyed taking international cruises and cruising on the Mississippi River in this fashion. He felt passionately about spreading the joy of folk dance and taught at the Boys and Girls Club, at the Renaissance Society in Sacramento, and (naturally) at Laguna Del Sol in near-by Wilton.

He also loved the music and, in fact, many forms of music such as traditional jazz and older popular tunes. He was able to exercise his lovely baritone voice while doing Balkan singing at the pre-dance Kolo Koalition group Sing Along with Toba (now Sing Along with Glynis), as well as belting out oldies and classical works with the Sacramento Choral Society, and at Singing for Fun with the Sacramento Renaissance Society.

His chosen profession as a Licensed Clinical Social Worker enabled him to work in several California counties with families in crisis. He strongly believed in keeping families together and used his counseling skills to achieve that with many of the families, employing the support of social workers and judges. He worked in the Peace Corps and, while in American Samoa, aided in establishing a mental hospital and bringing the one he found there out of the medieval age. I still hope his chickens are alive and well (sorry, private joke).

Dance and sing in peace, my friend.

P.S. Vick was also the person responsible for the final push to get the Folk Dance Federation 501(c)(e) status!

Two Different Parties With Something in Common

Like many folk dancers, I enjoy several kinds of dancing. Some dance groups, like Cal Tech Folk Dancers on Tuesday nights, are international; other groups confine themselves to one type of dance. I went to December holiday parties with Skandia (Scandinavian dances) and Kypséli (Greek for "beehive"). Some folk dance events use recorded music, but both these parties had live bands.

Kypséli wanted its holiday party to give the feeling of a Greek night club. Skandia's felt like a friends-and-family get-together.

Most Greek dancing I've seen is without partners, usually people holding hands in curved lines. Most Scandinavian dancing I've seen is by couples, often in a circle with each couple rotating individually while the whole circle also rotates. That's what I found at these two parties.

Despite these differences, it occurred to me that Greece and Scandinavia could each be considered to have a door-opening dance, a dance that, if you know or learn it, you can do the rest.

To me it seems the dance that opens the Greek door is syrtos, the four-measure dance in a curved line without partners, two measures traveling to the right and two more or less in place, three steps to each measure, the first step in each measure on a longer beat, the other two on shorter beats.

In Southern California syrtos seems to be the Greek dance that gets everyone onto the floor. At Greek festivals it's what I see most.

I think the dance opening the Scandinavian door is the vals (waltz), a dance for couples in a circle, two measures in triple time where all the beats are of the same length, each partner taking one step on each beat so that the couple rotates halfway around clockwise with each measure (or experts can rotate counter-clockwise), the whole circle rotating counter-clockwise.

The Swedish snoa ("rotating") is in two-beat time with one step for each measure (sometimes

called a pivot step), the couples rotating about the floor in a circle. The Norwegian rull ("rolling") is similar. This is simpler than the waltz in that you take fewer steps, but for many people it's harder. The partners each have to keep their weight balanced against the other's with fewer movements to make it happen. The schottis has a step-hop on each of two measures, or three steps and a hop, with similar rotation. All of these have variations in which the partners dance side by side awhile, then rotate awhile.

This idea of one door-opening, or maybe key, dance came to me when a friend who had done a lot of ballroom dancing said Scandinavian dances were all waltzes. First I thought that was wrong. After some thought, I believe it might, in a way, be right.

The Skandia party was announced as potluck, so lots of people brought food to share. People were invited to come in Scandinavian folk costume and many did. People brought food to the Kypséli party too. At both places I found some old friends and made some new ones. That's folk dancing for you.

I hope to see you soon on a local dance floor.
