We in Sacramento started a tradition of honoring those who have contributed to the cause of folk dancing over the years. We present it during the Sunday Concert at Camellia Festival. We realized that we are all getting older, and it would be nice to honor people while they are still around. In the past we have honored Al and Teddy Wolterbeek, Oscar Faoro and Irene Oxford, Bruce Mitchell, and this year we honored Hadi Babazadeh. We have put each year's addition into an album with a wooden cover and an engraved plaque for each honoree on the front of the album.

Hadi Babazadeh

Honored March 11, 2012

The Sacramento Folk Dance and Arts Council is very pleased to acknowledge the lifelong contributions and dedication to Folk Dance and Arts by Hadi Babazadeh.

It has been quite a journey from Hadi's birth in northern Iran 91 years ago, to his emigration to the US for his education and career in engineering, to marriage and family. Along the way, he discovered international folk dancing and has enjoyed it for over 40 years. He has been active in




many clubs and the Council. He served as President of the Council from 1991 to 1995.

As President, he was responsible for changing the name of the Council to the Sacramento International Folk Dance and Arts Council, to include musicians and singers. He has never been afraid of change.

During his terms as president, we were struggling with finding a home for this Camellia Festival. There was a time when the Camellia Festival Dance Concert, like this, would be held in the Memorial Auditorium to a standing room only crowd. It was the closing event of two weeks of citywide events like a parade, symphony concert and so forth. But over the years, City funding dwindled for the festival and we finally lost our historic home when the Memorial Auditorium had to close for renovations in 1986. We also lost the financial support of the City of Sacramento, so we had to pay the rent ourselves, and rents were very high. We did the best we could, but it was hard times for what little was left of the Camellia Festival. One of the places we rented during those times, was a small gymnasium room at this University. Teddy Wolterbeek was our president then, and she knew that Hadi, as luck would have it, was teaching at CSUS in the Mechanical Engineering department. So she asked him to approach Dean Sorenson and ask them to help sponsor us. He used his charm and persistence and they agreed to! So Camellia Folkdance Festival finally got a home, and Hadi is our hero!

Hadi still dances several times a week, and is loved and admired by the folk dance community. He can often be seen helping Barbara Bevan carry stuff back and forth for her various classes and supporting her in all emdeavors. He attends every Council meeting and continues to contribute in many, many ways.

Memorial—Neal Sandler

March 13, 2012

The service for Neal was at the San Joaquin Catholic Cemetery on Friday the 23rd of March at 3:00 p.m. The address is San Joaquin Catholic Cemetery, Cemetery Ln., Stockton, CA. 95201. Afterwards there was a reception at Mike Sandler's home in Woodbridge, CA.

What follows is the bio from Dick Oates' web site:

Neal Sandler, the son of Soviet Jewish immigrants, was born in 1931 in Philadelphia. Although he has long been interested in dance and theatre, he has also pursued an engineering career. He earned a B.S. degree from Drexel Institute of Technology and a M.S. degree from U.C. Berkeley, and has worked as a materials science engineer.

Neal's early theatrical experience includes training in professional dance forms, both in ballet and modern dance. He brought this experience to his initial involvement with Westwind in Los Angeles in the early 1960s. With Westwind, he acquired a growing interest in both recreational folk dance and in the theatrical presentation of folk material.

Neal and Anthony Ivancich became Westwind directors in Los Angeles in 1964, and in 1966 the ensemble split into its Northern and Southern counterparts with Neal's move to the Bay Area (Westwind's southern group later folded).

When Neal and his former wife, Carol, moved to the Bay Area in 1966, they started a San Francisco branch of Westwind. Their unselfish contributions of time, energy, and even money, enabled Westwind to grow into a strong amateur performing group. Neal, with his far-reaching and ever present artistic vision, became a mentor for many young folk dancers; several have gone on to pursue professional careers in folk dance.

The ensemble danced at UC Berkeley's Zellerbach Auditorium as part of the Zellerbach Dance Series in the spring of 1976 (Neal Sandler was its director in his final season). The combination of artistic vision and superb teaching techniques enabled Neal to contribute to Bay Area folk dance at every level. He enjoyed working with beginners -- helping them to enjoy folk dancing while carefully teaching them their first dances. He also worked well with advanced dancers, particularly in Westwind where he taught not only about dancing, but also a great deal about acting and theatrical presentation.

Part of his Westwind vision also concerned the importance of the having an integrated ensemble -- where skills in dancing, singing, playing music, and acting overlapped and were skillfully blended to produce a cohesive presentation.

He taught many venues, including the Menlo Park Recreation Center, the South Whidbey International Folkdancers, the Stanford International Dancers, Ashkenaz coffeehouse, Hearst Gym, J-house, Stanford Tressider Union, the Mandala coffeehouse, and Hillel. Neal Sandler helped to launch the Slavonijo Dance Ensemble and was its first artistic direc-

In 2001, Neal was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease, and went to assisted living in February of 2006.

Neal produced a CD with Yvonne Hunt and Christos Govetas that features musicians from Flambouro, Serres, called Zourna Masters of Flambouro. Dances Neal has taught include Dranovoto, Sokačko Malo Kolo, and Thracian Rŭčenica.

Some emailed comments about Neal:

I remember meeting Neal when I just started teaching at Mendocino Balkan camp...He was so warm and encouraging to me, and interested in helping me think out what I wanted to do - very kind and fun to connect with - a beautiful person!

North Bay Armenian Dance Workshops

Singer and folklorist Hasmik Harutyunyan and her relatives have spent years researching and helping preserve the community songs of the larger, pre-1915 Armenia. In mid-March, Petaluma Snap-y Dancers and Armenians of the North Bay asked her to teach two workshops on family and village party dances.

I asked Hasmik about a list of 30 "Armenian" dances we'd learned. Perhaps one third turned out to be familiar dances in Armenia. Another third she guessed were dances originating in the Armenian-American community. And most of the others she knew as the names of well-known Armenian songs — perhaps choreographed as "folk dances" outside Armenia.

Hasmik's first workshop was held March 11 at the Congregation Ner Shalom Hall in Cotati. Some 39 adults and nearly a dozen children attended, including several local Armenian-American families. A year before, she gave a guest lecture at Sonoma State University, followed by a choral songfest at Ner Shalom Hall with the woman's group KITKA. (She had hosted KITKA members during their visit to Armenia several years earlier.) It was a treat to see so many of our friends and fellow dancers join Hasmik as she led a final Kochari around the hall: http://www.youtube.com/watch? v=CfvI0zKj7CU.

While she taught, Hasmik's husband Andranik pointed out regions on a large wall map where each dance came from – places like the capital Yerevan, Moush (where Hasmik's family originally lived), Lake Van and several other places in western Armenia (today eastern Turkey). There were also dances of long-separated Armenian communities in Iran and the Pontic coast along the southern Black Sea.

The following evening, 36 dancers from several local groups attended Hasmik's second workshop at Petaluma's Hermann Sons Hall. She taught Miram Govand, Tamzara (3 patterns), Papouri, two Kochari variations, Shoror, Sheighani, Srapar and Trtrook (two Hamshen Armenian dances), Mayroke and Ververi. Another great video shows Hasmik and her brother Aleksan working up enthusiastic, arm-swinging lines of folk dancers while singing a Ververi: http://www.youtube.com/watch?v= CPtf7cNOf8.

As the lights dimmed after the Cotati workshop, there was one of those once-in-a-lifetime happenings. Almost everyone had left when a couple walked up to thank Hasmik, and mentioned that they had been married in an Armenian church more than six decades before. The lady spoke some Armenian, the man none. They seemed surprised when Hasmik asked if she could sing in their honor.

For a few minutes the room was filled with a most beautiful sound. There were few dry eyes, and the couple whispered they had never in their lives received such a gift. Hasmik said later she had combined themes from old Armenian wedding songs praising the groom, his relatives, his friends, the bride, and her family - picturing each as the trunk, branches and leaves of a growing tree. I hope Andranik will get us a translation of those songs and I feel chills remembering, grateful to have been a witness.

Springtime in Chicago

A dozen Californians blew into Chicago for Balkanske Igre's 47^{th} Anniversary Spring Festival and danced all the way back home. John Kuo, his wife Galia Miloucheva Kuo, the festival committee and a throng of additional volunteers turned International House at the University of Chicago into a lively Balkan Party for the weekend of March $23-25^{th}$.

Jim Stoyanoff and Orchestra Balkana played for Friday night's dance party, with breaks for introductory instruction. The crowd grew larger and the pace faster as more and more folks arrived from across the continent and beyond the seas.

Saturday featured non-stop dancing, music, feasting and entertainment. Ahmet Luleci taught Turkish dances first in the Assembly Hall, followed in quick succession by Ventzi Sotirov, Bulgarian, Atanas Kolarovski (assisted by Fusai Senzaki), Macedonian, Alex Markovic, Serbian and Romani dances from Vranje, and Malesevski Zurli, Romani dances from Berovo. Music & singing instruction took place concurrently in the National Room.

Disappointment at Martin Koenig's unexpected absence due to the passing of a friend in New York was quickly forgotten when Alex Markovic began delivering cultural sessions based on his fascinating research. His fieldwork explores the role of music and dance in the wedding rituals of both the Serbian and Romani communities in Vranje. He reported more similarities than differences and noted that brass bands, comprised of Romani musicians, not only accompany the dancing, but also help manage the event. The brass band gathers at a central location in the groom's village and begins playing to announce that a wedding will take place. Folks gather and proceed to the groom's home where his mother has the starring role in her dance with the decorated sieve. Other important members of the family have their specific music and lead a dance. If they don't know how to do the steps, a musician will even teach them as he plays. We all chuckled as we watched this take place on Alex' video recordings. Wedding rituals still require 3 days in the Rom communities, but have been condensed into one packed day among ethnic Serbs. The next ritual is to dance to the bride's home where her family members each have specific musical selections with accompanying dances. After she is "taken" the party may proceed to city hall and church for ceremonies then to the groom's house for a feast and party. On the 3rd day, for Rom weddings, a messenger is sent to the band that the marriage has been consummated. Again the brass band arrives to play while she gets dressed, and the party dances to the bride's home (with the mother in law carrying evidence of her daughter-in-law's virginity) to present her parents with sweetened rakia, and to continue feasting and dancing. These video clips were surprisingly vivid and evoked discussion about privacy, pressure, transfer of control of women, etc.!

Alex noted that it would be unacceptable for participants at a Rom wedding to not know how to dance. He also recounted that tax records from the Ottoman Empire show that Romani musicians received tax exemptions for playing at court. Historically and presently Romani children are socialized to be skillful dancers (girls) and musicians (boys). We laughed when Alex mentioned that the Roma consider the

bouncy Serbian dances to be too peasant-like, and the Serbs consider the heavier, more subtle Rom style of dancing "low class."

After the lunchtime cultural session we returned to the Assembly Hall where Alex taught a variety of dances from Vranje. Learn more about his studies at: uic.academia.edu/AlexanderMarkovic.

Instruction continued throughout the afternoon. At 5 p.m. an amazing crew of volunteers set up tables for a banquet of mouth-watering dishes prepared by Iordanka Sokolova, Galia's mother, and her willing but un-paid assistants, who labored for weeks to present such a glorious feast.

A concert extravaganza continued the festivities. Dance groups from churches within Chicago, the state of Illinois and neighboring Michigan and Indiana performed. The Balkanske Igre group presented 2 suites—one from Bunjevci, and later dances of the Nisava Valley. A Polish group, Wici, performed court dances and Milos Segrt delivered a musical story as if entertaining a Serbian King, while Veselo Selo Tambura & Kolo group danced a joyful suite in the "peasant" style. Two Romanian dance groups, Mirorita and Romanasul, both from Chicago, performed. Between dance groups we enjoyed the musical virtuosity of Chris Bajmakovich (accordion), Blagoj Lamnjov from Veles, Republic of Macedonia (clarinet), Ljupco Milenkovski (kaval), Angel Dobrev (gadulka), the Malevski Zurli and others. Truly, as John Kuo said in his introduction to the concert, the richness and diversity of Balkan culture was spotlighted on the stage. In fact, the only conflict during the evening was a ritual knife fight enacted on stage by two male dancers of the Ellas performing group for the attention of a beautiful woman.

Whoosh! Chairs were cleared, the Veselo Selo Tambura orchestra began to play and everyone danced together—performers, their family members, invited guests, teachers, children, local dancers and folk who came for the party. When the Tambura group finished Chris Bajmakovich, Blagoj Lamnjov, Angel Dobrev and friends took the stage and played until the clock struck "one" and John Kuo chased us out of the Assembly Hall. Fortunately dorm rooms at "I" house were only an elevator ride away.

Sunday morning sleepy dancers drifted into the class at 9 a.m. for another morning of instruction and a continuation of Alex' cultural hour during lunch. Dance reviews were offered in the afternoon. Finally the festival moved to Infusion, an Albanian restaurant, for a celebration dinner and more dancing. (Which I missed so I could catch a flight home to California and get to work on Monday.)

Among the Californians who attended are Fusai Senzaki, Richard Graham, Lucy Chang, Memo Keswick, Jana Julian, Sueko Takahashi-Gilbert, Keiko Trenholm, Eileen Menteer, John Burke, Mike Lipsey, Dr. Jatila van der Veen, Diane Baker, Jessica Ruiz and other musicians of Maleshevski Zurli. 

Thailand trip with Dance on the Water

Twenty folk dancers from all over the US and Canada enjoyed a unique DANCE ON THE WATER trip to Thailand. They sailed on the Kwai River for seven days. Do you remember the Bridge on the River Kwai built during World War II by POW's and workers from Thailand, China? They got to see and walk on the actual spot where that famous bridge was built and visit a World War II museum, the famous Japanese's prison of war death marches museum that has artifacts and photos of that difficult time. There were many exciting things to do on this trip.

They were able to ride elephants at the Saiyok Elephant Park in Kanchanaburi, Thailand and also to visit a "Tiger Temple" established by the monks at a monastery called Wat Pa Luangta Bua and is a wildlife sanctuary. It was a chance to watch the tigers at play in a pool with some of the staff to accustom the tigers to human beings. They got to pet baby tigers and well fed adult tigers. However, one did have to sign a "hold harmless" form before doing so. It was amazing how calm and docile these beautiful, powerful cats were. Over the 60+ years that it has been published, many of the dance leaders and teachers were featured in *Let's Dance!*. Some were printed as obituaries, while some were printed while the subject was still alive and active. These articles appeared under a variety of titles including "Folk Dance Profiles," "Folk Dancers We Should Remember," "An Interview with...," "Meet," "In Memoriam," "Folk Dancers Lost and Found," and "Teacher of the Month."

Go to www.folkdance.com and click on the Research tab on the navigation panel on the left side. Then click on Dance Leaders and explore the list you find there. Among the many treasures you will find -

- Interviews with Dick Crum, Yves Moreau, Jerry Helt, and Mihai David, and many others printed in the early 1970s.
- Excerpts from the issue that appeared after Madelynn Green died in 1970 that highlighted the last contributions of this amazing woman.
- Articles about Federation luminaries such as Walter Groethe, Millie Von Konsky, and Buzz Glass, the man who was instrumental in organizing the Folk Dance Federation back in 1942 and who served as the first president.

As of the writing of this article, there are just over 70 articles posted. Another 80 or so have been scanned and are waiting to be uploaded and added to the web page. There are another approximately 50 (!) more articles to be scanned.
