Vice-Fresident - Jules Di Cicco

Jules reported an average of 6 councils were represented at each of the Council Presidents' Meetings. Lengthy discussions were carried on, summarized and presented to the following Assembly Neetings.each

Bill thanked the San Francisco, East Bay, and Sacramento Councils for the copies of their council meeting minutes, and requested this practice be continued, including copies to the secretary, in the future.

Treasurer - Bruce Mitchell Bruce reported the past two years as treasurer have been enjoyable. The Treasurer's Ball cleared \$527 -- an increase in profit although the attendance was the same -- and was a success. He thanked Lawrence Jerue,

Ray reported that in 1966-1967, 63 individuals became Associate Director of Extension - Ray Kane Members and 3 new clubs joined the Federation; and in 1967-1968, 47 individuals became Associate Members and 5 new clubs joined the Federation. Ray thanked Vi and others for their help, and expressed a belief that the revised Federation Facts have been helpful in obtaining new members.

Director of Publicity - Lanya Pavliger Lanya's accomplishments for the year were a listing of all festival dates in the California Home Magazine; a flyer and banner for the Treasurer's Ball; an article to Sunset Lagazine advertising the Where to Dance in the West publication; the simplified costume designs as advance Statewide publicity so dances could be taught and dancers could wear costumes; articles for Let's Dance and Viltis; and a Statewide banner display at the February, March, and April festivals. attended several council meetings, and reported on the Diablo area. In the future, Lanya will be doing a banner for the Hof Brau After Party, news releases for Statewide, and assembling a costume booklet to sell at Statewide for 50¢.

Historian - Bee Mitchell

Bee has been doing thorough research on the Historian materials, using a new room in her home to spread out, and has spent some 75 hours of studying, repairing, and adding!

She again asked that the missing materials listed in the April 21 minutes be sent to her to fill in where previous historians have been lax. Bee has been Historian for 9 years.

Five display boards have been prepared for this year. She is doing a cross file of concerts, statewide programs, scholarship winners

Bee remarked on the lack of detail on programs -- missing dates, locations, etc .-- and asked for concentration of what, where, and when. Then Bee gave a brief, but interesting, survey of the Federation's

history: The first meeting was held in Lodi on May 3, 1942, under the direction of Buzz Glass. The cost was \$5 for the sound truck, postage,

and program printing!

The second meeting was held May 16, 1942, place unknown. Changs hosted a festival in June, 1942, and the Federation was formed. Attending were Lodi Folk Dancers, Fun Club, Palomanians, Vallejo Folk Dancers, Spartan Spinners, U.C. Square and Folk Dancers, Changs, Gateswingers, Sausalito Folk Dancers, and Berkeley Folk Dancers

Blackboards were used for the early programs. The first festival with a theme was held by the Berkeley Folk

Dancers in October, 1947 -- "Old and New Worlds."

The first two-day festival was hosted by the Lariat Swingers, in February, 1949, in Salinas.

Split hosting often occurred -- a club or council hosting the after-noon and the other hosting the evening. The biggest addition for the Federation was in April, 1947 -- with

57 new clubs being admitted.

The first meeting of the Dance Research Committee was held February, 1944.

August 2, 1943, was the first Woodminster. The first Federation paper was January, 1944.

Work was begun on attempting a moving picture -- in 1944-1945! Bee reported a total of 140 boards have been completed, and she has potential materials for 4 or 5 more.

Recording Secretary - Gail Clune

Gail reported that after the Stockton meeting, 5 Executive Board Meeting minutes and 11 Assembly Meeting minutes will have been published, a total of 16, an increase of 2 over the preceding year.

Through the April 21 meeting in San Francisco, there have been an average attendance of 69 at the Assembly Meetings, with 26 club delegates and 55 associate members.

Bill further reported that the minutes are typed in a rough draft and sent to him for corrections and approval. Then they are returned to Gail, typed on stencils, and sent to the Federation office for the Office Secretary to run, address, assemble, and mail.

Director of Publications - Jim Rasella
Jim summarized his duties as seeing that publications are kept in stock, increasing interest in sales, and maintaining and manning a sales table at festivals.

The restriction of the restricti

Jim acknowledged Vern Kirk as being particularly outstanding in selling Federation publications in the council area.

He mentioned there should be an increase in sales in the Dictionary, the Festival Procedure Manual, and the Where to Dance in the West directory.

He also asked that dancers help busy sales people. Often strangers

walk off with publications, unaware they are not all free.

Office Secretary - Bobby Burke

Bobby reported things are going well at the office -- the regular office routine gets done. The inventory on the printed matter has been completed. Walt Dexheimer built shelves that were sorely needed but there is still not enough room for all the printed matter that is still at the Printer's.

Editor - Let's Dance - Vi Dexheimer

Vi remarked that the magazine itself is her report. She showed the Assembly the cover for the May issue. The magazine is not yet ready. She thanked contributors--Liesl Barnett and Audrey Fifield in particular. She thanked Al Vincent and Suzy Hartine for the Calendar of Events pages, Alice Hauserman and Bill D'Alvy for the President Viewpoints pages, Pearl Bleadon for the Echoes from the Southland, the Councils for their festival information, and specifically Robert Frost, Milli Riba, Aletha Smith, Lydia Strafelda, Cliff Nickells, Claire Filden, and Leonora Ponti for their Council Clips; Dorothy Henney for the Council Presidents' meetings summaries; and Dorothy Henney for the Council Presidents' meetings summaries; and Dorothy Tamburini for the dance descriptions (submitted well in advance). expressed a wish to see more articles about interesting individuals and clubs.

Business Manager - Let 's Dance - Walt Dexheimer
Walt expressed thanks for the advertisements. To date there is over \$1,500 in in advertising, with \$500 yet to come in. He asked clubs and teachers to help sell subscriptions.

Calendar Chairman - Suzy Martine

Suzy began the year by sending out a letter to each council asking for the year's schedule of activities. She reported cooperation has been very good, and hoped the duplications of dates for Salinas and Stockton, and Walnut Grove and Daly City Festivals could be avoided next year. A new regional festival occurred this year -- the Apple Blossom Festival in Sebastopol.

Legislative Committee - Lawrence Jerue
Lawrence reported not much has come up this last year that would affect folk dancers. He reported his duties as checking for legislation that might be detrimental to folk dancing, and explained how this could occur in many different, unexpected ways. The dancers were asked to become acquainted with their Senator and Assemblyman so they would be known if it were necessary to contact them in regard to folk dancing. Lawrence stated he has been Parliamentarian for the last four years, and has also served on the Mominating Committee, Budget Committee, and By-laws Committee this year.

Corresponding Secretary - Ann D'Alvy April reported she has done the letter writing Bill has requested.

Institute Committee - Pabby Burke

Twenty-one dances have been researched and written by researchers, representing thirteen countries. Seventeen have been published in Let's Dance and eight have been used by the Institute Committee.

Costume Research Committee - Dorothy Kvalnes In Dorothy's absence, her report was read by Gail Clune. reported she will be unable to continue as chairman next year. The

Bill announced an artist was wanted for the costume calendar -sketches are to be in to Vi by May 15. The artist will work with the Costume Research Committee. Vi showed sketches made by Bob Bowley, that have been submitted.

Constitution Amendment - Eldon Kane

The statement which will be added to the Articles of Incorporation was taken to Sacramento by Lawrence Jerue and approved in format. Final copies will be signed by the President and Secretary.

Scholarship Committee - Gordon Deeg

Gordon introduced his committee and thanked them for their hard work. He reviewed the age limit change for this year-minimum 18 yrs, no maximum. Five forms were sent to each council on November 15. Four

replies were received by January 30.

From the ten applications, five were chosen, and the other five were asked to apply again next year. They were rejected due to incomplete packets—usually missing letters.

Gordon made the following recommendations for new procedures:
(1) send out application forms by October, (2) send applications to each club instead of the councils, (3) discuss program at first Council Presidents' Meeting, and (4) advertise program in Let's Dance.

Festival Advisory Committee - Millie von Konsky
Millie introduced her committee and thanked them for their work on their individual projects. The only recommendation she had was that a better schedule be coordinated for the month of May.

By-laws Committee - Eldon Kane

Eldon thanked those people who have called his attention to the weaknesses in our constitution, and explained it should be called a constitution, not by-laws. Again the suggestion was made that a larger committee, more representative of the folk dancers, work on any future changes. Eldon reminded the Assembly that no set of laws will eliminate the need for common sense. Eldon thanked his committee, and his wife in particular, for their hard work.

North-South Relations Committee - Jules Di Cicco Jules announced the meeting is being planned for Statewide.

Statewide '68 - Jules Di Cicco

Jules briefly mentioned the costume show on Sunday, with Althous
Lubersky of Marin in charge, and the brunch on Sunday morning.

Concert - Millie Von Konsky

Millie remarked that directing a concert is fun--and this is her fourth attempt! The majority of dancers do not hear of the problems. She has had complete cooperation from her staff of 28 people plus their assistants, and the 350 dancers who will participate. The City of Oakland has been cooperating tremendously—allowing the reserving of the Headows for the Picnic on Thursday, and the donations by the Recreation Department of \$300 for sound and \$500 from the City for the Auditorium rental.

Kundert and donated his time and work for the program cover and poster. The script by Liesl Barnett is finished. Nate Moore will be the

narrator.

Four radio tapes have been made. Bob Williams is in charge of

radio and television publicity. Millie plans on two to four more tapes to be made for KFAX and also for two other stations.

Nineteen countries will be represented without duplication. All the dances will be new and many of the costumes. A zither player, yodelers, and authentic singers will be part of the program. There will be a stage presentation as well as the program of exhibition groups on the auditorium floor. She asked dancers to help fill the Auditorium.

Teacher Training

It was reported that the Council Presidents' wish a teacher training to take place this fall. Bill remarked that it takes more than six months to set up a program. Millie has offered to help obtain programs and set up the instructional portion, and Bill will help obtain equipment, etc. An outside hall will be used, possibly Eagles' Hall, for no college credit. The target date will be Spring, 1969.

President's Report - Bill D'Alvy

Bill reported he has had good aides and few problems. He sat in on ten regular meetings, five executive meetings, plus today's annual meeting. He has attended most Institute meetings, the organizational meeting of the Costume Research Committee, a meeting of the Dance Research Committee, and the North-South Relations Committee meeting in Fresno. He also wrote five articles for Let's Dance, attended three regional festivals, and attended several clubs' meetings.

Bill thanked those who have helped him and asked that it be continued with Bruce. His final words were to push folk dancing.

Election

Lawrence Jerue was chairman of the nomination committee. officer candidates were introduced. Vi Dexheimer described June White, who was absent, for the benefit of those present. Jules review instruc Mountain View; they will be picked up and taken to Stockton; the ballots will be opened and counted during the Assembly Meeting.

The South's slate of officers was announced. Many of the offices

were contested.
