
The Annual Treasurer's Ball will be held in Sonoma on Sunday, December 13, 1981. We would like everyone to attend.

Irish Costume

Chinese Folk Dance ---



A NEW EXPERIENCE

What a delightful opportunity to study and talk dance with this Chinese couple, Ching-Shan Chang and Fang-Chich Chang from Taipei, Taiwan. Today Chang and his wife work together to teach dance to many individuals in the United States. I had the opportunity to study with the Change at 1981 Folk Dance Camp, University of the Pacific.

It is our gain that Chang was introduced to folk dance by Rickey Holden, a well-known square dance caller and folk dance teacher now living in Belgium. Later, while attending college Chang furthered his knowledge and folk dance skills in classes taught by his basketball coach from Springfield College, Massachusetts, a school that believes that young men who are preparing for a degree in physical education also attain skills in folk and modern dance. Several of our outstanding men leaders in dance have taught and/or received degrees from Springfield College.

While still in college Chang, upon the return of his basketball coach to the United States, was asked to take over the folk dance teaching. Although he graduated with a major in Atomic Physics, he was asked by his government to continue to teach folk dance rather than continue his studies for a Ph.D.

in the United States.

This change in his life led him in 1966 into the research of the Chinese folk dance and in 1970 into the creation of what he calls "new style Chinese folk dance". These dances have been created from the indigenous steps and patterns found in the villages and mountain areas of Taiwan as well as the known folk dance of China.

Chang says that today there are two kinds of dance in Taiwan: 1) Character dance and 2) recreational folk dance. Both types came from the same source, opera. Older people from the mountain areas remember steps now used in recreational dance. It is from his contacts with these people and with Opera that Chang has been able to create the Chinese folk dance which is being danced throughout Taiwan.

Dance was and is used to celebrate religious and national holidays -- a time when many people gather together for celebration. New Year is a time for singing and dancing and at this time the Lion Dance would be performed as a part of the celebration. The Lion Dance is also used at many other times through-with singing and dancing.

In doing research Chang found old existing dances among the mountain tribes wherein one or two steps were repeated over and over. These dances were much like the dances of the early research done in Yugoslavia, the simple kolos of Serbia, the oros of Macedonia, and other simple line dances of Greece, Rumania and Bulgaria. Taiwan has ten large tribes, and other small tribes. These tribes are made-up of the same kind of people, but their dances may differ. From the dance of the village people and the classical dance (character dance) of the opera Chang has created a lovely dance form for Taiwan.

When asked what were the characteristics of Chinese dance, Chang smiled and said. "To understand Chinese dance one must understand the Chinese people". "They are not very not show emotion." However, in dance, the whole body has movement. The body moves naturally with natural swaying movement. many hand movements and each movement has a special There are meaning, as--picking a flower, indicating a cloud. movements involve a hand drop from the wrist and hand turning movements from the wrist. Finger snapping is also found in some dances. As a general rule when one moves to the R the R palm is up and the L is down, and when both arms move to form a circle the R will cross the L in moving up and outward in a circular movement. The eyes, like the hands have many movements and can indicate delight, anger. They may smile or show depression. Chinese person instead of getting mad would show his emotion with some body language--through the hands, the eyes, or with head movement. The head may often be used in a side to side movement--as in the dance of India. We discussed where this side to side movement may have come from. Did it come from India across the Himalvas or did some area in China use this movement prior to the use of head movements in the dance of India? Without extended research into the dance of India and the dance of China this question could not be resolved, and some of the original sources for this research have been wiped out.

There are many couple dances in these new dances of Tai-In these dances the couples move backward and forward and away and together. The girls are very shy. Very few dances Unlike our ballroom or western dance where we use closed, semi-open or shoulder-waist position, the hands only may join, or the woman's upward palm may be struck lightly by the man. Touching is frowned upon by many in China. An interesting story developed from Chang's teaching in his "Morning Club" in Taiwan, where many participate in folk dance as a form of exercise. This activity is done in the park where there are many observers. In teaching he used some hand-hold dances, and soon found that this was not acceptable to the general observers. An article criticizing the subject of touching in dancing appeared in the next edition of the newspaper. They wish to keep some of the old tradition in their dance. Today there are no Balkan dances taught in the morning classes. However, all forms of folk dance as well as square dance is taught in the University Club.

At the last count there were 201 folk dance clubs in Taiwan, with as many as 200 dancers in some of the classes. Folk

dancers in Taiwan, like many dancers in the United States want their folk dance activity for a very small charge. One may attend a folk dance camp where board and room may be gotten for \$25.00. He did say, however, that the facilities at the camps were not as elaborate as ours, and the faculty was not as large as in some of our camps.


Prior to 1970 Chinese folk dancing was stage dancing and was done primarily by women. Because of Chang's efforts, today there are over 500,000 Taiwanese men and women doing Chinese folk dancing.

DRESSING IN THE IRISH STYLE



THE WEARING OF THE GREEN



As a dance costume, Irish women have adopted a basic dress, with several variations in the cape and decorations. The bodice is fitted, has long sleeves and a flared skirt, and is usually wool or velveteen. The skirt is often designed with a large box pleat in the front. Celtic designs may be embroidered on the skirt and cape in plain or variegated colors. The collar and cuffs are crocheted using "Irish Crochet" stitch. The cape may be draped or it may hang straight. Black stockings and black shoes complete the ensemble.

The men in dance wear a costume consisting of a plain kilt of dark green or saffron, white shirt, green tie, plain socks to coordinate with the kilt, and a short or regular length jacket.

A more typical dress for Irish women, however, is a wool underskirt, in green, red, brown or any dark color, with an overskirt of wool or cotton that is often pinned up to keep it out of the dirt or wet grass. The blouse is usually white and a plain or plaid scarf is worn over the shoulders, crossed in front and tucked in at the waist or tied in back. The shawl is of colors matching or coordinating with the skirts, often of the greens, browns, or saffron colors. Before 1940 a wide four to six inch laced girdle of green, red or black was worn around the waist.

The men at one time wore wool or widewaled corduroy knee breeches in brown, tan or black with buttons at the side knee, white shirt with a narrow neck band closed with a stud and a soft sash tie of black or green. The vest was double breasted with collar and lapels and the jacket was of a heavy wool in tan or grey, double-breasted, with long tails in back. The jacket was usually worn open. The socks were of a heavy wool knit, usually black, and the preferred shoes were brogan style.

The typical Irish hat that completes this outfit was of tan or grey felt, medium height with a small brim and a band of

green, grey or tan.

In western Ireland the men wear full length trousers, often of heavy tweed, a white shirt and a Arun Island sweater. A unique hand woven woolen belt in bright colors is wrapped several times around the waist, and the fringed ends are left hanging down at the side. A felt hat or tam o'shanter is worn.

For the flavor of Ireland, rather than authenticity, the men could wear brown knickers, (with knee length dark green or black sodks) or regular length black or brown trousers, a white shirt with a green string tie, a green vest, and brown or black shoes.

The woman could wear a white skirt and blouse, green side bustles, wide black laced belt with green or black lacings, and a plain or plaid scarf in greens, browns and saffron colors. This is the type of Irish costume frequently seen in ads and stories. Another version is a brown underskirt with a green overskirt pinned up, white blouse and a plain or plaid scarf in the traditional colors. Black socks or tights and black shoes are best.



Food in the Chinese Manner

It has been said that the art of Chinese cooking was passed down from generation to generation and kept alive by word of mouth. Recipes were prized family secrets. A Chinese cook very seldom sets down his secrets in writing.

MOO GOO GAI PIEN

4 double chicken breasts

2 4-ounce cans white button mushrooms

corn oil 2 teaspoons salt

2 sweet green peppers

1/2 teaspoon white pepper

1 tablespoon chili sauce **

1 tablespoon dry sherry

1 tablespoon sov sauce

1 teaspoon sugar

1/2 teaspoon salt

4 tablespoons peanut or

2 teaspoons cornstarch

Skin and bone chicken breasts and cut into slices 1" \times 1" \times 1/4". Mix with the chicken 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper and 2 teaspoons cornstarch.

Cut the sweet peppers into pieces approximately the same

size as the chicken.

Heat oil in frying pan over high flame. Add the seasoned chicken, stirring continuously for about 2 minutes. Add the sweet peppers and mushrooms. Mix thoroughly. If the mixture is too dry, add a tablespoon or two of the mushroom juice from the can. Serves 8

SHRIMPS, SZECHUEN STYLE

1 pound fresh uncooked shrimp

2 tablespoons scallions in 1/4" pieces

2 tablespoons minced fresh ginger root

2 cloves crushed garlic 1/4 teaspoon red pepper 1 tablespoon tomato ketchup ** 2 tablespoons peanut oil

2 cups peanut oil for deep frying

Shell and devein the shrimp. Wash and drain. Deep fry the shrimp in oil heated to 375° for 2 minutes. Drain on a paper towel.

Heat 2 tablespoons oil in a frying pan over a high flame. Add scallions, garlic and ginger, and stir until scallions turn dark green, about 2 minutes. Discard the garlic. Add the shrimp and stir for another minute.

Add 1 tablespoon sherry, 1 tablespoon soy sauce, 1 teaspoon sugar, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Stir a few more times. Then add the red pepper, tomato ketchup and chili sauce. Mix again.

Serve hot. 8 Servings

** Ketchup and chili sauce were introduced into Chinese cooking during this century. The Chinese find that with the addition of these two sauces food still tastes Chinese but with more

flavor.

SWEET-SOUR PINEAPPLE PORK

2 pounds boneless pork (any cut) 4 tablespoons soy sauce

16 ounces canned pineapple chunks with juice

8 ounces sweet mixed pickles in chunks with juice

2 medium sized tomatoes

4 cloves garlic

2 teaspoons dry sherry

l teaspoon salt

6 teaspoons cornstarch

4 cups vegetable oil for

deep frying

2 tablespoons oil for sauce

Cut pork into 1" cubes and mix them in a bowl with the dry sherry, salt, and 2 teaspoons cornstarch. (The remaining cornstarch is for thickening the sauce.) Let stand for 20 minutes.

Drain the pineapple and the sweet mixed pickles, saving the juice of both. Wash and cut the tomatoes into wedges. the cloves of garlic. Dissolve the remaining teaspoons of cornstarch in 2 tablespoons of cold water. Combine these ingredients to make the sauce and heat slightly.

Deep fry the pork in oil at about 375° for 6 minutes, or until golden brown. Drain the oil off and put pork on a platter. Keep warm. When ready to serve, pour sauce over pork. Serves 8

ASSORTED CHINESE FRUITS

10-12 preserved kumquats 6 slices preserved red ginger

1 small can pineapple chunks 1 small can mandarin oranges

6 maraschino cherries

Drain the mandarin oranges and pineapple chunks. In a salad bowl filled with crushed ice, arrange the kumquats, ginger, pineapple chunks and oranges. Decorate with maraschino cherries. Canned lichee nuts, if available, are a delightful addi-·tion to assorted fruits.



HOP BOUNCE STEP-HOP STEP-SWING

What is the difference between a STEP-HOP, a STEP-SWING, and a BOUNCE? Teachers, when you "call" your dances at learning sessions, be sure to use the correct terminology for the steps. Definitions:

HOP- Spring up off of one foot and land on the same foot.

STEP-HOP- Step on one foot (ct 1), hop on the same foot (ct 2). Meter 2/4, 4/4.

STEP-SWING- Step on one foot (ct 1), swing the other foot forward or across (ct 2), as you lift up the heel of the supporting foot. Meter 2/4, 3/4, 6/8.

What is meant by $\mbox{\sc BOUNCE}$ as used in Kolos and such dances as the Polish polka?

BOUNCE- A precise, but slight lift off the heel, usually in pairs.

Examples:

Bounce-Bounce off both heels, or Bounce R, Bounce L. Common use of this is in a version of the "Syncop Threes" in Yugoslav dances, with the rhythmof Slow-Quick-Quick as you dance Step-Bounce-Bounce, with the feet side by side as you face center.

The Polish polka uses Bounce-Bounce-Down, to the rhythm of Quick-Quick-Slow. The feet are placed one slightly ahead of the other, and you alternate the forward foot as you bounce on both feet.

For all these examples you really need to watch someone to be able to perform them properly.

Shih Wu

Shih Wu (SHIH WOO), meaning "Lion Dance" was presented by Ching-Shan Chang at the 1981 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp. The steps are from the "Wu Shiu" (Dancing Lion) which is performed during Chinese New Year and at other important festivals. The steps and formation described here may be arranged in any order to fit the purpose and number of dancers.

RECORD:

20

C.C.S. 1981 Camp (33) Side B/4

2/4 meter

FORMATION:

Individual dancers facing fwd, feet apart with knees slightly bent. Both arms are raised outward from the shldrs, elbows bent, palms facing fwd, fingers open.

STEPS and

Basic Step: Small flat-footed shuffle, four to a meas.

STYLING:

During Basic Step, hands shake rapidly.

MUSIC	2/4

PATTERN

Measures

Wait three long notes and four short notes, then begin dance.

INTRODUCTION

- 1-3 Beq R, move fwd with 12 basic steps.
- 4 Jump fwd (ct 1); hold (ct 2).
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 moving bkwd.
- 9-20 Stand with knees straight. Circle arms inward, down, out to side, up, and together, then close fists with palms down and move hands directly down to waist. Strong movement.

PART I

- 1-4 Beg R, move 4 steps fwd (ct l of each meas). When stepping on R, R hand, palm facing fwd, pushes strongly fwd at shldr level, L hand moves bkwd. Opp handwork for L step. On meas l-8, shout "Hey!" as each step is taken.
- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 moving bkwd. When stepping on R, R hand moves bkwd, L with palm facing fwd, pushes fwd. Opp handwork for L step.
- 9-12 Repeat meas 1-4.
- 13-14 Facing fwd with knees bent, move to R with 4 hops on R (ct 1, 2, 1, 2), leaning to R with L leg raised to L.
- 15-16 Step on L (ct 1) and move to L with 3 hops on L (ct 2, 1, 2), leaning to L with R leg raised to R.
- 17-18 With 8 Basic Steps, turn R (CW). During turn, 2 people move close together to end one behind the other, both facing fwd. The one in front is "A", the other "B".
- 19 Both jump fwd (ct 1); simultaneously B places both hands on A's shldrs.

PART II.

- 1-2 Step fwd on R, L (ct } of each meas). B keeps hands on A's shldrs until meas 27. A moves arms as in Part I, pushing R arm fwd with R ft and L arm fwd with L ft.
- 3 Move fwd with 4 Basic Steps.
- 4 Jump fwd (ct 1); hold (ct 2).

Shih Wu - con't (page 2)

- 5-8 Repeat meas 1-4 moving bkwd.
- 9-24 Repeat meas 1-16 of Part I.
- 25-26 A and B make one full turn CW with 8 Basic Steps (B behind A).
- 27 With 4 more Basic Steps, B drops hands and A makes a half turn CW to end facing B.
- 28 Both jump away from each other (ct 1); hold (ct 2).

PART III

- 1-12 Repeat meas 1-12 of Part I.
- 13 Step on R to R, leaning body to R.
- 14 Step on L to L, leaning body to L.

- 27 With 4 more Basic Steps, A makes a half turn CW and B dances in place to both end facing original direction.
- 28 Both jump in place (ct 1); hold (ct 2).

Repeat dance from beginning.

End with meas 9-20 of the Introduction.

Shan Yueh Tao Hua

Shan Yueh Tao Hua (SHAN yoo-AY TAH-oh HWAH) was choreographed and presented by Ching-Shan Chang at the 1981 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp. The music is from an old song of Southern Taiwan. "Shan Yueh" means "march", and "Tao Hua" means "peach blossom". The words of the song describe a young man flirting with a young woman. The steps used in the dance belong to the "Chu-Ku" style of dance.

RECORD:

C.C.S. 1981 Camp (33) Side A/5

4/4 meter

FORMATION:

Ptrs facing in double circle, M back to ctr, free arms swing naturally.

STEPS and STYLING:

M Bow: Place R fist, back of hand up, touching L palm, L fingers curved. 8end twd ptr from waist.

W Curtsy: Place R hand on L, palm to palm, close to body and in front of R hip. Step on R to R side, place ball of L ft behind R and bend both knees.

Hand Roll: Hands are in loose fists. Hold hands in front of chest, backs of hands up, R hand closer to body. Bring R hand over L in a half circle to end with L hand closer to body (ct 1); retracing arc, bring R back to beg pos (ct 2); start again as in ct 1 but make a full circle back to place (cts 3, 4). L hand rolls in opposition.

W styling is very shy.

MUSIC 4/4

PATTERN

Measures

4 meas INTRODUCTION On meas 3 ptrs Bow and Curtsy.

Ι. HAND ROLL AND CLAPS

- 8eg R, step fwd on R (ct 1); step bkwd on L (ct 2); step fwd on R, L (ct 3, 4). Hands move 1 in roll pattern.
- Tap R ft beside L and clap own hands once about chest level (ct 1); tap R ft diag fwd and 2 clap palm of R hand with ptr R hand, L hand extends to L side with palm out (ct 2); repeat (ct 3, 4).



Reminiscing by Alice Stirling on the San Diego State University Folk Dance Conference. The San Diego State Folk Dance Conference is an annual event in San Diego. This year it was Aug. 8-16. More than 200 dancers from all over the U.S. including Hawaii, and foreign countries, Sweden and Canada met together for the inspirational week. The teachers included eight wellknown ethnic authorities, full of charm and friendliness, who presented their dance material with great expertise.
