Bavarian Holiday Festival Costume



Statewide 1984 is going to be a <u>Bavarian Holiday</u> and now is the time to start thinking of a festival costume! The costumes from this area are very comfortable and the women's dirndl can be completely washable if desired. There are many lovely fabrics available now for dirndls, and if a border print is desired for the Bavarian style, the hunt may take a little while, so start now. The men's costume is both easier and harder. A white dress shirt, black pants, and Triggers (suspenders) is the easiest. Lederhosen are of leather and are usually ordered from importers. You might want to send to:

for their catalog, and mention that you are interested in Leder-hosen, Triggers, sox and tie, if you want a complete outfit.

The dress of Bavaria, Germany and Austria have many similarities. The winter and summer seasons and the occasion determine the fabrics used, but generally the woman's outfit consists of a dirndl, blouse and apron. A scarf is used with some of the ensembles. The man's consist of a white shirt, or one of small red and white check, triggers and Lederhosen, and long or short sox.

The dress of Bavaria is the one usually seen at Oktoberfests, in the German import shops, in catalogs and on posters. Lots of color, fun, beer and pretzels is the image. The men's Lederhosen are usually grey, the shorter style, with triggers and a white shirt with the sleeves rolled up. The sox are the split sox, but the knee high sox can be worn also. The women's dirndl is of rich colors, often with embroidery at the center front of the bodice and around the lower part of the skirt. The apron can be color co-ordinated or white with a lace insert and flat lace edge. An Edelweiss pendant necklace is popular also. Austrian attire for men often includes a vest, knee length lederhosen, and knee high sox. The knee high sox match the color or background color of the vest, or can be off white (natural wool color), grey or dark color that is color co-ordinated. In Austria a jacket, vest, lederhosen and sox present a complete look in color and style. The women's costume is also supposed to have a complete ensemble look. Special occasions call for special fabrics like rine wools, and silks. The other dirndls are of linen or cotton in solid colors, small floral prints and stripes using floral prints. When several fabrics are used they are all color co-ordinated, including the apron. The blouse is always of meduim weight white cotton. The stockings are also


white. The necklace can be an Edelweiss pendant or a silver chain and silver pendant. A scarf of floral or plaid silk can be worn with the ends tucked into the bodice in the front.

The illustrations give you some suggestions for the dirndls. Illustrations W-1, 2, 3, 4, 5 are from Austria. Illustrations W-6, 7, 8 are Bavarian in style. The men's vests shown are Austrian.


The dirndls can be made in many styles, but the fabrics and their colors should always look Bavarian or Austrian. More costume information will be available soon, but get your planning started now!

Christmas Over There



Christmas is a festive time of year in almost every land, especially those that have adopted the Christian religions or portion of the Christ Story. Even where this story is not widely accepted, there are mid-winter celebrations. In the Southern Hemisphere, there are enough people from the Christian nations to have instilled some of that tradition in their national heritage.

Because Špain is heavily endowed with Christian traditions, it is interesting to relate their holiday

celebrations to those of other nations.

As in any society, the individual or family will look at a tradition or holiday in a slightly different way from the family down the street, so too, will different countries attend the holiday seasons in different ways. And, within each country, the provinces have their own versions of the larger traditional festivities.

The differences follow the life style and natural surroundings of the region. Spain is no different. In the North, Navarré, Aragon, Old Castile, Leon and the coastal Galicia and Asturias, you will find snow is a part of the Christmas Tradition. In the South, Andalusia, Marcia Valencia and most of Estremadura, you find little or no snow in their traditions.

Even so, Christmas traditions in Spain are similar in many ways. There are three times of celebration, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day and day of the Three Kings (January 6). These tend to be celebrated in all of Spain, but here the similarity begins to fade. The Northern Coastal provinces (Galicia, Asturias and to a certain extent Navarré) hold to traditions strongly flavored by the Celts and Anglo Saxons. Basques are quite French or Central European in nature and the traditions in the South of Spain have heavy Moorish aspects because of the long occupancy by the Moorish kings.

As with most people, music and dancing is a large part of the Spanish holiday, and traditional instruments vary according to the region. In the South (Andalusia through central Spain and Madrid) the Guitar, castanets, tambourine, sonaja* and Zambomba* together with much hand-clapping and heel-stamping

accompany the flamenco and other traditional dances.

In the Great Cathedral at Seville on December 8, the feast of the Immaculate Conception to open the Spanish Christmas holidays, the Dance of the Sixes is performed by 10 choirboys dressed in seventeenth century page boy costumes of light blue satin and lace with wide brimmed plumed hats. Each movement of the dance accompanied by the music of the great organ, the orchestra and the choral music of the dancers, represents some part of the catholic tradition.

In the Northern coastal provinces, the bagpipe is the principal accompanyment for the provincial vaqueira (herders'

dance) and the pericote ("Little Peter" courting dance).

Barcelona has erected a statue consisting of eight figures in a circle formation depicting the sardana, the provincial dance of Catalonia. This a dance performed by large groups. often arranged in concentric circles, believed to be of Greek origin. Compared with the fiery flamenco danced in Andalusia at Christmas, the sardana seems almost emotionless, yet graceful and effortless. Despite its appearance, the sardana is a decidedly intricate dance, with a fixed number of steps to every bar of music. The dancers join hands in a circle, but after a certain number of bars, the hands change position. Individual dancers stay in one place for the greater part of the dance, carrying out an intricate toe-and-heel step. Then suddenly, as the music grows louder, the rings of dancers begin to spin, often in opposite directions. It is said that no one but a Catalan can dance the sardana without counting aloud. It is performed in the streets of every Catalan town and village during the Christmas holidays, to the tune of the beloved Catalan songs of joy-the goigs. One of the most popular is the "Carol of the Birds," popularized by the late Pablo Casals.

The traditions of Spain can be found in much of our own Christmas celebrations in the Western United States and throughout the world. As the conquistadores brought their way of life to this continent, so did the seafarers of the great courts of Spain and Portugal disseminate their way of life

around the then-known world.

Marzipan (marzapan) comes to us from Spain and is from the Moorish history.

Candles in brown paper bags seen along the walls and paths throughout California and the Southwest during the Christmas season is a tradition of the Luminarios or festive lights, both handsome and practical, to light the path of the festival visitors and the path to the cathedral or shrine for midnight mass.

In any country, Christmas is a happy, magical time, to enjoy music, dance, giving, sharing and love.

*The sonaja is a tambourine-like instrument involving metallic disks and taught wires on a frame. The zambomba is a small drum-like instrument with a stick running through the head producing a hum or howling monotone sound.

Shiri Li Kineret

Shiri Li Kineret (SHEE-ree lee kih-NEH-ret), choreographed by Shlomo Maman to music composed by R. Kadar, was presented by Ya'akov Eden at the 1983 University of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp. In commenting on the dance Ya'akov gave the following information: The title translates to "Sing to me, Kineret" (the Hebrew word for Sea of Galilee). The lyrics are composed of phrases from various songs which have been written about the Sea of Galilee and the Golan Heights, extolling the beauties of the area and the peace and quiet that have prevailed since Israel occupied the Golan Heights. The dance movements can be interpreted as walking on the shore of the lake, casting nets into the water and pulling them out (Fig I); and the waves on the lake depicted by the grapevine and step-brushes (Fig II).

MUSIC:

Cassette tape "Dance With Moshe Pinkas."

Side A/5

2/4 meter

FORMATION:

Closed circle of dancers, hands joined down at sides ("V" pos).

Face slightly R of ctr, wt on L.

STYLING:

Throughout the dance there is a relaxed, easy bending and straightening of the knees.

MUSIC 2/4

PATTERN

Measures

INTRODUCTION 16 meas + No action. Begin with vocal. 3 meas

I. STEP-TOUCH; IN AND OUT

- A 1-2 Moving in LOD, step on R (ct 1); touch L toe fwd in LOD (ct 2). Touch L toe bkwd in RLOD (ct 1); step in LOD on L (ct 2).
 - 3-4 Repeat meas 1-2.
 - Facing ctr, step on R sdwd to R, bending knees, leaving L ft on floor (ct l); step on 5-6 ball of L ft about where it was, straightening knees (ct 2). Step on R across in front of L with bent knee (ct 1); touch ball of L ft beside R, no wt, while rising on ball of R ft and pivoting to face LOD (ct 2).
 - 7 Turning to face ctr, step fwd on L with bent knee (ct 1); touch ball of R ft, no wt, beside L, rising on balls of both ft and straightening knees (ct 2). Raise joined hands fwd twd ctr about chest level during this meas.
 - Step bkwd on R with bent knee, pulling hands down with elbows bent (ct 1); sliding L ft 8 bkwd on floor, step on L beside R, straightening knees and relaxing hands to "V" pos (ct 2).
 - Repeat meas 1-8. On meas 16, ct 2, the vocal for Fig II begins. 9-16

II. GRAPEVINE; BRUSHES

- Facing ctr, dance a grapevine: Step on R sdwd to R (ct 1); step on L across behind R B 1-2 (ct 2). Step on R sdwd to R (ct 1); step on L across in front of R (ct 2).
 - Step bkwd on R (out of circle) with bent knee, leaving L ft on floor (ct 1); shift wt fwd 3 on L, knee bent (ct 2).
 - Brush R ft fwd, straightening L knee and rising on ball of L ft as R leg moves in a large 4 arc fwd and to the R (ct 1); step on R sdwd to R, bending knee (ct 2).
 - Step on L across in front of R (ct 1); brush R fwd again, rising on ball of L ft and mov-5 ing R leg in a smaller arc fwd and to R (ct 2).
 - 6-7 Repeat Fig I, meas 5-6.

Step fwd on L in LOD (ct 1); touch ball of R beside L, no wt, while rising on balls of ft and pivoting to face ctr (ct 2).

9-16 Repeat meas 1-8.

64 meas REPEAT DANCE FROM BEGINNING TWO TIMES (three in all).

B 1-16 Repeat Fig II.

CODA Repeat Fig I, meas 1-2, leaving R ft in place at end.

Cpls at random about the floor facing LOD, M to L of ptr with inside hands joined in "V" pos and outside hands down at sides.

Although the meter is 3/4, the steps have an "up-down" feeling as befits the beauty of Autumn. M and W are on opp ft thruout the dance; ftwk for M is described, W dance the

counterpart. This is a dance of affection, so eye contact with ptr is essential.

MUSIC 3/4

PATTERN

Measures

8 meas

INTRODUCTION wait; on the eighth meas, raise joined hands to "W" pos and the outside hands up and fwd.

I. FORWARD BRUSH AND WINDOW

- Step fwd on L (ct 1); brush R fwd (ct 2); step fwd on R (ct 3).
- Step fwd on L (ct 1); brush R fwd, turning to face ptr (ct 2); step on R to R (ct 3).
- Step on L across in front of R while raising joined hands (MR,WL) to form a window (ct 1); step on R a little to R (ct 2); step on L beside R, turning to face LOD (ct 3). On ct 1, ML and WR hands touch.
- Step fwd on R, raising both hands fwd at head level with elbows bent (ct 1); step bkwd on L, lowering hands (ct 2); step on R beside L (ct 3).
- Releasing hands, \underline{M} : Step fwd on L (ct 1); step on R near L (ct 2); step on L beside R (ct 3). \underline{W} : Move bkwd.
- 6 Repeat meas 5 with opp ftwk and direction ending beside ptr.
- 7 Turning a little twd ptr, change places with ptr, passing behind W, by stepping on L across in front of R with bent knee (ct l); step on R to R (ct 2); step on L beside R (ct 3). Look at ptr.
- 8 Repeat meas 7 with opp ftwk and direction, ending beside ptr.
- 9-16 Repeat meas 1-8.

II. BOX AND WRAP-UP

- 1 M: Step fwd on L (ct 1); step on R near L (ct 2); step on L beside R (ct 3). W: Move bkwd.
- 2 <u>M</u>: Step on R to R (ct 1); step on L near R (ct 2); step on R beside L (ct 3). <u>W</u>: Move to L side.
- 3 Repeat meas 1 but in opp direction. Ptrs have now exchanged places.

- Joining inside hands (ML and WR) about waist level, elbows bent, take a small step on R to R (ct 1); step on L near R (ct 2); take a large step on R across in front of L, passing behind W and raising the joined hands overhead in an arch for the W to pass under to end at MR side, MR hand on W waist (ct 3). Look at ptr.
- 5 Repeat meas 4 with opp ftwk and direction, returning hands to waist level.
- Repeat meas 4 ending with MR hip adjacent to WL, with WL forearm in front at waist and L hand joined to MR hand at WR side, and with ML and WR hands, still joined, extended fwd about chest level.
- 7-8 In the wrap pos, as a cpl, make a full turn CW in six steps with M_.moving fwd and W moving bkwd.
- 9-16 Repeat meas 1-8.
- 64 meas REPEAT DANCE TWICE.
 - 1-4 Repeat Fig I, meas 1-2, and end in the "window" pose on ct 1 of meas 3. Hold until music fades.


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
