Costumes of SARDINIA

. Audrey Fifield

IN TWO PARTS (Part II)

The ladies from Osilo, Figure #5, are wearing the gorgeous costume of this region. It is always of some shade of red, from vermillion to cardinal, and is of silk or wool, and finely pleated from the waist to the hem. A wide band of floral embroidery on white satin finishes the hem. The apron matches the skirt exactly. The low-cut bodice is tightly laced, as are all Sardinian women, and is of matching silk or wool. The sleeves are banded on the forearm with fancy braid and embellished with dangling, round, silver buttons of large size. The red silk head scarf is slightly shaped in the seaming and is always worn over a fine white embroidered net veil. (See D.M.C.'s "Encyclopedia of Needlework" section on net embroidery; especially. figures 896-7-8-9 and 900). The ruching is the same white satin as the rest of the trimming and is usually double rows.

Figure #6 is from Campidano. Her triangular veil is also embroidered net. Her fichu is of sheer white, lace-edged muslin. This costume shows more of the Italian influence than the others, as the sleeves of her mulberry velvet bodice are not slashed but are finished with a wide loop of ribbon. Her apron also is uniquely Italian in construction, though the pleating is Sardinian. It is of mulberry velvet with outside facing bands of heavy silk, either brocade or printed. The colors on this costume are principally gold and rose on white. The vertical side pieces are seamed flat to the velvet backing from top to bottom, but the center section is pleated and left free at the top, forming a deep pocket. The skirt is of heavy printed silk, and in this case, the colors are light green, cream and rose or henna, on a dark green ground. The ribbon at the hem is rose or henna. Two tassels or cords may be hung from the belt. as well as worn at the temples.

Figure #7, from Dessulo, is almost Nordic in appearance, and is unique in both cut and color. It is always of red, trimmed with bands of light blue satin, embroidered with a darker blue, and edged with gold braid. The red is slightly rusty in hue. The little bonnet is of white for babies, and of blue for girls or women. The trimming is of red, white and blue. Women wear a red cap of much larger cut, loosely, over the cap as a hood. The sleeves of the blouses are enormous and are gathered into a cross-stitched cuff, blue, of course. The top of the sleeve is shirred for a couple inches and held by a cross-stitched band at the drop-shoulderline.

Figure #8, from Itturi, wears an accordian pleated, bright red wool skirt, with an embroidered net apron and rectangular

head veil. The narrow edge of the veil is worm over the head, and the long end hangs down the back. The skirt has a wide band of darker red embroidery, banded with gold ribbon. The bodice need not match the skirt and may be any shade of red, from vermillion to magenta. The sleeves are trimmed with beaded silk braid and applique, and with really huge, fancy silver buttons dangling from three to one inch silver pins.

When making costumes with pleated skirts, remember they are

seldom pleated across the front under the pleated apron.

FIRST UNITARIAN FOLK DANCE GROUP

The First Unitarian Folk Dance Group has been the gateway to folk dancing for many people over the past fourteen years.

In December of 1953 the Dutton Club, a branch of the First Unitarian Church, asked Gary Kirschner to lead an evening of folk and square dancing at Sigmund Stern Grove Club House. This met with such enthusiasm from the participants that soon steps were being taken by some club members to start a weekly folk dance class at the church hall. Tuesday night was chosen as the most suitable, and soon the First Unitarian Folk Dance Club was launched, with Gary teaching a group of approximately sixteen dancers.

Though lacking in number, the group made up for this with their enthusiasm and spirit! Their friendliness and enthusiasm caused the new group to almost triple in number before even one year of dancing had passed. Soon the beginners had progressed to intermediate and advanced dances, but the new people joining the group were not forgotten. Each level of dancer willingly helped the other less experienced ones, thereby encouraging ALL who came to join the group. New dances were introduced and old ones retaught; parties were held regularly featuring exhibition groups and square dance callers who were only too happy to call for this lively group at the First Unitarian Church.

After thirteen wonderful years of dancing together the unforeseen happened! The church hall and other buildings adjoining the beautiful medieval-style church had to be demolished to make room for expansion and modernization of the church. The hall was torn down and because the group was unable to find new quarters in which to meet, the folk dance class was forced to temporarily disband. This was a big disappointment to the dancers, many of whom were original members of the group. They kept in touch with Gary and many attended his other classes during this enforced break. Often Gary was asked when the class would resume. He couldn't answer because it depended on the speed of construction.

Now, after one and a half years of rebuilding, a very beautiful new church hall has emerged from the workmen's rubble. It is ready for use again. The hall is just perfect for dancing-large and airy with parquet floors (easy on those dancing feet) and a lovely modern kitchen for our coffee and refreshments.

The folk dance group is most happy to announce, therefore, that folk dancing will resume Tuesday, March 12, in the new building adjoining the church on Franklin Street, at Geary.

You do not need to belong to the Unitarian Church to attend this class. The public is welcome. Classes will be held every Tuesday evening from 8 to 10:30, with a break at 9:15 for tea, coffee and cookies. Both beginner and intermediate dancers are welcome, and everybody will look forward to seeing old friends again and meeting new ones.

Our first Party Night will be April 16, when Edith Thompson will be the featured guest caller. There will also be an exhibition group, a program of your favorite folk dances, and delicious refreshments prepared by the group. Don't miss it!





TIKLOS

(Philippines)

For centuries Tiklos (Tee-KLOHS) has been a very important factor in the social life of the peasants in Leyte, Philippines. Tiklos refers to a group of peasants who agree to work for each other one day each week to clear the forest, prepare the soil for planting, or to do any odd job on the farm, including the building of a house. At noontime the people gather to eat lunch together and to rest. During this rest period Tiklos music is played and the peasants then dance the Tiklos. Tiklos was introduced at the 1967 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp by Bernardo T. Pedere, who was the lead male dancer and dance consultant of the Leyte Filipiniana Folk Dance Group which in 1966 toured the United States.

MUSIC: Record: Mico MX 534

Piano: Francisca R. Aquino, Philippine Folk Dances, Vol. II, Manila, Philippines, 1953

FORMATION: Ptrs stand opp each other about six ft apart. When facing an audience, W stands at ptrs R. Throughout the dance, unless otherwise directed, M hands in open fists with knuckles on hips; W arms down at sides, fingers holding skirt.

STEPS AND Change step: (1 to a meas): Step R fwd (ct 1), close L to R (ct &), step R again fwd STYLING: (ct 2), hold (ct &). This step is commonly called a two-step*.

<u>Heel-and-toe-change step</u> (1 to 2 meas): Place R heel diag fwd to R, facing and bending upper body slightly twd upturned toe (ct 1); point R toe diag bkwd, straightening body and facing fwd (ct 2); do a change step (cts 1, &, 2&).

Galop (2 to a meas): Step sdwd R (ct 1), quickly close L to R (ct ah), repeat action (cts 2, ah). This step is commonly called a slide*.

Ftwork throughout is same for both M and W. The above steps may be danced beginning L.

 - 7-8 Beginning R, move bkwd 4 steps to original place.
 - 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8.

II. ROCK AND GALOP

- Rock fwd onto R raising L ft sharply behind calf of R leg, knee bent and turned out slightly (ct 1); rock bkwd L (ct 2).
 - 2 Repeat action of meas 1 (Fig II). Keep body erect.
- 3-4 Move sdwd R with 3 galop steps (cts 1, 2, 1), step R sdwd (ct 2).
 - 5-6 Beginning L, repeat action of meas 1-2 (Fig II).
 - 7-8 Moving sdwd L, repeat action of meas 3-4 (Fig II).
 - 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8 (Fig II).

III. CLAP, CHANGE AND TURN

Face ptr. Throughout this Fig clap hands in front of chest: Clap 3 times (cts 1, &, 2), clap 2 times (cts 1, 2).

A 1-2 Beginning R, dance a change step sdwd R (cts 1, &, 2), hop on R simultaneously raising L knee in front and swinging L ft obliquely bkwd across R knee (ct 1), hop on R and swing L ft obliquely L fwd, straightening L knee (ct 2).

- 3-4 Beginning L, repeat action of meas 1-2 (Fig III).
- 5-6 Beginning R do a three-step turn R in place (cts 1, &, 2). Point L toe fwd (ct 1), point L toe beside R toe (ct 2).
- 7-8 Beginning L and turning L, repeat action of meas 5-6 (Fig III).
- 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8 (Fig III).

IV. TOUCH AND JUMP

- B 1-2 Ptrs facing; same hand pos as in Fig I. Beginning R, touch R toe fwd, knee straight (ct 1), step R beside L (ct 2). Repeat touch and step with L.
 - Jump onto both ft crossing R in front of L (ct 1), jump crossing L in front of R (ct 2); jump crossing R in front of L (ct 1), jump closing R to L (ct 2).
 - 5-8 Beginning L, repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig IV).
 - 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8 (Fig IV).

LIKI

(Philippines)

Liki (Lee-kee) is a Visayan dance of flirtation from Bago, Negros Occidental. The dance should be performed in a flirtatious and swaying manner, looking at partner whenever possible. Dancers may wear any Visayan costume. This dance was brought to us by Libertad V. Fajardo of Manila in 1962, and has since been presented by several teachers.

MUSIC:

Record: Mico MX-685A (45) 3/4 meter (count in 6's)

Piano: Visayan Folk Dances, Vol I, Libertad V. Fajardo, 1841 Kansas Ave., Manila, Philippines, 1961

FORMATION: Any number of cpls at random on the floor. Ptrs facing, about six ft apart, M L shoulder to audience (or music). Unless otherwise directed, W hold skirt lightly where hands fall naturally at sides and M place knuckles (open fist) on hips.

STEPS AND STYLING:

3-step turn (2 meas): Take 3 steps turning R (CW), traveling or in place (cts 1, 2, 3), step in place with free ft (ct 4), hold (cts 5, 6).

Close-step: Step R ft fwd (cts 1, 2), close L to R, no wt (ct 3). This step may begin with either ft and may be danced moving in any direction.

Waltz step: Step fwd R (ct 1), close L to R taking wt (ct 2), step fwd R (ct 3). This step may also begin L. It may be danced moving in any direction.

ARMS IN LATERAL POS: Both arms are at one side (either sdwd R or sdwd L) about chest high, hands with palms down.

ARMS IN FORWARD BEND POS, with a forearm turn R and L: From arms in lateral L pos: With hands slightly closed, bring R forearm up and out fwd in an arc, to finish with R elbow near body and hand with palm up. Simultaneously bring L hand near chest, partly closed hand with palm down (cts 1, 2, 3); repeat, bringing L forearm up and out fwd in an arc, as R hand is brought to chest (cts 4, 5, 6).

MUSIC 3/4

PATTERN

Measures

3 meas INTRODUCTION 3-step turn in place and bow to ptr, W holding skirt, M with open fists on hips.

I. BRUSH, CLOSE-STEPS FORWARD

- A 1-2 Brush R fwd (ct 6 of preceding meas) and step fwd R (ct 1), step bkwd L (ct 2), step sdwd R (ct 3); point L fwd (ct 4), hold (ct 5), bend knee and brush L fwd (ct 6).
 - 3-4 Beginning L, repeat action of meas 1-2.
 - 5-6 Beginning R ft, take 2 close-steps straight fwd to ptrs place, passing R shoulders.
 - 7-8 3-step turn in place R (CW) to finish facing ptr.
 Throughout the above fig, W hold skirt swaying it in time to the music; M keep open fists on hips.
 - 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8. Finish in own place facing ptr.

II. STEP-POINT, WALTZ

 Point L in front (ct 4), with R arm curved high and L arm curved in front of chest; hold (cts 5,6).
 - 3-4 Beginning L, repeat action of meas 1-2 (Fig II). Reverse arm pos on meas 4.
 - 5-6 Dance straight fwd with 2 waltz steps (R, L), passing R shoulders. Arms in lateral pos, moving R and L.
 - 7-8 Dance one waltz step turning 1/2 R (CW) to face ptr and one waltz in place. Arms in fwd bend pos, with a forearm turn R and L.
 - 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8 (Fig II), to finish in original place, but on meas 15-16 make one full turn R to end FACING AWAY FROM PTR.

III. BRUSH, CLOSE-STEPS BACKWARD

- A 1-4 Repeat action of Fig I, meas 1-4.
 - 5-6 Move directly bkwd to ptrs place with 2 close-steps (R, L), passing R shoulders. M open fists on hips, W sway skirt.
 - 7-8 3-step turn R (CW), but finish facing AWAY from ptr.
 - 9-16 Repeat action of meas 1-8 (Fig III). Finish facing audience (or music).

IV. TO THE AUDIENCE

- B 1-4 Facing audience, repeat action of Fig II, meas 1-4, moving little by little fwd. On last ct face ptr.

WHO'S WHO

MORLEY LEYTON

. Walter Grothe

A new personality will make his appearance this summer on the horizon of our West Coast folk dance world, an authority on the dances of Poland.

Morley Leyton will be on the staff of the Folk Dance Camp at the University of the Pacific at Stockton. He will introduce to us many charming Polish dances never taught here before, and will give us the proper ethnic styling. His teacher and the person who influenced him to study dance professionally was the great Polish character dancer, Yurek Lazowski. He studied under him and danced all over the East Coast with Lazowski's Polish Dance Theater. Later on Morley Leyton was one of the regular Chaine Dancers on the Polka-Go-Round TV show in Chicago.

Prior to his specialization in the Polish dance spectrum, Morley was also exposed to the general folk dance world. He started dancing at the University of Minnesota which had a very active folk dance group, in 1953. Then he entered the Army and was sent to Germany in 1954, where he danced for 20 months with the SCHUHPLATTLE VEREIN "ENZIAN" in Kaiserslauten. When an injured knee forced his retirement from professional dancing he returned to school and began to teach folk dancers. He was in charge of groups in Baltimore and Washington, D.C., for many years until he moved to Seattle in 1966 where he is now a leader of the "Kujawi Dancers of Seattle", a performing group. So Morley Leyton's background is varied, and he has taught classes in Polish dancing in all the larger cities in the East, Midwest and Washington.

In addition to his dance experience, his professional background is also impressive: B.S. in Mathematics at City College in New York, in 1952; M.S. in Biostatistics at Columbia University in 1962; Ph.D. in Biostatistics at John Hopkins University in 1967, and currently, Assistant Professor, Department of Preventive Medicine, University of Washington.

MOUNTAIN DANCERS


