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# Costumes of Croatia

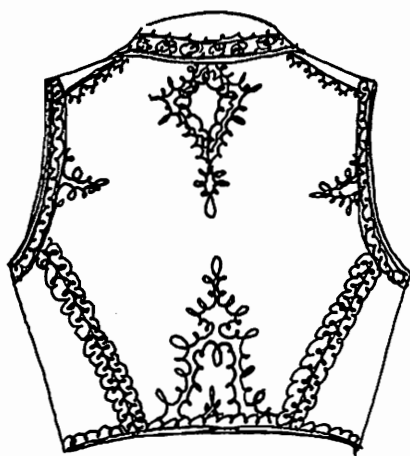
(Part II)

A particularly beautiful costume of Croatia is shown on page 2 (Plate 1). It is worn with minor variations in the vicinity of Sisak. It is of white or unbleached linen, for both men and women; very heavy and coarse for the men and the poorer women, but very fine and expensive for those who can afford it.

The man shown is wearing the most lavishly embroidered and lace trimmed costume of this type, but except for the decorations, all men's garments look the same. Sleeves may be gathered into a wristband rather than tucked, as shown, and shoulders may have fewer gathers; also the vest is often collarless. The vest is red, blue or black woolen, decorated with passementerie of black or blue soutache.

Soutache is a narrow, woven braid, available at most notion counters. Passimenterie is the applied decorative design done in soutache. A wider braid is sometimes used to edge collars and pockets. The sketch below shows the back of a vest with typical designs. Note back-dropped seams at shoulders and sides.



The shirt front and shoulder patches are all red or multi-colored florals, and the lines around the upper sleeve may be either tucks or yellow embroidery in decorative stitches, such as herringbone or featherstitch. The embroidery on the pants is also yellow and is mostly satin-stitch. Three rows of herringbone or tucks may be used instead of the wreathlike design. The lace at bottoms of shirt and pants may be much wider than shown. A striped, woven belt secures the shirt at the waist.

The girl in Plate 1 is unmarried, as shown by the red ribbon fillet around her head. It is edged with white ruching and tied in back with long streamers. Her hair is worn in two braids with the ends tied together with a length of narrow ribbon between them. (See Costume Calendar for April 1967). Her blouse is made of four straight pieces; one for each sleeve and one each front and back with a large gusset set under each arm. This makes the garment very wide at the neck, and requires several rows of shirring to control the fullness, especially in the heavier linens. The ruffle at the wrist is an extension of the sleeve and not a separate piece.

Her bodice is bright blue and may have blue passementarie or embroidery, but no contrasting colors, as the rest of the costume is very colorful. The bodice may or may not be worn, as the wearer wishes. This is true, also, of the triangular, silk shoulder scarf, worn open in the front (not crossed), with the two long points tucked into the striped woven belt at the waist.

The skirt and apron are box-pleated and embroidered in horizontal bands of diamonds, circles, squares, etc., interspersed with naturalistic flowers and trailing leaves. All colors are used, but the dominant color is red. Necklaces of coral are looped and tied in back with flowered ribbons.

Plate 2, page 4, shows three variations of the basic costume. Figure (a) is wearing a blouse with set in sleeves rather than the raglan style worn by the others. It is gathered into a band at the wrist and has no ruffle. Her embroidery is of geometrics in balanced designs and is all red except for her little cap with the white ruffle which is covered with a multi-floral design in many colors. The propeller-like double bow is sewn to the crown of the cap.

All ribbons used in these costumes may be of any color desired, but only this one has embroidered ribbons. Notice, too, that her sandals are of a different type than the others.

Figure (b) wears a head 'kerchief' with a wide border and lace edging around the face. The long ends are tied on the outside in back, and then all three ends are rolled up and tucked in over the knot. The 'kerchief may be red, maroon, purple, blue, etc., or any of the darker colors. The printed shoulder scarf and apron are also dark in color. The apron is of heavy silk and is either plain, printed or figured damask. A wide band, heavily embroidered and edged with lace, defines the sides, and lace, or in this case, fringe, finishes the bottom. This apron is shorter than the others.

The waist is worn as an over-blouse with a lace-edged shirt-tail, and the sleeves are heavily embroidered in many colors. The skirt is triple-box-pleated with panels of embroidery only on the topsides of the boxes. The design is in many colors. The silhouette of this costume is much straighter than the others, due, no doubt, to fewer petticoats. The back of the belt is embellished with two paddle-shaped embroideries on dark colored silk which often matches the apron. It is lined and faced

for stiffness and edged with lace.

Figure (c) wears a woman's cap, which is very small and very flowery. It has a wider ruffle than that worn by Figure (a). It is worn well back on the head, merely covering the bun of hair. Her sleeves and apron are embroidered in the same design of huge, shaggy tulips and other smaller flowers. The flowers are rendered in traditional "peasant" styling - not naturalistically. The kerchief is white with squares of flowers embroidered on it, and the knife-pleated dress skirt has only a narrow band of embroidery above the hem. Notice that this apron actually meets in back at the waist.

All skirts are edged with narrow lace about an inch wide and wide lace is used on the aprons. All women wear as many coral, amber, or just plain red necklaces as they can afford.

The most ornate men's costumes are worn with Figure (b), and the plainest with Figure (c). It would even be proper to have no trim at all on the man's shirt and pants, but to wear only a soft red neckscarf under the shirt collar, knotted softly at the throat. In this case the vest worn would be the one with the collar and very little passementarie on the back.

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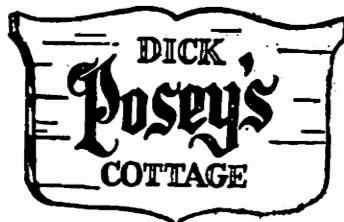
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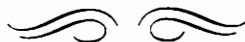


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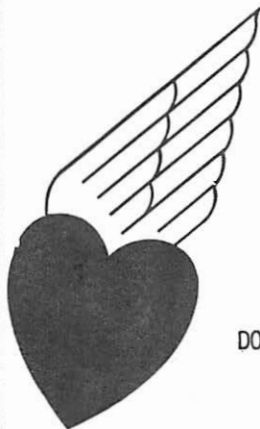

# The Party Planner

## CASCARONE BALL

Bailes de Cascarones (Cascarone Balls) is a custom brought to California as early as 1818 by Spanish families from Mexico. These balls were held nightly during the Carnival week preceding Lent, similar to a Mardi Gras. However, according to tradition, the Cascarone season begins at 12 midnight, Christmas night and lasts until Ash Wednesday. The main ball was held on Shrove Tuesday as a farewell to the spirit of carnival.

The cascarone is an eggshell (the egg having been blown out through a small hole at one end) filled with finely-cut bits of colored paper or tinsel (confetti), after which the opening has been sealed and the shell beautifully decorated. In the early days of California the egg shells were filled with bits of perfumed confetti.

Eggshells were saved all through the year, since many cascarones were needed for each ball. Poor families earned money by making and selling the cascarones. At the height of the ball the cascarones were broken. To break a cascarone on another person's head was considered a compliment. According to custom the highlight of the evening of the Cascarone Ball was the bidding for the golden egg (filled with gold dust). The caballero winning the gold egg would break it over the lady of his choice and she would then be the belle of the ball.

Why not plan a Cascarone Ball for one of your Party Nights!! Ask your club members to save egg shells. Get an artistic group together to decorate the egg shells. They may be painted in solid colors; decorated with colored tape; faces may be sketched on the shell, tiny hats or bonnets may be added; they may be trimmed with sequins, ribbons, braid or lace. Some of the egg shells may be too pretty to break so perhaps they could be sold to the folk dancers who attend your party, thereby adding to your treasury.

Set a time, late in the evening, for the eggshell breaking. Suggest a progressive dance be planned prior to the breaking, pass out the egg shells to your guests, so that each guest has at least one egg in his hand. The end of the dance will be the signal to break the shells on the partners' heads.

Mexican and Spanish decorations will be quite appropriate and add much color to your dance hall. Hang fringed silk and brocade shawls on the walls. Make placemats of fan-shaped paper trimmed with lace, for your place settings or your buffet service.

Feature Spanish and Mexican dances on your dance program.

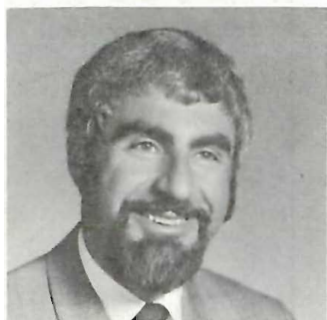

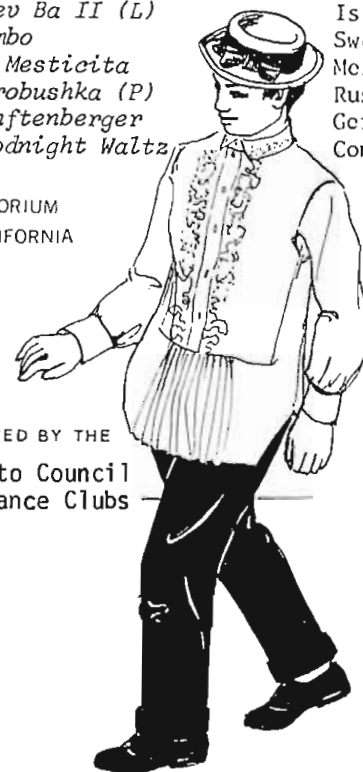

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## 47TH ANNUAL CAMELLIA SHOW 17TH FOLK DANCE PAGEANT

Every Spring, early in March, Sacramentans, and their good neighbors from near and far, celebrate the beauty of the camellia flower, the delicate blossom in myriad blends of white, pink and red, with a joyous ten-day festivity, known as the Camellia Festival. Each Festival has its special theme and its honored country. "Moments of Splendor" seems especially suited not only to the lush tropical land of the Philippines, our honored country, but to glorious springtime in California.

Folk dancers enjoy most (I think) the dazzling conclusion of the Festival, March 13 and 14, when Sacramento Council of Folk Dance Clubs goes all out to bring a beautiful pageant and fun dancing for all to the marvelous springy floor of the Memorial Auditorium. The Pageant, Sunday afternoon, is a drama never-to-be-forgotten. Balcony seats afford a great view of the exhibitions. The high point of the afternoon is always the skirling precision of Sacramento's own Cameron Pipe Band, as they escort the Camellia Queen and her Princesses from the Auditorium. This is truly an exhilarating weekend. But there is more to the Festival than this.

Events begin Friday, March 5, with the Queen's Presentation Breakfast. The Queen is chosen from among Royal Princesses, representing the local colleges, and with them reigns over the week's festivities. Later these royal ladies star at the Pink Perfection Luncheon and the Camellia Ball.

Saturday and Sunday, March 6 and 7, we see in the Memorial Auditorium, the 47th Annual Camellia Show. This is always a breath-taking display of Sacramento's official flower, with thousands of varieties.

Throughout the Festival (March 5 to 14) there is much to see and do. The Women's Golf Invitational Tournament is brand new. Other sports events are the Men's Golf Invitational Tournament and the Camellia Cup Regatta, on Folsom Lake, as well as something called Camellia Capital Century -- a 100 mile race and a Pacific AAU event. (This last will probably go on for 24 hours)

There are also Art and International Photographic Exhibitions, International Photographic Slide Shows, the Camellia City Ballet, High School Pep units competition, celebrations at shopping centers, gifts for new babies, Cheer-up Day at hospitals and rest homes, Pin-up Days at the Airport, and the Festival Parade, featuring children and flower floats, an unbeatable combination.

International friendship is always an important part of the Festival. There are International Exhibits, and an International Reception and Luncheon. Especially in the Folk Dance Pag-

eants do we show our interest in and friendship for peoples of other lands. Among others, there will be exhibitions of Philippine folk dances, distinctive and beautiful. ## CHOTIS DEL NORTE

(Mexico)

PARTY FUN DANCE

This dance consists of authentic Mexican schottische steps, which have been arranged in this sequence as a recreational dance by Henry "Buzz" Glass.

MUSIC: Record: Imperial 1081-A El Chote  
(Or any other Mexican schottische in a moderate tempo)

FORMATION: Cpls in a circle, M back to ctr, ptrs facing with joined hands outstretched at shoulder height.

MUSIC 4/4

PATTERN

Measures

### I. MEXICAN CHOTIS

- 1-4 In the Mexican manner, take one schottische sdwd to M L (LOD) and sdwd to M R (RLOD). Repeat.
- 5-8 Take closed pos (R hips adj.) and cpl turn CW with 4 step-hops. On 4th step-hop bring L hips adjacent. With L hips adjacent take 4 step-hops CCW back to orig pos. Finish with joined hands outstretched.

### II. STEP-HOPS AND CHOTIS

- 1-4 In place, M step-hop L, R (W-R L). Moving sdwd to M L (LOD) dance 1 schottische step. Repeat step-hops (M-RL, W-LR) and one schottische step to M R (RLOD).
- 5-8 Repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig II).

### III. STEP-HOPS AND STAMPS

M hold clasped hands behind back, W hold skirt.

- 1-2 Beginning ML-WR, move bkwd away from ptr with 2 step-hops, followed by 3 stamps (q,q,s).
- 3-4 Beginning MR-WL, move fwd twd ptr with 2 step-hops, followed by 3 stamps (q,q,s).
- 5-8 Repeat action of meas 1-4 (Fig III).

Note: On last pattern (meas 5-8), M may move to W ahead instead of returning to original ptr.

## Jessie Polka

(United States)

PARTY FUN DANCE

The composer of this fun-dance is unknown.

MUSIC: Record: MacGregor 630-A; MacGregor 5001-B.  
Piano: Two popular tunes for this dance are "Oh, Dem Golden Slippers" and "Jesusita".

FORMATION: Two or more dancers, side by side, anywhere on floor, with hands joined in back of waist.

STEPS: Hop;\* Two-step.\*

\*Described in volumes of "Folk Dances from Near and Far", published by the Folk Dance Federation of California, Inc., 1095 Market Street, San Francisco, California 94103.

MUSIC 2/4

PATTERN

Measures NOTE: Except for the two-steps, each movement of this dance takes one count.

- 1 Touch L heel in front. Step on L beside R.
- 2 Touch R toe in back. Touch R toe beside L.
- 3 Touch R heel in front. Step on R beside L.
- 4 Touch L heel in front. Touch L toe beside R (or across in front of R).
- 5-8 Move fwd anywhere on floor with 4 two-steps beginning L.

Repeat dance from beginning.

NOTE: When dancers are sure of themselves, the dance may be made more intricate by adding a hop to each ct of meas 1-4, and doing a polka step (hop, step, close, step) (cts ah, 1,&,2), instead of the two-steps, in meas 5-8.

## Don't Look Back; The Wolf is Coming!

This is a children's game from Romania (or a party stunt) which was taught by Andor Czampo during Folk Dance Camp at the University of the Pacific in 1967. Any number of persons may play.

All stand in a circle, shoulder to shoulder (close), facing center (don't look back; the wolf is coming!) each with hands clasped behind own back, R hand on top, palm up. An extra person (#1) walks CCW around outside of circle, carrying in his hand a large handkerchief. Without stopping he places handkerchief in open palm of one of the participants (#2) who does not let on that he has it. #2 now quietly slips handkerchief into hand of the person on his R (#3), and #3 at once begins to flail the next person on HIS R (#4) with the handkerchief. #4 must run CCW around the outside of circle, chased by #3, and still being hit with the handkerchief. #4 is "safe" when he has regained his place in the circle. Meanwhile, #1 has also slipped into his place. #3 now begins the game all over again.

# The Party Planner

## ITALIAN SUPPER (Fund Raising)

St. Joseph's Day, March 19, is celebrated whole-heartedly in Italy, with a colorful festival, at which time much feasting and merrymaking is enjoyed by everyone. Since folk dancers like to eat, as well as dance, what more reason than to follow the custom of the Italians.

Get out your Italian recipes and choose your favorite Italian dances. Plan a menu that is typically Italian - much of it can be prepared in advance. The menu should include spaghetti with meat sauce, Italian bread sticks and a Romaine and tomato salad. If available, tiny cream puffs are most appropriate to complete the supper.

Strange as it may seem, cheeses, which are so popular on all other occasions, are absent from St. Joseph's Day foods.

For decorations walls could be covered with colored sketches of a variety of market stands, showing the produce, fruit and flowers, that are sold in the market places in Italy. Italian colors are green, red and white. Pennants or flags could be on the walls.

A suggested table covering should be of white, with a center piece of garden flowers, flanked with white candles.

Among the traditional foods served on Saint Joseph's Day is the rich minestrone, a recipe for which is as follows:

### MINESTRONE (From Vera Jones' Files)

| 1/2 lb. spinach, finely chopped                 | 1 onion, sliced thin    |
| 3 carrots, sliced                               | 2 peppercorns           |
| 2 medium sized tomatoes                         | Salt to taste           |
| 2 potatoes (2-1/2 cups, diced)                  | Parmesan Cheese         |
| 1 lb. fresh lima beans                          |                         |

Heat stock to boiling. Add all ingredients, except the Parmesan cheese. Bring again to a boil and simmer for 3 hours.

Serve hot, with a spoonful of Parmesan cheese on top.

This is a thick soup which may be used as a main course dish and subsequent re-heatings improve the flavor.

(Makes 3-1/2 quarts)

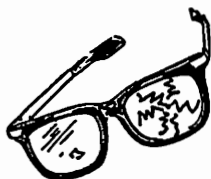
